## Drinking Taboo On School Grounds

School officials this week are issuing a reminder of the State law prohibiting the possession of intoxicating beverages on school grounds. The softball field, property of Hart ISD, is also subject to this law and law officers will enforce the rule.

The 66th Legislative Session of the State of Texas enacted the regulation which states: "The possession of any intoxicating beverage for consumption, sale, or distribution while on the grounds or in a building of a public elementary, junior high, or senior high school or while entering or inside any enclosure, field, or stadium where an athletic event sponsored or participated in by a public elementary, junior high, or senior high school of this state is being held is unlawful."

Persons violating this regulation are subject to fines up to \$200.

**Editor's note:** The Rev. Wheeler gave this advice to the young men in the Class of 1980 at a party given for them by Mr. and Mrs. Bill Rich and Mr. and Mrs. Luie Cross.

By the time the Constitution of the United States was written, we had already decided that happiness, at least the pursuit of it, was something that should be guaranteed. Thomas Jefferson would have defined his term as the right to succeed.

## Cook Of The Week

Summer time means time to get out in the garden again for Joy Barham. With Perry's help, it's big enough to provide their family with fresh meals plus a lot of good eating come winter months.

The Barham garden has all the usual vegetables plus broccoli, cabbage and cauliflower. From it, Joy plans to freeze and can for future meals. Despite the toil it requires, Joy finds much satisfaction from growing her family's food.

Joy enjoys cooking and likes clipping new recipes. She avidly saves those columns featuring her friends, neighbors and acquaintances.

The Barhams moved to Hart in 1966 from Tulia. Perry works with the County; Joy has been bookkeeper for B&B Farm Supply since 1975.

They have four children. Ronnie and Brenda (Mrs. Jerry Davis) live in Plainview with their families. Ronnie is the father of a little son, two years old. Brenda and Jerry are parents of six-year-old twin daughters. Dianne (Lloyd) lives in Lubbock. David has been busy earning a degree from West Texas State University.

Members of First Baptist Church, Joy sings in the choir.

She is a former Sunday School teacher.

She grew up around Quitaque and Flomot. She met Perry, a native of Oklahoma, in Flomot. They lived there following their marriage in January 1948 until 1959 when they moved to Tulia.

Quilting and crocheting are among Joy's favorite pastimes. She is currently working on a crocheted "flower garden" afghan. Since Perry made her quilting frames to replace the old ceiling hung frames, Joy has enjoyed a renewal of that hobby.

Joy also likes to sew and makes most of her own clothes.

Joy shares recipes for her hot rolls which always draw compliments, Mexican Pizza ("the only pizza I like," she says), Broccoli and Onion Casserole and Potato-Ham Scallop.

### ICE BOX ROLLS

- 2 pkgs yeast
  - 2 c warm water
  - 1 T salt
  - 1/2 c sugar
  - 1 egg
  - 2 T shortening
  - 6 to 7 c flour
- Dissolve yeast in water. Add

remaining ingredients. Place in greased bowl, cover with damp cloth and refrigerate until ready to make into rolls. Let rise at room temperature until double in size (about 1 hr.) This keeps well until all is used if kept covered and refrigerated. Also good for doughnuts or cinnamon rolls.

### MEXICAN PIZZA

- 1 1/2 c Bisquick
  - 1/2 c cornmeal
  - 1/2 c water
  - 1 lb ground beef
  - 1 4 oz can green chilies, chopped
  - 1 envelope taco seasoning
  - 1/4 c water
  - 1 can refried beans
  - 1 1/2 c shredded cheddar cheese
  - 1 c shredded lettuce
  - 2 tomatoes
  - 1/2 c chopped onions
- Heat oven to 425°. Grease 12" pizza pan. Mix first three ingredients to make crust. Will be thick. Pat in pan and bake 10 mins. Cool. Brown beef, add chilies, taco mix and water. Simmer 5-10 mins. Spread beans on crust and add meat, sprinkle with cheese and bake 10 mins. Serve with lettuce, tomatoes and cheese.

### POTATO-HAM SCALLOP

- 2 c cubed cooked ham
  - 6-8 med potatoes, sliced thin
  - 1/4 c chopped onion
  - 1/4 c flour
  - 2 c milk
  - 3 T bread crumbs
  - 1 T butter or margarine
  - 1/2 c grated cheese
- Put half of the ham in 2 qt casserole.

Layer half the potatoes and half the onions. Season with salt and pepper. Add remaining ham, potatoes and onion. Sprinkle flour over top of casserole. pour milk over all. Add salt and pepper. Bake 1 to 1 1/2 hrs in 350° oven, covered. Uncover, add bread crumbs, butter and grated cheese. Bake 15 mins more.

### BROCCOLI & ONION CASSEROLE

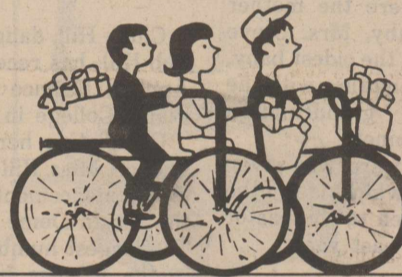
- 1 lb fresh broccoli or 2 10 oz pkgs frozen broccoli
  - 3 med onions, quartered
  - 1/4 c margarine
  - 2 T flour
  - 1/4 t salt
  - 1 c milk
  - 1 3 oz pkg cream cheese
  - 1/2 c shredded cheese
  - 1 c bread crumbs
- Cook broccoli until tender. Cook onion in salted water. Drain. In sauce pan, melt half the margarine, blend in flour, salt and dash of pepper. Add milk, cook, stirring all the time, until thick and bubbly. Reduce heat and blend in cream cheese. Put vegetables in 1 1/2 qt casserole. Pour sauce over them, top with grated cheese, melt remaining margarine and toss with bread crumbs. Sprinkle over top of casserole. Bake in 350° oven about 30 mins.
