Funeral Services Held For Harry Newton, Jr., in El Paso Thursday: Sanderson Friends Attend Sad Rites

Death is inevitable; it is the
portion of everyone and every-
thing, animate and inanimate. It
has been truly said, that death
loves a shining mark, and this
was verified on Tuesday after-
noon when the Grim Reaper
suddenly snatched from loved
ones and friends Harry Newton,
Jr., following a brief illness from
a brain affection, which struck
without warning. Seldom has a
death so shocked a community as
did the passing of this fine youth.
When the announcement came—
its suddenness stunned our people
and many of them wept openly.
It seemed that the order of things
was changed when a fine young
fellow, robust, an outstanding
athlete, at the time of his illness
doing a grown man's work, could,
in such brief space, be called to
that Great Unknown, never to re-
turn.

Harry Newton, Jr., son of Mr.
and Mrs. Harry Newton of this
place, was born in Sanderson on
September 8, 1915, and died at
the Hotel Dieu, El Paso, Tuesday
afternoon at 2:30 o'clock.
"Spec," as he was familiarly
known to young and old alike,
was one of the most likeable
young men one could meet. He
was industrious to a degree and,
when his age permitted, he spent
his vacation at odd jobs, making
lighter the family budget. An
outstanding athlete he starred in
both basketball and football, and
apparently, he was destined to go
far in athletics in the higher
institutions of learning. Also,
he was a leader in activities on
the campus. His popularity with
his classmates was unquestioned.

In recording the passing of
Harry Newton one does not have
to borrow thought for phrases
in keeping with the event. They
come naturally to one who has
known him and was privileged to
be called a friend. Quiet and un-
obtrusive in his daily contacts
with friends, old and young. On
the fields of competitive athletics
he was generous in victory and
defeat alike. Good sportsmanship
was one of his most noticeable
traits. With the exception of one
term in the Del Rio schools, Harry
entire school life was spent in
Sanderson.

His last illness, starting with
a severe headache, followed by
a state of coma, puzzled local
physicians, who advised the trip to
El Paso for an X-ray. For two
days his condition showed slight
improvement, then came a relapse
from which he never rallied.

Funeral services were con-
ducted from the mortuary of Kaster &
Maxon, and interment was in the
Masonic cemetery, El Paso—a
touching scene, when the flower-
banked casket was placed in the
grave, his loved ones and class-
mates bidding a last, tearful fare-
well.

Survivors in the immediate
family are the heart-broken par-
ents, Mr. and Mrs. Harry Newton,
and a sister, Miss Mattie Newton.

Pall bearers, active and hono-
rary were selected from his class-
mates and friends who journeyed
to El Paso for the last sad rites.

500 Men Will Regarrison Post at Marfa: Will Be Motorized Outfit

Fort D. A. Russell at Marfa,
Texas, which was abandoned by
regular army troops on Jan. 1,
1933, will be regarrisoned with
field artillery as soon as practic-
able after Sept. 1, 1935, according
to War Department instructions
released the first of this week.

It is proposed that Fort D. A.
Russell be garrisoned by regi-
mental headquarters and head-
quarters battery, service battery
and the second battalion of the
77th field artillery, which are to
be equipped with 155-millimeter
howitzers.

584 Men at Fort

This type of artillery is tractor-
drawn. The strength of the field
artillery command at Marfa will
be 19 officers and 515 enlisted men.

The plan also calls for a station
hospital detail of two medical of-
ficers and 15 enlisted men, an
ordinance detachment of four en-
listed men, a signal service de-
tachment of two enlisted men and
a quartermaster corps detach-
ment of one officer and 30 en-
listed men. The total personnel,
according to the tentative setup
for Fort D. A. Russell numbers
22 officers and 572 enlisted men.

To Use 115 Vehicles

Under the new motorization
program being carried out in the
regular army, the 77th field artil-
lery, less the first and third bat-
talions, will require a total of 115
motor vehicles.

Gen. Johnson Hagood, Eighth
Corps area commander, in the
formulation of the plans for re-
garrisoning, has been called upon
to advise the war department of
the date on which actual regarri-
soning can take effect.

Capt. John A. Hunt, quartermaster
corps, 8th Corps Area util-
ities officer, has departed from Ft.
Sam Houston to supervise a sur-
vey of the repairs and renova-
tions necessary to make the old
buildings at Fort D. A. Russell
habitable.

by the Marine Corps.

Closing Program Of Bible School Well Attended

The Vacation Bible school came
to a close last Friday night, when
all four departments gave a very
creditable program, showing the
type of work done during the two
weeks of the school. This closing
session was held in the Baptist
church.

The total enrollment was 93,
with an average attendance of 72.
There were 35 who had a perfect
attendance record.

The departments enrolled as
follows: Beginners 19, Primaries
23, Juniors 35, Intermediates 16.
Attendance by churches was—
Presbyterians 19, Church of
Christ 21, Baptists 18, Methodists
30, Mormons 4, Lutheran 1. Two

Free Shooting Exhibition By Ad Topperwein

Adolph Topperwein of San An-
tonio, who has earned the title of
the "wizard of the rifle," and who
is also a wizard with shotgun and
revolver as well, is scheduled to
give one of his great shooting ex-
hibitions next Friday, June 14.
The exhibition will be held at the
baseball park at 2:30 p. m., and
the public is invited. There will
be no admission charge.

Topperwein has been giving
his marvelous program of shoot-
ing before hundreds of thousands
of people during the past third of
a century and his coming to San-
derson offers an opportunity for
anyone who enjoys watching a
past master make firearms per-
form for him to see something
worth going a long way to see.

Shooting is play to Ad Topper-
wein. He is as happy as a baby
with a new toy when he is shoot-
ing rifle or shotgun and making
them do feats that will make those
watching gasp with astonishment
and admiration.

While the Topperwein exhibi-
tion program is not a set one, the
shooter draws on his almost in-
imitable bag of stunts for a series
of amazing acts which never fail
to thrill and delight his audien-
ces. He shoots at pieces of coal,
at stones, at clay targets and at
blocks, in many cases throwing
the object into the air, then pick-
ing up his gun and hitting them as
they fell.

Topperwein uses an array of
arms, including the Winchester
22 repeater, a .22 Winchester au-
tomatic, a lever action, and shot-
guns in carry out his program.

One bit of shooting which can-
not be done everywhere, but a
very effective feature of his pro-
gram when shooting conditions
permit, is that of placing two tar-
gets on chairs, one 20 yards in
front of him and the other 20 yds.
behind. Sitting in a chair in the
center of the space between the
targets "Topp" sights at one tar-
get and gets the range of the
other target with a mirror attach-
ed to his shoulder, and when he
has secured the exact range he
shoots two pistols simultaneously
and shatters the two targets at
the same time.

Everyone is invited to witness
this exhibition and to ask ques-
tions regarding the shooting. Mr.
Topperwein will be glad to an-
swer all questions at the close of
his exhibition.

Constitutional Amendments

S. J. R. No. 3

A JOINT RESOLUTION

proposing an Amendment to Article XVI of the Constitution of Texas by striking out Section 20a to Section 20c, both inclusive; prohibiting the open saloon and vesting in the Legislature the power to define and enact laws against such; vesting in the Legislature the power to regulate the manufacture, sale, transportation and possession of intoxicating liquors, including the power to provide for a State Monopoly on the sale of distilled liquors; providing that intoxicating liquors shall not be manufactured, sold, bartered or exchanged in any county, justice's precinct or incorporated city or town wherein the sale of intoxicating liquors had been prohibited by local option election held under the laws in force at the date of the taking effect of Section 20, Article XVI of the Constitution of the State of Texas, until a majority of the qualified voters of such county or political subdivision shall determine such to be lawful at an election held for that purpose; providing that such shall not prohibit the sale of alcoholic beverages containing less than 3.2 per cent alcohol by weight in cities, counties or political subdivisions in which the qualified voters have voted to legalize such sale under the provisions of Chapter 116, Acts of the Regular Session of the 43rd Legislature; providing for an election on the question of the adoption or rejection of such Amendment; prescribing the form of ballot; providing for the proclamation and publication of such by the Governor and making an appropriation therefor.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Article XVI of the Constitution of Texas be amended by striking out Section 20a to Section 20c, both inclusive, and substitute in lieu thereof the following:

"ARTICLE XVI, Section 20.

(a) The open saloon shall be and is hereby prohibited. The Legislature shall have the power, and it shall be its duty to define the term 'open saloon' and enact laws against such.

Subject to the foregoing, the Legislature shall have the power to regulate the manufacture, sale, possession and transportation of intoxicating liquors, including the power to establish a State Monopoly on the sale of distilled liquors.

(b) The Legislature shall enact a law or laws whereby the qualified voters of any county, justice's precinct or incorporated town or city, may, by a majority vote of those voting, determine from time to time whether the sale of intoxicating liquors for beverage purposes shall be prohibited or legalized within the prescribed limits; and such laws shall contain provisions for voting on the sale of intoxicating liquors of various types and various alcoholic content.

(c) In all counties, justice's precincts or incorporated towns or cities wherein the sale of intoxicating liquors had been prohibited by local option elections held under the laws of the State of Texas and in force at the time of the taking effect of Section 20, Article XVI of the Constitution of Texas, it shall continue to be unlawful to manufacture, sell, barter or exchange in any county, justice's precinct or incorporated town or city, any spirituous, vinous or malt liquors or medicated bitters capable of producing intoxication or any other intoxicants whatsoever, for beverage purposes, unless and until a majority of the qualified voters in such county or political subdivision thereof voting in an election held for such purpose shall determine such to be lawful; providing that this subsection shall not prohibit the sale of alcoholic beverages containing not more than 3.2 per cent alcohol by weight in cities, counties or political subdivisions thereof in which the qualified voters have voted to legalize such sale under the provisions of Chapter 116, Acts of the Regular Session of the 43rd Legislature; providing for an election on the question of the adoption or rejection of such Amendment; prescribing the form of ballot; providing for the proclamation and publication of such by the Governor and making an appropriation therefor.

visions of Chapter 116, Acts of the Regular Session of the 43rd Legislature."

Sec. 2. Such proposed Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at a special election to be held throughout the State of Texas, on the fourth Saturday in August, 1935, at which election all voters favoring said proposed Amendment, shall write, or have printed on their ballots the words:

"FOR the amendment to the State Constitution repealing State-wide prohibition, prohibiting the open saloon and providing for local option."

And those voters opposed to said proposed Amendment shall write or have printed on their ballots the words:

"AGAINST the amendment to the State Constitution repealing State-wide prohibition, prohibiting the open saloon and providing for local option."

If it appears from the returns of said election that a majority of the votes cast are in favor of said Amendment, the same shall become a part of the State Constitution.

Sec. 3. The Governor shall issue the necessary proclamation for such election, and shall have the same published and such election held as provided by the Constitution and laws of this State.

Sec. 4. The sum of Eight Thousand (\$8,000.00) Dollars, or so much thereof as may be necessary, is hereby appropriated out of the State Treasury to pay for the expenses of such publication and election.

A JOINT RESOLUTION

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That the Constitution of the State of Texas, Article 16 be amended by adding thereto another section to be known as "Section 61", which shall read as follows:

"Sec. 61. All district officers in the State of Texas and all county officers in counties having a population of 20,000 or more, according to the then last preceding Federal Census, shall from the first day of January and thereafter, and subsequent to the first Regular or Special Session of the Legislature after the adoption of this Resolution, be compensated on a salary basis. In all counties in this State, the Commissioners' Court shall be authorized to determine whether precinct officers shall be compensated on a fee basis or on a salary basis; and in counties having a population of less than 20,000, according to the then last preceding Federal Census, the Commissioners' Court shall also have the authority to determine whether county officers shall be compensated on a fee basis or on a salary basis."

And those opposed shall write or have printed on their ballots the words:

"AGAINST amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas abolishing the fee system of compensating all district officers, and all county officers in counties having a population of 20,000 or more; and authorizing the Commissioners' Court to determine whether county officers and precinct officers in counties containing less than 20,000 population may be compensated on a fee basis or on a salary basis."

Sec. 4. The Governor of the State is hereby directed to issue the necessary proclamation for said election and have the same published as required by the Constitution and existing laws of the State.

Sec. 5. The sum of Five Thousand (\$5,000.00) Dollars, or so much thereof as may be necessary, is hereby appropriated out of any funds in the Treasury of the State not otherwise appropriated to pay the expenses of said publication and election.

A JOINT RESOLUTION

proposing to amend Sections 3 and 5 of Article 7 of the Constitution of the State of Texas so as to permit the furnishing of State official text books free to every child of scholastic age, attending any school within the state.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Section 3 of Article 7 of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended so that hereafter it shall read as follows:

"Section 3. One-fourth of the revenue derived from the State occupation taxes and poll tax of One (\$1.00) Dollar on every inhabitant of the State, between the ages of twenty-one and sixty years, shall be set apart annually for the benefit of the public free schools; and in addition thereto, there shall be levied and collected an annual ad valorem State tax of such an amount not to exceed Thirty-five Cents on the One Hundred (\$100.00) Dollars valuation, as with the available school fund arising from all other sources will be sufficient to maintain and support the public school of the State for a period of not less than six months in each year, and it shall be the duty of the State Board of Education to set aside, under such regulations and in such manner as may be provided by law, a sufficient amount out of the said tax to provide free text books for the use of children within the scholastic age attending any school in this State; provided, however, that should the limit of taxation herein named be insufficient the deficit may be met by appropriation from the General Funds of the State and the Legislature may also provide for the formation of school districts by General Laws; and all such school districts may embrace parts of two or more counties, and the Legislature shall be authorized to pass laws for the assessment and collection of taxes in all said districts and for the management and control of the public school or schools of such districts, whether such districts are composed of territory wholly within a county or in parts of two or more counties, and the Legislature may authorize an additional ad valorem tax to be levied and collected within all school districts heretofore formed or hereinafter formed, for the further maintenance of public free schools, and for the erection and equipment of school buildings therein, provided that a majority of the qualified property taxpayers of the district voting at an election to be held for that purpose, shall vote such tax not to exceed in any one year One (\$1.00) Dollar on the One Hundred (\$100.00) Dollars valuation of the property subject to taxation in such district, but the limitation upon the amount of school district tax herein authorized shall not apply to incorporated cities or towns constituting separate and independent school districts, nor to independent or common school districts created by General or Special Law."

therein, provided that a majority of the qualified property taxpayers of the district voting at an election to be held for that purpose, shall vote such tax not to exceed in any one year One (\$1.00) Dollar on the One Hundred (\$100.00) Dollars valuation of the property subject to taxation in such district, but the limitation upon the amount of school district tax herein authorized shall not apply to incorporated cities or towns constituting separate and independent school districts, nor to independent or common school districts created by General or Special Law."

Sec. 2. That Section 5, Article 7, of the Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended so that hereafter it shall read as follows:

"Section 5. The principal of all bonds and other funds, and the principal arising from the sale of the lands hereinbefore set apart to said school fund, shall be the permanent school fund, and all the interest derivable therefrom and the taxes herein authorized and levied shall be the available school fund, to which the Legislature may add, not exceeding one per cent annually, of the total value of the permanent school fund, such value to be ascertained by the Board of Education until otherwise provided by law, and the available school fund shall be applied annually to the support of the public free schools. And no law shall ever be enacted appropriating any part of the permanent or available school fund to any other purpose whatever; nor shall the same, or any part thereof ever be appropriated to or used for the support of any sectarian school, provided that the State Board of Education may furnish State Adopted text books free to every child of scholastic age, attending any school within the state; and the available school fund herein provided shall be distributed to the several counties as may be provided by law and applied in such manner as may be provided by law."

Sec. 3. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to the electors of this State qualified to vote on Constitutional Amendments at the election to be held on the fourth Saturday in August, 1935, at which election there shall be printed on each ballot the following:

"FOR THE AMENDMENT TO THE CONSTITUTION OF THE STATE OF TEXAS PERMITTING THE FURNISHING OF FREE CHILD OF SCHOLASTIC AGE ATTENDING ANY SCHOOL WITHIN THIS STATE," and

"AGAINST THE AMENDMENT TO THE CONSTITUTION OF THE STATE OF TEXAS PERMITTING THE FURNISHING OF FREE CHILD OF SCHOLASTIC AGE ATTENDING ANY SCHOOL WITHIN THIS STATE," and

"FOR THE AMENDMENT TO THE CONSTITUTION OF THE STATE OF TEXAS PERMITTING THE FURNISHING OF FREE CHILD OF SCHOLASTIC AGE ATTENDING ANY SCHOOL WITHIN THIS STATE," and

Sec. 5. The sum of Ten Thousand (\$10,000.00) Dollars or so much thereof as shall be necessary is hereby appropriated out of the State Treasury to pay the expenses of the publications and elections provided for in this Resolution.

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION

Section 1. That Article IV of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended by adding thereto, between Section 11 and 12 a new section to be known as Section 11A, to read as follows:

"Section 11A. The Courts of the State of Texas having original jurisdiction of criminal actions shall have the power, after conviction, to suspend the imposition or execution of sentence and to place the defendant upon probation and to reimpose such sentence under such conditions as the Legislature may prescribe."

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Section 11, of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended so as to hereafter read as follows:

"Sec. 11. The right of the jury shall remain inviolate. The Legislature shall pass such laws as may be necessary to carry out the provisions of this section."

as may be needed to regulate the same, and to maintain its purity and efficiency. Provided, that the Legislature may provide for the temporary commitment, for observation and -or treatment, of mentally ill persons not charged with a criminal offense, for a County Court without the necessity of a trial by jury."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to the qualified electors of the State, qualified to vote on Constitutional Amendments, at an election to be held throughout the State on the 4th Saturday of August, A. D. 1935, at which election each ballot shall have printed thereon the words:

"For the Amendment of Article 1, Section 15, of the State Constitution by adding to said Section a provision to the effect that the Legislature may provide for the temporary commitment of mentally ill persons not charged with a criminal offense by the County Court without the necessity of a jury trial."

"Against the Amendment of Article 1, Section 15, of the Constitution by adding to said Section a provision to the effect that the Legislature may provide for the temporary commitment of mentally ill persons not charged with a criminal offense by the County Court without the necessity of a jury trial."

Each voter shall scratch out with pen or pencil the clause which he desires to vote against so as to indicate whether he is voting for or against the proposed Amendment.

Sec. 3. The Governor of this State is hereby directed to issue the necessary proclamation for said election, and has the same published as required by the Constitution and laws of the State of Texas.

Sec. 4. The sum of Five Thousand Dollars (\$5,000.00) or as much thereof as may be necessary, is hereby appropriated out of any funds in the Treasury of the State not otherwise appropriated to pay expenses of said publication and election.

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION

proposing an amendment to Section 1, of Article XVII, of the Constitution of Texas, providing that Constitutional Amendments may be submitted by the Legislature at Special Sessions under certain conditions, providing for an election on the question of the adoption of such amendment and providing for the proclamation and the publication thereof; describing the form of ballot, and making an appropriation therefor.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Section 1, of Article XVII, of the Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended so as to hereafter read as follows:

"Section 1. How the Constitution is to be Amended. The Legislature, at any biennial session, by a vote of two-thirds of all the members elected to each House, to be entered by yeas and nays on the Journals, may propose Amendments to the Constitution, to be voted upon by the qualified electors for members of the Legislature, which proposed Amendments shall be duly published once a week for four (4) weeks, commencing at least three (3) months before an election, the time of which shall be specified by the Legislature, in one weekly newspaper of each county, in which such a newspaper may be published, and it shall be the duty of the several returning officers

Sec. 2. The foregoing Amendment shall be submitted to the electors of this State who are qualified to vote on proposed Constitutional Amendments at an election to be held on the 24th day of August, A. D. 1935, at which election each ballot shall have printed thereon for those favoring the Amendment the words:

"FOR the Amendment to Section 1, of Article XVII, of the Constitution of Texas, providing that Amendments to the Constitution may be proposed at Special Sessions of the Legislature under certain conditions." And those against the Amendment shall have printed the words:

"AGAINST the Amendment to Section 1, Article XVII, of the Constitution of Texas, providing that Amendments to the Constitution may be proposed at Special Sessions of the Legislature under certain conditions." Each voter shall strike out with pen or pencil the clause which does not indicate his desire regarding the above proposed Amendment.

Sec. 3. The Governor is hereby directed to issue the necessary proclamation for said election and to have the above proposed Amendment published in the manner and for the time required by the Constitution and laws of this State.

Sec. 4. The sum of Five Thousand Dollars (\$5,000), or as much thereof as may be necessary is hereby appropriated out of any funds in the State Treasury not otherwise appropriated, to pay for the expenses of said publication and election.
