



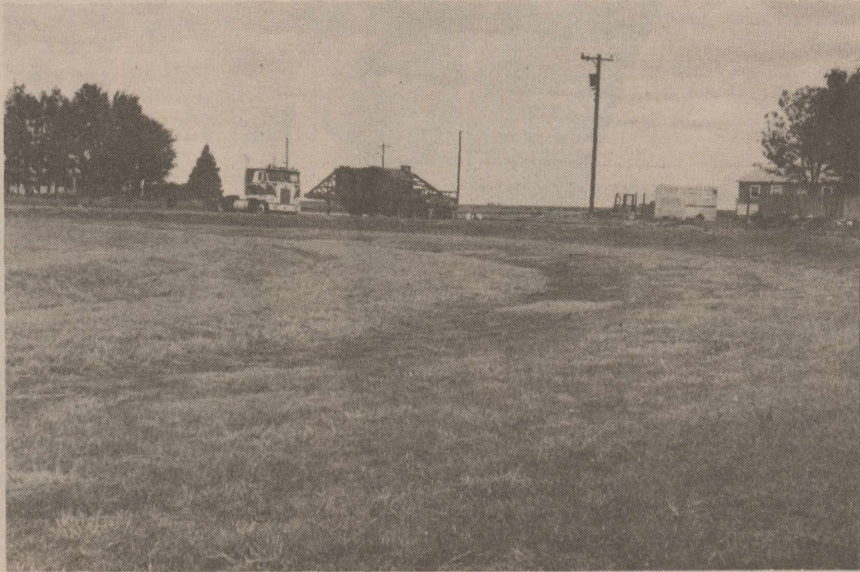

Season Lead Changes Again, Reed Holds 2-Point Edge

Everette Heller captured the week's top victory in the Hart Beat football contest, missing just two games. He was the lone contestant missing that number.

Two contestants missed three games each with the tie-breaker determining the second and third place finishes. Cleve McLain was 24 points off the actual score of the Longhorns-Mustangs game Friday. His prediction of

18-0 was good enough for second place. Third place goes to Deanna Huseman who was off 39 points with a 17-14 prediction.

Bob Reed edged back into sole possession of the season lead. He has 102 correct predictions over the nine weeks of competition. Rusty Ammons holds 100 correct predictions.

In County, Locally

Voters Pick Reagan

In keeping with the rest of Texas and the nation, voter turn-out Tuesday was "very good" at both the local and county levels.

Castro County registered their desire for a change by giving 1955 votes to Ronald Reagan and George Bush and 1199 to Jimmy Carter and Walter Mondale. Seventeen persons voted for Libertarian Party candidate Ed Clark for president while Independent John Anderson received 44.

In Hart, voters gave the nod to Reagan over Carter by 224 to 210.

Kent Hance received 2517 votes in the county with his Libertarian opponent, J.D. Webster drawing 24.

Former Boys Rancher, Bill Sarpaluis easily out-distanced Bob Price in his seek for State Senate. He garnered 2329 to 773 across the county; 345 to 81, locally.

Unopposed, George E. Bennett received 23 votes in his re-election bid.

Proposed constitutional amendment number one was narrowly approved in Castro County with 1391 for; 1339 against. Number four, to authorize bingo games on a local option basis was okayed 1564 to 1212.

Also approved was amendment authorizing the governor to remove

appointed officers, 1514 to 1115.

Amendment seven, authorizing counties to do private road work, was endorsed 1530 to 1108 and amendment nine, concerning separate property, was approved 1440 to 1193.

Amendment two, authorizing appeal of pretrial rulings, was defeated 1686 to 902. Voters cast 1503 votes to 1066 for amendment three requiring a single appraisal and single board of equalization within each county.

Defeated 1955 to 759, was amendment five which grants the governor power to exercise fiscal control over appropriate funds.

Amendment eight was also defeated in Castro County. Voters cast 1507 to 1006 against changing the name of the Courts of Civil Appeals.

Longhorns Overpower Bovina

Hart Longhorns and Bovina Mustangs met last Friday in a game that matched running against passing. When the contest had ended, Hart had slapped a 42-0 whitewashing on the pass-oriented Mustangs. The Horns did use a ball control offense mixed with some timely passes to dispose of their second district foe. The victory was aided by a very stingy Longhorn defense which intercepted seven Bovina passes.

Both teams started out rather slow, seemingly trying to figure one another out. The first quarter ended with the game still in a "dead" heat 0-0.

The Longhorns used the second quarter to begin their dominance of the ballgame. Having begun a drive late in the first period from their own 42 yard line, the Horns moved down to the Mustangs' five yard line. On second and goal Daniel Guzman banged over-right guard for the score. This game with 10:35 still remaining in the half. This was an eight play 58 yard drive highlighted by runs from Isaias Ponce and Derek Rich. Rich kept the drive alive with a 13 yard pass to Chad Black on third down. After the run for two was no good, Hart led 6-0.

After the ensuing kickoff, the Mustangs fumbled on their first scrimmage play. With the Longhorns recovering at Bovina's 33 yard line, Hart went back to the ground and drove the ball down to the Mustangs' two yard line. Again, on second down, Guzman slipped through for the second Hart score with 7:23 left before halftime. Rich passed to Black for the two point conversion upping the Horns' lead to 14-0. This drive was a seven play 33 yard drive.

On the first play after the kickoff, Leonard Washington intercepted a Mustang pass, returning it 20 yards down to Bovina's nine yard line. Bovina's defense stiffened and held the Horns by throwing Derek Rich for a 14 yard loss on fourth down.

The Mustangs threw for one first down. Unable to move any further the Mustangs were forced to punt. Benny McLain knifed through and blocked his second punt in as many games. Kevin Belt recovered the ball putting the

Horns' back in business at the Mustangs' 15 yard line. Four plays later, Ponce busted over from the three yard line for the Longhorns' third score of the evening. The pass for two points failed leaving the score 20-0, Hart, with 3:47 remaining in the second quarter.

Neither team threatened during the remainder of the period. This left the halftime score 20-0 in favor of the hometown Longhorns.

Bovina received the kickoff to begin the second half. They made one first down with the aid of a pass interference penalty. Four downs later, from Hart's 38 yard line, Bovina QB, Dale Gilbreath, passed down field trying to hit Ricky Shepherd. Washington stepped in and made another interception. However, Bovina was flagged for an offensive pass interference penalty. The Mustangs were penalized 15 yards from the original line of scrimmage, giving the ball back to the Horns.

The Horns returned the ball to the Mustangs via a tipped pass and interception. Both teams moved very little until the waning minutes of the third quarter when Ponce intercepted another Bovina pass. Taking over on the Mustangs' 38 yard line, the Longhorns marched in for the score on the last play of the third quarter. Guzman carried the ball in for Hart. Rich passed to Clay Barnes for two points to move the count to 28-0. This drive was good for 38 yards in six plays.

Bovina received the kickoff and for the first time in the game, the Mustangs showed that they indeed could pass. After two pass completions and two first downs, Bovina had moved to the Longhorn 30 yard line. On second and short Black intercepted a short pass in the "flats", returning it 73 yards for a Longhorn touchdown. Ponce ran the ball over for the two point conversion. With 9:09 remaining in the game, Hart now led 36-0.

After several change of possessions, Hart took over on downs on their own 35 yard line. From here the Longhorns displayed their powerful running game

once more. Good runs by Belt and Barnes moved the ball deep into Mustang territory. The Mustang defense rose up and held the Horns on downs, taking over on their own four yard line. On a third down, Santos Valenzuela deflected a Bovina pass. Agustin Perez intercepted the ball and ran down to the one; he fumbled the ball into the end zone, where Jorge Barretero fell on it for the last Hart score. The run for two points failed

leaving the score 42-0 with 1:52 remaining in the game.

Bovina took the kickoff and made their only real threat of the evening. The Mustangs moved to the Horns' 22 yard line. On the last play of the game Bovina completed a pass to the Longhorn nine yard line, but Barretero recovered the fumbled ball to end the game. The final score read Hart 42, and Bovina, 0.

JV's 'Tuff' In Victory

The Longhorn JV journeyed to Bovina last Thursday to take on the Mustangs. The Horns played good "tuff" defense along with a spirited offensive punch, which allowed Hart to come away with a 16-6 win.

Defensively, it was a team effort as the Horns limited the Mustangs to only 136 yards total offense. Robert Martinez led the Horns in tackles with 20. Robert Gonzales had 13, Joey Macias 12, and Roy Rodgers had 11.

The Longhorn defense forced three Bovina turnovers. Two were fumbles and one was an intercepted pass by Arthur Finch.

Offensively, the Horns did equally as well. The offensive line did a good job of blocking all night as was evident by the 224 total yards gained. Alex Carrasco led all rushers with 104 on 11 carries. Martinez added 60 yards on six carries. Doing the blocking were Arnie Gonzales, Macias, Robert Gonzales and Rodgers.

Coy Myrick scored first for the Horns on a one yard QB sneak, which followed a 47 yard run by Martinez. Carrasco added the two points on a three yard run around right end. Myrick, again, tallied the last Hart score on another one yard sneak. The try for two points was successful as Myrick passed to Tony Hoover.

The Longhorns are now 1-4-2 on the year. However, this defensive bunch has allowed only 53 points in seven

games thus far. The JV's next game will be at home against Kress, Thursday, Nov. 6. Game time will be approximately 7:45 p.m.

ORDINANCE NO. 78

AN ORDINANCE RESTRICTING PARKING IN CERTAIN AREAS ABUTTING STATE HIGHWAY 194 WITHIN THE CITY OF HART, TEXAS; ESTABLISHING A PENALTY FOR NON-COMPLIANCE WITH THIS ORDINANCE; AND PROVIDING A PROCEDURE FOR THE EFFECTIVE DATE THEREOF:

WHEREAS, the City Commission of the City of Hart, Texas, meeting in regular meeting on the 27th day of October, 1980, after due posting of such meeting; and,

WHEREAS, the City Commission, after having been informed by the Chief of Police, to the hazardous condition existing at the intersection of State Highway 194 and Farm to Market Road 168, and that such condition could be alleviated by designating certain areas as a no-parking area; and

WHEREAS, the City Commission of the Hart, Texas, deems the passage, promulgation, and enforcement of the provisions hereinafter contained necessary for the protection of the public safety and general welfare of the community and of all of its citizens in the City of Hart, Texas;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED by the City Commission of the City of Hart, Texas:

SECTION I - DELINEATING PROHIBITED AREAS

It shall be unlawful for any person operating a motor vehicle or owning one to allow said motor vehicle to be parked or left unattended without taking the necessary precautions for an emergency stop on the South right-of-way of State Highway 194 from its intersection with Farm to Market Highway 168 Southeastward a distance of one-hundred [100] feet; said area to be marked by highway markers designating same as a no-parking area.

SECTION II - Penalty

Any person violating this ordinance shall be cited to appear before the Corporation Court of the City of Hart, Texas to show cause why they should not be found in violation of the provisions of this ordinance. Any person found in violation of this ordinance shall be subject to a penalty by payment of a fine to said Corporation Court of not less than \$1.00 nor more than \$200.00 upon a finding of guilty of such violation.

SECTION III - EFFECTIVE DATE

The City Clerk of the City of Hart, Texas, is hereby directed to have the descriptive caption as well as the penalty clause of this ordinance published in the local newspaper for two [2] consecutive weeks informing

the general public of its nature and penalty. This ordinance is to be effective from and after its date of passage with the penalty for enforcement to be effective as of the date of the second publication as required by law.

SECTION IV - SAVINGS CLAUSE


The invalidity of any section, subsection, paragraph, sentence, clause, phrase, word or words, shall not invalidate any other part of this ordinance. It is the intent of the City Commission in enacting this ordinance that the provisions are separable and that no provision hereof shall become inoperative or fail by reason of the invalidity of any other provision.

AND, WHEREAS, an emergency is apparent for the immediate preservation of health, safety and general welfare of the public, that requires this ordinance to become effective immediately; therefore, all rules to the contrary requiring three or several readings of this ordinance are hereby waived, and this ordinance shall become effective as of the date of its publication as hereinabove set out and as required by law.

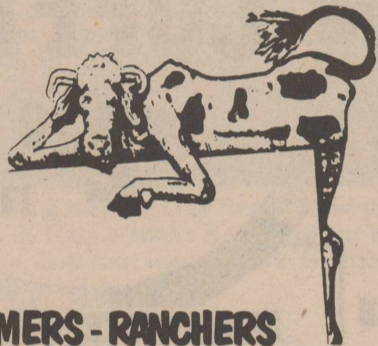

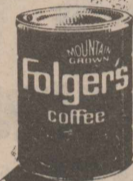
