## County getting better internet

The Mitchell County Commissioners met Monday morning and entered into a contract with NTS Communications to provide fiber optic internet service to all county buildings. The service is expected to begin in a couple of weeks.

NTS's Ismael Silva and Nathan Hasse met with the court to provide a cost quote for the monthly service. The men told court members that the service will provide better, faster internet for the county at a cost of about \$1,500 per month.

Currently, the county doesn't pay anything for internet but pays \$1,100 per month for the use of T1 lines. The county's internet service is provided by Rise Broadband but will switch over to NTS soon. Luckily, the county already owned some fiber optic lines, limiting the cost of the new service.

There was some discussion about the possibility of charging Rise Broadband to continue using the county's tower to make up the \$450 or so more that the new service will cost. When asked if the county has a contract with Rise, County Auditor Heidi Harris said that she's never seen one.

Court members chose to approve a one-year contract with

NTS and will have the option to renew this time next year.

Commissioner Jeremy Strain asked if the new service will fix the problem the clerks' offices have been having with electronic records filing. District Clerk Belinda Blessingame said she understands it will, and the NTS representatives assured the court that the 20MB x 20MB upload speeds will enable the clerks to e-file.

Once the new service is up and running, all county offices will have a private connection, providing the same security level as other institutions such as banks.

Besides allowing the clerks to electronically file, the faster connection means computers used by the public at the library will also have better internet service. All county offices, including the tax office, extension office, library, water district, annex, county jail, etc., will get the upgrade.

Other businesses that have signed up with NTS for fiber optic internet include the new Super 8 motel, FirstBank & Trust, Mitchell County Hospital District and others. Hasse said he hopes to see the service continue to expand, and a decision about offering it to residential custom-

## Oilfields in neighboring counties purchased by Chinese developer

In a deal that highlights China's interest in the US energy sector, Yantai Xinchao, a Chinese real estate developer, has inked a letter of intent (LOI) to buy oilfields in the Permian Basin in West Texas for \$1.3 billion (8.3

billion yuan) through a limited liability partnership.

The company said in Saturday disclosure to the Shanghai Stock Exchange that the oil fields in Howard and Borden counties will be acquired from two Nevada-based companies: Tall City Exploration and Plymouth Petroleum. Oilpro has reached out to both companies but have not yet received a response. The filing gave few further details on the assets being purchased.

In the Saturday filing, Yantai Xinchao said it inked a LOI on Friday with limited liability partnership, Ningbo Dingliang

Huitong Equity Investment Center, and its seven shareholders to purchase the oilfields through Moss Creek Resources, a Ningbo Dingliang subsidiary.

On Friday, Yantai Xinchao shares were suspended from trading to allow for the oilfield purchase and the asset restructuring. The company projects shares to be halted for approximately one month. According to a separate stock exchange filing, the company also plans to release periodic updates on the restructuring.

In a Sunday report, the Wall Street Journal noted that indus-

## Donations sought for construction of local animal shelter



**LOOKING FORWARD TO A SHELTER** - Animal Control Officer Rustine Lendermon was the featured speaker at the weekly Lions Club meeting last Friday. She is anxiously awaiting the construction of an animal shelter in Colorado City, and it's looking like she may just get her wish.

Rustine Lendermon, local animal control officer, was the guest speaker for the weekly meeting of the Colorado City Lions Club last week. She informed the club of plans that are in the works to build an animal shelter in Colorado City, and donations are being taken at City National Bank, the local police station and city hall.

Lendermon said that because there is currently no shelter in Mitchell County, she has to transport all the dogs she picks up to the shelter in Snyder. There, they hold the dogs for five days before allowing adoptions giving owners the time to claim them.

As far as the time the captured dogs have before being euthanized, Lendermon said she wasn't sure of the time frame. However, personnel at the Snyder shelter do a good job of getting the animals rehomed. They often work with Second Chance Dog Rescue, a group out of Snyder that uses foster homes as temporary lodging until the dogs can find permanent owners.

Donna Overton, of the Colorado City Police Department, drew up a design that will be used as a plan for the shelter. Plans include 25 stackable kennels for the smaller animals, and several more gated areas for the bigger animals. All boarding areas will be covered, and the design also includes a washroom and office.

City Manager David Hoover has opened an account at City National Bank to accept donations to help fund the construction of the shelter. Lendermon said that she's had various people offer to donate to help with construction costs, and she hopes they will contribute now that the account is open.

The City of Colorado City

contracts with the City of Westbrook to provide animal control services, and officials there have said they would be willing to contribute to the construction and maintenance of the shelter as well.

One of the possible locations for the shelter would be near the new water tower, north of B&B. The construction of a shelter would ultimately save the city money, but construction costs are estimated to be \$35,000. Lendermon said that the city pays the shelter in Snyder and also pays Mitchell County Vet Clinic when the shelter is full.

Lion Glenna Siemens asked if volunteers would be needed once the shelter is built, and Lendermon said she would love that. She said she will also be looking at signing up foster homes that can take dogs while they are in the search for new homes.

Residents that live within the city limits should be aware that it is the law to have pets registered with the city and to keep their rabies vaccinations current. Lendermon said she will warn residents about dogs running loose once but then they will get a citation.

Dog at large citations, just like any other citation, will go through the warrant process if not paid. People have been known to go to jail for a dog at large citation. Lendermon said that taking care of your pets is a lot cheaper than paying citations.

"I'm just an animal cop, but I love it though," she said.

Besides dealing with dogs and cats, Lendermon said she sees and deals with a lot of skunks and raccoons. Skunks are euthanized, and raccoons are transported far from town and released.

The Monster Mud Bog will be held Halloween Day, Saturday, October 31st at the Mitchell County Rodeo Arena west of Colorado City. Registration will be held from 8 a.m. to 11 a.m. that morning, with a driver's meeting taking place at 11:30 a.m. The monsters and mud starts flying at 12:30 p.m.

Admission is \$5 for those 13 and up, \$2 for kids ages 6 to 12, and kids 5 and under get in free. Organizers are also selling reserved parking spaces along the arena fence for \$50 per spot.

Space is limited, so anyone wanting to reserve their space should call as soon as possible.

For the true mudders, entry fee for the bog is \$35, and payback is 100%.

Those running with racing fuel must have a fire extinguisher on board. Helmets are required for all drivers and riders.

The day will be great fun, but there are a few no-nos. No blowers or nitrous will be allowed. Also, no barbecue pits or outside food allowed, as there will be a full concession stand available.

## Main Street cleaning up the streets Nov. 14; volunteers needed

There are a few things those planning to use the recycling drop-off may need to know. All labels and lids on cans and bottles should be removed and all recyclables should be cleaned and rinsed before depositing them into the receptacles. Batteries, ceramics, drinking glasses, garbage, Styrofoam, window glass, yard waste and lightbulbs are not accepted at the city's facility.

Kern said she hopes much of what is picked up during the cleanup can be taken to the recycling facility to keep it out of the landfill. She also said she hopes people will make an effort to come out and volunteer their time to help keep Colorado City streets clean. Community service hours will be documented for those participating.

## Vin Fisher going into roping finals as leader

Vin Fisher, son-in-law of Perry and Tresa McMillan of Colorado City, qualified to enter the World Steer Roping Finals in Wichita, Kansas, set to be held in early November. It's a feat he's accomplished before, but this year he's the leader going into the event.

The McMillans have expressed their pride in what Fisher has been able to do this year, as well they should. He is heading

into the finals as the top earner in steer roping. He qualified for the finals 12 times, but never before as the leader.

"This is the first time I'm going in No. 1," Fisher told Sam Kaufman of the *Andrews County News*. "That's been a goal for a long time, and I was able to get that done for the first year."

The roper from Andrews earned \$67,000 this season, about \$6,000 more than the second place roper. Each of the 10 individual rounds at the finals pays \$9,000, and the world title is up for grabs as the average is up to \$27,000.

Consistency has been the key, according to the story that ran

in the Andrews paper. Fisher finished well in nearly all rodeos this season, winning the average at events in Arizona, Idaho and Texas. He earned \$6,000 at the Odessa Sandhills Rodeo at the beginning of the season.

Fisher's brother, J. Tom also of Andrews, is headed to the finals and will be competing against Vin.

Fisher told Kaufman that he has been sitting at home quite a bit lately with all of the rain, but he plans to practice every day to get his horses ready for the finals next week.

"We are so proud of him. We love our cowboy," Tresa said of her son-in-law.

## TUMBLEWEED SMITH An experienced military convoy

In communities of all sizes, the turnout to see a convoy of vintage military vehicles is amazing. School kids join veterans to see them pass by. In cities where the convoy stops for a meal or to spend the night, the vehicles are parked in formation so people are able to see them up close.

The convoy is a project of the Military Vehicle Preservation Association and is traveling the entire length of the Bankhead Highway, which will be 100 years old next year. It was the first all-weather road to cross the country and runs from Washington DC to San Diego. "Right now we've got 45 historic military vehicles along with 5 or 6 in our support unit," says Dennis Boots of Denton, Convoy Commander. "We left the DC area on September 19th and we'll end up in San Diego on the 17th of October." The trip took three years to plan.

This is the third convoy of the organization in the last 6 years. "We started doing these convoys to drive historic military convoy routes. The first one we did in 2009 was to follow the Lincoln Highway from Washington DC to San Francisco, some 3,300 miles. We did that in about a month. It was the 95th anniversary of the highway, the first one across the country. Then in 2012 we did the Al-Can Highway which the Army Corps of Engineers built in 1942 from Dawson Creek, British Columbia to just outside Fairbanks, about 4,100 miles. We went on up to the Arctic Circle while we were there. All the vehicles made it fine. We generally don't exceed 30 miles an hour."

The organization gets no outside funding. The owners (half of them veterans) maintain the vehicles and buy their own gas. Some communities help with food and lodging along the way. In Fort Worth, two tanks cars with gasoline filled up the vehicles and gave the participants two banquets. "The small towns along the way percentage-wise are giving every bit as much as Fort Worth did, maybe more. They've received us well everywhere we've gone. We enjoy meeting people, especially veterans. School kids wave flags and hold hand-made banners. People who think America is going to hell in a hand basket need to ride with me."

Dennis, who was an Army Captain in Viet Nam, drives a 1970 Jeep made by American General Corporation. "It's similar to what I drove in Nam in '69 and '70. It is the last model Jeep the military had in use before going to the Humvee."

The convoy contains ambulances with Red Crosses painted on them, trucks with box vans on them used for electronic warfare, the ever-popular 2 and half-ton trucks, and a tractor-trailer rig. One was a recovery room in a field hospital. "They're all unusual. There's not a vehicle here that is not historically significant. They have all played a part in our nation's history. Many of them are 75 years old but they are working vehicles that can make 225 miles a day for 3,400 miles." In addition to Americans from all over the country, the convoy has men from Australia, New Zealand, and the Belgian Congo.

### House Passes Reconciliation to Repeal Obamacare, Balance Budget

ers is still pending. Hasse also said that the service could be expanded depending on the county's needs and as technology changes. Silva said he will get to work and the service should be ready to use in about two weeks.

In other business, court members approved an agreement with West Texas Centers for MHMR to provide mental health services to the inmates of the county jail. The county is required to provide the services, and MHMR currently sees clients in the old health clinic located at 505 Chestnut Street.

An interlocal agreement with Lubbock County to provide a public defender for capital murder cases was also approved. County Judge Ray Mayo pointed out that, many times, defen-

dants have to pay back the costs of a public defender as part of their sentence. The agreement costs the county \$1,637.26.

A resolution was approved to apply for the Indigent Defense Grant Program. Mayo said that Mitchell County has been approved to receive \$24,000 which partially pays for indigent defense supplied by the county.

The county will continue to work with the Texas Association of Counties to give retirees a chance to purchase a supplemental insurance plan called Silver Choice. While the county does not pay for the insurance, it is still offered to retirees.

Bills in the amount of \$182,747.12 were approved, as was payroll in the amount of \$82,611.98.

try insiders say several of Chinese firms — including some whose main businesses are not O&G — have expressed interest in acquiring North American O&G assets. The over-year-long decline in oil prices has, in many instances, rendered asset prices especially attractive.

Due to comparatively stable regulations overseeing O&G E&P, the US has long been an attractive opportunity to Chinese energy firms. However, US restrictions on Chinese investment in potentially sensitive regions means Chinese investment in the US O&G sector has thus far been limited.

This deal underscores how Chinese firms are searching for new industries outside of China to be profitable, as domestic demand slows in tandem with a slowing economy.

The WSJ noted that Chinese companies are looking abroad for energy sector deals due in part to the strict domestic restrictions, which renders investment in O&G nearly impossible. State-run companies dominate China's energy sector, which has left little room for independent companies to invest. As part of ongoing reforms, the Chinese government says it seeks to attract more private capital into the O&G sector.

Yantai Xinchao said the deal has been approved by the Committee on Foreign Investment in the US. The company is based in the coastal province of Shandong. It reported 2014 revenues of approximately 1 billion yuan. The company's principal focus is property development and producing electronics components. This story ran on oilpro.com

## Merket making her mark in Ranger JC volleyball program

RANGER, Texas – Heather Merket wipes sweat away from her face with the bottom of her practice shirt, takes a deep breath. An hour into practice in the sweltering heat in the Ron Butler Gymnasium and she can feel the effects of seemingly endless jumping on her legs and hundreds of deflected balls on her arms and hands.

She takes a deep breath and puts the discomfort away. The pain, she hopes, will lead to gain in the end – and earn her a place in Ranger College volleyball history with a return trip to the Region V Volleyball Tournament in November.

"We're really close," said Merket, the 19-year-old daughter of Denise Crawford and Gordon Crawford of Colorado City. "We're going to have to beat some

good teams to get in but if we play like we know how, we can beat them. Our goal is to make it to the tournament."

A highly-decorated athlete coming out of Colorado City in 2014, Merket is helping the young Lady Rangers' volleyball program develop into a power in the junior college ranks. The team, which began just a few years ago, heads into the final two weeks of the North Texas Junior College Athletic Conference season sporting a 13-16 record and sitting in fifth in the NTJCAC standings with a 4-5 mark.

"As a team, we're playing better and better every game, but we're still not winning like we want," said Merket, one of 10 sophomores on the RC roster. "I don't think we've come together completely but we're getting better. We have a bunch of players with a lot of talent."

Merket is among those with plenty of talent. A middle blocker was recently named the NTJCAC Player of the Week for Oct. 4-10. During that span, the 5-foot-10 standout recorded 26 kills, 11 digs, six solo blocks and nine block assists. She also posted a hitting percentage of .423 en route to leading Ranger to a 2-2 record.

The award is the latest in a series of collegiate successes the former Lady Wolves' standout has merited during her time at Ranger College. A year ago, she finished second in the nation in blocks per set among all National Junior College Athletic Association players with a 1.72 average in 27 matches.

Adjusting to the collegiate level was a slow process for Merket, who starred in four sports at Colorado High School. In addition to learning a new system under a new coach, she also had to adjust to life on campus and not having multiple sports to prepare for. There was just one season and then a long time to get ready for the next.

"It was different," she admits. "It (Ranger) was smaller than where I came from, plus it was all new. I didn't start as well as I wanted last year. Maybe it was because I was a little intimidated at having to play girls from much larger schools but I figured it out. I'm just told myself I am a good player, too, and that I could do this."

With Merket figuring things out on the court, the Lady Rangers posted a 12-19 record in 2014, and went 3-9 in conference play and finished fourth overall – an honor that enabled them to advance to the Region V tournament for the first time.

The 2015 season has been seen its share of changes, too. The new cast meant the team has spent much of the season adjusting to another. At times,

the team has played well, including a stretch earlier in which they reeled off six straight wins.

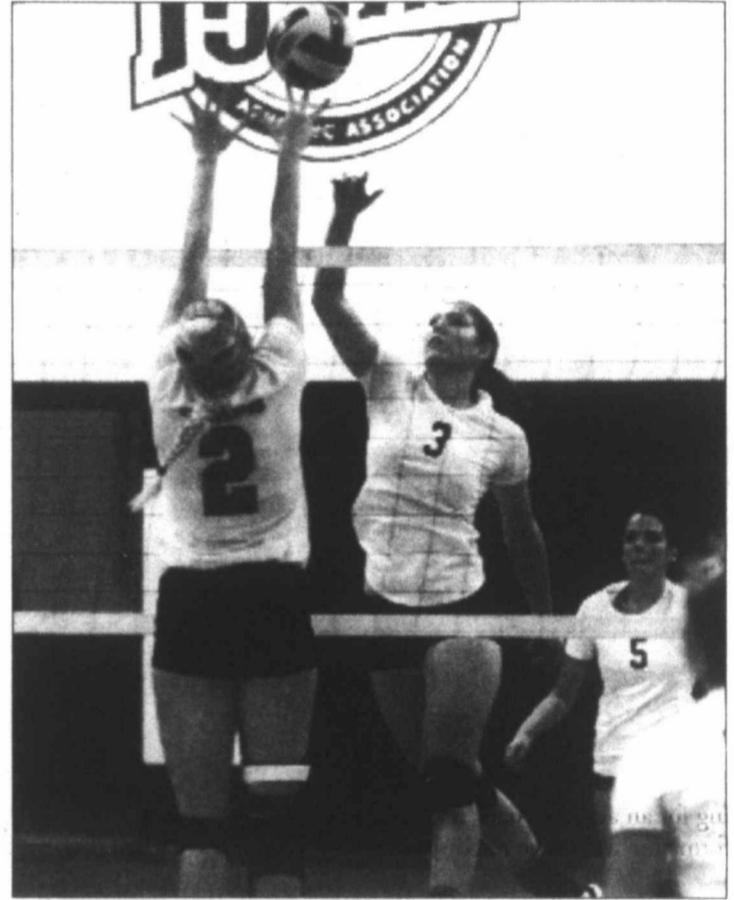
"We can be a good team," said Merket, whose younger sister, Hailey Hulme, is scheduled to graduate from CHS in May. "We just have to play like we are able."

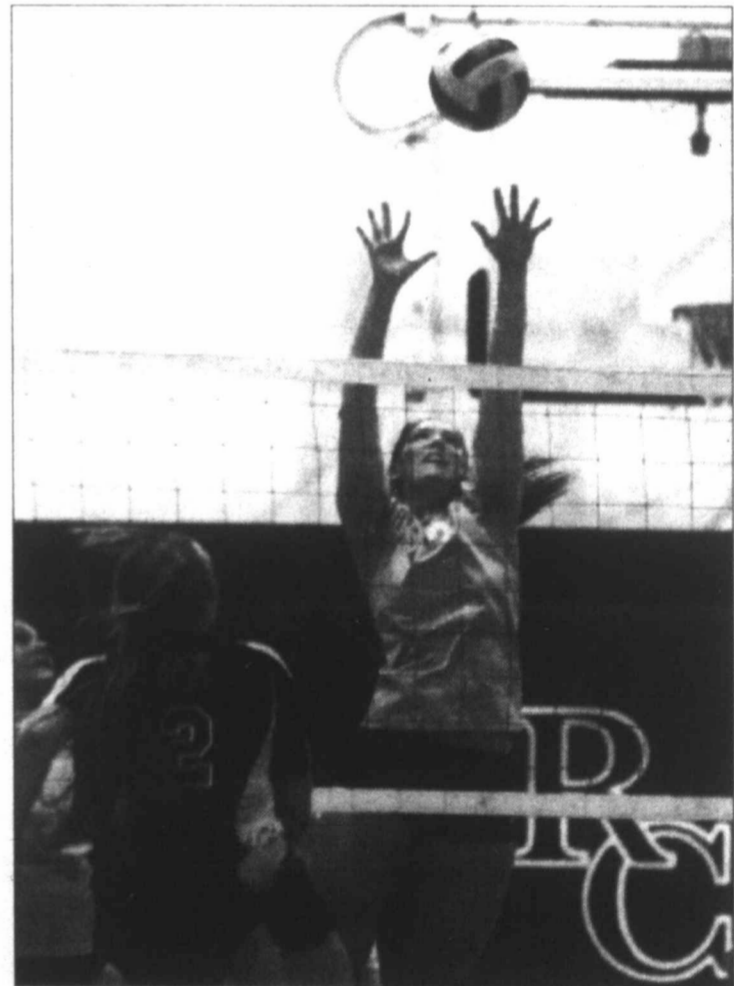
In the end, she chose Ranger College because it afforded her an opportunity to break into the rotation quickly.

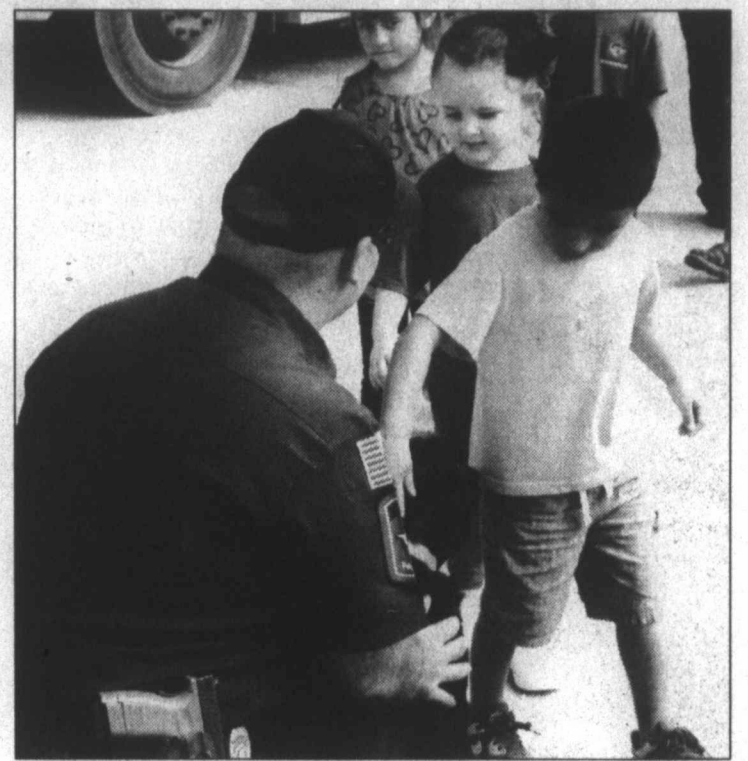

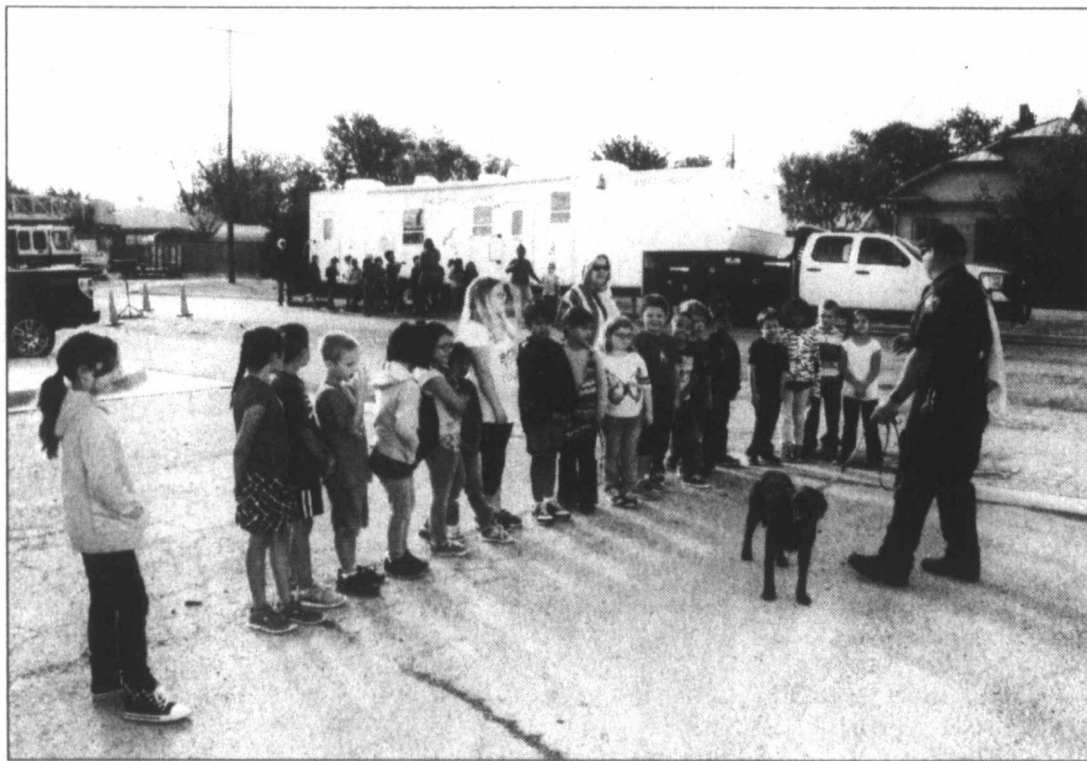

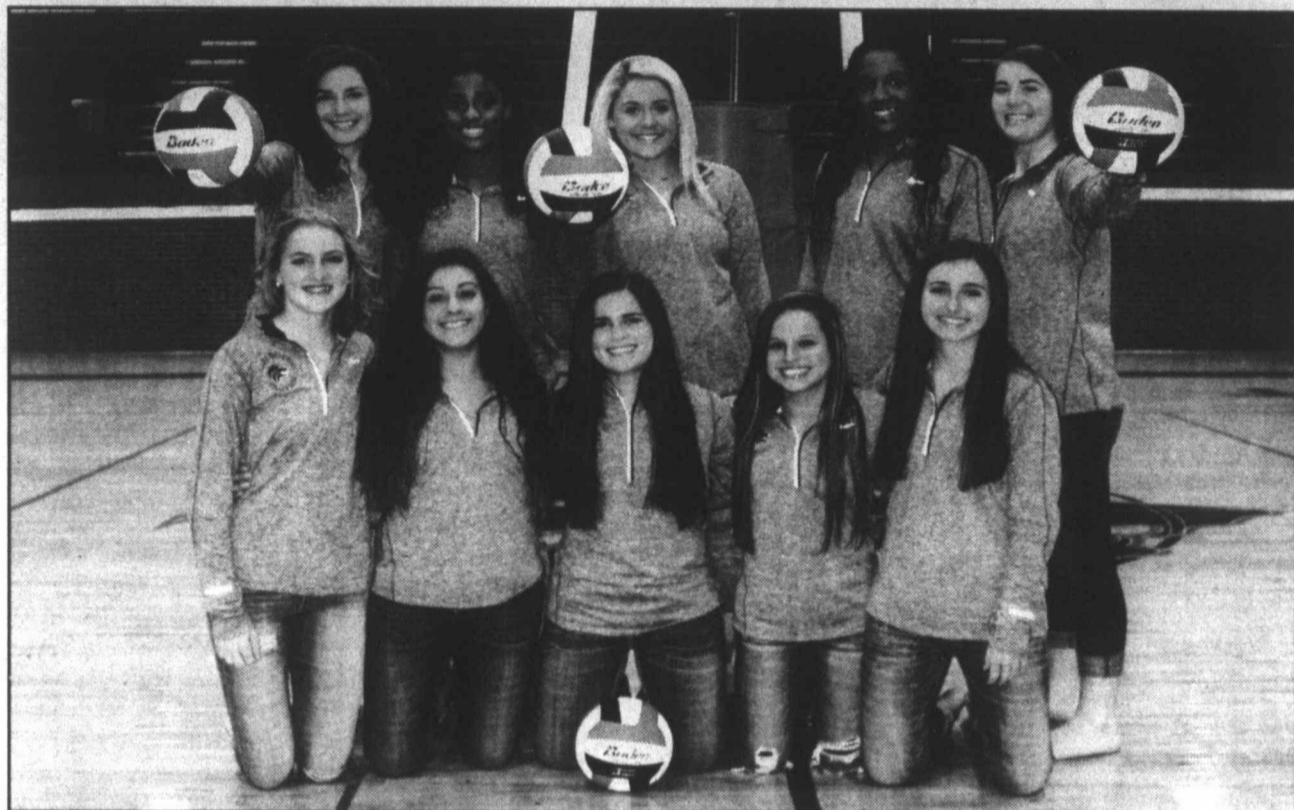

## Munoz's 3 TDs help Wolves drown Ballinger

Neither Mother Nature nor Hurricane Patricia could stop the Colorado Wolves on Friday night. Nor could they prevent the Wolves from putting themselves right in the middle of the postseason playoff picture. Despite more than 3 inches of rain and a lightning strike that took out the scoreboard at Wolf Stadium Thursday, the Wolves did exactly what they needed to

do. They reeled off a thrilling 28-27 victory over Ballinger. With the victory, Colorado City improved to 3-5 for the season and, more importantly, moved to 2-1 in District 3-3A play and moved into a tie for second. Ballinger, which had entered the contest tied with Colorado City, fell to 5-3 and 1-2. The CHS defense set the tone

for the Wolves early on. Backed by a strong push from up front, Colorado City held Ballinger to a total of 11 yards on their first 11 plays and forced the Bearcats to punt both of their first-quarter possessions away. The Wolves' defense caught Ballinger behind the line of scrimmage twice in the first quarter, including a key 8-yard sack on the third play from scrimmage.

Munoz was far from through tormenting the Bearcats. He capped the Wolves' second scoring possession by catching a 6-yard TD strike from James on third down. Alex Trujillo caught a short pass from James on the ensuing PAT try and handed Colorado City a 15-8 lead on the final play of the first half.

Munoz's second TD reception, officials postponed play due to lightning, the Bearcats managed to regroup during the break. Following the break, Ballinger scored on passes of 72 and 26 yards and pulled into a 22-22 deadlock heading into the start of the final frame. The Bearcats took the upper hand early in the fourth. Crabb handed Ballinger a 28-22 lead just 23 seconds into the fourth quarter by plunging in from the 3-yard line.

## Wolves to face the Antelopes in Post

Colorado City will travel to district leading Post Friday night for a 7:30 p.m. contest that will certainly be the Wolves toughest challenge this season. After three district games, the Post defense hasn't given up a touchdown and has shut-outs over Ballinger 29-0, Coahoma 53 to 0 and Coleman 21-0. Post was the district's pre-season favorite and they haven't disappointed. Returning 15 starters from last year's playoff team, the Antelopes feature the district's pre-season defensive MVP in defensive back Cambry Gilbert

and the extremely quick defensive lineman A.J. Reed. The Antelopes have cruised through their non-district schedule with victories over Abernathy 25-0, Tahoka 42-0, Denver City 28-7, Floydada 26-7 and Slaton 4-19. The victory over Ballinger clinched at least a playoff berth for the Wolves and another victory in one of the Wolves' two remaining games would assure them the third seed. The Wolves end the regular season with a district game at home against Coahoma November 6th.

Offensively, the weather wasn't kind to Colorado City in the first quarter. The team misfired on a fourth-down play that resulted in a turnover on downs. Their second series ended with a punt. The Wolves got untracked early in the second. After a short Ballinger punt that gave the Wolves the ball at their own 47, Tommy James kickstarted the CHS offense with his legs. On first down, he scrambled to the field for a gain of 13 to the BHS 40. De'Ante Adkison gave C-City the upper hand from there. The senior running back took a handoff from James on the next play and darted up the middle, cut outside and raced 40 yards for a touchdown. Josh Salazar's ensuing extra-point kick staked the Wolves to a 7-0 cushion. Ballinger battled his way back minutes later. The Bearcats rambled 63 yards on 11 plays on their ensuing drive. Ballinger's Colton Little tossed a 9-yard touchdown pass to running back Clayton Crabb to finish off the drive. Little completed the two-point play seconds later with a throw to Rusty Fischer and gave the Bearcats an 8-7 lead midway through the second frame. James didn't allow Ballinger to enjoy the lead long. The C-City junior helped the Wolves put together a 10-play, 60-yard march on their next series. Isaiah Jennings gave Colorado City a spark quickly. The CHS senior fielded the Bearcats'

ensuing kick at his own 25 and raced to the Wolves' 40. Moments later, James shifted the Wolf offense into high gear by lofting a 19-yard strike to Mark Munoz. The two came up big again four plays later, connecting for a 32-yard gain to the BHS 3 on a key fourth-and-9 play. Munoz refused to let the Wolves' playoff hopes get drowned. A senior, he capped an 8-reception, 140-yard performance late in the game by helping engineer a game-winning drive. He finished off the drive by pulling in his third TD of the game via a 16-yard strike from James. Salazar iced the victory seconds later when he split the uprights with the extra-point attempt. As a team, the Wolves rolled up 326 yards in the game, including 93 yards rushing from Adkison. James finished the game by completing 14 of his 22 passes for 138 yards. 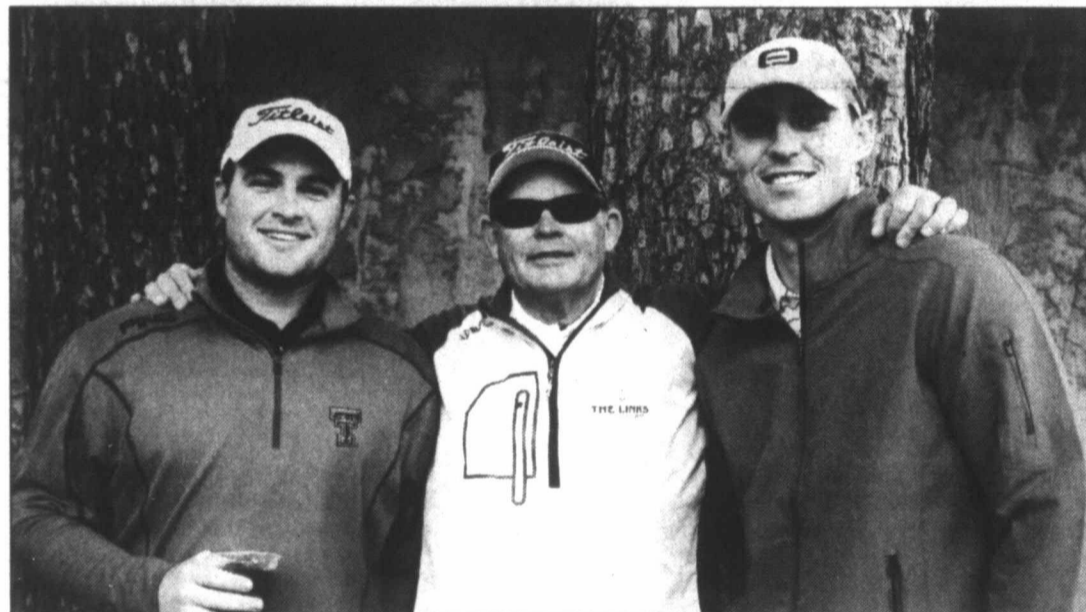
