Local People Will Vote At Telephone Cooperative Tues.

Voters across Texas will go the polls Tuesday, Nov. 5, in the general election to cast ballots on 13 Constitutional Amendments. Some counties will add local issues to the ballot. In Santa Anna, voting will take place at the Telephone Cooperative building. Polls will be open from 7:00 a.m. to 7:00 p.m. Rockwood voters will vote at the Community Center.

Perhaps the most talked about proposition on the ballot is # 11, which, if passed, will authorize a state lottery. Among others are those concerning water districts and financial aid for college students. You are urged to study the propositions and vote in this important election. The News has printed the propositions, 1 thru 8 last week, and the remainder this week.

Here in Coleman County voters

will also be making the choice of whether or not our Tax Assessor-Collector will remain an elective office.

According to Amendment # 14, when the census in a county falls under 10,000 the Tax Assessor-Collector office reverts to the sheriff's office unless the voters in the county choose to keep it an elected office.

The proposition is worded on the ballot: Keeping the office of Assessor-Collector of Taxes separate from the Sheriff's office.

As explained to us, it seems if the office reverts to the sheriff's department, he would apparently be responsible for the job, appointing a deputy to do the work of assessor-collector.

Outreach Needs Volunteers

Family Outreach of Coleman County needs volunteers to train to form a circle of support with a common goal of strengthening family life.

Training sessions will begin Monday, November 4 at 6:00 P.M. in the old South ward School cafeteria (401 West 5th Street) in Coleman. This will kick off the fall Training Program for volunteers to

learn to assist in the 51 Child Protective Services/Family Outreach cases in Coleman County.

A sampling of types of cases since January 1 are:

1. Jim is a five year old whose language skills are almost non-existent.

2. John is eight years old and in need of attention, clean underwear and socks and usually he is hungry.

3. Mary is a 15-year-old mother of a beautiful, prematurely born baby; she needs guidance.

4. From an alcoholic parent and an imprisoned parent, is a 16-year-old parent herself, also in need of encouragement and guidance.

5. Bill is a teenage boy whose mother is in prison for sexually abusing his sibling; he needs positive attention, help with self-esteem and someone who cares.

6. In another family, three small children need attention and emotional support; one has a permanent physical disability (seizures) due to

physical abuse of a mother who no longer has custody.

Family Outreach of Coleman County needs volunteers to train to form a circle of support with a common goal assistance in situational problems (such as discipline or communication difficulties).

There is a long waiting list of potential clients -- waiting until we have enough trained volunteers to do the job.

Santa Anna and Coleman County extends a hearty welcome to hunters and hope you have a fruitful stay in our part of the country. We invite you to visit our friendly merchants and take advantage of the many special items you can find in our local stores to help make your hunting trip more enjoyable.

Wildlife Biologists Don Davis of Winters, Trey Carpenter of Tuscola and Bill DelMonte of Nolan with the Texas Parks and Wildlife

Department would like to remind landowners and hunters concerning the proper harvest of deer. The biologists indicated also that no antlerless deer permits will be required for taking antlerless deer in the counties indicated on the map during the 1991-92 regular deer season.

The regular gun season for the white-tailed deer in Nolan, Taylor, Callahan, Coke, Runnels and Coleman Counties is November 2

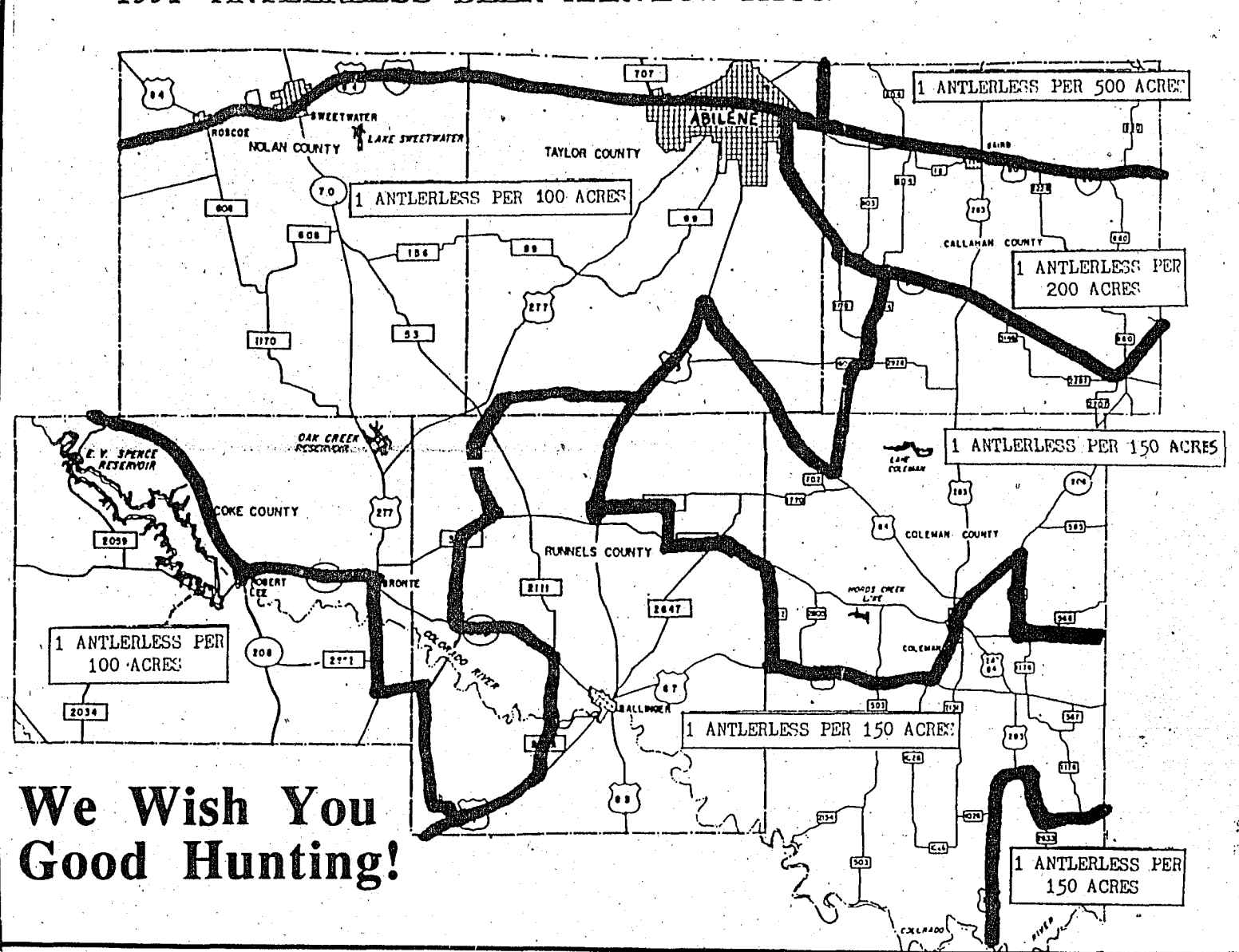
through January 5, 1992. The bag limit in Nolan, Coke, Runnels and

Coleman Counties is four deer, either sex, but with a limit of no more than two bucks. The bag limit in Taylor and Callahan Counties is three deer, either sex, but with a limit of one buck and no more than two antlerless deer.

Deer populations vary from area to area and from ranch to ranch. The either-sex regulation allows the

landowner the flexibility to harvest deer on his property at the proper rate. It does not automatically mean that a heavy harvest of antlerless deer is needed. The recommended harvest rates of antlerless deer and bucks, as provided by the Department, should be used only as a general guideline for harvesting deer in the indicated counties. Mountaineers Swat Hornets; Prepare For Yellowjackets

Santa Anna's offense hit a season high last Friday as the Mountaineers steamrolled Irion County 39-16 to set up this week's key District 11-A game against Menard. Santa Anna is now 5-2-1 overall and 2-1 in district. Menard is also 2-1 after beating Water Valley 35-6.

Both have lost to front-running

Eden (3-0), a 28-0 winner over Miles.

Irion County came into last week's game with a 2-0 district record after going 0-4-0 in non-district. But the Hornets had no answers to Santa Anna's offense and defense.

The Mountaineer offense produced 324 yards - 225 on the

ground. Phillip Hernandez set the pace with 124 yards on 18 carries, including touchdown runs of one and 13 yds. Paul Morris had scoring runs of seven and eight yards.

Tommy Williford, who donated 78 yards on a dozen calls, added a 26-yard touchdown.

Billy Thomas caught a 17-yard pass from Dan Benton for the other

TD. Santa Anna had leads of 6-2, 19-2 and 32-2 at the quarter breaks. But a key play came early in the game when the Mountaineer defense stopped the Hornets on a fourth and two call at the Santa Anna 26.

The Mountaineers then drove 71 yards to Hernandez's ice-breaking one-yard touchdown run. The extra point was blocked and returned 89 yards by Irion County's Ruben Catano for two points.

The Hornets had little else to cheer about until the fourth quarter when they scored twice after the Mountaineers had put the game away.

Both Irion County touchdowns were set up by Santa Anna turnovers.

Irion County did little against Santa Anna's defense. The Mountaineers allowed just four first downs, 52 yards rushing and 66 passing.

Irion County gained most of their 118 yards in the final quarter against the Mountaineer backups. They had only four first downs and 52 yards rushing. Defensively for the Santa Anna, Billy Wayne Thomas had two interceptions and Vicente Frausto one, while Donny Perry gets credit for blocking a Hornet punt.

Coach Mike Permenter expressed his pleasure with the Mountaineers' overall effort. "We scored three of our first four possessions in the first half," he said. "If I hadn't been impatient, we should have scored the fourth time as well." Irion County intercepted to kill that threat. "I'm pleased with both the offensive and the defensive play of our guys. We now have to get ready for Menard. It's essentially the playoffs for us when we meet them Friday night."

Consider Reading Buddies Kit from Nabisco. Two brand seals and \$1.50 will bring your child a membership badge, newsletters from Fivel (comic mouse) bookplates and bookmarks, a door hanger, a game, and a fun card. If your child never receives mail, here is a chance for letters with his own name. Reading these could be exciting for you both.

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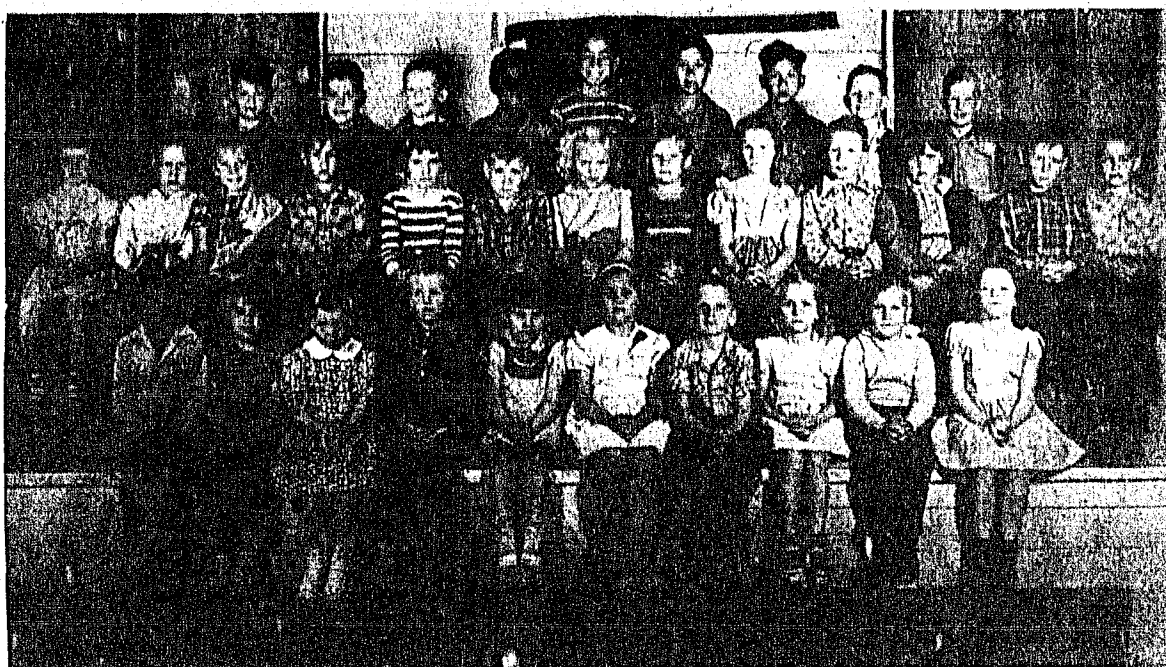

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Summary Of Proposed Constitutional Amendments 9-13

The following is a summary of propositions 9-13 which will appear on the ballot for the general election on Tuesday. The first 8 proposals were published last week.

Proposition 9:

"The constitutional amendment authorizing the commissioner of the General Land Office to issue patents for certain public free school fund land held in good faith under color of title for at least 50 years."

Summary: This amendment deals with lands that are technically owned by the state of Texas. In some cases, people have purchased or acquired this land from someone other than the State. While the State still technically owns this land, some people who purchased or acquired the land did not know that the land was owned by the state. From the time that these people purchased or acquired this land, they have believed that they are the legal owners.

If passed, this amendment will allow the Land Commissioner to give the legal title for this land (called public free school fund land) to certain people. A person is entitled to receive a legal title to this land if: (1) the land is surveyed public free school land; (2) the person could not gain the land's title under previous law; (3) when the person acquired the land, he or she did not know that the land was legally owned by the state and has believed that he or she has owned the land since January 1, 1941; (4) the person has a recorded deed on file in the county courthouse and has claimed the land for at least 50 years as of January 1, 1991; and (5) all taxes on the land, including any interest and penalties for late tax payments, have been paid for at least 50 years.

Note: Public free school fund land is owned by the State. Any revenue that this land generates (through sale, rent, etc.) is placed in the Permanent School Fund.

Proposition 10:

"The constitutional amendment authorizing the legislature to exempt from ad valorem taxes certain property of a nonprofit corporation that supplies water or provides wastewater service."

Summary: This amendment deals with property owned by a nonprofit corporation that supplies water or provides wastewater services. If passed, this amendment will allow the legislature to exempt property that is owned by these corporations from ad valorem taxes. In order for this property to be exempted, the nonprofit corporation must meet the following conditions: (1) the corporation's bylaws must say that, if the corporation stops operating, any leftover assets must be transferred to an organization that provides water supply, wastewater service, or both; (2) the leftover assets must be property that can be used for water supply and wastewater services.

Note: An ad valorem tax is a tax imposed on the value of property.

Proposition 11:

"The constitutional amendment authorizing a state lottery."

Summary: If passed, this amendment will allow the State to operate lotteries. The State would also be able to contract with other organizations that would operate

lotteries on the State's behalf.

Proposition 12:

"The constitutional amendment to increase from 20 percent to 50 percent the percentage of Texas water development bonds previously authorized by Texas voters that may be issued for economically distressed areas."

Summary: This amendment deals with reallocating a percentage of the \$500 million of Texas water development bonds that were approved by Texas voters in 1989. These bonds were to be issued to fund water supply, water quality, and flood control projects. Currently, the board is limited to issuing 20% of the \$500 million (or \$100 million) of these bonds to provide water and wastewater facilities to economically distressed areas of the state. If passed, this amendment will allow the board to issue up to 50% of the \$500 million (or \$250 million) of these bonds for this purpose.

Proposition 13:

"The constitutional amendment providing for the issuance of general obligation bonds not to exceed \$300,000,000 to continue existing programs to provide educational loans to students, with repayments of student loans applied toward retirement of the bonds."

Summary: If passed, this amendment will allow the Texas Higher Education Coordinating Board to issue up to \$300 million in general obligation bonds. The money from selling these bonds will be used to finance educational loans to students. In the past, all bonds in this program have been retired through repayments from student borrowers, not the taxpayer.
