The Ohio Oil Company No. 1 Swenson Land & Cattle Company, Northeast Garza County wildcat, 2,367 feet from north and 1,980 feet from west lines of section 26, block 2, H&N survey, was reported to be bottomed at 7,956 feet in an unidentified line, and to be running 5 1-2 inch casing.

No further information on this project has been released by the operator. Some observers think the zone at the bottom is Ellenburger.

With the promise of the best FFA and 4H stock show ever held in the part of the state, the Dickens county show will be held in Spur on Saturday, April 3, with the heaviest entree list that has ever been recorded.

The features of the show will be in the beef, steers and hog classes with a large showing of each group. Approximately 50 calves and the same number of fat hogs will be exhibited.

In the breeding classes of gilts, duross, chesherwhites, hampshires and one or two other types will be shown and judged also the breeding class in steers.

A horse show will also be held in connection with the show, the plans for this part of the show are being formulated.

Classes will be provided for fat lambs as another feature.

Charles E. Fisher, of the Spur Experiment station will be superintendent over all shows.

Judges for the show are Stud Barnes of Texas A & M, L. M. Hargroves of Texas Tech in the breeding classes and Robert McAttee of Spur as judge in the horse show.

Breeders are advised that they will be allowed to exhibit their breeding stock in this show if they desire. Any information concerning the show can be obtained from Charles Fisher at the experiment farm.

MAHON OPPOSES CIVIL RIGHTS PROGRAM, UNITY NEEDED NOW

Washington, March 8.—Refusal of the House to add an anti-racial segregation amendment to an appropriation bill was praised today by Rep. Mahon (D-Tex.).

He was a leader in the House Appropriations committee move which cut the Civil Rights proposal from the Labor Department - Federal Security agency money bill.

Has Opposed Program

After the House rejected an amendment to put the provision in the measure, and passed the bill, Mahon arose to say:

"I am gratified at the non-partisan action of the House in killing this obnoxious amendment."

In his remarks before the amendment by Rep. Marston (AL-NY) came up, Mahon said:

"On previous occasions and in former years I have condemned consistently and voted against this so-called civil rights legislation."

"I again wish to register my emphatic protest against the opposition to federal anti-poll tax legislation, federal anti-lynching legislation and legislation designed to prevent segregation of the races and to set up a fair employment practices commission—F.E.P.C."

"Such legislation is dangerous, unconstitutional, against the public interest, and it should not even be considered by Congress, much less enacted into law."

"We need unity at this time in our history and an application of all our energies to the great national and international questions which press down upon us. I respectfully request, and demand if I may, that no more legislation of such kind and character be presented to the floor of the House of Representatives. Both Democrats and Republicans should join together in such a course of action."

Doss Flying School Opens In Spur

The GI School of Flying, that Spur has looked forward for some months, has recently been approved and officially opened Monday March 1, under the management of W. M. Doss of the Spur Air Port.

At the present time ten students are enrolled. There is a requirement of five hours flying prescribed per week, depending on weather conditions.

Two nights a week are to be devoted to ground instruction under a trained instructor, although this part of learning to fly may not prove so sensational to the student, it is still a very necessary part of the instruction in developing a well rounded pilot.

It will take from an eight to ten weeks course to procure a private license. Every one should realize the value of these schools that are being established over our country and make an effort to take advantage of this opportunity to become a licensed pilot.

Spur is proud to have this school located here and hopes are maintained that it may prove to be one among the very best.

Their is more laughter and song here than in any country on earth. There are more liberal people who can hear the cry of distress around the world and send relief.

Why did men die from starvation in several great nations of the world for six thousand years, and are still doing so?

Why is it we have never had a famine? I do not know, but I believe it is because ours is the nearest to a Christian Democracy the world has ever known.

If the gates of these United States were opened to emigrants for ninety days all the boats afloat could not haul them from the ports of other nations to our ports.

Do we appreciate, as we should, welcome you to her country and she would I am sure. How many would seek passage from the U. S. to her ports? And yet three are people we hear who want to make this Country Communist which carries with it pogromism. We are few men desire this, and we wish they could all be banished from this country to live for a while. Where they would be compelled to pay tribute to Stalin and his bunch of cohorts that are enslaving millions of people who want freedom from the little bits for the Texas Spur and occasionally some fellow scribbles. I still think this is a good old world, and that there is more good than bad in the hearts of most of the people of the United States, and that there is a thorough desire in the hearts of most of the people of the world to have the opportunities that we have.

Yes Spur is a good town, Texas Spur a good paper. We have fine prospects for green pastures and beautiful crops, and flower bedded prairies. Where white faced calves romp and play.

"Nobody loves a fat man," I have heard, and nobody loves a pessimist, so why not keep on the optimist's side during 1948.

The Spur School needs the help of every person in our school district to help in this matter. It is very necessary that we have the name of every child in our district as we employ teachers in accordance to the number of students. If we miss any great number of children our school will be crowded as to the number of teachers.

Homes that have children going to school are not so hard to get the names of the school child, but homes that do not have children in school are very hard. If you have a neighbor that has children that are not in school, please see that these children's names are given to some of the school officials.

The oldest child in each family will be given a Census blank. Please fill this in and have your child to return it that day.

BIRTH CERTIFICATES

Birth Certificates will be required of each child that enters the Spur School for the first time. (First Grade.) Please start now in securing this for your child as it will be necessary.

LOOKING TO THE FUTURE

The Spur School officials are going to make a Survey as to the future enrollment of the Spur Schools. We are requesting that each child in our school district that is under the school age be Enumerated. These children will not be included with the school children census but will have special blanks passed out with the School Census blanks, every person in Spur should put fourth their best efforts in order that we may accomplish what we want. We must know what the future enrollment in the Spur School is going to be in order that we make our plans to meet this enrollment. This can not be done

Secretary Treasurer, S. L. Benefield gave a report on the Cooperative's business for the year ending March 1, 1948.

He also called attention to a booklet published by the Department of Agriculture that was distributed at the time of the meeting entitled, "A Guide for members of Rural Electric Co-ops." It was pointed out that the success or failure of a co-operative largely depends on its members.

Prizes consisting of various Electrical Appliances given by the Co-op., and local dealers were awarded to some members present.

Veterans Offered Old Regiments For Re-Enlistments

Spur men who served in any of the Armed Forces during World II will find it worth their while to investigate a new opportunity for qualified veterans to enlist in the Army for service with the famous 7th Infantry Regimental Combat Team of the 3d Infantry Division, Major Harold Fulghum Recruiting Officer said here today.
Recently authorized by the Department of the Army, this new enlistment opportunity makes it possible for men with prior service who meet prescribed qualifications to enlist in the Army in training and length of service. They will be assigned to this Combat Team for a minimum of three years. The 7th RCT is now stationed at Fort Benning, Ga.
"The 7th Infantry Regimental Combat Team," Major Fulghum said, "chalked up a record of 531 days of combat against the Nazis in North Africa, Sicily, Italy, France, and Germany during

Fire Protection Is Needed In Schools

"Will your child lose his life in a school fire this year? Or be injured? Or go through the terrifying experience of a fire at school?"
These were questions Marvin Hall, State Fire Insurance Commissioner, wondered if Texas parents had considered, in the last of a series of articles he has prepared on school fire hazards.
"The following statistics will give a good idea of how desperately the school fire situation is," Hall says "and what a great need there is for parents, teachers and school boards over the State to work together to promote safety measures in schools."
Nationally, 384 children have been killed in school fires since 1930. In Texas, the average yearly school fire property loss from 1943-47 was 375 thousand dollars.
"More than 2,000 school fires occur annually in the United States," the Commissioner stated. "In spite of modernized fire pro-

Texas Eggs Shipped To Hatcheries In U.S.

A total of 1,440 Texas hatching eggs that may make poultry history, were placed in special incubators at Bradley's Hatchery here, today.
The eggs were shipped by Western Hatcheries of Dallas and Frank W. Allenson of Breham, two of 40 breeders from 26 states in the national Chicken - of - Tomorrow contest which Dewey H. Termohlen, chief of the U.S. Department of Agriculture's poultry branch, predicts "will revolutionize the poultry industry within the next five years."
The contest will culminate a three-year search for a superior meat-type chicken. The finalists, winners of regional and state-wide trials conducted during the past two years in 44 states, are competing for \$7,000 in cash prizes donated by A. & P. Food Stores. Each contestant has entered 720 eggs in the contest supervised by a national committee of government experts and poultry industry leaders.
By March 21, the precious eggs will be hatched, and flocks of 400 super chicks selected from each batch. The 16,000 birds will be raised under identical conditions for a 12-week period. Birds will be dated for meat characteristics, feed consumption, hatchability, growth and mortality. They will go to the dressing plant on June 21, and the judges will name the winner of A & P's \$5,000 grand prize on June 24.
Western Hatcheries, with a White Wyandotte - White Rock cross, won top honors in the 1946 state contest, fourth in 1947, and sixth in the Southwestern regional.

Gasoline Saving

Detroit - While the nation is faced with a possible shortage of oil and gasoline, motorists should take every precaution to see that their engines are properly adjusted to give maximum mileage on the least possible amount of fuel, E. L. Harrig, manager of the service and mechanical department, Chevrolet Motor Division, said today.
"Carburetor adjustment, proper timing and an engine tune-up are the most important points to have checked in order to save fuel," Harrig said. "Chevrolet owners should let their dealers' service departments check these points. Not only will it help save valuable fuel, but it will save the motorist money."
Harrig estimated that as much as 20 per cent might be saved in fuel consumption if an improperly adjusted engine is tuned and adjusted correctly for the spring season. Owners should see to it that their carburetor is adjusted for leaner mixtures in warm-weather driving, and that the idling adjustment is set for slower engine - idling speed in spring and summer.

Spring Gardens

The spring garden situation is running a little behind schedule in soil preparation due to the recent unfavorable weather the past 30 days, says J. F. Rosborough, extension horticulturist of Texas A. & M. College, and most gardeners have not been able to get their soil ready at the right time. January's weather brought soil temperatures down pretty low, and in many localities the soil is extremely wet.
At the first chance, when the sun warms up things a little, the soil should be plowed into beds; wait several days, then rebled to increase warmth of the soil, and to aerate the soil through plowing.
Commercial fertilizer should be applied seven to ten days before seed planting time; five or six pounds of 5-10-5 to 100 feet of row is good, will provide a quick meal for the young plants and stimulate early growth.
Barnlot fertilizer is a good substitute for commercial fertilizer in the blackland areas of Texas. Use 50 to 100 pounds of

the barnlot fertilizer per 100 foot space.
When good weather gets around, any of these can be planted: onion plans, beets, carrots, English peas, lettuce, Irish potatoes, sweet corn, and spring cabbage. And don't forget to save part of the garden space for March plantings, Rosborough says.

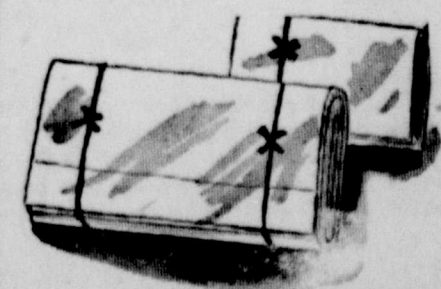

Despite this final defeat a better season is expected next year.

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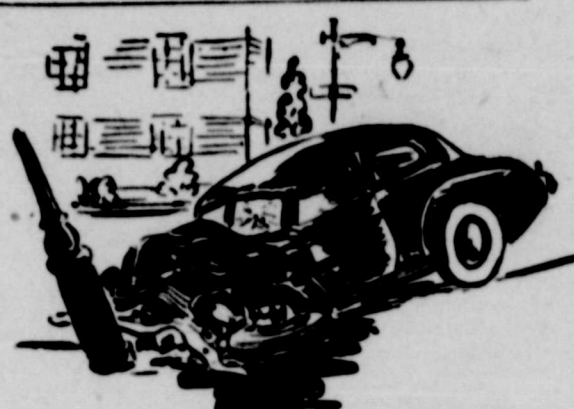
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Junior Party

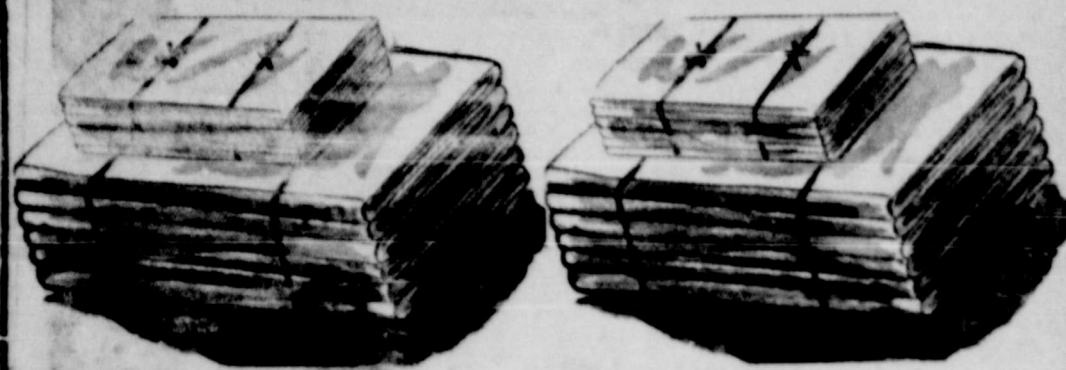

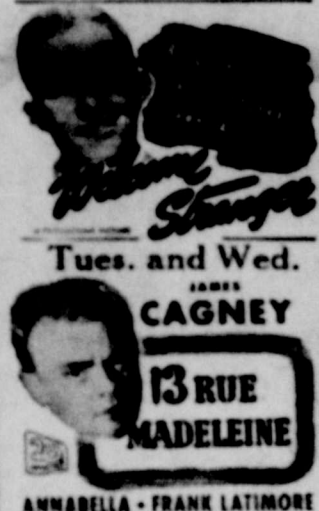
