Murder Case To Jury

Evidence To Be Presented Tomorrow

The fall term grand jury of the 32nd Judicial District Monday will hear evidence in the July 14 murder of Major Bell, who was gunned down at J&J Gulf Service Station.

The evidence is being presented in connection with the arrest of a suspect in Dallas about three weeks ago. The suspect is now being held in Dallas on other charges.

A second suspect in the Major Bell killing is also known to be in the Dallas area and officers say that should an indictment be handed down, it would not be difficult to find the second man.

The murder case is one of 19 grand jurors will hear next week. Others involve driving while intoxicated, possession

of marijuana and there is one attempted murder.

The suspect in the murder of Major Bell is a 27-year-old ex-convict with a lengthy arrest record.

Officers believe that the suspect and some of his cronies were in Colorado City at about the time a killer put five .22-caliber bullets in the service station attendant's back.

Hightower, Ratliff To Compete?

The state senate district which includes Mitchell County has been redistricted by the Legislative Redistricting Board to include two incumbent state senators.

State Senator David Ratliff of Stanford, and Jack Hightower of Vernon, have been pitted against each other in a 29-county district that extends from Plainview, Silverton and Childress on the northwest, to Big Spring, Colorado City, Sweetwater and Cross Plains on the South.

Ratliff, Mitchell County's state senator for more than a decade, has said he plans to seek re-election but Hightower's plans are unknown at present so it is not clear if the two will compete against each other.

However, Hightower has talked of running for Congress.

Ratliff has said he dislikes the new plan which was drawn up by a constitutionally established board after the state senate failed to do its own work.

However, he would not elaborate on what evidence is being sought or what evidence police now have other than what was

initially told on the suspect and his friend.

Bell, 56, was found outside the station about 12:40 a.m. the morning of July 14 by Colorado City youths Earnest Galvan Castillo and Lynn Prescott and Ray McGee of Snyder.

Police say the shooting occurred between 12:20 a.m., when Bell was last seen alive by patrolman L. C. Devorce, and

12:41, when the body was found.

Had it not been for a planned vacation, Mrs. Bell might also have been killed as she had been in the habit of staying with her husband at the station at nights.

However, the Bells were planning to take a vacation a few days later and she was at home making preparations for the journey.

Wolf Defense Holds On For 7-7 Tie

The Colorado City Wolves' defense Friday night was put to the test again Friday and it rose to the occasion.

Thanks to the defense, the Wolves came out of the contest with a 7-7 tie.

The Wolves stymied the powerful running game of the Lakeview Chiefs in San Angelo. The Chiefs accumulated a lot of yardage--193 yards rushing--but when it came down to the nitty-gritty, the San Angelo team could only get the ball across the goal line once.

And it was the Colorado City defense in the person of Rickey Parks who got the Wolves' only points.

While the Wolves' defense sparkled, the Colorado offense had what appeared to be its worst night of the season thus far. The Wolves could not put together a single scoring threat. The deepest penetration for the Wolves was the San Angelo 30 yardline and Colorado City got the ball there on a fumble and promptly fumbled it back to the Chiefs.

The fumble by the Wolves was one of three lost during the night along with two interceptions. The Wolves got only five first downs, on 70 yards rushing and 25 yards passing. Two of eight passes were completed. Tim Stansel had seven punts for 34 yards and the Wolves were penalized once

for five yards, the only penalty in the game.

Parks was the leading ground gainer in the game with 48 yards while Larry Dearen had 13 yards.

For the most part, the first half was a defensive battle, with neither team claiming a first down until 3:34 was left in the first half. This was after Colorado City had already scored.

The Wolves on the first two downs of every series looked like they might be going some-

where. But for some reason, Colorado City usually fell apart on third down.

It appeared the offensive line was doing a good job most of the night but the running backs couldn't take advantage of it.

On the first two possessions by the Wolves, they were stopped and had to punt. Then Lakeview fumbled on their own 30, giving rise to hope that Colorado could cash in on the mistake.
