Hart Woman Loses Life In Car-Train Accident

Tragedy struck the community Friday night, Feb. 27, when Mrs. Joe (Glenna Dean) Newman, 41, was killed in a car-train accident near Umbarger.

Mr. and Mrs. Newman were returning home from Amarillo, where they had visited Newman's uncle, Chesley Bostic, who was in an Amarillo hospital. They had visited earlier in the evening with their daughter and husband, Mr. and Mrs. Bill Glidewell of Canyon.

The accident occurred at the intersection of FM 168 (Buffalo Lake Road) and the railroad at Umbarger.

Highway Patrolman Ron Boyter of Canyon said Newman was in a state of shock immediately following the accident but that officers were able to piece together details of the mishap from accounts by witnesses.

Newman told patrolman Boyter that Mrs. Newman was driving because he was ill and was lying down in the back seat of the car.

He heard his wife scream and he jumped up, trying to help her from the car but was unable to do so. He leaped from the car just as it was struck by the Santa Fe freight train. He was knocked down and suffered minor scratches on his back.

The crossing guard arms were down, but the car went around the guard rail on its side of the track and approached the railroad. It hesitated and then pulled onto the track and stopped, Fogleston was quoted as having reported.

Dick Gritman, assistant manager of the Buffalo Lake Wildlife Refuge, said he and his wife were returning home from Canyon when he noticed sparks flying from the train. He remarked to his wife, "That train is dragging something."

He said that Newman came running down the track, waving him down, saying that he wanted an ambulance and that he was unable to find Mrs. Newman.

Mrs. Newman was knocked from her car, Boyter said. She is believed to have been killed instantly. The Newman automobile was dragged about a mile from the crossing.

The officer said the train was traveling about 70 miles an hour at the time of the accident.

Mrs. Newman was pronounced dead at the scene by Justice of the Peace W. A. "Bill" Wilson.

The body was brought to La Grone Funeral Home of Canyon and then transferred to Parsons Funeral Home at Olton where funeral arrangements were made.

Services were held at the First Baptist Church at 10 a. m. Monday morning with the

Rev. C. T. Cunningham, pastor and the Rev. Denzil Leonard, a Dalhart minister, officiating.

Burial was in the Parklawn Memorial Gardens in Plainview under direction of Parsons.

Mrs. Newman was born Oct. 15, 1928 in Seymour. She was married Nov. 23, 1947 in Hart. She was a member of the Baptist Church and Order of the Eastern Star.

She is survived by her husband, Joe; a son, Terry, of the home; a daughter, Mrs. Cheryl Glidewell of Canyon; her parents, Mr. and Mrs. O. O. Breland, Lubbock and a sister, Mrs. O' Bera Ready of Lubbock.

Pallbearers were Ralph Futtrell, Warren Lemons, Theron Morrison, Joe Bailey, David Nelson and Bill Rich.

Schools To Be Dismissed For District Teachers' Meet

Special Education Programs in Texas."

Special education students include mentally retarded, emotionally disturbed, blind, deaf, physically handicapped and homebound and those with speech or hearing problems, learning disabilities or minimal brain injuries.

Approximately \$1300 was netted Friday night in the fun-filled basketball game between the Teachers and the Parents and the Slave Sale during half-time ceremonies.

Forty-five "slaves" - students in athletics - were auctioned bringing a magnificent \$985. An additional \$180 in donations was contributed. Concession stand and door fees added an extra \$311.80.

Sales Tax To Be Decided

Hart residents will go to the polls April 4 in an election to decide the issue of a one-cent sales tax. Decision to call the election was made at the regular meeting last week of the City Commission.

Most cities in the surrounding trade area have already approved a one-cent sales tax, one considered by most tax authorities as the fairest of any tax.

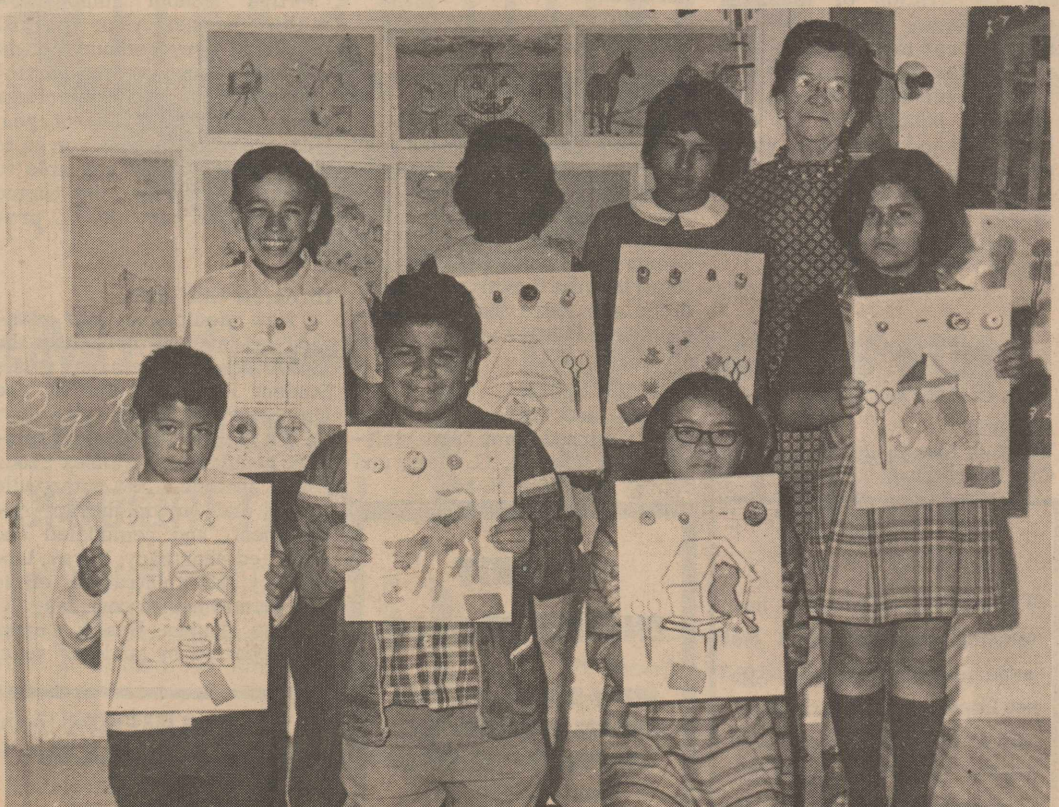
The Commission asks that the people of Hart give serious consideration to the question. There is need for equipment for maintenance and cleaning of streets. Method now used is very slow and expensive.

Approval of the tax could possibly mean a reduction in the present rate of taxation although it is not known, at this time, what amount this revenue might be.

He can never get any job where he has to be bonded or licensed.

He can't work for the city, county, or federal governments.

He can enlist in the military service but will not have a choice of service and will possibly be assigned to a labor battalion.

If this happened to you, would you think you had lost anything?

Girl Scouts Adult Uniforms Fashionable After 20 Years

Girl Scout history is marked by the changing designs and lines of uniforms. In 1912, it was the blue middie sailor dress; in 1916, the captain's suit and Teddy Roosevelt hat. The uniform dress with the Garrison cap came along in the 40's.

Of dark blue duck with a light blue tie, the first Girl Scout uniform was copied from English Guide uniforms. In those days, adults and girls often wore the same uniform.

The captain's uniform later was almost synonymous with the Suffragette's. In 1948, famed couture designer Mainbocher created a classically designed adult uniform which carried over 20 years to 1968.

The latest design for adult

leaders was about a year in the making, from approval by the National Board of Directors of Girl Scouts of the United States of America to the actual appearance of the uniform.

For clothes-conscious ladies twenty years is a long time between new outfits, but Girl Scout adults understand why. The adult uniform is believed to be the largest single-design and color garment manufactured for women outside the military, and any change calls for long, thoughtful consideration. The uniform must cover an age span from 20 to 70 and look "right" in sizes 6 through 46 1/2. Sixty thousand of them, give or take a few,

are sold each year.

The new style now in use emphasizes uniformity of appearance rather than a military look. In fact, the simply tailored green dress, conceived by Stella Sloat, sportswear designer, becomes a uniform only when Girl Scout insignia are pinned on.

In two fabrics, easy-care for summer and a dacron-and-worsted for cooler weather, the dress is a comfortable one-piece, a-line style with walking pleats. There is a matching green beret designed by Miss Emmie of New York.

In keeping with the vagaries of fashion, the uniform has a three-inch hem and can be worn midi or mini depending on the wearer's preference.

High School Juniors Told Of Scholarship Program

High School Juniors --- Within the next year you will be giving very serious thought to your future, and in particular the first step - a college education. For many of you, finances may be a factor as to which school you are able to attend. Perhaps the United States Air Force ROTC program can be an assist to you.

The Air Force offers a four year scholarship program for selected freshmen. The scholarship consists of full tuition, laboratory and associated fees, an allowance for books, plus a tax-free allowance of \$50 a month as long as the scholarship is in effect.

If the college of your choice has the four-year AFROTC program, you may want to consider applying for the scholarship. The training you get while in AFROTC cannot be matched. It will help you develop your leadership potential; create a disciplined personality; and generally prepare you for entrance into the Air Force Officer Profession upon completion of your college work.

The cut-off date for application is normally the 14th of November of the Senior year.

For further details, see your high school counselor. If he doesn't have the detailed information concerning the program, ask him to write or you write directly for it. Address your inquiries to Air Force ROTC (ARTO), Maxwell AFB, Alabama 36112, and ask for the bulletin on the "Air Force ROTC Scholarship Program".

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Girl Scouts Start The 70's With A Bang And A Button

The nearly four million adult and girl members of Girl Scouts of the United States of America plan to start off the new decade with a bang -- and a button! Across the country men, women and girl members, ranging in age from seven to seventy, are pledging themselves to a personal ACTION 70 commitment -- "A nationwide effort to become more aware of prejudices, and to take action to build better relationships among persons of all ages, religions, races, and nationalities".

The idea of an ACTION 70 effort grew out of the 1967 National Senior Conference on Service in the inner city which in the time led to the Senior Girl Scout Speakouts conducted simultaneously across the country in the fall of 1968. These no-holds barred discussions brought to light a number of concerns about which Senior Scouts felt keenly. These were not limited to Girl Scouting, but repeatedly echoed their individual and personal awareness of social injustices, crying needs in our total society, and an especial concern about the existing prejudices between peoples within the community.

Although it seems to be becoming common for young people to object to and want little or nothing to do with older people, nearly 9,500 Senior Girl Scouts in their honest out-speaking, scored perpetrators of the "Generation Gap" myth as "Dodging the real issue" -- which they felt was adult indifference and unwillingness to involve themselves personally in the concerns of youth and in youth's efforts to make changes to better our society for everyone. They said in clear English to their elders in Girl Scouting, "We need you to help us and guide us. We

want more involvement in our projects. We can do a lot, we feel -- But we cannot do it alone. Please get into the action with us!" In response to this plea, the Girl Scout Organization conveyed of an ACTION 70 project that would be nationwide and directly involve a commitment to action, individually and together, on the part of Girl Scouts of all ages. Senior Scouts were invited to submit ideas for an ACTION 70 project, which could be implemented through the existing Girl Scout program. More than 300 different suggestions were received. After culling the variety of ideas, the specially appointed committee composed equally of girls and adults, came to the conclusion that the aims of ACTION 70 were so far-reaching that the exact nature of a project undertaken at community level, should be the choice of individual local Girl Scout Councils. Community needs, they reasoned, and potential community response to an ACTION 70 effort could differ sharply from one part of the country to another, and what would be suitable (and potentially successful) in one area -- might not fill the bill in another.

The plan now is for girls and adults in local council jurisdictions to meet together to identify their own priority areas of need. In doing this, one of the ACTION 70 goals will be partially achieved -- That of building better relationships among people of widely different ages. These deliberations will be carried on late in 1969, and early in the new year local councils will pledge themselves to specific projects they have selected.

One thing, however, that all ACTION 70ers will have in common is the special ACTION 70

button, which will serve as instant identification of adults and girls locally as committed participants in a Girl Scout ACTION 70 community effort. People who don't know what the local project is that has been selected, are encouraged to ask the first ACTION 70 button-wearer they see! Hopefully they too will join an ACTION 70 effort, for to be effective, ACTION 70 projects will need the cooperation, interest and perhaps even the equal dedication of ALL members of the community, whether they are Girl Scouts or not.

GIRL SCOUT COUNCILS countrywide are reaching out to the disadvantaged youngsters in their area, with programs under the agencies of the Office of Economic Opportunity, The Department of Health, Education and Welfare, Department of Housing and Urban Development and Bureau of Indian Affairs, among many other federal agencies.

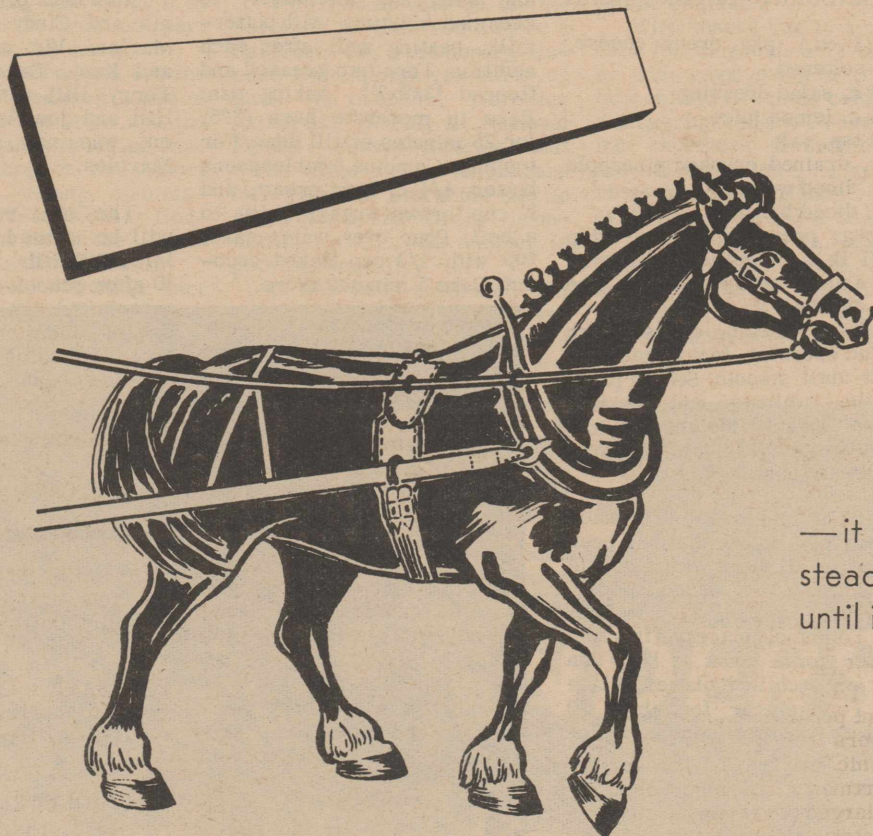

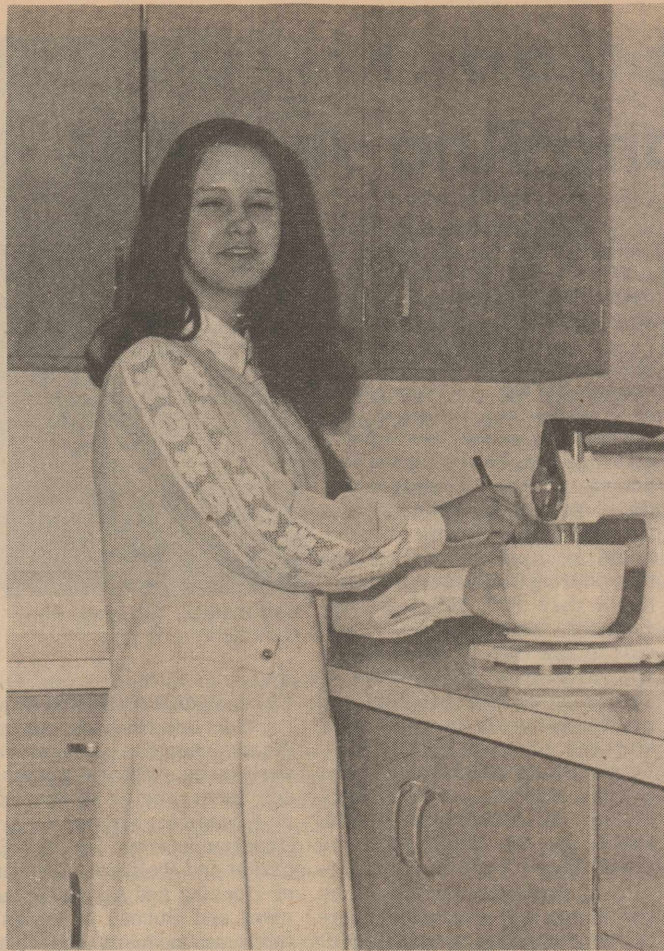

CRANBERRY CHUNK SALAD

2 (3 oz.) pkg. cream cheese, softened
1/4 c. salad dressing
1/4 c. lemon juice
1/8 tsp. salt
1 c. drained crushed pineapple
1 c. diced walnuts
1 c. diced bananas
1 pkg. prepared Dream Whip
1 (1 lb.) can jellied cranberry sauce, chilled and cut into chunks

Beat cream cheese with salad dressing, lemon juice and salt until smooth. Stir in pineapple, walnuts and bananas. Whip Dream Whip and fold into mixture. Lightly fold in cranberry chunks.

Turn into a 9x5x3" teflon bread pan or one that has been lined on all sides with a double thickness of waxed paper. Freeze.

To unmold place pan in warm water for a count of 15. Turn out on a chilled platter. Place in refrigerator for about 30 minutes before serving. Slice to serve.

NUTMEG CAKE

1/2 c. butter or margarine
1 1/3 c. sugar
3 eggs
2 c. sifted all-purpose flour
1 tsp. baking powder
1 tsp. baking soda
2 tsp. nutmeg
1/2 tsp. salt
1 c. buttermilk or sour milk

Cream together butter or margarine and sugar till light and fluffy. Add eggs, one at a time, beating well after each addition. Sift together flour, baking powder, soda, nutmeg and salt; add alternately to creamed mixture with buttermilk, beating well after each addition. Turn into greased and floured 13x9x2" baking pan. Bake in moderate oven (375) for 25 minutes or till done. For topping: Combine 6 tablespoons butter, 1/4 c. light cream, and 1 cup brown sugar; bring to a boil. Pour over warm cake, top with 1/2 cup flaked coconut. Bake 5 minutes more.

Accent on Health

Did you ever hear of emphysema or chronic bronchitis? Chances are you have since it is one of the hazards of cigarette smoking.

The problem of chronic obstructive lung disease isn't new, but its prominence in the field of health is making itself known by the rapidity with which it is disabling people from one part of the state to the other.

Pulmonary diseases are the second most common cause of disability in the state and the number of cases is rising rapidly, according to Dr. Albert G. Randall, deputy commissioner for Tuberculosis Control Services with the Texas State Department of Health.

bronchitis has more than quadrupled in the United States and continues to grow faster than for any other disease. Put another way, deaths from emphysema and chronic bronchitis in this country have just about doubled every five years since 1952.

Why should this be of importance to you? You may be a candidate for a pulmonary disease even though you think you have no problem. Statistics gathered during a National Health Survey indicate that some three million Americans have limited activities due to emphysema and chronic bronchitis. And... the number is growing annually.

It has been estimated that some 25 per cent of those over age 40 have abnormal lung function. Although women and

younger people suffer from emphysema, there are 10 men victims for every woman. Most of the more than 10 million victims are men past 40. And here's another shocker for you who haven't concerned yourself before with emphysema: There are more sufferers from emphysema in the United States than from lung cancer and tuberculosis combined, according to one estimate.

What marks you as a candidate for diagnosis as a sufferer with emphysema or chronic bronchitis? Frequent colds... a lingering cough... increasing shortness of breath with normal activities... frequent respiratory infections... general weakness and a tendency to tire easily... a feeling of tightness in the chest. BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COMMISSION OF THE CITY OF HART, CASTRO COUNTY, TEXAS:

Section 1. That a special election shall be held in and throughout the City of Hart, Texas, on the 4th day of April, 1970, at which election there shall be submitted to the resident qualified voters of said city, for their action thereupon, the following propositions:

"FOR adoption of a one percent (1%) local sales and use tax within the city."

"AGAINST adoption of a one percent (1%) local sales and use tax within the city."

Section 2. That said election shall be held at the City Hall in Hart, Texas, and the following named persons are hereby designated to hold said election; Glyn Reed, Presiding Judge

The Presiding Judge at such election shall appoint not less than two (2) clerks.

Section 3. That said election shall be held in accordance with the Constitution and laws of the State of Texas, and all duly qualified resident electors of the City of Hart, Texas, shall be qualified to vote.

Section 4. That the ballots of said election shall conform to the requirements of Section 2, Subsection G, of Article 1066c, Vernon's Texas Civil Statutes (Acts 1967, 60th Legislature, Regular Session, Chapter 36, Page 62), and to the requirements of Chapter 6 of the Election Code of the State of Texas, as amended, and the language to be printed thereon shall include the following:

OFFICIAL BALLOT

INSTRUCTIONS: Place an "X" in the square beside the statement indicating the way you wish to vote.

FOR adoption of a one percent (1%) local sales and use tax within the city

AGAINST adoption of a one percent (1%) local sales and use tax within the city.

Section 5. The election judges and clerks are directed to comply with Article 6.06, Election Code of the State of Texas, as amended (Section 2 of House Bill 181, Acts 1967, 60th Legislature, Regular Session, Chapter 452, Pages 1026, 1028), which provides that a square shall be placed beside each proposition in which the voter is instructed to place an "X" or other clear mark to indicate the way he wishes to vote; but which also provides that failure of a voter to mark his ballot shall not invalidate the ballot, and the ballot shall be counted if the intention of the voter is clearly ascertainable, except where the law expressly prohibits the counting of the ballot. It is specifically provided that the election officers shall not refuse to count a ballot because of the voter's having marked his ballot by scratching out the statement of proposition for which he does not wish to vote.

Section 6. That notice of the election hereby ordered and called shall be given: (a) by publication on the same day of two successive weeks in a newspaper of general circulation published with said city, the date of the first publication to be at least twenty-one (21) days prior to the date set herein for such election; and (b) by posting of such notice at the polling place in said city not less than twenty (20) days prior to the date set herein for such election. It is hereby found and determined that The Hart Beat is a newspaper published within the City of Hart, Castro County, Texas, and is a newspaper of general circulation with said city.

Lloyd Bentsen Proposes Plan For Small Cities

Lloyd Bentsen, Democratic Candidate for the U. S. Senate, has proposed that the National Government offer special tax credits to industries which will locate in smaller cities and towns.

"Municipal and County governments and Chambers of Commerce are already doing all they can to encourage industrial development in these smaller cities," Bentsen said. "Why shouldn't the national government join in the same effort to decentralize industry and revitalize these smaller cities?"

"The dispersal of population is a worthwhile national goal. Let's use some imagination to keep rural areas from dying... to keep small towns from stagnating... to keep big cities from bursting at the seams with people who can't get good jobs elsewhere.

"I think we should speak in the broader context of population problems.... The great migrations of the past 30 years, the crowding of our major cities at the expense of rural areas, the mobility of people and yet the restrictions imposed upon them by transportation tangles on the land and in the air.

"When we talk of decen-

tralizing the United States, we should not just talk about decentralizing the government. Why not try to decentralize some of our problems?"

"Perhaps then we can cope with them more effectively. President Nixon has proposed that the federal government by 1976 should be funneling five billion dollars in its revenues back into the states and local communities in block grants.

"I am for this approach... it's been backed by both Democrats and Republicans as a promising way to get state and local government to work on more problems which they can handle better than the federal government," Bentsen said.

Financial Facts

Do you know what happens when a foreign government cashes in dollars? And takes the money out in the form of gold?

First the gold is moved from Fort Knox to New York. However, it is seldom shipped across the ocean to the foreign government.

It is deposited for safekeeping in the vaults of the New York Federal Reserve. There the gold resides five stories underground. It is protected by an air-water-tight cylindrical door ninety tons in weight.

When this gold is officially received, the foreign government issues a check. This check is drawn on its bank account to the order of the United States government.

The Treasury deposits this check

at one of the Federal Reserve banks. Both countries adjust their records accordingly.

Ceremony Marks Official Opening Of District Office For 1970 Census

At a ceremony today Mayor Stroud cut a length of computer tape, officially opening the district office in Amarillo from which the 1970 Census of Population and Housing will be directed in this area. R. L. Butler, Manager of the district office, explained that computer tape is symbolic of the Census Bureau's modern electronic equipment that will process the data collected in the census. Others attending the ceremony were: Rep. Walter Knapp, Rep. Hudson Moyer, Rep. Tom Christian, Postmaster C. T. Davis, Judge E. H. Foster, City Mgr. John Stiff, and other city and county officials.

This district office will be

headquarters for census operations in 30 counties in the Panhandle area, including Lamb, Castro and Swisher.

With the official opening today, the active phase of the census gets under way in this census district. About 480 crew leaders and census takers will be selected and trained. Detailed arrangements will be made to enumerate people in institutions, jails, hospitals, colleges, and places other than in homes, all in preparation for April 1 when the actual enumeration begins.

Beginning four days before April 1, mail carriers will leave census questionnaires at each residential mailbox. Each family will be asked to fill out its questionnaire and hold it for the census taker. The enumeration of the district is expected to be completed in about five weeks after the census takers begin making calls on April 1.

There are 180 other census districts throughout the country

where this method of enumeration will be used. The Census Bureau estimates that about 40 percent of the U. S. population live in these districts.

There are 212 other census districts in which the remaining 60 percent of the population live. These districts, for the most part, include the large cities and their suburbs. Households in these districts will also receive census questionnaires in the mail to fill out, but they will be asked to mail them back to the census office in a postage-free envelope that will accompany the questionnaire. No census taker will call at these households from which completely filled out questionnaires are returned.

The Census Bureau says that having the questionnaire in the home for several days give the family time to assemble information about each member of the household, thus speeding up the census and providing accurate statistics.

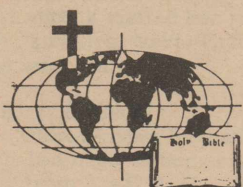
