5000 CANS FOOD TO BE PUT UP HERE

County Base Ball Tournament Opened Last Sunday

WORK WILL BE- GIN ON HUCE TASK MONDAY

INTEREST WARMS AS ELIMINATIONS GETS UNDER WAY

Dawson County's Fourth Annual Baseball Tournament got off to a flying start Sunday afternoon before a crowd variously estimated at one thousand to fifteen hundred people. The weather was ideal and the great crowd thrilled to the call of play ball. This has become one of the outstanding sports events of the County since its inauguration here three years ago. Each year the interest grows more and more, and we believe this year's crowd was the largest opening crowd since the Tournament's inception. Sixteen teams are scheduled to compete during the playing and the rules of the tournament are that as each team loses two games they are automatically eliminated from the playing. Proceeds of the gate are divided among the winning clubs.

This year some of the teams have been in constant practice preparing to cop the county championship and interest has waxed high. As yet no favorites have been selected by the dopesters. It seems to be anybody's ball game and it is expected to see some very hard battles fought before the final round.

HIGHWAY BODY MET HERE TUES.

A meeting of the Dal Paso Highway Association met in Lamesa Tuesday afternoon in the Chamber of Commerce office as the result of a call issued by President of the Association, Victor L. Minter. The meeting was called for the purpose of effecting organizations in cities along the route of the highway for the purpose of erecting signs that will bring more passengers along the route.

A feature of the meeting and one of the most important was the presidents report of the trip to Hot Spring, Ark. when he made the request that the Dal Paso Highway be included on the Broad way of America Highway.

A motion was made at this meeting for a renewed request for U. S. markings along the route.

J. A. WOMACK DIES SUDDENLY

Funeral services were held Sunday in the Methodist Church for J. A. Womack well known and beloved Dawson County citizen.

His death occurred Friday morning about seven o'clock when he dropped dead from heart attack.

At the time of his death Mr. Womack was 74 years old. He was born in Iuka Mississippi in 1857. On February 18, 1895 he married Miss Maggie Dell Kellam in Webers Falls, Indian Territory now the state of Oklahoma. Soon after he moved to Texas where he has been ever since. He leaves three children, Lestr, Dimmit, Texas, a daughter, Daisy on New Castle, Wyoming and Jack of Lamesa. All the children were away from home but came to Lamesa for the funeral. Mr. Womack was a mason and was buried with Masonic Rites. He was also a member of the Old Sacred Harp Singers.

The funeral service was conducted by Rev. W. B. Wages assisted by Rev. W. C. Hinds. During the service the Sacred Harp Singers sang two selections. Interment was made at the Lamesa cemetery.

Daddy Womack as he was familiarly known will be mourned by old and young alike who loved him for the true friend that he was.

CLEAN-UP CUP GOES TO LEGION

Due to inclement weather only a small crowd was present Monday afternoon to see the American Legion win the \$10.00 loving cup awarded to the organization doing the most effective work during the recent clean-up campaign which ended here Saturday after the judges had turned in their grades.

This 4th annual clean up campaign started some three weeks ago intending to continue for one week only but due to the desire of the organizations to do more work the time limit was postponed for another two weeks.

Judges during the clean up were disinterested persons. The judging committee was composed of Joe Peterson, A. Priddy, and W. E. Bartlett. In judging the work done the judges took in to consideration the amount of work completed during the contest.

In awarding the cup to the Legion a score of 202 points out of a possible 300 was made. The section that the Legion superintended was that section of the city between N. 2nd and Bryan Streets.

The cup was presented by Mayor Lowrie head of the Civic Department of the Chamber of Commerce which sponsored the event and was accepted by Clyde Backenstoss, a Legionnaire. Second place during the clean up was scored by the Chamber of Commerce with a total count of 187 points. Included in the Chamber of Commerce territory was that section of the city between Commerce and N. 1st Street. The Lamesa Delphian Club won third place with a score of 180 with territory lying between N. 4th and S. 2nd, and Houston and Bryan Streets.

Mrs. S. R. Simpson president of the Delphian Society had charge of this territory.

To keep this cup for good the club winning the cup three years in succession is owner of it.

A short speech by Judge J. E. Garland was scheduled for the afternoon but due to the smallness of the crowd this was cancelled according to the wishes of Judge Garland. Conway King and the Municipal Band opened the program with several numbers.

MELON RIND COOKING IS EXPLAINED

Nine Home Demonstration Clubs of Dawson County were busy Tuesday learning from experience the many uses that can be made from watermelon rind. Miss Rozelle McKenney, home demonstration agent in charge showed the members of the clubs how these delicacies could be made.

The meeting was held all day Tuesday in the Home Economics room of the Lamesa High School where all stoves were busy cooking during the day.

Made and bottled during the day were crystallized watermelon rind leaves and crystallized crumbles used as garnishes for dessert watermelon pineapple jam, and sweet watermelon rind pickles. As these products were cooked they were immediately put in jars and put under pressure. Each H. D. Club received a sample of each product made for their club.

Clubs represented at this profitable demonstration meeting were, Wilson, Hancock, McCarty, Midway, Five Mile, Fairview, Ballard, Weaver, and Liberty. A noon lunch was served.

Dr. and Mrs. A. H. Smith and family returned to Lamesa Tuesday minus their car (a Pontiac) which they started in a trip to New Mexico. They were near Taos when the accident occurred. Leaving their car parked near a high ledge the family walked off a few paces. A strong wind unbalanced the car and sent it tumbling down the precipice. It was an almost total wreck.

COMMISSIONERS COURT

The County Commissioners Court met this week in the County Court Room to approve bills against the county.

Preparing for the worst this winter the American Red Cross has furnished Dawson County with 5,000 cans to be filled with clean wholesome Dawson County surplus food to be distributed this winter to the poor and needy. This food will be distributed by the local Red Cross Chapter. Surplus food that is now in the fields will be the products that are needed to fill these cans. Workers from every community are expected to help in this gigantic undertaking and all surplus food is solicited for this purpose.

This canning event will last four days beginning Monday and continuing until Thursday. Below is a detailed account of the event:

1. Place—West Texas Gas Co. Garage, in Lamesa where 15 Steam Pressure Cookers will be operated.

2. From each of the Communities, 4 men and 4 women, about 40 workers, will be needed to can each day as scheduled.

3. If your community cannot supply food, it may supply labor, so select workers to help on the day your community is scheduled as follows:

Monday, Aug. 17, 8:30 a. m.—Bartlett, Fairview, Five Mile, Liberty, Lou, Shaktown, Weaver.

Tuesday, Aug. 18, 8:30 a. m.—Ballard, Hagan, Klondyke, Patricia, Richardson, Sunset, Wilson, Higginbotham.

Wednesday, Aug. 19, 8:30 a. m.—Arvana, Grandview, Hancock, McCarty, O. K., Pride, Sparenberg, Woody.

Thursday, Aug. 20, 8:30 a. m.—Key, MtOlive, Mullins, Plainview, Randal, Shumake.

4. Select leaders to gather food and deliver fresh to the plant. Select men and women workers who will be on hand to help on the day your community cans.

5. Bring two 188 quart steam pressure cookers from each community. Put the name of the owner on the cooker and lid.

6. All vegetables, such as corn, beans, and peas, should be canned the day gathered.

7. Bring one sealer from each community. Put name of owner on sealer.

8. About 30 bushels of corn and 40 bushels of beans and peas will be needed on each day.

9. Leaders should see to getting up their community quota of food and workers.

10. Leaders will please have announcements made at all meetings.

11. The food will be boxed and stored under the direction of the local Red Cross Chapter, and distributed to needy families in Dawson County as required.

12. The County Home Demonstration Council is co-operating and sponsoring this movement. It is county-wide, and men and women everywhere are asked to help.

It is passing strange that in the abundance of the earth there is want, hunger and distress. The granaries of the country are bursting with wheat and other cereals. The mills of the world are run over with cotton and wool. The manufacturing of all commodities was never more plentiful and the abundance of the earth challenges the genius of Man to solve the problem.

Since these conditions are visited upon us perhaps by Providence the best we can do is to be diligent, forbearing, humble and charitable to one another. In keeping with such spirit it is the country wide canning event to be conducted in Lamesa Monday, Tuesday, Wednesday and Thursday by the communities of the county as a safeguard to some extent against hunger this winter. This is the spirit of a real service and the Courier believes that those who are fortunate to have surplus of food will fill the 5,000 cans for their friends and those who do not have available food now will lend a hand in the big community "Working." The event is one practical in every way to meet the challenge to solve a local problem. The Red Cross furnishes the cans, we fill them and they are stored and distributed to the needy under the Red Cross Chapter.

Prospects for a crop in Dawson County, we believe are the best they have ever been during the fifteen years of our residence here. Unless some unforeseen trouble arises Dawson County will stand a chance of harvesting something between fifty and sixty thousand bales of cotton, with an abundance of feed stuff to last till a new crop with a surplus to spare. Granting the fact that cotton will sell at a ridiculously low price this fall, with the immensity of the crop there will be lots of money turned into the channels of trade in Lamesa. Admitting that cotton would only bring twenty-five dollars per bale and we make a fifty thousand bale crop, that would mean a total income from this crop alone of \$1,250,000 in Dawson County or a per capita income of \$92.66 for every man woman and child in the County. This with the dairy products, chickens, live stock and the other commodities the farmer has to sell, it is not likely that citizens of this county are facing anything serious in the way of getting by for another year. There are lots of countries who would be glad to have the opportunity to do as well as the prospects look for us. We could be much worse off.

FOOD PREPARATION

Who wouldn't like vegetables served as a crisp salad? Just the dish for these warm days. And club girls who have been making salads during July find that they are easy to make and very inexpensive when prepared from products grown in the home garden, or from other home produce. Salad greens grown in many of the gardens are: lettuce, New Zealand Spinach, tender mustard greens, celery, cabbage and Chinese cabbage. Vegetables which may be

used for garnishes are: parsley, radishes, cucumbers, beets and peppers. Almost all vegetables and fruits may be utilized to make appetizing salads. At each club meeting the girls prepared a fruit salad, a meat or egg salad and a vegetable salad and an appropriate salad dressing to serve with each of these. Some of the combinations used are given here. 1 cup of apples unpeeled and diced in 1/2 inch cubes then dipped in fruit juice of lemon juice to prevent discoloration. 1 cup

cabbage finely grated and 1/2 cup chopped nuts or raisins. Heap this on a bed of salad greens and add one tablespoon of Mayonnaise dressing or moisten with uncooked sour cream dressing. Two cups fresh shredded spinach 1 cup celery or cabbage, 1 small onion and two diced cooked beans make a delicious salad served with cooked salad dressing or French dressing. Grated carrots, shredded cabbage with a little green sweet pepper and a thin slice of onion are also delicious combined with cooked dressing or Mayonnaise dressing.

Cooked Salad Dressing

Scald 1 cup milk in a double boiler. Mix 3 tablespoons flour, 1 tablespoon sugar, 1/4 teaspoon mustard, 1 teaspoon salt, 1/8 teaspoon pepper or paprika then pour the milk over this stirring to prevent lumping. Cook this in the double boiler until the mixture thickens. Add this to one beaten egg, 1/4 cup vinegar, and 2 tablespoons of butter, cook five minutes longer. This may be kept in a cool place for a period of two weeks. 1 cup stiff whipped cream may be folded in just before using.

Sour Cream Dressing

Whip 1 cup sour cream, stir in 3 tablespoons sugar, 1 teaspoon salt, 1/8 teaspoon pepper or paprika and 2 to 4 tablespoons vinegar. Serve at once.

French Dressing

An attractive bottle make an excellent container for serving as well as making this dressing. Place the ingredients in the bottle and shake vigorously just before using. 1/2 teaspoon salt, 3 tablespoons vinegar or lemon juice, 1/8 teaspoon paprika, 1/4 teaspoon sugar and 1/2 cup salad oil or grease from sugar cured bacon.

Most of the 'guess work' of making jelly may be eliminated by a simple test to determine the pectin content of the concentrated fruit juice. To make jelly there must be fruit juice containing pectin and acid, sugar and heat. The acid content may be determined by taste, though many fruits that are very acid are low in pectin content.

To test the pectin content measure 1 tablespoon of warm concentrated fruit juice into a glass dissolve 1/2 tablespoon of Epsom Salts and 1/4 tablespoon of sugar in this juice. Let it stand for 15 minutes. If at the end of this time the contents of the glass are jelled the juice tested contains sufficient pectin to use 1 cup of sugar to one cup of juice. If only 3/4 is jelled then 3/4 cup of sugar to one cup of juice should be used. Using too much sugar results in a syrupy tender jelly; too little sugar in proportion to the pectin makes a dark tough jelly. If less than 2/3 of the juice jells it is best to combine it with some other fruit juice rich in pectin extract which can be made from the white inner rind of lemons or oranges.

Enough juice to make 10 glasses of jelly may be cooked at one time if all necessary equipment is assembled. Boil the strained fruit juice ten minutes, skim, add the sugar and cook until it is so thick that two drips poured from the side of a spoon will unite and drop off in a sheet. This should not require longer than 15 minutes, longer cooking will result in a dark product lacking in flavor.
