Nebraskan Attacks President After Being Denounced by Indiana Senator as a "Consummate Demagogue"

WASHINGTON, Dec. 23. (P)—In an assault upon the republicanism of President Hoover, Senator Norris of Nebraska today challenged the control of the national party by those who are demanding his own ouster.

The Nebraskan spoke out in blunt terms after Representative Wood, of Indiana, left a conference with President Hoover to urge support for the "eradication" of Norris which was advocated by Robert H. Lucas, executive director of the republican national committee.

Borah Into Action.
Wood's denunciation of Norris from the White House steps as a "consummate demagogue" stirred Norris to question the republicanism of Mr. Hoover and called into action Senator Borah, of Idaho, another republican independent, who answered "let them get out those who have disgraced the party."

"The republican party belongs to the rank and file," said Norris in talking to newspapermen who gave him the news of Wood's attack. "Mr. Wood and Mr. Lucas, even though backed up by Mr. Hoover, do not constitute the republican party. I was fighting for the republican party when Mr. Hoover himself was a resident and voter of Great Britain."

"Mr. Hoover is most liable to be a democrat any day. When he came to this country from Great Britain he was a democrat, accepting office as a democrat. He remained a democrat until the republicans came in power, and when he accepted office under the republicans he automatically became a republican."

"I have never found fault with that. I concede his right to change his political affiliation every time he changes office if he wants to, but I haven't found it necessary myself."

Wood, the first of the republican regulars in congress to speak out in

Jones, Sheppard Asked For Advice

Designation of means whereby Lubbock county and the rest of the South Plains can obtain immediate governmental aid in relieving conditions caused by the drought has been asked of Congressman Marvin Jones, Senator Morris Sheppard and Senator Tom Connally by the Lubbock Chamber of Commerce.

Chamber of commerce officers said that the process by which the government expected to help drought stricken regions had not been fully specified in information at hand, although President Hoover has asked his signature granting drought relief expenditures.

In connection with a possibility that the relief work will be done through the United States department of agriculture, the Lubbock chamber wrote to Sterling Evans, district agricultural agent, of College Station, asking for additional information and calling attention to need in this area.

Texas Drouth Group to Meet

Executive Committee of the Statewide Committee Will Meet at Spur December 30 to Discuss Allocation

(By Associated Press)
ABILENE, Dec. 23.—The executive committee of Governor Moody's state-wide drought relief committee will meet at Spur December 30, with O. B. Martin, College Station, as its announced head today by D. A. Bandeen.

Bandeen, manager of the West Texas Chamber of Commerce, also is chairman of the state committee's executive committee; and Martin, member of that committee, is head of the extension service of Texas Agricultural and Mechanical College. Other committee members are A. F. Pierce, Quanah; Will P. Jones, Childress; O. P. Thrane, Snyder; J. M. Edwards, Turkey, and N. E. Gaines, Bellevue.

On the basis of the \$45,000,000 federal appropriation for drought relief, between \$3,000,000 and \$4,000,000 probably will be allocated to Texas, Bandeen said. The U. S. department of agriculture, disbursing the federal fund, probably will use the extension service as its Texas agency. The Spur meeting is for a discussion of allocation of funds to counties in Texas.

\$724,000,000 Will Be Spent By Government

Public Works Construction in 1931 to Be Inaugurated in Effort to Aid Jobless of Nation; Highways Get Most

Fund Is Available

Largest Peacetime Program in History of America Is Announced by Hoover; 1932 Budget Will Be Used

(By Associated Press)
WASHINGTON, Dec. 23.—Moving to the aid of its jobless, the American government will spend \$724,000,000 on public works during the calendar year 1931, the largest peacetime construction program in its history.

The amount compares with the average fiscal expenditure of approximately \$275,000,000.

Figures announced by President Hoover today showed the largest amount for any purpose was the \$219,922,900 to highways.

Running a close second was public buildings construction with \$173,889,000 available. Rivers and harbors will receive \$159,857,000 and ship construction \$129,900,000.

Fifth on the list was an item which 20 years ago would have been considered an impossible dream. A total of \$30,882,000 will be used for building aircraft.

Of the \$724,000,000, a total of \$116,000,000 was made available last week by congress as an emergency unemployment relief measure.

In addition to the appropriations for public works the government will expend \$170,000,000 for agricultural relief, \$45,000,000 of which will be used for seed and fertilizer loans to farmers stricken by last summer's unprecedented drought.

In order to arrive at the expenditures for the calendar year 1931 President Hoover took half of the 1931 budget figures and half of the 1932 budget figures and added the emergency and acceleration appropriations to the amount.

At the same time the president announced the government intended to see that its contractors maintained the wage levels existing before the business depression set in.

Arrest Echoes Robbery Here

Dick Fitzgerald Is Returned Here from Big Spring on Indictment Charging Robbery of Wholesale Grocery Firm

Wanted on an old indictment charging burglary in connection with robbery of a wholesale grocery house here, Dick Fitzgerald is in the Lubbock county jail as a result of his arrest Monday at Big Spring.

Fitzgerald was arrested at Big Spring by Sheriff Wade Hardy and City Deputy Sheriff O. B. Conley, of Lubbock county, on an indictment returned by a ninety-ninth district court grand jury.

Indicted in connection with the robbery of the Davis and Humphrey wholesale grocery house at 901 Avenue P in the early fall of 1929, Fitzgerald also is under sentences imposed for burglary by courts at Lubbock and Wichita Falls. It was said at the sheriff's office here.

Two men executed the wholesale grocery house robbery and fired at a night watchman in escaping. County officers here said Fitzgerald had made no statement in connection with the charge he faces here.

ROBERT HOOPS DIES

Lubbock Man Was Resident of County for 32 Years

Robert E. Hoops, 54, of 1618 Seventeenth street, died at 8:45 o'clock Tuesday night at a Lubbock hospital following a week's illness. He had lived in Lubbock county about 32 years, having come here from the eastern part of the county about two years ago.

Funeral services will be held this afternoon and burial will be in Lubbock cemetery. Arrangements had not been completed Tuesday night, although it was believed that the rites would be conducted at Riggs-Banders funeral home.

The widow and a son, Orville, both of Lubbock, survive Mr. Hoops, who formerly was a farmer and stockman.

Fund Started For Appeal of Shepard Trial

Unsolicited Offers for Aid Forthcoming Before Verdict Recommending Life Term Is Hour Old

(By Associated Press)
KANSAS CITY, Dec. 23.—A fund was started today to finance the appeal of Maj. Charles A. Shepard from his conviction yesterday in federal court on a charge of murdering his second wife.

The verdict recommending life imprisonment for the 59 year old army officer was scarcely an hour old, his attorneys said, before unsolicited offers of financial aid were forthcoming.

Funds Promised
"We have had many calls from persons who desire to aid in financing the appeal," Harry S. Class, of defense counsel said. "There is no reason why the major should lack money for prosecution of his appeal in higher courts."

W. W. Gordon, former mayor and former chief of police of Kansas City, Kas., where the trial was conducted, was one of the first contributors to the major's appeal fund.

A petition appeared for circulation at the Kansas City, Kansas, city hall which protested the Shepard verdict and called upon the United States circuit court of appeals to reverse it. Members of Mayor Shepard's counsel said he had spent much of the time since the reading of the verdict interviewing those who had proffered financial aid.

Sardius M. Brewster, district attorney, who presented the government's allegation that Mayor Shepard poisoned his wife to be free to wed 24 year old Grace Strunton, San Antonio, Texas, stenographer, described the verdict as "just."

Think Supply Cut

Seizure Marks Carrying Out of "Purchase" of Liquor by Prohibition Officer in Guise of Bootlegger

AN ALLEGED wholesale liquor dealer landed in his airplane west of Lubbock at 2 o'clock Tuesday afternoon, with a load of 30 gallons of aged whisky only to be met by a federal prohibition agent and a deputy sheriff, who arrested him and confiscated the ship and liquor.

Charges of illegal liquor sale, possession and transportation were filed here Tuesday afternoon against the flier, Clyde Renfro of Hereford, before United States Commissioner Victor H. Lindsey. Bond was not fixed. Renfro is in the county jail.

Capture of Renfro and his liquor laden plane was expected to shut off one of the largest sources of whisky in the Caprock territory, officers said. Taking of the cargo of whisky Tuesday marked the largest single confiscation reported in the county during the last several months. Source of Renfro's supply was believed to be in Oklahoma, according to officers.

The suspect's desire to make a sale led him to the federal agent and Chief Deputy Sheriff O. B. Conley, they said. The prohibition officer said he flew last Saturday to Renfro's private landing field near Hereford.

Landing at Renfro's field, the Volstead vigilante talked of air-

BRADY FILES MOTION

Convicted Former Judge Asks Case Be Reconsidered

AUSTIN, Dec. 23. (P)—John W. Brady, former judge of the court of civil appeals, today filed a motion in the court of criminal appeals asking reconsideration of the action of the court affirming his three year sentence for the murder of Leila Highsmith, a stenographer to the supreme court commissioner.

Brady was convicted in Dallas county after a jury here failed to agree.

Brady's attorneys again charged Dr. Lee Edens of Austin was permitted to testify improperly as to Brady's sanity at the time he stabbed the girl.

JOINS CATERPILLARS

SMITHVILLE, Dec. 23. (P)—Lee Abbott, commercial pilot, joined the ranks of the Caterpillar club near here today when his plane, one of the smallest passenger types manufactured, folded up. Abbott was stunt flying and was traveling upside down when the wing supports gave way. He bailed out with his parachute and landed without injury, the plane was demolished.

Following Closely

Most important of the diplomatic developments since the Washington Arms conference of 1922 was the London naval conference—the crowning event of the year. Outstanding Inventions of Future to Be in Field Of Health, Thomas Edison States in Questionnaire

NEW YORK, Dec. 23.—Thomas A. Edison said today the outstanding inventions of the future will be in the field of health and that inventors will be biologists and chemists.

Mr. Edison replied to a questionnaire from the Review of Reviews. Edison himself is famous for his questionnaires.

"Sickness is pretty hard on the workman now," said the 84-year-old wizard of Menlo Park. "It's hard for them to get a good doctor, and proper care is expensive. There is too much sickness. Something will have to be done about it, and that is where biology and chemistry comes in."

Here are some of the other questions and answers:
Q.—Do you think your work would be easier if you were beginning now — with business ready to give money and facilities for research?
A.—Yes, I was 45 years hunting for payrolls.
Q.—Do inventions come from necessity — the mother of invention? — or from scientific curiosity?
A.—Most inventors work to earn money to get a modest living for their families. All they want is enough money to experiment with.

Q.—Will science tell us to eat less, as it has told us to drink less?
A.—Eighty per cent of our deaths are due to over-eating. After the age of 21 a large variety and quantity of food is unnecessary. All those things crowd the stomach and cause poisons. It takes courage to learn restraint, but all that eating is unnecessary. I find that my weight keeps up on a glass of milk alone, every two hours.
Q.—Is there danger that life will grow too complicated, too speedy, with so many new inventions?
A.—I don't think so. Life is complicated enough now.

The answers are supposed to indicate the temperament of a person and to aid the psychologist in his report.

The ordinary man or woman with domestic difficulties attempts to work them out without the assistance of some professor who is generally accepted as a visionary. City Urged to Take Lead in Drouth Relief

W. O. Stevens Says Responsibility of Obtaining Aid from Government for South Plains Rests on Lubbock

Responsibility of obtaining substantial government aid necessitated by the drouth for people of the South Plains rests upon Lubbock, since President Hoover has signed drouth relief bills, W. O. Stevens, vice-president of the Citizens National bank here, declared in an interview Tuesday.

"A part of the county is in as bad condition from the drouth as any other section of the South Plains," he continued. "They are needing help over there had need it badly."

Mr. Stevens said that details had not been received here as to the operation of the proposed drouth relief measure. He is expecting word from Washington in a short time telling how the applications for aid should be made.

Should Discuss Matter

In my opinion, the chamber of commerce, the bankers, the business men and the farmers should get together and see what can be done," he continued. "Perhaps the county commissioners court should make application. Perhaps the chamber of commerce. I should like to see every organization do what is necessary."

There are a good many farmers, Mr. Stevens pointed out, who are in such shape that their situation cannot be helped by aid through the intermediate credit banks, such as have been organized at Rains, Spur, Memphis and Lockney. "They need loans on their crops for 1931, with the government adding," he added. "The government should be prepared to stand a loss if the crops are not big enough. It should be understood that the government will take the loss if farmers do not get a good crop."

Mr. Stevens pointed out that the eastern section of the Plains country, Crosby, Garza, Dickens and other counties are all heavily affected by the drouth conditions. The situation as it exists in the eastern section of this country, he added, was county-wide in the other counties.

Lubbock should take the lead and do what it can to get any federal aid for the counties in its territory," the banker declared.

Heaviest Xmas Mail in Texas History Seen

Semi-Official and Incomplete Compilations from State Postoffices Reveal Gains Over 1929 Receipts

DALLAS, Dec. 23. (AP)—Semi-official and incomplete compilations by Texas postoffices indicated today the heaviest Christmas mailing in history.

San Antonio reported yesterday's postal business the biggest in the postoffice's history, 610,000 pieces of letter mail and 24,750 packages having been dispatched to outside points from that postoffice.

Set New Record
Houstonians posted 778,000 pieces of letter mail yesterday for a new record, but parcel post mailings were not available.

Postmaster George C. Young of Dallas reported the Dallas office had broken all its records for pieces of letter mail handled when the total for Monday reached 1,068,000. The best previous record was established one day last year with 1,009,000 pieces of letter mail handled. Young said this year's figures were below last year's in other mail classifications, notably in parcel post.

Austin said Christmas mail was considerably in excess of last year, although figures were not available. Among the smaller cities, Sherman reported a 10 per cent increase, with 29 extra men employed to handle the business. Beaumont reported a new record set as did Galveston without quoting figures. Waco said there was a "substantial increase in the postal business there. Tyler set a new high record, and Corsicana handled more first-class mail but slightly less parcel post packages.

AMARILLO, Dec. 23. (AP)—Monday's record for mailing was the largest in the history of the Amarillo postoffice, it was announced by W. C. Kenyon, postmaster, who said postal receipts here this year will exceed those for 1929 by more than \$20,000. Receipts last year were \$349,836.24.

A Prohibition Bombshell

FEDERAL Judge Clark's bombshell decision declaring prohibition invalid because of illegal ratification will be very much more than a puff of smoke. The attention of bench, bar and public on the defects of the traditional method of ratification to which constitutional amendments are submitted.

Public opinion in the United States, apart from its attitude upon the question of prohibition, has accepted the view that legislative ratification is inadequate and that it does not assure that mature consideration by the people of the several states which should be required for a change in the fundamental law of the union.

Ratification by state legislatures opens the way to the common protest that the legislatures did not properly represent the people. Moreover, how is the legislator to know on what issue, by what group, with what influence or with whose money he was elected?

Proposal for a popular referendum on all constitutional amendments is an attempt to remedy this serious defect. Popular approval by the electorate for amendments to their constitutions are required by most of the states, taking these vital questions out of politics as much as possible. It is not enough that the courts have held that congress has the discretionary power to take its choice between the two methods. Ratification by direct vote of the people should be mandatory.

UNFOUNDED SUSPICIONS

Political crises in Latin America have sometimes made it necessary for the United States to take a firm stand and deal with menacing situations in such a manner that they would not get out of hand or assume serious proportions.

Such emergencies have more than once served to throw the press of Europe into a high state of excitement. Reputable newspapers have assumed righteous airs and have indignantly or openly charged that we were playing the part of the bully, were oppressing our weaker neighbors and had imperialistic designs upon them.

Unhappily, many Americans are overcredulous when our national behavior is under fire of foreign critics. They seem to accept as gospel every word against America that is couched in the terms of the Atlantic and forget that the United States has no monopoly of friction with minor states. The very nations that are most critical of us frequently visit punitive wrath upon weaker peoples.

Have not the recent revolutions in South America shown our true hand in pan-American affairs or our complete vindication and full acquittal of imperialistic designs? Here was an opportunity for an imperialistic nation to capitalize if ever there was one, but did Washington seize upon it? No, it gave the troubled republics to the south a free hand to work out the solutions to their own problems, demanding nothing and dictating nothing.

If our critics were fair, they would admit that when Washington interferes beyond its borders it is actuated by an honest and creditable desire to protect its nationals and American property, a duty to which no nation can be blind.

With so much material on hand it is no wonder men are materialists.

Practical Health Problems

DIRTY OILS OFTEN CAUSE IRRITATION OF THE SKIN

The wide use of kerosene in the home and industry has been responsible for many rashes on the skin which are difficult to diagnose.

Crude petroleum will cause itching and frequently eruptions associated with infection of the follicles of the skin by germs which are always present. Lubricating oils and cutting emulsions used over and over again without filtering or sterilizing accumulate fine metal fragments which will produce minute cuts in the skin.

The oil becomes contaminated furthermore by the germs that produce pus and the infection is passed in this way from one worker to another. When crude petroleum is refined, the products are likely to be less irritating than the crude oil itself.

Nevertheless, it is known that benzine, naphtha, and carbon disulfide will irritate the skin. Workers with paraffin and workers with shale oil also have these irritations.

The use of impure vaseline or of vaseline containing a high percentage of carbolic acid may produce serious irritation of the skin, subject also to secondary infection.

It is now known that repeated irritation of the skin with coal tar and with oils may result in a sufficient irritation of the cells to set up an active growth which eventually becomes cancerous.

Exposure to creosote, asphalt and other products of tar is sometimes followed by the development of tumors. One of the most interesting forms is called mole spinae cancer. This occurs principally among workers in the cotton industry in England. Low-grade oils used for the lubrication of the machine get on the skin. Neglect of personal cleanliness permits constant irritation and cancer follows. Tar and pitch are particularly irritating in this manner. Soot, lamp black and peat produce irritations of the skin which sometimes are followed by warty growths and cancer.

Fortunately knowledge has become widely disseminated as to the nature of these growths and steps are being taken in all of the industries concerned to protect the workers against the possibilities that have been mentioned.

Doak Seen As Real Trainman

WASHINGTON, Dec. 23.—Secretary of Labor William M. Doak is a solid, squarely-built, middle-aged man. About 50, I would say. May be a couple of years less or a couple more.

He has thick brown hair without a streak of gray. His eyebrows are rather sandy and his eyes are blue. He wears gold-framed glasses.

His photographs give him a plump expression. They do him an injustice. His smooth-shaven face is good-natured and he smiles frequently and amiably.

Nearly everyone calls him Bill. His name fits him very well—Bill Doak.

BILL LOOKS like what he is, or was until he became a cabinet member—a railroad trainman, lifted out of active railroading into a position of official importance in his organization.

He just strikes a fair average. He has not the majesty of the lordly conductor, and yet he has poise. He has a finish which the hard-handed switchman or brakelack, but he puts on no airs.

An all-around trainman is what Bill is, or was.

HE SEEMS a good sport. His predecessor as labor secretary, now Senator James J. Davis of Pennsylvania, placed him decidedly in a ridiculous position.

Jim, the puddler, had a childish ambition to ride, as a cabinet member, from the labor department up to the capitol and be sworn in as a senator, with no break between the two jobs. As the whole country knows, the senate was doubtful about admitting him without further inquiry into his campaign expenses, and did keep him in suspense for awhile, during which he hung like grim death onto his portfolio. Meantime Bill, already appointed to succeed him and actually pictured taking the secretarial oath, waited, too far in to back out, yet unable to enter and hang up his hat.

It was great fun for the spectators, but would have been mighty painful for Bill, had he been incapable of enjoying a joke on himself. However, with three hearty cheers for his sportsmanship, he went right through it with a broad grin on.

MANY FOLK say that President William Green of the American Federation of Labor virtually appointed Bill Doak to the cabinet, by telling President Hoover that he must name, as his labor secretary, neither Bill nor anyone else except a member of some organization affiliated with the A. F. of L. which Bill's union, the railroad trainmen, is not, being one of the railroad brotherhoods, an independent group, instead.

Whereupon, according to this version, President Hoover promptly appointed Bill not because he wanted to get rid of him, but to teach a lesson to President William Green.

Indeed, as has been recounted, Mr. Hoover did accompany his announcement of Mr. Doak as his choice for the labor portfolio with a statement rather emphatically setting Mr. Green in the latter's place.

IT IS LIKELY enough that President Green chided Bill's job for him, but the best available information is that Mr. Hoover was anxious to appoint him anyway.

There are reports that he would have liked to do so immediately after his inauguration, but the A. F. of L. objected then, as later, resulting in Secretary Davis' continuation in his post until his election to the senate made a show-down at last inevitable.

At the juncture it would seem that President Green overruled his hand and President Hoover instantly took advantage of it.

AN EXCEPTIONAL well-informed labor authority, whom I cannot name, but whose relationship is rather with the railroad brotherhoods than the A. F. of L., tells that Green had a fairly good case in insisting on a federation man for labor secretary. After all, there is no denying that the federation is the country's foremost central labor organization.

"Nevertheless, Green put himself in the wrong, not so much by what he said to President Hoover as by what he said to the press. To speak more exactly, by the interrelation which naturally was placed upon what he said."

"HAVING SEEN Mr. Hoover," proceeded my informant, recalling the incident, "Green was surrounded by the White House correspondents the moment he emerged from the executive private office.

"What about Bill Doak's appointment?" inquired Green truthfully.

"What's the matter with him?"

"Nothing whatever, personally," said Green, unwilling to give the impression that he knew the least thing to Bill's discredit.

"Then why oppose him?"

"Now, William Green is a student; not a quick thinker. He failed to realize what his utterance would sound like when he answered:

"We insist on a federation man."

"THUS," concluded the narrator, "poor Green was correctly quoted and yet misquoted. I wouldn't have criticized the appointment of a suitable candidate entirely outside the ranks of organized labor.

"I do have my doubts if the spanking of William Green, which accompanied the Doak appointment, was good policy.

"Those who applauded it are folk of short political memories.

"But the rank and file of the American Federation of Labor?"

Development Of Iron Mines In Texas Seen

Upshur County And Surrounding Territory Likely To Be Great Iron Center In Future; Area Investigated

(By Associated Press)
MARSHALL, Dec. 23.—Ore City, a hamlet in the northeastern portion of Upshur county, would become the Pittsburgh of Texas if plans of an eastern corporation materialize. It is authentically reported Ore City, Upshur county and three contiguous counties, are due for one of the biggest developments Texas has known.

Obtaining Specimens.
The large eastern corporation has sent in a crew of approximately 50 engineers, geologists, paleontologists and other mineral experts, who are obtaining specimens and making tests and assays of the various iron ore beds.

It is officially estimated the iron ore beds cover at least 45,000 acres in Upshur, Marion, Harrison and Morris counties.

There are three separate and distinct strata of ore. The strata are several miles wide and more than 45 feet thick, according to actual tests.

Geologists and engineers conservatively estimate there is a sufficient amount of ore in this field to supply the demands of the United States for 50 to 100 years.

The quality of the ore in this field is, in the opinion of the engineers, as good as that mined anywhere in the world.

The ore is at the surface, or only two or three feet thereunder, making it possible for it to be mined with steam shovels.

Land Transfers Ordered In Will

EDINBURG, Dec. 23. (P)—Land transfers constituting as a whole one of the largest deals in the history of the Rio Grande valley may be expected if the terms of the will of A. Y. Baker, Hidalgo county's millionaire sheriff, are uncontested and carried out.

The will, filed for probate following the death of Sheriff Baker a few days before the general election this year, provides that half of the holdings of the estate be converted into cash within three years after his death and invested in sound securities. The other half of the estate left at the disposal of Mrs. Baker, all property being declared community holdings. The value of the estate is generally estimated at about \$2,000,000.

Three children of the sheriff are to share equally in the property, but are to receive proceeds from the estate through the San Antonio City-Central Bank and Trust Co., trustee.

Heavyweight Showdown Postponed By Fight Fathers

Knute Rockne's Physician Urges Complete Relaxation

Boxing Board Relents with Xmas Spirits

Mellow Influence of St. Nick May Have Worked on Hard Boiled Board; Maxie May Rest for Few Days

(Associated Press Sports Writer)
NEW YORK, Dec. 23.—The big showdown among the heavyweights, scheduled for today, has been postponed, either by accident of design, until the mellowing influence of the Christmas season have gotten in their work.

Peace and good will toward man ruled the offices of the New York State Athletic Commission where the duel of words and wits was scheduled between doughty old William Muldoon, James A. Farley, and General John Phelan on one side and Joseph Yussell Jacobs, manager of Max Schmeling, on the other. But the battle that involves the "Tuscan" standing as heavy-weight champion, and his naive attitude toward a commission ultimatum to sign within 15 days for a title defense against Jack Sharkey, never took place.

Jacobs will visit the commission as a private citizen next Tuesday, when the "Merry Christmases" and best wishes of the season have died away. Under the benign influences of the holiday commissioner Farley said today he would be happy to receive Jacobs, though he questioned whether or not the latter was Schmeling's manager, and would deal with him "firmly but kindly."

There seems to be a general softening of the flinty attitude of the commission toward Schmeling, and Schmeling toward the commission. The flinty fathers have decreed that Der Maxie must fulfill next June the promise he made the day after he won the commission's recognition as heavyweight title holder on a foot last spring in the Yankee Stadium, a promise of a return match with Sharkey.

The commission has ruled that Sharkey does not need to qualify for the match by winning his way through an elimination tournament involving the sensational Southern, Young Stribling, and the gawky gauchito from the Argentine, Victorio Campolo, although promoters insist that without this "build-up" a match between Sharkey and Schmeling would be a total financial loss. The Chicago Stadium has further complicated matters by offering Schmeling \$500,000 for a title go with Young Stribling in June.

It seems likely that compromise on both sides will bring the title duel to New York.

Flood Control Fund Allocated

\$17,818,340 of the Emergency Appropriation for Rivers and Harbors Allocated by Secretary Hurley

WASHINGTON, Dec. 23. (AP)—Secretary Hurley today allocated \$17,818,340 of the emergency appropriation for rivers and harbors work and the \$3,000,000 provided for flood control.

The allocation leaves almost \$5,000,000 of the \$22,500,000 appropriation unallocated pending study of several projects. This will be allocated as soon as detailed plans, rights of way and certain other questions have been settled.

Among the larger allocations were \$1,500,000 for the Illinois river, \$1,000,000 for work on the Mississippi river between Kansas City and the mouth, \$1,450,000 for the Mississippi river from the Ohio to Minneapolis.

The flood control allotment was: Memphis, Tenn., district—Levees, \$100,000; Reclamation—\$400,000; Vicksburg, Miss., district—Levees, \$1,000,000; New Orleans, La., district—Levees, \$1,000,000.

Specific allocations included: Texas City channel, Texas 100,000; Aransas Pass—Corpus Christi channel, Texas \$15,000.

Englishman Is Shot, Wounded

Sir Geoffrey de Montmorency, Added to List of British Officials in India, to Be Targets of Bullets

LAHORE, India, Dec. 23. (AP)—The name of Sir Geoffrey de Montmorency, governor of the Punjab, was added today to the growing list of British officials who have been targets for the bullets of would-be assassins. He was shot and slightly wounded by a youth who also wounded two others before he was killed.

During the second time Sir Geoffrey had been shot at and the attempted slaying occurred just a year from the day that an attempt was made to bomb a train carrying the viceroy, Lord Irwin, and Lady Irwin to New Delhi.

Crimson Tide Sweeps Into Sunny California To Do Battle With Washington Cougars New Years

Tired After Trek Tide Works Out On Arrival

PASADENA, Cal., Dec. 23.—Alabama's Crimson Tide poured into Southern California late today, and though darkness was fast setting in, Coach Wallace Wade whisked his football squad to Patterson Field for a brief workout for the New Year's game with Washington State.

These Southern gentlemen and the accompanying party which detrained at Alhambra, near here, were given a rousing reception both by Washington State officials and Californians.

Fresh from a season of victorious grid struggles, but a bit weary of the long cross country jaunt, the giant Alabama players radiated confidence. They are here for a third Tournament of Roses game, and see no reason why the record of one victory and a tie should not be improved January 1.

Meanwhile, Coach Orin Babel Hollingbery dished out another light workout for his Washington State squad at Tournament park, satisfied with the way his team was rounding into top form.

All-Star Gridders Drill At Ft. Worth

PORT WORTH, Dec. 23. (AP)—All-American and All-Southwestern football players today limbered up on the turf of La Grange field in preparation for the Christmas Day gridiron contest here.

Ernie Nevers and his Chicago Cardinals of the National Professional Football League will meet an aggregation of former Southwest Conference football men, the majority of whom performed for Texas Christian University and Southern Methodist university in their collegiate days.

The Cardinals, working out under the direction of Roy Baker, one-time All-American back of the University of Southern California, put their offensive into shape so that Captain Nevers will find everything ready when he reaches the city.

Predict Help For Producer

Oil Industry Says Aid Will Be Given Independents from Within Own Ranks as Prairie Withdraws from Market

WASHINGTON, Dec. 23. (AP)—The oil industry today notified Secretary Wilbur that from within its own ranks would come help for 10,000 small, independent producers threatened with extinction by the impending withdrawal from the market of the Prairie Oil and Gas company.

Wilbur, chairman of the Federal oil conservation board, announced several of the major companies had informed him by telegraph they were sending representatives to Independence, Kan., to meet with the producers in the Kansas and Oklahoma fields.

Plans for buying the production that has been purchased heretofore by the Prairie company will be laid at the meeting, the secretary said. Meanwhile, the producers and the American Petroleum Institute are seeking the most feasible plan.

The date for the meeting has not been set. Secretary Wilbur declined to make public the names of the companies.

The Prairie company notified the conservation board it stood ready to offer its pipeline facilities to the producers to move their oil to new markets.

Protests of the producers were filed with President Hoover, who called the conservation board into session to consider plans for obtaining relief.

DIES OF INJURIES

SALINA, Kans., Dec. 23. (AP)—Ben Laker, 24, who fell 48 feet from a theater building, December 17, at the time believed uninjured died today in a hospital here. Physicians said he had suffered internal injuries.

Famous Coach Suffers from Season's Toil

Possibility of Complete Breakdown Shown by His Doctors May Take Rockne from Public Eye

(By The Associated Press)
ROCHESTER, Minn., Dec. 23.—His physician's warning to limit his strenuous activities or face the possibility of a complete breakdown confronted Knute Rockne, famous football coach of Notre Dame tonight.

Dr. C. J. Barborak, of the Mayo Clinic, gave his verdict after an exhaustive examination of the coach who came here last week, for a physical inventory fearing a return of phlebitis of the leg, an ailment that once before sent him to bed.

Rockne, the physician said, shows no immediate signs of further trouble in the leg but is suffering from fatigue which closely approaches the line of exhaustion and must limit his activities or face grave consequences.

Immediately after the outcome of the physician's examination was announced, the Notre Dame coach returned to his room at a hotel here and denied himself to all inquirers.

Dr. Barborak explained his findings do not mean that Rockne must cease coaching but he must place a curb on his other activities, including speech-making, writing for magazines and other tasks, which coupled with the strenuous gridiron season just ended have sapped his strength.

Five Georgia Tech Coaches Notified No Longer Needed

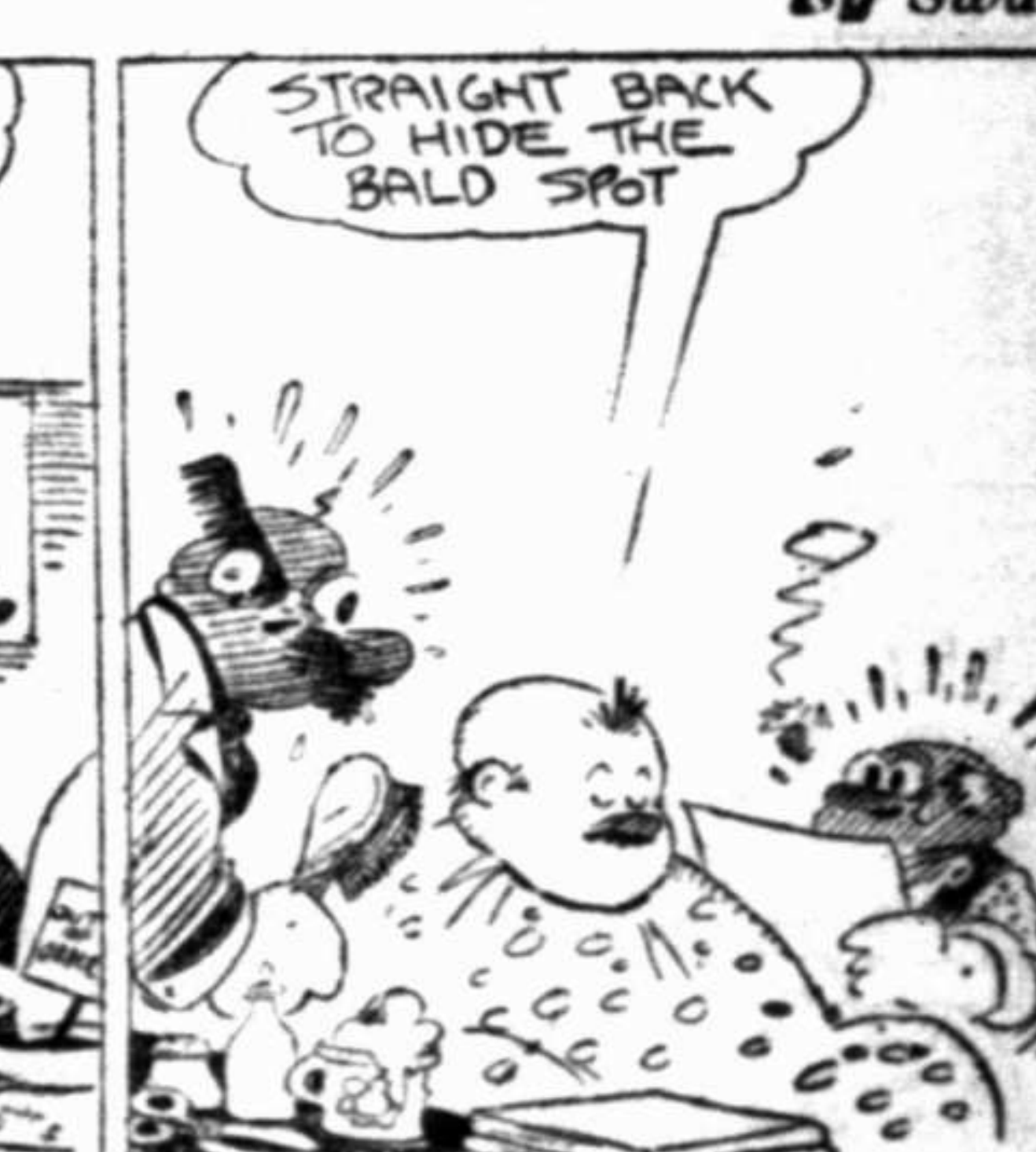

John Herd Is Elected Head Of Post C.-C.

Business Men, Farmers and About Fifty Members Attend Annual Banquet of Organization Monday Night

POST, Dec. 23. (Special)—John Herd was elected president of the Post Chamber of Commerce at the annual banquet of that body at city hall here Monday night.

Leo Walkow was chosen as vice-president and George Samson was re-elected as secretary of the Post chamber. Four men were elected to the board of directors.

Business men, farmers and about 50 members of the chamber attended the meeting.

Charles E. Coombes and D. A. Bunde, president and secretary respectively of the West Texas Chamber of Commerce, who were scheduled as the principal speakers, were unable to attend the meeting because of road conditions. The assembly convened at 8 o'clock at the city hall.

Four Men Elected

Four men elected as members of the chamber board of directors for two-year terms were: Dr. A. C. Surman, re-elected, and Walter Duckworth, H. Jones and Leo Walkow. Outgoing directors, in addition to Doctor Surman, were T. Bouchier, Knox Parr and T. R. Greenfield.

The four directors retained for another year are: L. B. Sarge, J. T. Herd, M. L. Mason and Bob Warren.

Retiring President Greenfield presided at the meeting and made a brief report of the chamber's work during the last year. George Samson, secretary, presented a financial report.

Mr. Sarge made a favorable financial report on Two Draw Lake, which is operated through the Post Chamber of Commerce.

Wheat Distributed

Distribution by the Post chamber of 1,500 bushels of wheat to 238 farmers to replenish winter pastures was reported by Mr. Herd, who said that it had been planted and that already there was a good stand which would prove beneficial.

Mr. Herd gave the annual report of the Post chamber, in which he said that \$122 had been paid in the recent Red Cross drive the amount being more than that usually obtained here.

The drought relief committee report also was made by Mr. Herd. A total of \$259 has been spent by the Post Chamber of Commerce in drought relief, he said.

Tells of R. M. A.

Guy Speck, president of the Republic Merchants Association, reported activities of the association and it was organized several months ago.

Activities of the Goodfellow club which acts in cooperation with the chamber of commerce, were reported by W. R. Greaser.

Purpose of the Texas-Made Product campaign was explained and its history, from the time it was originated in Post until it was adopted by the West Texas Chamber of Commerce, was related by Doctor Surman. The West Texas chamber at its recent annual meeting at Abilene made the Texas-Made Product campaign a part of the regional body's program for the new year by adopting the plan in a resolution.

Reports on Campaign

Herbert Jones, manager of the Postex Cotton mills here, reported further on the Texas-Made Product plan and said that Texas manufacturers who met recently at Waco also had included in the scheme in the program.

The Postex mills now produce about one-tenth of the sheets and pillow cases used in Texas, Mr. Jones said. If the demand could be increased so that the Postex mills would produce one-third of all such articles in the state, the size of plant and the number of employees could be doubled, according to Mr. Jones.

J. P. Maxey, farmer, advocated planting of longer staple cotton by Garza county farmers and said that if such cotton were produced, it could be sold to the Postex and other mills and an additional premium of from \$5 to \$10 a bale realized.

The Post chamber adopted the customary resolution of thanks to directors for the work accomplished during the last year, and voted to invite Mr. Coombes and Mr. Bunde to speak here later.
