Trent scored in the first quarter on a 25 yard spint and made the extra point to go ahead of the Bulldogs. They scored again in the second quarter on a pass that carried 43 yards and again made the extra point and the half ended with the Bulldogs 14 points behind. The first half was all in favor of the Gorillas.

The Gorillas scored again in the third period and made the extra point to put them ahead 21 to 0.

The Bulldogs came alive in the third quarter and carried a sustained drive to Trent's 1 where Galvan carried the ball over for the Bulldogs' first score after Don Templeton had made most of the yardage on the march. The Bulldogs were on fire after the touchdown and held the Gorillas scoreless the rest of the night and making another touchdown themselves in the fourth quarter when Templeton broke through on a 35 yard jaunt to cross the goal standing up. This time the extra point was good bringing the score 21 to 13 but time ran out before the dogs could put across another score.

Two completed passes by the Gorillas, one for 35 yards and the other a 43 yard touchdown was the big factor in the defeat of the Bulldogs. The Gorillas threw nine passes but completed only two. The Bulldogs threw only one pass and had it intercepted.

This week the Bulldogs go to Stanton for another non-conference game on Friday night.

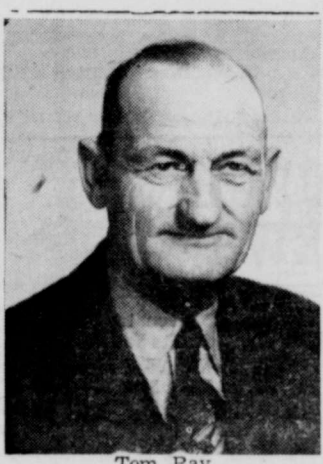

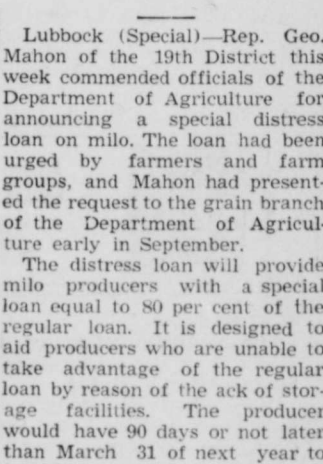
Reta Beights, sophomore in McMurry College, was one of six girls selected as pledges of T. I. P. girls social club at the college.

Geo. Mahon (Special)—Rep. Geo. Mahon of the 19th District this week commended officials of the Department of Agriculture for announcing a special distress loan on milo. The loan had been urged by farmers and farm groups, and Mahon had presented the request to the grain branch of the Department of Agriculture early in September.

The distress loan will provide milo producers with a special loan equal to 80 per cent of the regular loan. It is designed to aid producers who are unable to take advantage of the regular loan by reason of the lack of storage facilities. The producer would have 90 days or not later than March 31 of next year to locate storage and convert his distress loan into a regular loan. Details of the program are available through County ASC offices.

The distress loan is necessary by reason of the very heavy milo production, limitation of elevator capacity and the critical shortage of boxcars to transport the milo to available storage. Mahon said that it was his hope that the distress loan would tend to stabilize the marketing of the milo crop. He said that he hoped the new program would not have to be used in a very big way as it had certain disadvantages and was primarily meant as an aid to a more orderly disposition of the crop.

At the same time the distress loan was announced, a 3 cents per hundred weight increase in the loan rate was announced. The previous rate was an interim rate. The new rate is the final rate for the 1957 milo crop.

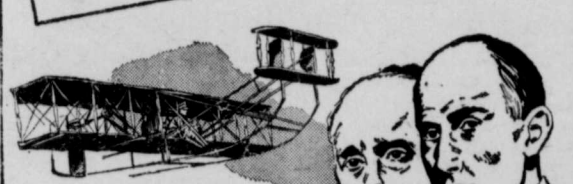

COMMUNITY COOPERATION IN WATERSHEDS

Wherever you live, your home is in a watershed. Your farm, your ranch, your town lot, or your business in the city are all within the natural boundaries of some watershed.

Your watershed may be large or small. It may be a few acres in a farm field that drain into a single gully or grass waterway. Many small watersheds together may cover nearly half a continent like the Mississippi River and its tributaries.

In your watershed, you may have to share with all others there the tragedies of floods, washed-away land, mud-filled lakes, and water shortages. You also share with others the fruits of watershed protection, development, and flood prevention.

Probably the most important watershed work is on the farm land—land treatment measures that help hold as much water as nearly where it falls as possible. Farmers who follow farm conservation plans that they have worked out with help from U. S. Soil Conservation Service technicians through their soil conservation districts are doing their part in good watershed management. Crop rotations that make the soil soak up and hold more water—terraces and contour rows that carry water across the slope instead of straight down it—trees and grass on steep land whose roots anchor soil and make channels for taking in the water—these and many more conservation practices help make any watershed plan work. They make it possible for water-holding dams and other structures to do their job better.

Slow Down At Sundown

Austin—"Slow down at sundown!" J. O. Musick, General Manager of the Texas Safety Association, warned motorists today. His appeal came as a part of the Safety-after-dark program of T.S.A. for October.

"Since nighttime doubles traffic troubles, the driver has to soft pedal the gas pedal—he has to watch out for the lives of others as well as his own."

He emphasized that a driver must be alert at all times and expect the unexpected. Sometimes children dart out from behind parked cars, or bicycle riders make turns without signaling, or an animal wanders onto the highway. Musick also mentioned that when drivers become drowsy or fatigued, they should stop for a short nap or a brisk walk around the car.

"If a driver must stop at night, it is imperative that he always pull completely off the road and leave on his parking and dome lights," Musick said.

He particularly stressed the fact that night driving is different from daytime driving. Motorists must adjust to that difference by putting their guard up when the sun goes down.

There's Color, Fun At The Fair, You Can Capture It All On Film

Ever think of lassoing the whole big State Fair of Texas? Like to bring it back home with you complete in all its color, action and thrills?

This is easy. Just take your camera along. Advance planning and careful use of your still or movie camera will let you capture the Fair and hold it for years on film.

Here's some simple advice to help you make better pictures at the State Fair:

The first suggestion is important to a good cook or a seasoned traveler as well as a photographer: plan ahead. What you've read about the Fair will provide good ideas of what you'll want to see and photograph. Decide on the sequence of pictures you'll take at the Fair. Later on, this sequence will tell a complete story about the day your family spent at the Fair. And to make it a complete story, plan to take pictures before and after your actual stay at the Fair. Snaps, slides or movies of the family getting ready for the Fair should be included as well as pictures of the sleepy children arriving home at the end of an enjoyable day.

Be sure you're equipped to take good pictures. If the family camera has been on a shelf for several months perhaps it should be checked by a photo dealer. You can have this done at the same time you buy enough film to shoot all the pictures you'll want at the Fair.

Take enough pictures. The professional photographer often shoots several hundred negatives on one job. To be sure, this is more than the family snapshotter will need, but by "over-shooting" you'll be sure to have all the pictures that will tell your story. Too often, the "perfect picture" is spoiled because its subject blinked his eyes or a stranger walked in front of the camera.

Many of the finest pictures you'll find at the Fair will come up fast. You'll see and shoot... to capture fast action or a charming expression. Keep the camera ready for instant use.

Other shots should be carefully arranged. But when posing people, don't make their presence in the picture meaningless. A straight line of people looking at the camera is uninteresting and unrelated to what's doing at the Fair. Have the family watch some one of the Fair's attractions when you snap their picture. Compose adults and children in different poses. And vary your camera angle and distance. Shoot some pictures from eye-level, others from a kneeling position or get up high and look down at the subjects. Try close-ups of facial expressions, tight group shots and long-range pictures to achieve variety.

Some of the most exciting activities at the Fair take place indoors and at night. Here's where you'll probably need to use flash. A tiny flash bulb packs a lot of action-stopping light. Even in daylight flash can be an effective means to better pictures. It fills in the shadows of facial expressions, makes outdoor photos extra snappy. A supply of blue bulbs is convenient to carry when you're shooting Kodachrome or Ektachrome transparencies outdoors.

How about exposures... what lens opening and shutter speed to use? There's a whole range of cameras and films on the market today and the best general advice is to follow the manufacturer's instructions which are enclosed in each carton of film.

At the State Fair of Texas, you have a center where photographic experts are on hand to answer any and all questions about picture-taking. Drop by and ask for the answers at the Kodak Photographic Information Center, General Exhibits Building.
