

QUAKE DEATH TOLL NEARS 2,000

FIVE CHARGED IN MURDER OF TEXAS COUPLE

THREE MEN AND TWO WOMEN HELD FOR DOUBLE SLAYING

HOUSTON, July 24.—Five residents of Humble and vicinity, three men and two women, were in custody today charged with murder in connection with the shotgun slaying of Edward Stone and Miss Olena Wuenesche near Aldine 15 months ago.

Those charged in justice court are May Vick, 22; Mrs. Mattie Vick, 33; Henry Vick, 24; Frank Vick, 20, and Eugene Davis, Deputy Sheriff J. G. Henderson and Frank Neville filed the charges.

Are Questioned
The five were being questioned by Sheriff T. A. Buford and Assistant District Attorney James H. Peden. Since dawn of Monday, May 6, 1929, revealed the bodies of Stone and Miss Wuenesche, nearly 3 miles apart on little used roads in the vicinity of Aldine, the case has become one of the "murder mysteries" of South Texas.

Found Near Car
The body of Stone, 31-year-old machinist who worked in Houston and resided on his father's farm near Westfield, was found near his parked car just off the Conroe road west of Aldine. He had been shot through the chest at close range with a shotgun.

Miss Wuenesche's body was two miles north of Aldine on the Hardy street road near the Green's bayou crossing. She had been shot in the back with a shotgun. Both had been dead several hours.

The couple had left Miss Wuenesche's father's home near Spring early Sunday night, ostensibly to return to Houston where the young woman was employed as a cook.

Rewards for arrest and conviction of the slayer or slayers were posted by Governor Dan Moody and citizens of Spring and Westfield. Nearly two score officers, including state rangers, sheriffs department, city police and private detectives assisted in the investigation which was without result until filing of the complaints.

ARGUMENTS IN CASE CLOSED
BALLINGER-SAN ANGELO LINE PLEAS ARE HEARD TODAY

WASHINGTON, D. C., July 24.—Final arguments in the contest over the proposed Texas and Pacific railroads to build 40 miles of new line from Ballinger to San Angelo were submitted today to the interstate commerce commission.

T. J. Graham, chief counsel for the Abilene and Southern, a subsidiary organized by the Texas and Pacific to undertake the construction, argued that with the new line the Texas and Pacific would be able to serve 38,000 square miles of Texas territory which now has but a single railroad.

CAMPAIGN NEARS CLOSE

WESTER GIVES INFORMATION ON ELECTION

COUNTY CHAIRMAN HAS DESIGNATIONS OF PRECINCTS

Persons who were 21 years of age on January 1, 1930 may vote in Saturday's primary without either a poll tax receipt or an exemption certificate, a statement by J. K. Wester, chairman of the Lubbock County Democratic Executive committee, explains today. Some indication has been evident among voters of the county on the question and the chairman's statement was made to clarify the situation. To aid voters and guard against confusion, boundaries of local precincts also have been outlined.

"After a thorough investigation of the law and decisions of the higher courts of Texas, I am of the opinion that a person who was 21 years of age on January 1, 1930 may vote in the July primaries without either a poll tax receipt or an exemption certificate," Mr. Wester explains.

Doesn't Apply Here
"In cities of 10,000 or more population the voter must have an exemption certificate, however, this does not apply to Lubbock for 1930. In the opinion of several lawyers, persons are entitled to a vote who were 21 years old the first of January."

Dwyer and Malina, who reside in Galveston, came here on call from local union officials.

The Gulf Coast district includes Houston, Galveston, Port Arthur, Beaumont, Orange and Lake Charles.

Cause of the strike according to union officials, is due to alleged use of unfair labor by the Planagan company.

CANDIDATES RETURNING TO NATIVE AREAS

INTENSIVE BALLYHOO TO COME TO END ON TOMORROW

Clint Small was back in his home territory of West Texas, to speak in the afternoon at Ranger and at Abilene tonight. Ross S. Sterling, fresh from a homecoming celebration at Houston last night, planned speeches today at Orange and Beaumont and tonight at Port Arthur. James E. Ferguson, speaking for his wife's candidacy, was booked for an address at Eastland at 8 p. m.

Thomas E. Love, hovering nearer Dallas and a hometown engagement tomorrow night, planned to speak this afternoon at Bonham and tonight at Greenville. Earle B. Mayfield was to appear at Gatesville in the afternoon and at Temple tonight. Lieut. Gov. Barry Miller, also circling back toward his home at Dallas, was due appearances at Greenville in the afternoon and tonight at McKinney. Vernon Young was listed to speak at Vernon this afternoon and tonight.

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CLOUDS THREATEN ENDURANCE PLANE

ST. LOUIS, July 24. (AP)—Storm clouds threatened today as Dale Jackson and Forest O'Brien began their fourth day of sustained flight in an effort to recapture the refueling endurance record, so they took on an extra supply of gasoline in anticipation of "a bad day."

They started their fourth day at 7:11 a. m. C. S. T., when they had been up 72 hours. Their plane, the "Greater St. Louis" was functioning perfectly.

Hoover Cuts Liquor From Embassy List
WASHINGTON, July 24. (AP)—Bubbling champagnes and choice wines at governmental expense are forbidden luxuries in American embassies and consulates abroad under an executive order just signed by President Hoover.

The order cites in detail regulations governing the disbursement by nearly 100 American diplomatic and consular missions abroad of allowances recently voted by congress for official entertaining.

Two Killed As Plane Falls In Nebraska
LEXINGTON, Neb., July 24. (AP)—Gerald May, 20, and Fred Taylor, 21, both of Lexington, were killed last night when the airplane they had borrowed from Glen Morton of Grand Island, burst into flames and fell in a field twenty miles from here.

Blanchard Files Appeal On Case
WASHINGTON, D. C., July 24. (AP)—Edward Blanchard of Dallas, convicted of violating the prohibition law through possession of 13 gallons of wine, today asked the supreme court to review his case.

He claimed his warehouse had been illegally visited by two federal prohibition agents without a search warrant and the wine unlawfully seized and used as evidence against him. He was fined \$500 and sentenced to serve 60 days in the Dallas jail.

ELY DECLARES ROAD WEST OF HERE IS UNFIT

FEDERAL DESIGNATION IS DELAYED; MEET HELD IN ABILENE

Certification of that portion of the Carlisbad-Cavern highway west from Lubbock as in good condition for interstate travel as required by the United States highway department in its conditional designation of the route as a federal thoroughfare has been refused by Judge W. R. Ely, of Abilene, member of the Texas highway commission, it was learned here today.

The action will delay considerably the final designation of the route.

J. H. Hankins, president, and A. B. Davis, secretary, of the Carlisbad-Cavern Highway association, returned early today from Abilene where a conference was held yesterday with Judge Ely, and R. A. Singletary, manager of the Good Roads division, Oklahoma City Chamber of Commerce.

Other Matters Up
Yesterday's meeting had been designed for discussion of possibility of making of the Carlisbad-Cavern route an international connecting link but other questions of possibly more immediate importance occupied the full time of the meeting.

Judge Ely explained his action by stating that information received from this city revealed the highway to be in bad condition and that he could not make the certification unless he was assured his recommendations would be correct. While local delegates assured him that the western portion of the road is as good as any other part of the route the highway official would not grant the certification at this time.

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FARMERS TO GATHER HERE

MASS MEETING SLATED FOR WEDNESDAY TO START DRIVE

A county-wide mass meeting of Lubbock county cotton farmers will be held in this city next Wednesday afternoon at 2 o'clock when the candidates for members in the Texas Cotton Cooperative association will be formally started here.

Lubbock county is expected to continue as in the past, the leading county of Texas in membership for the cooperative association, according to expressions by R. J. Murray, chairman of the Lubbock district of the cooperative.

Leaders Confident
"Although we have almost 600 members of the association in Lubbock county now," Mr. Murray states, "There are approximately 2,000 farmers in the county who do not belong, and by the time our intensive drive is closed we feel confident that a majority of these will be counted."

As stated frequently by P. R. Friend, vice-president of the First National bank, he "does not see how any cotton farmer can afford to stay out of the Texas Cotton Co."

CANDIDATES TO BE HEARD HERE FRIDAY

FINAL APPEAL TO BE MADE IN RALLY FOR VOTES IN CITY

Climaxing a primary campaign unusual in its lack of spirit and interest, Lubbock county candidates and representatives of other office seekers tomorrow night will make their final appeal for votes at a mass meeting to be held in the county courthouse at 8:30 o'clock.

While some degree of interest has been evident during the past few days in the political situation, chief interest has been centered in the governor's race with little talk of county campaigns. Oldtimers of the city and county have expressed opinions that politics in the county this year have been quieter than at any time heretofore.

Communities Visited
"We want to urge every voter who possibly can to attend the meeting Friday evening," E. L. Pitts, chairman of the assembly stated. "Practically every community in the county has been visited by the candidates during the past three weeks and the final big gathering here will wind up the first lap of the contest. New issues probably will be brought to light by several of the candidates and all of them are expected to be on hand to at least express a word of appreciation to voters."

Speaking before a fairly representative group of voters last night, the candidates took the stump at Tumble N swimming pool. A chicken dinner was served in the park by the Lubbock Business and Professional Women's club and about 25 candidates for county and precinct offices addressed the gathering. J. A. Humphries spoke in behalf of "Ma" Ferguson as a candidate in the gubernatorial race.

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DELAY IS GIVEN TAX RATE ACTION
AUSTIN, July 24. (AP)—Taxpayers of Texas probably will not learn next year's tax rate until after the election.

The automatic tax board, consisting of the governor, comptroller and treasurer, was called to meet yesterday. Treasurer Hatcher and Comptroller Sheppard were here but Governor Moody was unable to be here. The governor came back today but found the other members of the board absent. Hatcher left again on his interrupted campaign for railroad commissioner, and Sheppard was somewhere in North Texas, also campaigning.

Croxton Released On Bond Of \$1,500
I. S. Croxton, charged with chicken theft, was released this morning from the Lubbock county jail on bond of \$1,500, following his arrest late Tuesday afternoon. He waived preliminary hearing before Judge G. R. Scott yesterday afternoon.

Ed Stovall also was arrested with Croxton but he has not been arrested for a hearing. A coop containing fifteen chickens was alleged to have been stolen by the two men.

REPORTS SAY TOTAL TO BE STILL HIGHER

INJURED LIST RUNS INTO THOUSANDS IN DEVASTATED AREA

(By Associated Press)
NAPLES, July 24.—Government officials this afternoon expressed fear that the earthquake death list, officially given out at noon as the count progressed. Unofficial reports said 3,025 bodies had been taken from the ruins throughout the devastated territory.

The same report said that the dead in the volcanic crater city of Melfi were increasing in number every hour as the work of rescue parties in the ruins progressed.

Cemeteries Filled
The report said the cemeteries in that town had been completely filled and that 200 bodies had to be taken by train to Foggia for burial.

Upon receipt of this information the Bank of Naples placed \$500,000 lire at the disposal of the government for relief work.

The earthquakes, sharp shocks undulatory in nature, began shortly after 1 a. m., yesterday and vibrations continued intermittently all day. Buildings over the entire area were shaken and it was in the collapse of these that the deaths and injuries resulted.

Rescue Work Rushed
Rescue work, directed by soldiers and Fascist militiamen, continued through all of last night by aid of torchlight, while those who survived the disaster slept in parks, in fields or anywhere except in buildings, fearing fresh shocks.

In Naples there was another feat, for Mt. Vesuvius, which for ages past has rolled down floods of lava upon the country surrounding it, was seen glowing across the bay and many believed an eruption would follow.

Greatest Since 1908
Not since the earthquake which wiped out Messina in 1908 has Italy seen such a despread destruction.

In some instances entire villages have been wiped out.

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PRORATION IN AREA ORDERED

DRASTIC CUT TO BE MADE IN OKLAHOMA OIL FIELDS

(By Associated Press.)
OKLAHOMA CITY, July 24—The state corporation commission has formally ordered the most drastic curtailment of crude oil production in Oklahoma since proration was started. The order, effective until August 31, holds the state to a maximum daily output of 550,000 barrels.

The action is official approval of an agreement entered into by operators in flush pools of the state at Tulsa a week ago. It was made retroactive to July 15.

Pools Regulated
The Oklahoma City field, under the new order, will not be allowed to exceed 18.75 per cent of its potential production. A 25 per cent production will be allowed in the East Earlboro and South Earlboro pools, while 50 per cent production will be permitted at Allen, Bowlegs, Carr City, Earlboro townsite, Little River, East Little River, Marshall-Lovell, Maud, Mission, Muskogee, Scarsight, Seminole, East Seminole and St. Louis.

The order stated that since the issue of the original proration order, potential production of crude oil has increased to 1,400,523 barrels per day, while the reasonable market demand has decreased from 650,000 barrels, the production permitted under the former order, to 550,000 barrels.

The pools curtailed 50 per cent will have an estimated production under the new order of 152,856 barrels daily for July and 143,421 barrels for August.

UNWILLING GIFT

Robbers Leave Car And Safe At Scene

CHARLESTON, S. C., July 24 (P)—The government today had an automobile as an unwilling gift from robbers who made an unsuccessful attempt to loot the North Charleston post office last night.

Unable to break the post office safe open, the robbers pushed the 1,800 pound strong box through a window where it tumbled into the tonneau of their car. The safe crashed through the car's floor and the robbers found it impossible to move either car or safe.

Post office employees found safe and car this morning.

(Ash Can Pete) Inserio, whose North Elizabeth street saloon used to be called the "Ash Can Club," was shot to death last night. Six bullets entered his body, but Inserio, 40 years old, lived long enough to be taken to a hospital. A police man asked who shot him.

"I don't know," he answered, "but they did a good job." No witness has been found to the shooting. An hour earlier Inserio had been sitting in front of the saloon, now called the "Idle Hour Club."

A search of the saloon disclosed a few nickels in the cash register. There was no liquor or beer there. Police believed "Ash Can Pete" may have been slain by enemies of the Moran-Aliele gang with whom, officers said, Inserio had recently formed a connection.

Woods To Talk
H. D. Woods, former Lubbock mayor, will speak in support of Small at a general county meeting Friday night at Littlefield.

Small personally will close his campaign Friday night in Wichita Falls. Expressing belief that Small will receive 75 per cent of the votes cast in this district, R. J. Murray, president of the Lubbock Chamber of Commerce and director of Small's for-governor activities here, said: "That estimate is based on a wide acquaintance throughout the district and is made because I have had an opportunity to talk to many voters while directing Small's campaign here."

West Texas' Chance
"It is to be hoped that all the South Plains will vote for Small. West Texas has a chance to elect a governor."

"I predict that Small will get 100,000 votes in West Texas and 50,000 in the remainder of the state."

Mrs. Lena E. Goodman, former committee woman from the 30th senatorial district, believes Small will carry her district by a large majority, particularly among the women voters.

Predicts "Ma" Second
In response to a telegram pertaining to the gubernatorial race, J. H. Goodman, local attorney, Wednesday replied that he believed Small would receive a majority of 200,000 votes expected to be cast in West Texas. "Ma" Ferguson he believed would be second in the primaries, Love third and Mayfield and Sterling last.

Reports from Spur indicate that Small will get a large majority in Dickens county with scattered ballots going chiefly to Mrs. Ferguson and Love. Mr. Goodman said.

CHICAGO, July 24.—Evidence tending to disprove the theory that babies born to Mrs. Charles Bamberger and Mrs. William Watkins at Englewood hospital June 30 may have been transposed by attendants was disclosed at the identification inquiry today.

Members of the scientific group after examining principals in the mixup found that the baby given to the Bambergers has a birthmark on its heel similar to such a marking on Mr. Bamberger's heel. Two other children of the Bamberger family were found to be identically marked.

A number of nurses, experienced in the care of infants, called in to look at the youngsters, expressed confidence the babies are now in their rightful homes. They pointed to a marked facial resemblance between Mrs. Watkins and the baby she now has and to a similarity in body and facial formations between Mr. Bamberger and the other child.

Finger prints of the subjects

And the four parents were taken today by Dr. Ferdinand Wetzel, of Vienna, world famous criminologist. Dr. Wetzel was confident that a study of the finger prints would establish without a doubt the identities of the babies. He said the balls of the finger tips of a mother and her child are similar. This having been proved in the examination of 120 sets of prints.

Harmon's dream, though realized, was his undoing, and he was ousted shortly afterwards as chairman of the board of directors. Tribute will be paid to the veteran promoter today in Chicago.

Adolfo Luque, Cuba's leading baseball hero, age 39, did a great job as he made first place in the National league safe for the Brooklyn Robins. Luque held the St. Louis Cardinals to five hits through a trying duel with Sylvester Johnson, while Brooklyn slowly gathered enough momentum to win, 4 to 1. Most of the time, Luque had only one run lead and it was not until the Cards had tied the count in the seventh that the Robins started hitting.

The Robins' gain was made possible by their neighbors, the New York Giants, who downed the Chicago Cubs, 8 to 6, to put Brooklyn a full game plus a few odd points in the lead. The pitching in this contest was a matter of numbers rather than skill. Chicago using five hurlers and New York four, and the wisdom of the Cub throwers was the principal reason for the Giants' four run rally in the fifth which decided the game.

Along with Luque, ancient Jack Quinn, of the Philadelphia Athletics, whose years number somewhere near 45, above or below, gave the younger pitchers a lesson. Quinn had a little trouble in the ninth inning and George Earnshaw finished the game for him as the A's downed Detroit, 4 to 1, but in his eight innings on the mound which gave him his ninth victory. Quinn allowed only five hits and three more drives past the infield.

Urban "Red" Faber, second in age to Quinn in this quietest, did not figure as a winner or loser for the Chicago White Sox. After holding a 1-0 lead for five frames, Faber weakened and allowed the Boston Red Sox three runs in the sixth. Hal McKinnis relieved him and got credit for the victory as Chicago rallied again and gained a 5 to 3 decision.

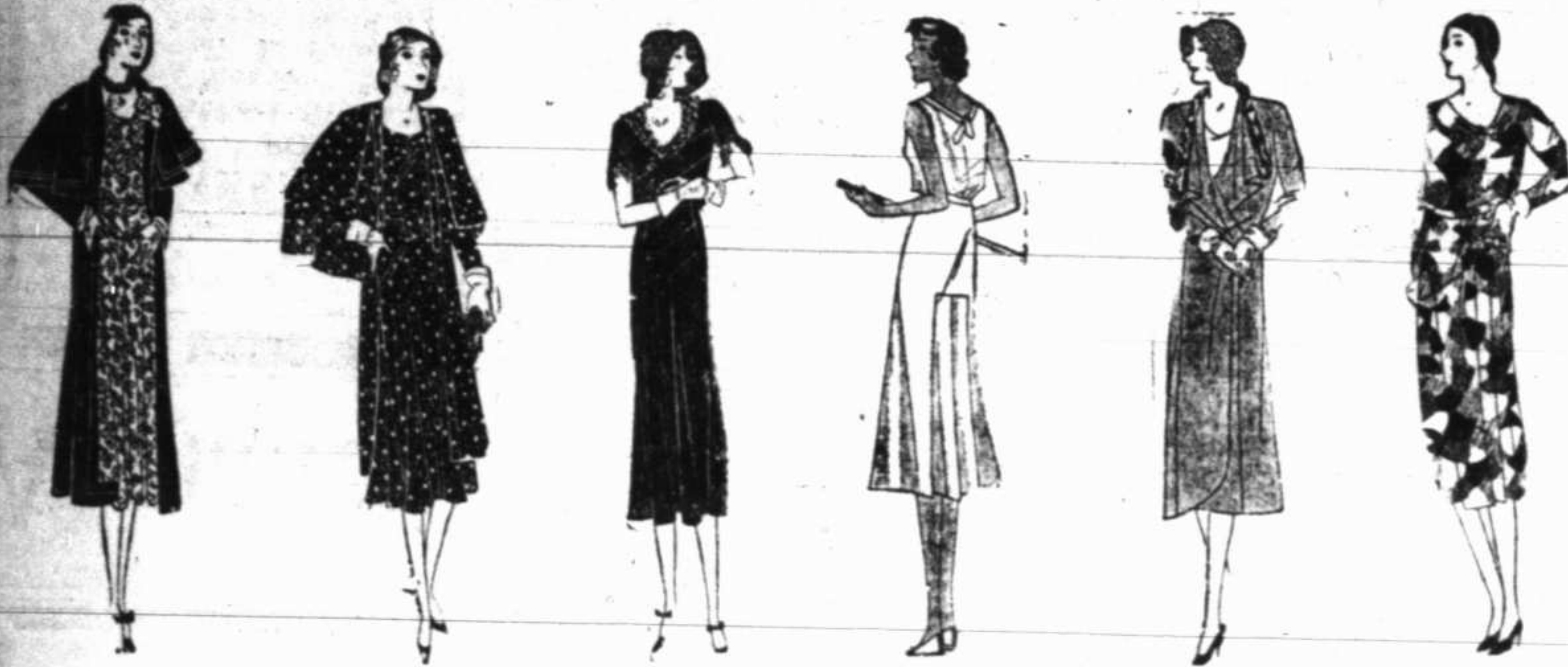

WASHINGTON, July 24 — Carl Williams, Farm Board member representing cotton, said today cotton cooperatives would advance to the members the largest amounts possible on the 1930 crop, adding that would be not less than 65 per cent of the market value of the cotton and perhaps more.

TEXAS ROYALTIES CONTINUE CLIMB

AUSTIN, July 24 (P)—June royalties on the production of gas and oil on lands of the University of Texas totaled approximately \$190,000, C. H. Koch, in charge of the fund, said today. This is about \$9,000 more than was received in royalties in May with nearly \$2,000 more expected.

With the receipt of the June royalties, the permanent oil royalty fund of the university reached \$12,841,171.

Koch said part of the increase in the June receipts was due to the collection of \$13,616 from the Landreth Oil company as royalty on the oil on the ground that payment should be made when the oil was marketed.

Of the total royalties the Big Lake Oil company paid \$47,694; Texas Oil company \$38,244; Sued Oil company \$10,468; Gulf Petroleum corporation \$12,532.

Spur Schools Ready For Another Session

SPUR, July 24.—(Special)—The Spur school system has 19 credits of affiliated work with the Texas high school system. Dean Z. Hall, superintendent, announced Mr. Hall came here recently to head the schools. More than 100 pupils from outside the district have transferred to the local schools.

The commercial course is being strengthened. Mr. Hall said Typewriting, bookkeeping, shorthand, business English, arithmetic and commercial law will be given in the course.

Young Man Dies In Mineral Wells Lake

MINERAL WELLS, July 24.—Foster Matatal, 20, was drowned in a swimming pool at Lake Mineral Wells three miles east of here, while swimming with a young brother.

The body was located by A. A. Freeman and Joe Hall, operators of a nearby store, and was brought to shore. Artificial respiration and massage were employed in an effort to revive the man.
