FUNERAL PENDING FOR JOE DULIN

Colorado City — Funeral is pending at Kiker and Son Funeral Home here for Joe Dulin, 69, Colorado City farmer. Burial will be in Colorado City Cemetery.

Mr. Dulin died unexpectedly Monday morning at his home here.

JUNE 30 IMPORTANT FOR DISABLED WORKERS

June 30, 1962, is a very important date for workers who have been severely disabled for several years, according to Erven Fisher, District Manager of the Big Spring Social Security Office. Until June 30, 1962, a person may file a claim for disability insurance benefits and establish a period of disability from the date his illness or injury occurred. However, the 1960 amendments to the social security law established June 30, 1962, as a cut-off date for filing a claim for a disability that has existed more than 18 months prior to the date on which the application was filed.

Effective July 1, 1962, eighteen (18) months prior to the date of filing is the earliest period of disability that can be established for a worker regardless of the actual onset of his disability.

Mr. Fisher went on to point out that the date of onset of a disability is extremely important in computing a worker's disability insurance benefits. For example a man who became disabled in 1957 may establish that onset date if he files his claim before June 30, 1962, and will get a much higher benefit than if he waits until after the cut-off date to file. If he does not file a claim until July 1962, the onset of his disability is deemed by law to be January 1961, or 18 months prior to the date of his application.

Mr. Fisher concluded that most people are not aware of the significance of the onset date in the computation of a disability insurance benefit. Any person who was disabled in 1960 or before should file his claim for social security disability insurance benefits before the June 30, 1962, cut-off date. If you would like detailed information concerning the requirements that must be met to entitle a person to social security disability insurance benefits, you may obtain Booklet No. OASD-294, "How Disabled Must You Be," from the Big Spring Social Security Office at 700 Rummels Street.

Rain, Hail And High Wind Hit Area Last Week And This Week

Loraine finally got a big rain Wednesday morning starting about 7 o'clock and ending about 9:30 amounting to 1.95 inches at the government gauge here in town. This rain as all the others have been recently was lighter South of town. It was spotted ranging from the Loraine measurement down to as low as .40 inch on the Dr. R. N. Gray farm about ten or twelve miles South of town. Most of the area, however, received enough moisture for planting.

During the month of June up to and including Wednesday morning Loraine had received a total of 3.15 inches of rain with no damaging hail or wind anywhere in the territory except North of town where considerable damage was done by hail last week. Some cotton was also damaged by sand following the rains.

Some of the area North of town received up to six or seven inches of rain in the week period. A lot of fields were badly washed and water is standing around terraces.

Heavy rain and considerable hail fell on many farms in the Loraine area North of town during the storm period of last week. The heaviest rain and hail fell in the Valley View area where cotton crops on several farms were badly damaged and in some instances will need to be replanted. Other fields suffered severe damage but many farmers say they will wait a few days before they decide to replant.

As much as four- and five inches fell on some farms it is estimated. Over the area the rain fall amounted to from more than

an inch to 2.50 inches. Some hail fell in most of the area. Showers began to fall in the area as early as last Tuesday night but the heaviest rain and hail came on Wednesday night and Thursday night.

During all the stormy period, the area South and West of town remained mostly dry except for isolated spots through Saturday. The rains came within a mile or so of Loraine on the North. All of the showers during the week followed that pattern and left the remainder of the Loraine territory dry.

Where the rains fell crops will put on new life and those in the area who had not planted will have moisture to plant on. Crops in the dry part are still doing well but need moisture. Those in the dry area who had not planted do not have the moisture yet to plant on.

Light rain showers Saturday and Sunday night left .75 inch of moisture in Loraine and over most of the area South of town that had remained dry during the stormy weather earlier in the week.

The .75 inch of moisture coupled with other light showers a few days earlier brought the total for Loraine to 1.05 inches which will be sufficient for those who have not planted to get their seed in the ground this week. It was a life saver for small cotton and other crops that had been struggling for the little bit of remaining moisture.

Another shower moved in from the West Monday night and left .15 inch of moisture here in town. The fall was heavier both North and South of town. Some areas North received as much as 1.50 inches and South measure- ments ranged up to .70 inch.

MARKETING PROBLEMS TOPIC AT MEETING JULY 10-11

Dallas - (Special) - Major marketing problems of the U. S. Cotton industry will be examined at a meeting here, July 10-11, according to the National Cotton Council.

Attending the Cotton Marketing Conference at the Statler Hilton will be farmers, ginners, merchants, spinners, machinery and instrument manufacturers, research and education workers, and others associated with this phase of the industry.

Burris C. Jackson of Hillsboro, president of the Council, will open the conference with an address on the need for increased efficiency in producing and marketing cotton.

Program for the first day will include reports on the value of "area" programs in quality improvement, preservation, and marketing; impact of modern mill processing on quality; potential influence of Common Market on U. S. exports; tolerances and instrument specifications in marketing; fitness and strength values in merchandising; length and other properties important to manufacturing; and data processing in merchandising and manufacturing.

The second day will feature discussions on the influence of ginning practices on market value; economics and effects of multiple lint cleaning; and new developments in instrumentation.

NEW PERMITTED CROPS AUTHORIZED FOR DIVERTED ACRES

Producers who want to redesignate acreage diverted under the 1962 feed grain or wheat stabilization program should get in touch with the ASCS County Office right away, Orrison J. Linnam, Chairman, Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation County Committee, said. The diverted acreage may be redesignated only for the production of one or more of the "permitted" crops which a farmer may grow on the acreage instead of devoting it to a conserving use. The deadline for such redesignation is June 29.

The number of such permitted crops was recently increased as authorized by new legislation. Flax, rapeseed, and mustard seed were added to the list, which already included guar, sesame, sunflower, soybean, and castor beans.

The Chair pointed out that a partial payment will be made for 1962 acreage diverted from corn, grain sorghum, barley, and wheat and planted to guar, sesame, sunflower and castor beans. In the case of guar and sunflower, the partial payment will be based on 20 per cent of the applicable commodity rate for minimum diversion for the farm. For castor beans and sesame, the rates will be based on 30 per cent and 40 per cent, respectively, of the minimum regular rate for the acreage involved.

No payment will be made if safflower, flax, rapeseed, or mustard seed is grown on the diverted acres. Flax grown on the diverted acres will not be eligible for price support, but any other flax on the farm may qualify for support. No price-support program is in effect for the other crops that are permitted to be planted on the diverted acres.

Mr. Linnam explained that the sign-up for diverting acreage under the 1962 feed grain and wheat programs will not be reopened, nor will producers be permitted to increase their stated intentions to divert.

1963 CROP WHEAT PROCLAMATION POSTPONED

Proclamations relating to marketing quotas and acreage allotments for the 1963 crop of wheat have been temporarily postponed, according to an announcement by Secretary of Agriculture Orville L. Freeman.

The postponement was authorized by legislation recently enacted by Congress which permits the Secretary of Agriculture to defer until June 15, 1962, any proclamation as to marketing quotas and acreage allotments for the 1963 wheat crop which otherwise would be required to be made by May 15.

Orville J. Linam, Chairman of the Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation County Committee, reminds wheat growers that the wheat Stabilization Program provided under legislation enacted last year applies only to the 1962 crop of wheat. Under that program, individual farm wheat allotments were reduced 10 per cent below what they would have been under a minimum national acreage allotment of 55 million acres, and diversion payments were available to those producers who shifted wheat acreage to a conservation use. Wheat price support was available only to those wheat producers who participated in the Wheat Stabilization Program and who stayed within their farm allotments.

The chairman emphasized that the legislation governing the 1962 wheat program also increased the marketing quota penalty rate as well as the amount of wheat subject to penalty, and extended the quotas. The marketing quota penalty rate for 1962 "excess" wheat has recently been announced at \$1.59 a bushel, compared with a 1961-crop penalty rate of \$1.08 a bushel.

Mr. Linam urged wheat growers who are not clear about the wheat quota provisions to check with the ASCS County Office for full information.

QUESTIONS AND ANSWERS

Q. When can I expect my GI insurance dividend during 1962?
A. The GI insurance dividends are being paid as near the anniversary date of the policy-the date it was issued-as possible.

Q. Can anyone enter the V.A. Hospitalized Veterans Writing Contest?
A. No, the contest is limited to war veterans who are actually hospitalized at the time their entry is written.

Q. Are all veterans with wartime service entitled to domiciliary care?
A. Not necessarily. Veterans with wartime service must have disabilities that incapacitate them from earning a living; be in need of domiciliary care; and be unable to defray the expense of necessary domiciliary care. War veterans whose disability is non-service-connected must execute an affidavit of inability to pay for their care. Peacetime veterans must have been discharged or retired for a disability incurred in line of duty or be receiving disability compensation.

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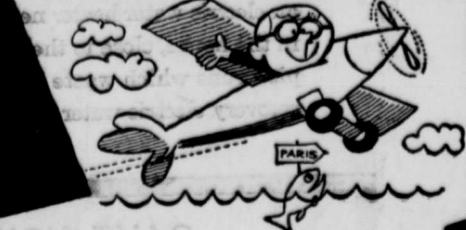


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
