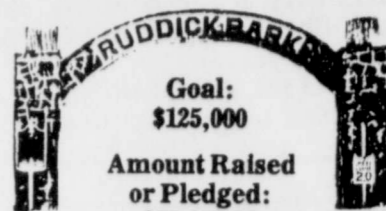

Arctic front brings snow, freezing temps

A blast of cold arctic air mixed with light snow and freezing rain and sleet covered Colorado City under a blanket of white Thursday afternoon.

Area residents greeted the winter wonderland with mixed emotions as numerous minor wrecks were caused by the slippery streets.

Colorado City Police Chief Bobby Sparks said his department investigated a number of wrecks, none involving injuries.

Interstate 20 was dotted with jack-knifed trucks as a thin sheet of ice covered the highway

in both directions. Less than an inch of snow covered the ground, and the freezing precipitation ended by late Thursday evening, followed by temperatures in the low 20s.

Forecasters were expecting an even colder night Friday with the low expected to be near 15.

Schools remained on normal schedule Thursday although Thursday night basketball games were canceled. Although snow still covered the ground Friday morning, streets were clear and classes remained unaffected.

Loraine students fare well on TEAMS test

Loraine High School juniors taking the Texas Educational Assessment of Minimum Skills (TEAMS) test scored above the state average in both areas tested, according to Glenn Sanders, superintendent of schools.

"The Loraine ISD is well pleased with the results of the TEAMS tests," said Sanderson. "The state-wide average is 91 percent in English Language Arts and 88 percent in mathematics. The average of students mastering both sections of the test in Loraine was 94 percent."

Sanders said 17 students took the test which must be passed by students in order to graduate

from high school. Sanders said there was one student who failed the math portion and one student who failed the language arts portion. He said since the test was given, one of the two students who failed has moved from the district.

"Although Loraine ISD students' mastery of the TEAMS test is higher than the state average, there are some areas in each test where our students displayed weaknesses," said Sanders. "These same areas correspond to student weaknesses

Sales tax check down

State Comptroller Bob Bullock sent a check totaling \$16,811.27 in local sales tax to Colorado City, one of the 1,010 Texas cities that levy the one-percent city tax.

Colorado City's check for the period was down from \$17,040.57 for the same period last year. The 1985 payments to date total \$263,671.53, up 7.37 percent from the 1984 payments to date of \$245,565.67.

Loraine and Westbrook did not receive payments this period.

Loraine's 1985 payments to date are \$4,658.48, down 21.85 percent from the 1984 payments to date of \$5,960.75. Westbrook's 1985 payments to date are \$21,360.58, up 48.14 percent from the 1984 pay-

ments to date of \$14,419.65. December checks represent taxes collected on sales made in October and reported to Bullock by November 20.

Cook's Corner

Dyer enjoys company

A fire glowing and crackling in the fireplace, a pot of cider wassail heating on the stove and the lights on the Christmas tree, all give a warm feeling during the holidays at the John and Jan Dyer home.

"We always have a table of Christmas goodies prepared for unexpected guests because we love to have anyone drop in and enjoy the holidays with us, says wife, mother and homemaker, Jan Dyer.

"As I was growing up, I remember when it snowed, my parents always made a pot of homemade chili and invited people to our home to share it with and I guess I grew up with that instilled in me.

"I learned a lot about cooking from my parents, mostly my dad. He was one of six children and grew up on a farm. My grandmother prepared meals for the families that pitched in and helped with the farm chores such as combining, thrashing and other farm duties. The families were large, so my dad would help my grandmother prepare the meals for them so he was used to preparing a lot of food. Since I learned from him, I naturally grew up cooking large meals because that's what he was used to. I also use a lot of my grandmother's recipes he gave to me.

"My children love to cook and my son, Scott, age 10 can prepare the best chicken fried steak you ever tasted. Rebecca, our daughter, who is seven years old, also can cook and both of them are learning to follow recipes really well.

"My husband, John, explains that he is not a cook, he is a chef. He is really an excellent cook, but there is only one condition to his cooking, that someone always has to clean up his messes and it usually ends up being me. He doesn't measure anything when he is cooking and he pours everything into what he is preparing except the kitchen sink. It always turns out tasting really good, but you never ask him what's in it.

"I remember when we first got married, we had an old cook stove that the thermostat was broken. I never knew when I was cooking on 200 degrees or 450 degrees. I called my mother for a cake recipe that called for a dry cake mix and liquid ingredients to go with it. I mixed it up according to the box directions

and then added my liquids the recipe called for. It filled the bundt pan completely full. John came in from work and I was crying because the cake had run out all over the bottom of the oven and I was trying to scrape cake off of everything. We then went to a garage sale and we bought another stove to cook on."

She is sharing some of her recipes that might come in handy for the holidays with RECORD readers today.

CHINESE FRIED WALNUTS
6 cups water
4 cups walnut
1/2 cup sugar
Salad oil
Salt

About 1 1/2 hours before serving or up to two weeks ahead:

In a four quart saucepan, boil water; add walnuts and heat to boiling; cook 1 minute, rinse walnuts under running hot water, drain. In large bowl, gently stir warm walnuts with sugar till dissolved, (may take 5 minutes). Meanwhile, in same saucepan over medium heat, heat about 1" salad oil to 350 degrees on deep-fat thermometer. With slotted spoon, add about half of walnuts to oil; fry five minutes or until golden, stirring often. With slotted spoon, place walnuts in coarse sieve over bowl to drain, sprinkle very lightly with salt, toss lightly to keep walnuts from sticking together. Transfer to paper towels to cool. Fry remaining walnuts. Store in tightly covered container. Makes 4 cups.

HEARTY CHEESE SOUP
One-third cup water
3 tablespoons margarine

10 oz. frozen corn
3/4 cup shredded carrots
One-eighth teaspoon pepper
3 cans cream of potato soup
3 cans milk
2 cups shredded cheddar cheese

3/4 cup white cheese (Mozzarella, Monterey Jack or Swiss)
1/4 cup chopped onion
1 cup chopped frozen broccoli, thawed

Combine water, margarine, corn, carrots, onion, broccoli and pepper in large pan over medium heat. Cover and simmer 10 minutes. Add soup, milk and cheeses, stirring until cheese melts. Refrigerate.

LEMON BARS

Mix together:

2 cups flour
1 cup oleo, melted
1 cup powdered sugar
Spray with Pam coating a 9x13 pan. Pat mix into 9x13 pan, and bake 20 minutes at 350 degrees.

Blend:

4 eggs
4 tablespoons flour
5 tablespoons lemon juice
1 teaspoon baking powder
2 cups granulated sugar
Pour above mixture over crust. Bake 30 minutes more at 350 degrees.

CIDER WASSAIL

2 cups pineapple juice
2 cups orange juice
Juice of 2 lemons
1 gallon apple cider
2 sticks cinnamon
8 whole cloves
1 1/4 cups sugar
Combine all ingredients and simmer 20 minutes or longer, until spice taste is definite. Strain. Serve hot or iced.

CHS loses 3 to Sweetwater

Colorado High School basketball teams hit the road to Sweetwater Tuesday night and found their hosts less than hospitable as the Mustangs swept all three contests.

Closing out the evening was a 41-27 Mustang victory in a varsity boys contest—a cold contest for the Wolves.

Through eight winless games, the Wolves have averaged 32.69 percent shooting from the floor. In the first quarter against Sweetwater—after which the Mustangs led 11-8—Colorado City made 40 percent of its shots. From there, it was down hill as the Wolves made 25 percent of their second period shots, 15 percent in the third and 23 percent in the fourth for a total game percentage of 25. Sweetwater led 18-14 at halftime and held only a seven point lead (26-19) after three periods.

Scoring for the Wolves were

Terry Jackson 10, Albert Rivera, Ruben Rivera and Mike Ligon 4, Marty Cleckler and Wylie Dakan 2 and Ken Woods 1.

Woods and Jackson finished with eight and five rebounds for 13 of a total 20—under the Wolves per game average of 29.66. The Wolves committed 18 turnovers—also under their average of 28.5 per game.

Colorado City is making 40.32 percent of its free throws while averaging 42.33 points to the opponents 60.16.

In the varsity girls contest, the defending AAAA state finalists defeated the Lady Wolves 72-35.

Scoring for the Wolves were Denise Jackson 19, Jennifer Monroe 5, Jody Huff 3 and Diane Gregory, Sandra Williams, Kellie Beights and Misty Strain 2.

Jackson also had a team high 16 rebounds and four assists. Sherry Fite collected 10 rebounds and Gregory and Monroe

added five. The Wolves committed 33 turnovers and made 10 of 44 goal attempts and 15 of 23 free throws.

Sweetwater won the junior varsity girls game 50-11. Sally Mendoza made four of five free throws to finish as high point. Also scoring were Jodi Mitchell, who made one of three goals and one of two free throws of three points, and Denise Lowrance, who made one of seven goal attempts for two points. Rebounding were J. Mitchell 19, Lowrance 9, Andra McKinney and Audy Rivera 8 and Robin Edwards and Christabel Molina 7. The Wolves made 31 turnovers, three of 36 goal attempts and five of 16 free throws.

Harris and Messer made 12 and 10 points for the Mustang varsity boys while Malanax, Upshaw and Blueford led the Mustang girls with 10, 18 and 14 points.

The Loraine Bulldogs varsity boys basketball team won third place to lead four Mitchell County class A teams at last weekend's Garden City tournament.

Forsan won both divisions of the tournament—defeating host Garden City in the girls final and Sterling City in the boys final.

Loraine began the tournament with a 48-44 victory over county and district 7-A rival Westbrook. The Bulldogs led Westbrook 15-10 after one period and 28-20 at halftime, but the Wildcats came alive to take a 36-34 lead at the end of the third period.

Landy Smith, Charles McPeters and Eddie Benitez scored 22, 8 and 9 points respectively to lead the Bulldogs while Edward Cannon and Hollis Browne scored 10 for Westbrook.

Loraine then lost 71-61 in a second round game before their 41-36 overtime victory over Water Valley that gave them third place.

Smith again led Loraine by scoring 20 against Sterling City and Freddie Benitez, E. Benitez and Ben Esquivel each scored 14.

In the third place victory the Bulldogs "worked the ball inside twice" for the overtime scores and "controlled the ball the last 1:55," said coach Russ Shurbet. "We stole the ball with pressure to score with five seconds left and send into overtime."

E. Benitez scored 11 and Smith 10 to lead the Bulldogs while Joe Vasquez scored four of his

eight points in the overtime period.

Westbrook Wildcat girls bowed out of the tourney after a 58-26 loss to Garden City and a 73-23 loss to Novie. Elizabeth Burnett scored 10 against Garden City and 13 against Novie to lead the Lady Wildcats.

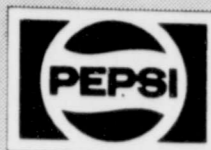

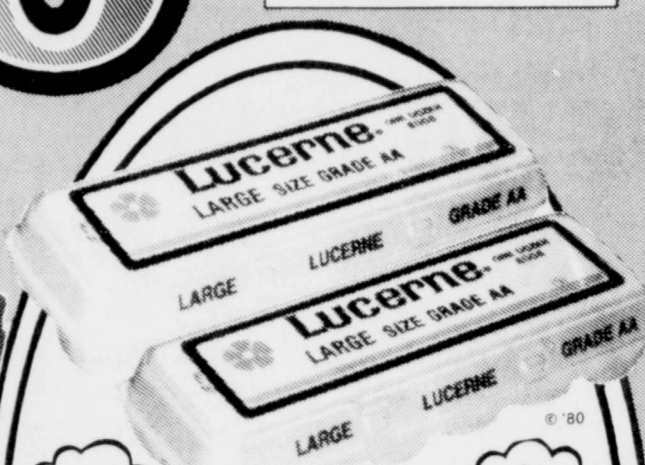
