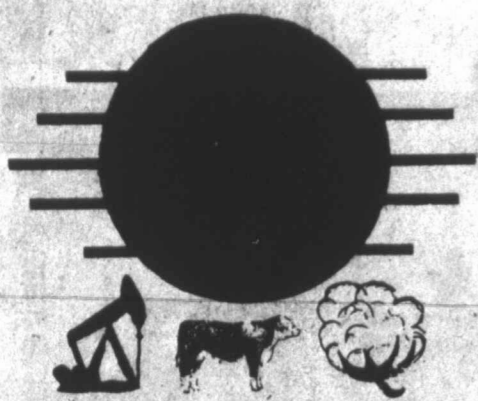

County arrives at budget plan

5% salary increases OK'd; Tax rate to remain same

Mitchell County Commissioners whittled here and added there while conducting a budget workshop Monday afternoon then settled on a tentative \$2.7 million budget that offers County officials and employees a 5 percent salary increase and keep the tax rate the same as last year.

During the second workshop session, representatives of the Senior Citizens appeared before the Commissioners' Court to express their thanks for the support they have received from the County.

Also City Manager Brenda Tarter was present to request that the County's participation in the land-fill operation be increased from \$2,000 a year to \$5,000; and to consider seal-coating ten blocks of city streets per year.

District Clerk Bill Irwin also appeared to request a salary increase, and assurance of proper liability coverage.

The Court then began a line-by-line examination of the budget

and made the following changes:
• Funds for part-time help for lawn care of County facilities was reduced from \$8,700 to \$4,500 per year.

• Land-fill contribution was increased from \$2,000 to \$4,000 a year, but the Court turned down the request for annual paving of city streets.

• Justice of the Peace Joan Merket's request to increase out-of-county travel expense from \$1,200 to \$2,400 was denied. Also request for addition of part-time help in her office was turned down.

• In the 32nd District Court budget, the County's 30 percent share of Judge Kirk's administrative secretary's salary was increased from \$6,695 to \$7,200. Office supply budget was increased from \$475 to \$600. District attorney indigent defense funds were increased from \$30,000 to \$38,000.

Scouts utilizing Col-Tex facilities

Former employees of the Col-Tex refinery in Colorado City never dreamed that the recreation center they built on the northeast shore of Lake Colorado City would someday be an aquatic center for Boy Scouts.

But that's exactly what it has become.

When Fina (Cosden) purchased the Colorado City oil refinery some years ago, the Col-Tex Club, as it was known then, was included in the purchase. Five years ago, Fina donated the building and one and a half acres of land to the Buffalo Trail Council of the Boy Scouts of America. Since that time, the Boy Scouts have spent about \$200,000 updating the facilities and adding acreage, said Gerald Petty, camp director.

Petty is busy this week overseeing the Col-Tex Aquatic Base, an annual event started three years ago with 16 campers and a staff of five that has grown this year to 65 campers and a staff of 17.

The aquatic camp is the only

such camp offered in the Buffalo Trail District which includes an 18-county area stretching as far as Alpine and the Big Bend National Park and including the Midland-Odessa area as well as Snyder and Colorado City.

"This camp is different from the normal scouting camp," said Petty during a break in the action Monday. "This camp is for boys interested in aquatics. We provide the leadership." "Because it is

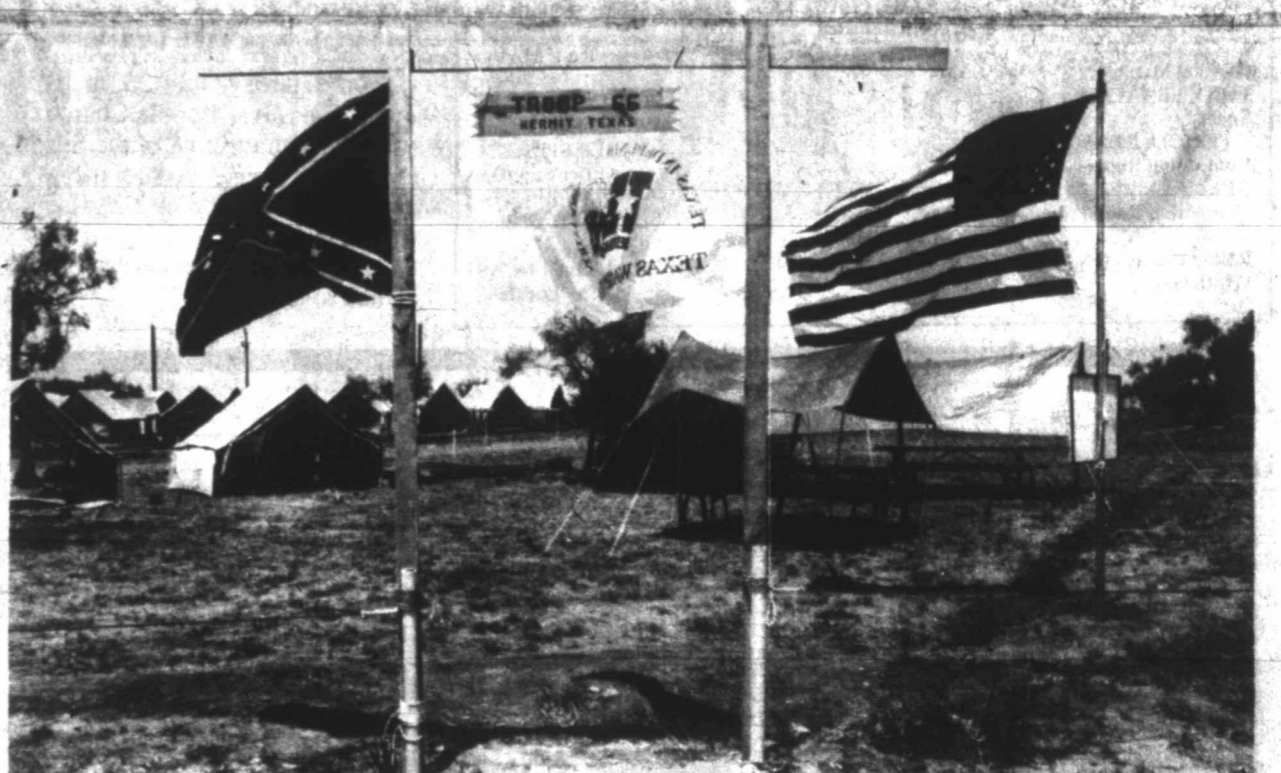
16-year-old burglary suspect

secretary salary was reduced from \$12,604 to \$10,864 to get in line with third deputy wage scale, with the difference to be made up from the office's bad check collection fund.

In the Sheriff's Office, funds for uniforms was reduced from \$3,500 to \$2,000; office supplies reduced from \$7,000 to \$5,500 and radio and teletype maintenance reduced from \$5,000 to \$4,000. Then the Court added \$14,000 for the purchase of a new car for the department.

Workman's Compensation expense was increased \$1,000 from \$6,500 to \$7,500 in each of the four precincts.

The County Clerk's budget was left the same, with the addition of \$2,000 for computer maintenance, and the Clerk was strongly urged to begin utilization of computer operation in her office.

Due to a change in accounting methods, some \$42,000

in state fees were also added to the budget, but this amount will be offset equally by the fee collections.

Commissioner Paul Hunter also recommended the deletion of any funds tagged as "miscellaneous expense" and to be replaced with a 2 percent contingency fund, figured to the nearest \$100 of the total budget for each department.

SALARIES
Requested salary increases for county officials and employees have ranged from three percent by Tax Assessor-Collector Mike Burt to ten percent by County Judge Bill Carter.

Commissioner Hunter then presented the following recommendations to the Court:

With the current tentative budget totaling approximately \$2,653,602, his "contingency funds" would add about \$48,000 and he recommended a five percent salary increase which would add about \$49,777 per year. This would bring the total tentative

budget to \$2,703,379, approximately \$212,000 over the past year's budget of \$2,490,983—a 7.8% increase.

Although the property valuations for the County had not yet been finalized, Hunter said preliminary figures were set at approximately \$390 million. Using this valuation figure, Hunter calculated that it would take an effective tax rate of some .47 to .48 cents per \$100 valuation to generate the same budget as last year.

He recommended, however, that the tax rate remain at the present 39.07 cents. This would generate some \$367,000 less income—from \$1,889,000 to \$1,522,000, and result a \$648,501 income deficit for the proposed \$2,703,379 budget.

In order to make up part of the deficit, Hunter suggested applying some \$262,000 in interest monies due. And since there is likelihood of increased valuations next year through the addition of the power plant expansion project and improved oil and gas revenues, rather than to increase the tax rate to raise the balance needed to meet the budget, he recommended that the remaining \$368,501 be taken from the County's Reserve Fund which has built up over the past several years.

County Judge Carter persisted with his request for a 10 per cent salary hike either through further budget reductions or increase in budget, but the other Commissioners, Ed Roach, Johnny Shackelford and Bill Preston were in general agreement with Hunter's proposal.

Final figures will not be available until the official valuations are announced by the Appraisal Board and the County Auditor completes the calculations for the budget changes.

A public hearing will be held on July 28 at which time the Court will approved the tentative budget figures. Then the budget is to be adopted and the tax rate formally set at the Court regular term on August 10.

aquatic, whole troops may not be interested in the different types of merit badges offered," he said. "Therefore, individual boys from troops may attend although we do have two troops here this week (one from Kermit and one from Alpine)."

"We feel it is an ideal Boy Scout aquatic camp situation," said Petty. "We're thrilled to death over it and we thank Fina for their generous gift."

Petty said the camp has to meet health and safety regulations and is inspected by the National Scout Council, the State Health Department and the local Fire Marshal's office annually.

Merit badges offered include swimming, lifesaving, Scout life guard, canoeing, rowing, motor boating, water skiing, sailing and fishing.

"We average about three to four merit badges per boy," said Petty. The boys range in age from 11 to 17.

"We probably have eight or nine boys from the original camp three years ago back again for different badges," he said.

Because of the large number of campers this year, an eight-acre camping area across the road from the original site is being utilized. The camping area features just-completed restroom facilities, said Petty, who has been in scouting as a professional for 19 years, nine and a half in this Council.

Petty said much of the work done at the camp has been made possible with donations. One donation, \$200,000, was from an area resident who wishes to remain anonymous but who wants to see the camp developed to its full potential.

"We would not be this far along if it had not been for this and other donations over the past several years," said Petty.

Petty said the \$80 each aquatic

camper is charged only meets the expenses for the one week the camp is in operation.

The camp facilities are open to other scout troops during the year at no charge.

"Troops camp all the time throughout the year as long as the weather is warm enough for them to get into the lake," he said. "We have canoes and row boats they can use."

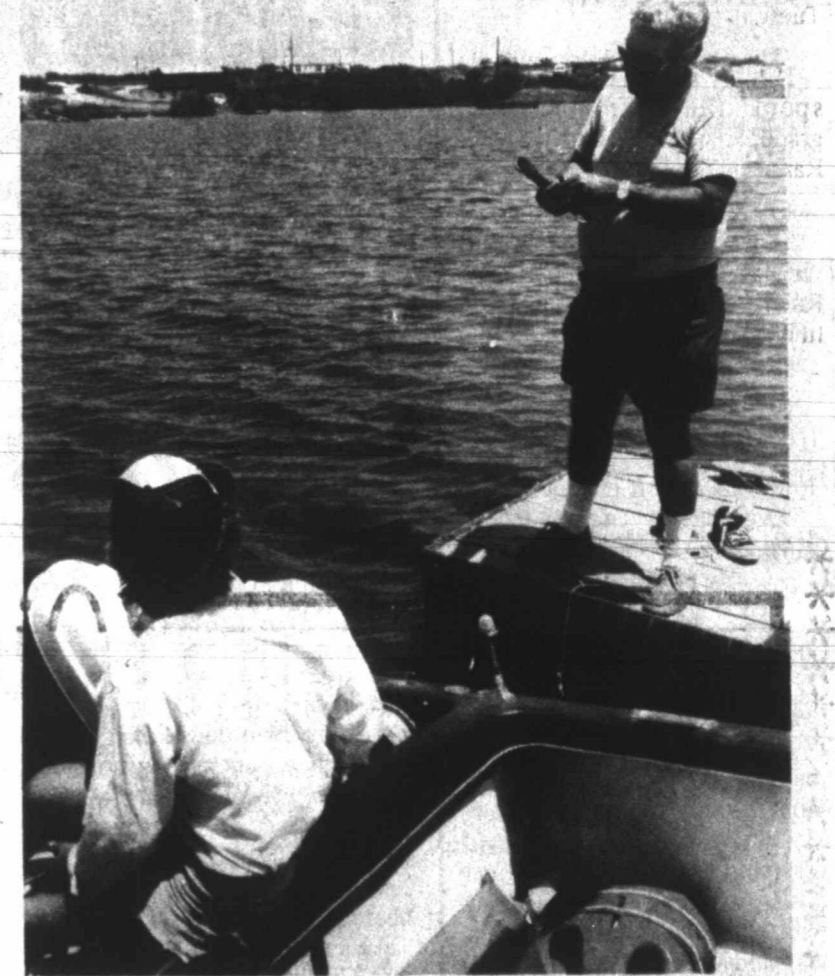
The facilities also are available for reunions and other functions. Petty said that anyone wishing to reserve the facilities can do so by contacting the Council office in Midland. He said a fact sheet con-

taining costs and rules and regulations will be sent to interested persons.

"We get a lot of reservations for family reunions," he said. "We're usually booked every weekend from Memorial Day through Labor Day."

There are six parking spaces for recreational vehicle (RV) parking as well as other parking spaces. The RV spaces are not equipped with water and electricity, however.

The Scout District Director for this area is Fred Yockey from Big Spring.

WICHITA FALLS--Thirteen of the most prestigious ranches in Texas will compete in the seventh annual Texas Ranch Roundup, August 14-15, at the Wichita County Mounted Patrol Arena. The winner of the two-day ranching event gains "bragging rights" as the best ranch in Texas.

The roundup is based upon competition in events patterned after traditional ranching activities, including arena activities such as a wild horse race, team roping, and team branding, among others. Ranches also participate in a ranch foods cook-off, a first lady contest and talent competition, which focus upon the ranching lifestyle.

The King Ranch team, which participated in the roundup for the first time last year, is eager to compete again.

"We enjoyed meeting the other cowboys and their families," said Buster Welch, King Ranch team captain. "We are bringing cowboys from another one of our camps to the event this year, so we're looking forward to the competition."

The Pitchfork Land & Cattle Co. (Guthrie) will return to

defend its 1986 win. Other participating ranches are Cowan & Son Circle Bar Ranch (Seymour), Double U Hereford Ranch (Levelland), JA Cattle Co. (Palo Duro), Lewis Ranches (Clarendon), Moorhouse Ranch Co. (Benjamin), R. A. Brown Ranch (Throckmorton), Renderbrook-Spade Ranch (Colorado City), Tongue River and Spur Ranch Headquarters Ranches (Dumont), U. Lazy S Ranch (Post) and W. T. Waggoner Estate (Vernon).

Participating in the events from Colorado City will be Bob Northcutt, team penning; Bubba Swann, team penning; Roy Wilson, team roping and team penning; Tooter Jameson, team branding, wild cow milking and wild horse race; Rudy Gabaldon, team roping and wild cow milking; Ronnie Clark, team

branding; David Northcutt, team branding; Butch Gass, saddle bronc riding, team branding, wild cow milking, and wild horse race.

Also Charlotte Northcutt, painting; and Rachel Swann, croquet.

The 1987 Texas Ranch Roundup is co-sponsored by Budweiser and the North Texas Rehabilitation Center. Proceeds from the roundup will benefit the North Texas Rehabilitation Center (Wichita Falls), the West Texas Rehabilitation Center (Abilene) and the West Texas Boys Ranch (San Angelo).

Legend of ranch shows beginning in 1881

Established in 1881 by J. Taylor Barr, the Renderbrook-Spade Ranch was bought by one of two inventors of barbed wire, Colonel Isaac Ellwood of Illinois, in 1889 from the Snyder Brothers.

According to legend, the ranch, located 22 miles south of Colorado City, takes its name from the nearby Renderbrook Spring, so named for a soldier ambushed by Indians along its banks. Actually, however, an 1876 Army staff map shows the spring was named for a Captain Joseph Renderbrook.

Ellwood purchased his first cow herd from J. F. "Spade" Evans. Since that time, cattle on the 120,000-acre Renderbrook spread have worn the Spade brand.

Because Ellwood felt his investment had been a good one, he insisted that all improvements be permanent. So, in 1901, a rock house with carbide lighting and the latest conveniences, including hot and cold running water, was built at ranch headquarters. The Renderbrook Ranch also piped water to its cattle long before other West Texas ranchers began to do so.

When his son W. L. Ellwood died in 1933, the younger Ellwood left the ranch, which by now included land in Lubbock, Hale, Hockley and Lamb Counties, to his daughters, Mrs. F. H. Chappell and Mrs. R. Leland Kenney. Fourteen years later, Colonel Ellwood's great grandson, F. H. Chappell Jr., established the 40,000-acre Chappell-Spade Ranch.

The Spade Ranches today con-

sist of three outfits: the Renderbrook-Spade Ranch in Mitchell County, the Chappell-Spade Ranch near Tucumcari, New Mexico, and the Borden-Spade Ranch near Gail, Texas. The Spade brand is common to all the ranches.

They are operated by F. H. Chappell Jr. and Mrs. B. D. Basham, and are managed by W. J. "Dub" Waldrip, who introduced crossbreeding to the ranches. The strains, which never contain more than 5/8 percent of any breed in the cross, are Hereford, Angus, Brown Swiss and Simmental. His plan was the first which crossed two British and two Swiss breeds.

In addition to cattle, the ranches breed horses and sheep. The land is not cultivated, but remains native range.

At 106 years, the Renderbrook-Spade Ranch is three years older than Colorado City. It has been acknowledged by the Texas Historical Survey Committee with a marker for its "White House," a structure built in the late 1800s by the Snyder Brothers, which is still in use.

Texas banks given opportunity to rebuild

WASHINGTON--Texas banks serving agricultural communities and oil-&-gas regions of the nation will be given the opportunity to rebuild their capital through a new program of regulatory forbearance, U.S. Sen. Phil Gramm said.

Gramm, a member of the Senate Banking Committee, earlier had urged the Comptroller of the Currency and the Federal Deposit Insurance Corporation (FDIC) to expand and extend existing regulations which allow banks in economically troubled regions of the nation to be given a grace period to rebuild their capital.

The current forbearance regulations came about as the result of proposals offered by the senator last year during consideration of emergency banking legislation. Gramm's proposals, adopted by the Comptroller of the Currency, the FDIC and the Federal Reserve Bank, allowed a bank with a high concentration of agricultural and energy loans and a minimum

capital level of four percent to participate in the regulatory forbearance program. Eligible banks are given seven years in which to achieve a workable capital level.

Following a recent series of meetings held with Clarke and other banking regulators, the Senator requested a new set of proposals in a letter to each of the regulatory agencies. Gramm emphasized that continued efforts were needed to strengthen our banking system in order to maintain public confidence and speed economic recovery in Texas and other distressed agricultural and energy regions of the Nation.

The proposals outlined by Gramm have now been adopted by the Comptroller of the Currency and the FDIC. Under the new regulations, the forbearance program will be expanded to include banks in economically hard-pressed areas, eliminating the four percent capital requirement for well managed and financially sound banks, as well as extending the forbearance program for two additional years. Banks currently participating in the program will be given an additional two years to rebuild their capital.

Following the approval of the new proposals, Gramm said that he was "pleased with the rapid consideration given by the regulators to the concerns we have in Texas."

Funds are earmarked

WASHINGTON - The Department of Housing and Urban Development has earmarked \$54 million for Community Development Block Grants to small cities in Texas, U.S. Sen. Phil Gramm has announced.

The senator said the decision will provide funding for a broad range of projects for cities and towns which choose to participate in the program.

Grants made under the small cities program may be used, for instance, for housing rehabilitation, improvements to water and sewer facilities, street paving and lighting, and construction of community centers.

Cities and towns with a population of 50,000 or less are eligible.

3. The purpose of the weather modification operation is to increase rainfall to affect water resources. The period of the permit is March 1 through November 30 during the years 1988, 1989, 1990, and 1991.

4. The proposed weather modification operation is to be conducted for and on behalf of the Colorado River Municipal Water District, P.O. Box 869, Big Spring, Texas 79721-0869.

5. The proposed weather modification operation is to be carried out in both an "operational area" and a "target area" to cause the intended effects to occur only in the target areas. The operational area is that area described as being the area between an outer boundary which is defined by a line that encompasses the block of counties of Lynn, Garza, Kent, Fisher, Nolan, Coka, Sterling, Glasscock, Martin and Dawson, and an inner boundary which is that of the target area.

6. The area to be affected by the proposed weather modification operation is the target area. The target area is that area described as bounded by a line beginning at a point of origin at Big Spring, Texas, and running along Highway 87 in a northwesterly direction to Lamesa; thence, north-northeast on Highway 87 to the north border of Dawson County; thence, east along the northern boundary lines of Dawson, Borden, and Scurry Counties to Highway 84; thence, southeast along Highway 84 to Roscoe, in Nolan County; thence, south-southeast to Maryneal; thence, southwest to Silver in Coke County; thence, west-southwest to Highway 87 at a point approximately 13 miles northwest of Sterling City; thence, northwesterly along Highway 87 to the point of origin at Big Spring, Texas.

7.
