

## Big Hospital Campaign Opens Thursday

### Pastor Is Carried From Baptist Meet

AMARILLO—(P)—A Fort Worth pastor was carried from the floor of the Baptist General Convention here Wednesday when he tried to challenge the featured speaker.

The Rev. William Fraser, member of Dr. Frank Norris' Fundamentalist Church of Fort Worth, got to his feet from his front row seat in the convention hall when Dr. Louie Newton, Atlanta, Ga., president of the Southern Baptist Convention, was introduced by Dr. Wallace Bassett, Dallas, president of the General Convention.

"I would like to challenge Dr. Newton and ask him—" Fraser began. "He was out short by Dr. Bassett, who pointed a gavel at him. "You're not going to ask Dr. Newton anything," Dr. Bassett said.

"I want to raise a protest as high as heaven—" Fraser continued. Dr. Norris, sitting nearby among reporters in the orchestra pit, grinned broadly and stood up. The crowd began to boo loudly, and stamp their feet. Someone began a hymn, and the audience joined in.

A number of Baptist pastors and laymen, including Chester Watts, Mineral Wells, and the Rev. Vernon Yearby, Midland, advanced on Fraser.

"Are you going peacefully?" one of them asked. Fraser continued shouting until he noticed the men were serious. He crouched in the orchestra pit, his face red and flushed.

Six men picked him up bodily and carried him out of the hall. Norris continued to smile.

"This is the worst thing they ever did," Dr. Norris told a reporter. The hall quieted down. Five minutes later, Fraser returned to the hall and sat down quietly. No other effort was made to eject him.

Perry F. Webb, pastor of the First Baptist Church at San Antonio, said afterwards that "this is something that is repeated year after year and is terribly embarrassing to us."

"There doesn't seem to be anything we can do about it," Webb said. "These men have no more right to the floor of the Baptist Convention than I would have to the floor of a Methodist Convention. They are merely a publicity."

Norris has long been criticizing Baptists to do more personal evangelizing since "Communism is going up and down this world tearing up everything in its way and make no mistake about it, that exactly is what it intends to do."

Fraser, during the time he was trying to get the floor, shouted several times, "I want to know why Dr. Newton feels we should be an ally of Russia?"

Newton, in his address that followed the disturbance, made one reference to Communism, imploring Baptists to do more personal evangelizing since "Communism is going up and down this world tearing up everything in its way and make no mistake about it, that exactly is what it intends to do."

### New School Building Plans Ready Soon

Trustees of the Midland Independent School District were told, at their regular meeting Tuesday night, plans for the new high school building will be ready for final approval December 15. The Lubbock firm of Hayes and Kirby is the architect for the new building for which bonds were voted earlier this year.

The purchase of football equipment for the three elementary schools and the junior high school was approved by the trustees. The project is in line with a program to keep students busy and to provide a complete recreational program in all schools.

The proposed removal of a building from the hospital area at Midland Air Terminal is discussed. The School board here discussed. The building was obtained recently from the War Assets Administration. It will be used to house a vocational agriculture shop and other activities at the school.

Supt. Frank Monroe submitted reports on school operation, athletics, and finances.

### France Urged To Take Lead In Alliances

PARIS—(P)—Gen. Charles De Gaulle, leader of the French people, urged Wednesday to take the lead in forming alliances with the United States, Great Britain and other countries "who feel themselves similarly menaced" by Communism.

"France must take the initiative because she is the most menaced," the leader of the Anti-Communist Rally of the French People (RPF) told a news conference.

"France is the most menaced externally by this enormous power—the most formidable she has ever faced—and internally because, independent of her own force, this power has assistance within France," De Gaulle declared.

### Yearby Outlines Baptist Finances At Texas Meeting

AMARILLO—(P)—The Baptist Foundation of Texas, which invests and administers assets of Baptist institutions, has made \$1,000 for every dollar it has lost, and at a ratio of 1,000 to one will never go broke, the Baptist General Convention of Texas was told Wednesday.

The Rev. Vernon Yearby of Midland, said in an address prepared for delivery Wednesday that total assets of the foundation stand at approximately \$14,000,000 with an additional \$1,250,000 in sight, real estate worth \$500,000 and wills on file worth more than \$1,000,000.

Other speakers for the day—second day of the three-day state convention, include Louie D. Newton, president of the Southern Baptist Convention, Atlanta, and J. W. Bruner of Dallas, endowment secretary for the Baptist General Convention of Texas.

Five thousand delegates are here for the sixty-second annual session. The 2,600 seat municipal auditorium was filled to overflowing Tuesday night and hundreds of disappointed Baptists milled around exhibits in the auditorium's lobby, unable to get in. For a while, latecomers stood in the aisles but they were ordered out, as a safety measure by firemen.

The Baptist Foundation handles funds for Baptist institutions like Baylor University, Baylor hospital, Dallas, and Hardin-Simmons University, Abilene. It was born in Amarillo 17 years ago. It diversifies its investments, Mr. Yearby said, adding: "Our present setup is about as follows—mortgage loans, 20 per cent; oil loans, 25 per cent; bonds, 25 per cent; stocks, common and preferred, 25 per cent; bonds, 25 per cent; stocks, common and preferred, 25 per cent; real estate, 5 per cent."

"Our phenomenal profit and loss reserve of more than \$1,000,000 gives confidence and strength. We have come to a place where the foundation carries itself and operates without expense to the institutions it serves."

Largest benefactors named  
Texas Baptists' largest benefactors, next to Mr. and Mrs. John G. Hardin of Burkburnett, now deceased, Mr. Yearby stated, were T. G. and Mrs. Ida Hendrick of Abilene, now deceased. The Baptist Foundation in August received from the executors of the Hendrick estate \$1,000,000 in cash and government bonds. The \$600,000 represents endowment for the Hendrick Memorial Hospital of Abilene. The \$1,000,000 goes to the Baptist General Convention.

Bruner, addressing the convention on endowments, presented a report which showed endowments for Baptist institutions in Texas this year increased \$2,487,965. Endowments now amount to \$13,750,557 with the Baptist Foundation and \$2,862,190 with the institutions. The report said \$43,202,629 in additional endowments are needed. The total income from endowments this year was \$388,946.

J. Howard Williams, executive secretary of the Baptist General Convention, said in a speech Tuesday that one-half of all church people in Texas now are Baptists.

### Airlines Ground DC-6s

GALLUP, N. M.—(P)—At least five airlines grounded their large DC-6 planes Wednesday, pending an inquiry into the cause of a fire which forced an American Airlines ship to make an emergency landing.

The Douglas Aircraft Corp., which builds the four-engine planes, also urged all other users of them do likewise until cause of fires "have been established and eradicated."

Twenty-five passengers and crew personnel emerged unscathed Tuesday after the American Airlines DC-6 came in for a spectacular emergency landing at Gallup Airport with flames spouting from beneath its fuselage.

In quick succession American, United, Braniff and National Airlines, and Panagra suspended flights of DC-6s.

One source termed the fire "a blazing crash of a United Airlines DC-6 which killed 52 persons in Utah last month."

The American Airlines ship was en route from San Francisco to New York with Capt. Evan W. Chatfield of Tulsa at the controls.

More than two score investigators, representing government agencies and air lines, are here Wednesday to inspect the damaged plane.

### Additional Bus Service Provided

Midland received a new bus service Tuesday when Baygett Coaches started operating four round-trip schedules daily between Kermit and San Angelo by way of Odessa, Midland, Garden City, Sterling City and San Antonio.

Hearings on the application by the bus concern to serve the city on the route were held in San Angelo and Odessa last May. A certificate for operating the new service was granted recently.

R. E. Baygett, owner of the bus-line which has headquarters in Marfa, said here Wednesday new buses are being used on the new route which offers the first through bus service to San Angelo.

Baygett said his Westbound buses leave Midland at 10:10 a.m., 1:25 p.m., 5:15 p.m. and 9:25 p.m. Three of the schedules offer through service to Kermit.

The Eastbound buses leave here at 7:40 a.m., 11:30 a.m., 3:30 p.m. and 7 p.m.

Baygett Coaches also serve Midland to its Iraan-Lamesa and Midland-Goldsmith-Kermit routes.

The line has extensive operations over West Texas serving Marfa, Alpine, Presidio, Crane, McCombs, Fort Stockton, Van Horn, Del Rio, Sanderson, Uvalde, Junction, Llano and intermediate points.

### Lions Contribute To Hospital Fund

On the eve of Midland Memorial Hospital's campaign for funds to build a \$600,000 general hospital in Midland, the Lions Club at its meeting Wednesday in the Scharbauer Hotel contributed \$1,043 to make the organization's total amount contributed, \$7,500.

President James Daugherty of the Lions handed M. C. Ulmer, general chairman of the hospital campaign, a check for the \$1,043. Ulmer accepted for the hospital foundation and said "we have faith in the successful conclusion of our drive when such acts as this are performed. Certainly the Lions Club of Midland is to be commended."

Art Cole was principal speaker at the luncheon which had as its purpose the call to help in the hospital campaign. Cole presented "These Are The Facts," He said "We must get together and the job starts tomorrow. We must throw rugged individualism out the window and get together."

### Gun Battle Victim Was Sentenced Here

William Raymond Pittman, one of two prisoners killed by Sheriff Vail Eavis of Beeville Tuesday in a gun battle at Pettus, Texas, was sentenced to two years in the penitentiary on a forgery count here in 1942, Midland County sheriff of Beeville records show.

He was arrested here in April of 1942. His record at that time listed several prison terms for forgery, bogus checking and car theft.

### Midland Citizens Seek \$600,000

Thursday will be "Hospital Day" here as the Midland Memorial Hospital campaign to obtain \$600,000 with which to erect a modern general hospital, officially opens amid fanfare and with plans for the fastest and most thorough financial drive in West Texas' history.

The sounding of sirens, train whistles, church bells, automobile horns, and other noisemakers at 8:45 a. m. will herald the opening of the big and all-important drive to provide ever-growing Midland and the Permian Basin area with modern and adequate hospital facilities.

Mayor R. H. Gifford proclaimed Thursday "Hospital Day," and urged citizens to lend every effort in getting the campaign off to a fast start.

M. C. Ulmer, general chairman, said everything is in perfect readiness, after weeks of preparation, for the drive's opening, and said solicitation will be conducted rapidly and completely. He commended all volunteer workers who are assisting in the campaign and asked for the full cooperation of all citizens.

R. M. Barron, vice chairman, stressed the fact the campaign will be fast and will not be allowed to lag.

"Kickoff" Dinner  
A "kickoff" dinner for division chairman, team captains, executive managers and other solicitors will be held at 7 p. m. Wednesday in the Crystal Ballroom of Hotel Scharbauer. Final instructions will be provided and supplies distributed. More than 200 workers are expected to attend. John W. House, special gifts chairman, will preside.

John P. Butler, hospital treasurer and vice chairman of the Special Gifts Committee, expressed confidence the campaign will be terminated successfully. He requested citizens to make pledges to the hospital instead of cash gifts. Although cash is acceptable, sponsors prefer that gives make pledges to extend over a 25-month period, payable monthly, quarterly, semi-annually or annually. Employees have been asked to authorize payroll deductions or company plan collections.

Business leaders, in a poll conducted this week, agreed the campaign is the largest and most important ever conducted here, and predicted it will be completed quickly. They said every business firm and every man, woman and child will be asked to give to the hospital fund. "The erection of a hospital will fill a long-felt need and undoubtedly will be another turning point in the interesting and remarkable history of Midland, sponsors said.

The \$250,000 in cash and pledges obtained in last year's campaign will be applied against the \$600,000 goal, Dr. John B. Thomas, president of Midland Memorial Hospital, said.

James N. Allison, vice chairman of special gifts, said volunteer workers will meet at the first report luncheon with the Kiwanis Club Monday noon. Another report meeting will be held at the Lions Club luncheon next Wednesday, and the third session at the Jay-Cee luncheon Friday, November 21.

The solicitation of big gifts was started several days ago by members of the Big Gifts Committee headed by A. N. Hendrickson, Mrs. Ruth Scharbauer and Clarence Scharbauer, Jr.

"You probably will be using a hospital all your lives," he said, "but perhaps this is the only chance you'll ever have to help build one."

Wood told the group that "without your assistance, frankly, the hospital couldn't be built." He cited the impossibility of providing adequate hospital care here with present facilities and the tragedy that would ensue if greater facilities suddenly were needed.

The more than 125 persons at the dinner were given booklets explaining the history and planned future of the hospital and describing in detail the necessity of providing the growing city of Midland with a hospital commensurate with the city's size, its fine buildings and apparent future as one of the Southwest's most progressive communities.

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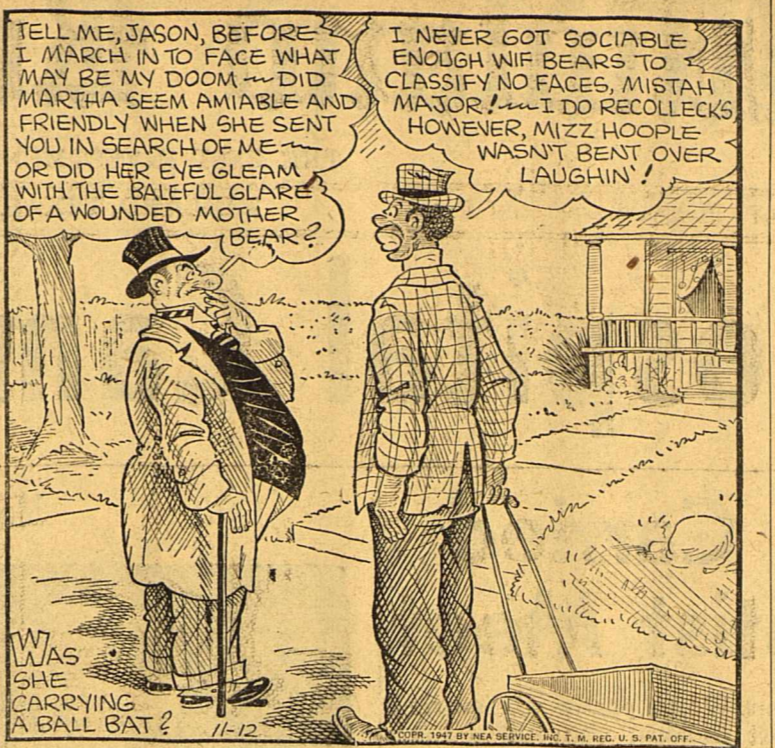

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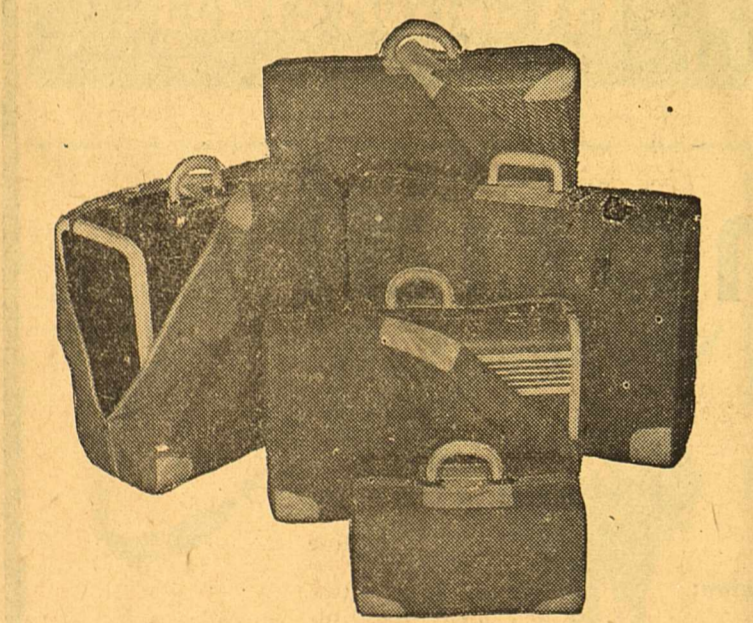

## Bugs In The Marshall Plan

When a group of American officials got hold of the working papers which served as the basis for drawing up Marshall Plan requirements of The Netherlands government, it was found that the figures were completely unrealistic. The aid requested under the four-year plan drawn up at Paris was obviously greater than needed.

This over-estimate was called to the attention of the Dutch foreign minister. He admitted that the demands were high. He explained that he had tried to persuade his government to put in lower estimates, but had been voted down in cabinet.

The attitude of the cabinet was that all the other governments in the 16-nation Paris conference for European economic cooperation would submit inflated demands. If the Dutch did not do likewise, it was felt they would be at the bottom of the list and would therefore look bad!

This story is typical of the Marshall Plan criticisms which are now piling up in Washington. They are all going to spill out on the floor of the House and Senate in the special session of Congress.

Another flaw to be found concerns the hoardings and concealed assets of the European people. Jean Monnet, French economic planner, has estimated that at least \$2,000,000,000 in gold and Swiss francs may be hidden by frugal Frenchmen in their socks and mattresses. This may be a conservative estimate.

The reason the French people now bury their wealth is that they have no confidence in the value of their currency. But the problem this hoarding raises for U. S. congressmen is—why should they ask American taxpayers to foot the bills while there is all this hidden wealth in France?

**Texas Livestock Is In Poor Condition**

AUSTIN—(AP)—Texas livestock is in poor condition as winter approaches, and range feed has deteriorated to its lowest condition for this season of the year since 1934, the United States Department of Agriculture said in its monthly report. Lack of rainfall in October accentuated the drought condition, although scattered rains helped some stock water supplies in west central, northern and northeastern counties. Small grains, winter weeds and grass prospects were improved in the favored areas. At 70 per cent of normal condition, range feed was five points lower than in September and was 12 points below the 10-year average of 82 per cent. Heavy shrinkage was shown by cattle and calves during the last 30 days, and both cows and sheep were reported going into the winter in poor flesh.
