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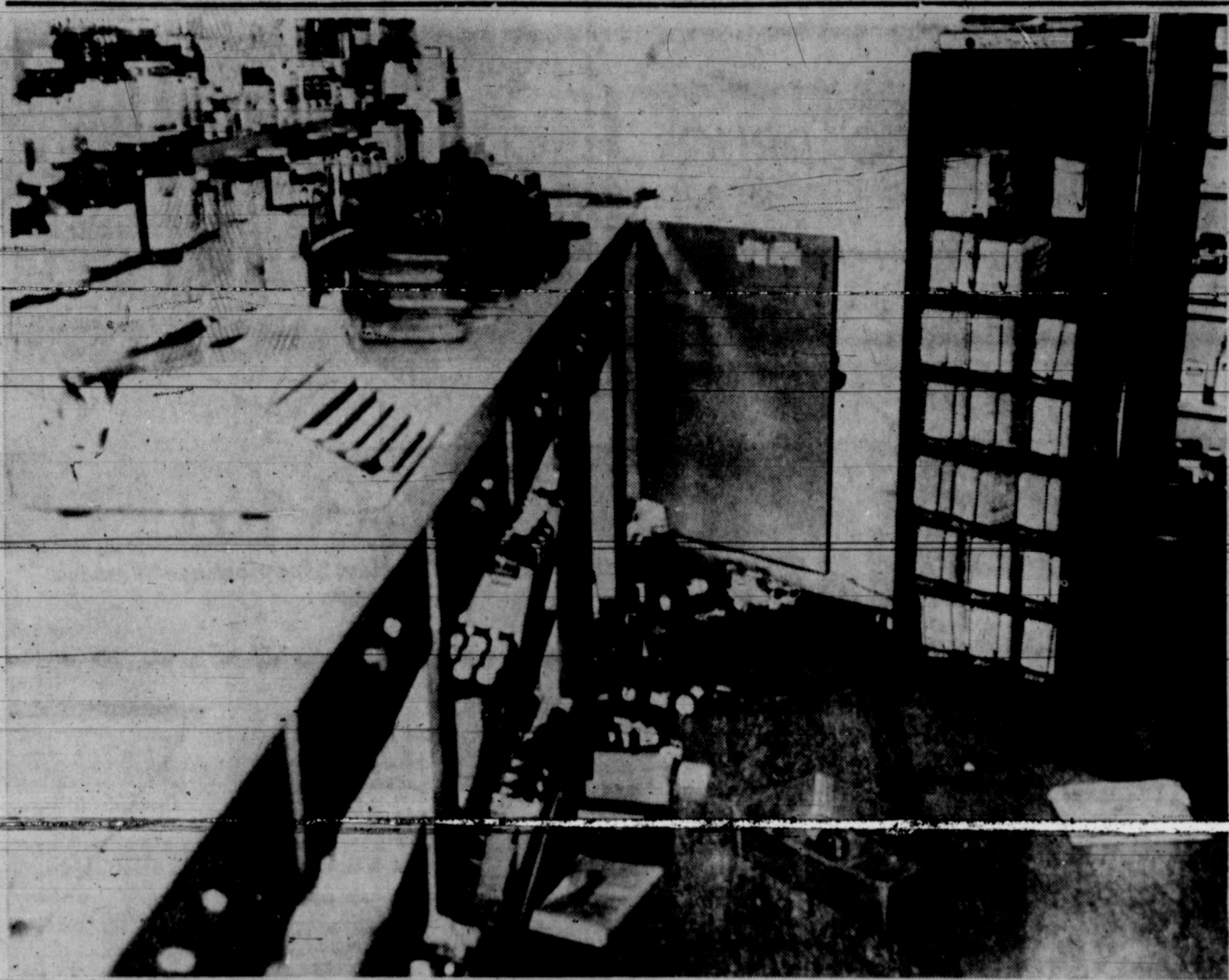

Drugs Cabinet Rifled In Narcotics Burglary

James G. McMath Heads TB Fund Drive

Wolves Get Indian Scalps In 12-7 Win Over Haskell

Colorado High Wolves wound up their season in a blaze of glory — scalping Haskell Indians and burning their tepees in a red that ended 12 to 7 in favor of the Wolf pack.

Game, played at Haskell Friday night, was the third straight district victory for Coach Truman Nix's Wolves. After losses to both Hamlin and Stamford, Wolves came back with a de-orde spirit in about-face wins over Anson, Winters, and Haskell — bang, bang, bang! The win Friday night boosted the Wolves into a three-way tie for second place honor in district, sharing the glory with Haskell and Hamlin while Stamford Bulldogs held on to the top spot with an 18-7 defeat over Hamlin. Stamford ends the season with 5-0 record and will play Crane in bi-district.

Wolves, with an overall season record of 6 wins, four losses, came through with the stubborn score of 3 wins, 2 losses in district contest. One thing cheering the

hearts of Wolf backers is the fact that Colorado High beat both teams touted to win district this year — Haskell and Anson.

It was another Dan Steakley night as the fiery half-back gained 154 yards on 21 carries, bringing his season's total to 1420 yards. It was more than that, a Wolf night. To pick outstanding performances would need a full roster of names right down the program line.

Haskell won the toss and elected to receive, then bucked the Wolf defense in vain giving up the ball on downs on the Wolf 47.

Pass from Keaton Grubbs Wolf quarter, to Ralph Lindsey, fullback, was first spectacular of the evening when Lindsey caught the beauty snatching it from under the eyelids of his Indian guide — on the Indian 23 only to bite the dust 3 yards short of goal.

Dan Steakley went over Indian right end for the touchdown. Pass for the coveted 2-point conversion

failed and the score stood at 6-0, Wolves.

Second quarter was strictly a defensive tactic from both sides to see who'd last the longest. Half time score

was unchanged, 6-0 for Wolves.

After the between half paw-wow, Indians buckled their moccasins. Their safety man grabbed a Grubbs pass intended for Randy Parker, Wolf right end, and they continued on the war path for nine plays to bring the ball to the Wolf 2.

Wolf defense stood off the Indians for three straight plays giving up only 1 yard. On fourth try Derrel Davis, sneaked over for the Indians. Kick for extra point by Ray Herron was good, leaving the Wolf pack behind, 6-7, Indians.

Neck and neck with Indians having a one point lead, both teams moved the ball well for the rest of third quarter.

Fourth quarter started off scaring the holsters off Colorado City fans, when Haskell drove to the Wolf 25.

Right then, Indians feathers fell. Randy Parker snatched an Indian pass right on the Wolf 12. It was the See Wolves Page 6

Proper Harvesting Is Cotton Essential

"With so much emphasis on the production of quality cotton, farmers in Mitchell County should examine closely their harvesting operations," says Bobby Lemons, County Agricultural Agent.

The agent lists four points as key factors for a proper harvest.

Lint moisture should be down to about eight per cent. This point is reached when the relative humidity in the field is 60 per cent or below. Moisture can also be checked by collecting a few locks of cotton and squeezing them together in the palm of the hand. If the cotton balls up, it is too moist. If it fluffs out, it is dry enough for harvesting.

a medical problem or a community problem or a fund raising problem. I assure you it is also a devastating family and personal problem, and it is the personal responsibility of every individual in this country young and old to eliminate it."

Strippers should be checked carefully to assure that they are properly adjusted and green boll separators should be operating efficiently.

Seed cotton should not be stored on trailers if the moisture level is above 12 per cent. Seed quality will also be reduced drastically if stored with a high amount of trash.

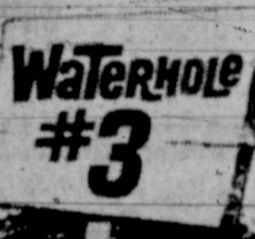
Seed cotton should be grouped or separated when any difference in quality is suspected. Grouping should be based on variety, irrigation or dryland, disease or insect damage, hail damage, lint moisture and planting date.

All these items make for more orderly, efficient ginning as well, points out Lemons. Such problems as mix-packs or two-sided bales, overdriving and sinning at improper moisture levels can thus be minimized.

Ginners, thusfar, have been doing a commendable job with the block ginning program, he adds.

"All in all, with farmers and ginners working closely together, the outlook for quality cotton production in Mitchell County looks promising," said Lemons.

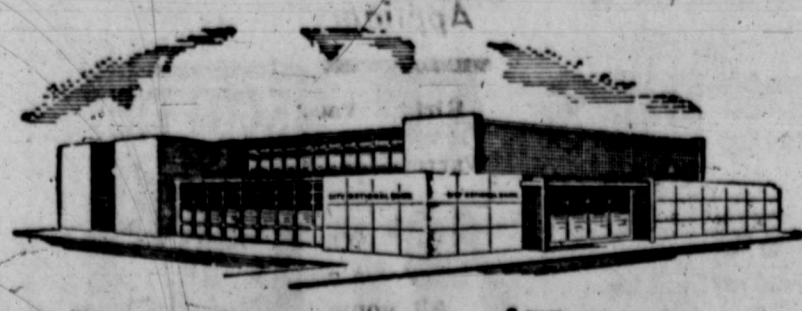
