County Designated For Emergency FmHA Loans

Mitchell County Judge Bill Carter received notification Saturday that the county has been designated for Emergency loans because of damages and losses caused by drought from August 1, 1973 through September 15, 1974.

The letter giving notification

came addressed to Judge Carter and Mitchell County Commissioners from J. Lynn Futch, state director of the Farmers Home Administration (FmHA).

The county commissioners requested emergency aid in copies of resolutions sent to

the President, Secretary of Agriculture and Texas Governor Dolph Briscoe. Their resolution was dated August 21.

Due to the Emergency designation, county agriculture producers may apply for emergency loans through the local FmHA office, located in

the G-Kell Building on the Snyder Highway.

David Marion, county supervisor for FmHA in Mitchell County, will handle applications and submit them to his county committee for their approval.

Producers have until August 15, 1975 to make application for the low-interest, fully repayable loans for production losses sustained during the period of designation, August 1,

1973 through September 15, 1974.

According to information sent by Futch, loans based on qualifying production losses may include funds to reimburse applicants for production expenses which went into damaged or destroyed crop and livestock enterprises, but not to produce new crops during 1975. "Payment terms depend on the purposes for which the loan

is used and the applicant's payment ability," the notice said. "No loan may exceed the actual loss sustained."

The 5 per cent interest loans will also have to be secured by crops, livestock, farm machinery or real estate, the notice said.

Futch said further questions should be directed to county supervisor Marion.

Wolves Downed By Hamlin, 47-7

Everything that could possibly go wrong happened to the Colorado City Wolves Friday night as they lost to Hamlin, 47-7.

The keyed up Wolf Pack traveled to Hamlin hoping for an upset to keep the Pied Pipers away from the District 6-AA crown.

The Wolves took the opening kick-off. On the first play from scrimmage, a pichout was fumbled, recovered by Hamlin and six plays later, the Pied Pipers were ahead 7-0.

On the ensuing kick-off, the Wolves were held and on fourth down, a low snap from center resulted in the Wolves punter being tackled on the Wolves 5 yardline. It took one play to make the score 13-0.

After the Wolves next possession, they had to punt again and on the first play, Hamlin's speedster, Johnny Jones, broke loose and ran 49 yards to score.

On the first play after the kick-off, a Wolves pass was intercepted and Hamlin drove 42 yards to score. On the Wolves next possession, the Colorado City team again fumbled, leading to another Hamlin touchdown. That was all the scoring of the first half, with the Wolves only getting into Hamlin territory once in the first half.

In the third quarter, the Wolves put together a long drive, culminated by a 21 yard pass play from Gene Banks to Pete Parham, who dragged three tacklers with him for eight yards across the goal line. Robert Rivera kicked the extra point.

Hamlin took the ensuing kick-off and marched some 59 yards to score again and in the fourth quarter Hamlin scored its final TD on a 37 yard pass play. Five of seven extra point attempts were good.

The game was the last in a Wolf uniform for Colorado City seniors Danny Molina, Dan Smith, Gene Banks, Ricky Hemphill, Ed Warren, Steve Bollin, Steve Marcom, Danny Rivera, Mike Brooks, Roger Roenfeldt, Tim Taylor and Fete Selvera.

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Executive Changes Made By TESCO

Hulsey will succeed T. L. Austin, Jr. as president of Texas Utilities Company. Austin has been elected vice chairman of the board and chief executive effective January 1, 1975. C. A. Tatum, Jr. will continue as chairman of the board, a position he has held since 1972.

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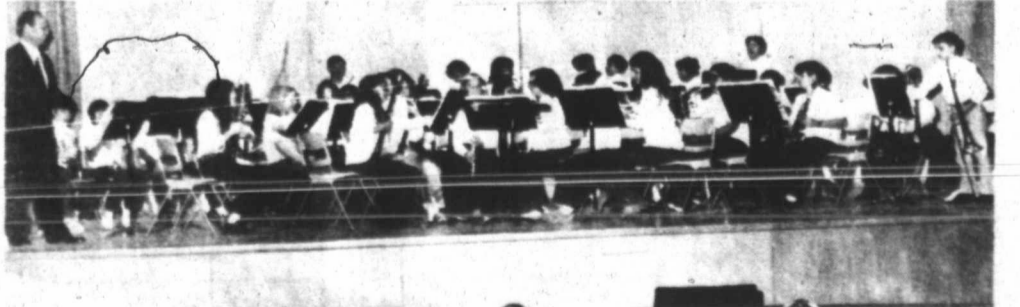
Three Holdover Performances

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Nuclear Energy Program To Be Held

Ways of putting nuclear energy to work for people will be demonstrated Nov. 20 at Colorado High School.

A program titled "This Atomic World" will acquaint Colorado students with basic principles and sources of nuclear

energy. Its role in agriculture, industry, medicine and research will be shown.

Ed L. Kasper will conduct the 40-minute demonstration-lecture sponsored by Texas A&M University's College of Engineering.

He will explain in student terms the structure of atoms, nuclear reactor operation and concepts such as radiation, fission and fusion.

Kasper will employ special electronic equipment to demonstrate applications of nuclear energy, such as in generating electricity. Use of radioisotopes in life process studies and disease diagnosis and treatment also will be depicted.

In a chalkboard talk to Colorado High science classes, he will provide additional detail on atomic structure, radioactivity, radiation biology and nuclear science careers, among other topics.

Forgiving One Another

In Matthew 18 verses 21-35 we find Peter asking Jesus a question, "Lord, how often shall my brother sin against me, and I forgive him? Till seven times?"

Jesus answered Peter, "I say not unto thee, until seven times; but, until seventy times seven."

Jesus did not stop with this. He went on to give Peter a Parable about a man who had been forgiven, yet he would not forgive others. I hope you will read this from your Bibles because this parable teaches us four things:

1. It teaches about unlimited forgiveness.
2. It teaches about relationships between citizens in the Kingdom of heaven.
3. It teaches about man's forgiving grace towards sin.
4. It shows the right relationships between people in the church.

I believe that one of our biggest problems in our churches and our communities today is people's unwillingness to forgive one another. I want you to think about two things: Why should we forgive? and How can we forgive?

I find three reasons in the Bible why we should forgive one another (there are more). The first reason is because Christ has forgiven us. If we have received Christ as our Savior and if we possess the Spirit of Christ we should have the Spirit of forgiveness, unless we are quenching the spirit. Not one of us has suffered as much as Christ, he was stripped naked, beaten, spit upon, made fun of, betrayed, denied and rejected, cursed, nailed to the cross, pierced in the side with a spear and with all of this and much more we find Christ saying, "Father forgive them for they do not know what they are doing." Friends, if Christ has forgiven us of all our past sins and if He is willing to for-

give us of all our present sins, then why can't we forgive those who do something to us which is smaller?

The second reason we should forgive is because God's word commands it. Jesus said to forgive "seventy times seven." The apostle Paul, under the inspiration of God, said that the Christian is to "Forebear one another, and forgive one another, if any man have a quarrel against another; even as Christ forgave you, so also do ye." (Colossians 3:13) To disobey the commands of our Lord shows our lack of love for our Saviour, for Jesus said, "If a man loves me, he will keep my commands." Forgiving one another is one way we show our obedience and love to Jesus.

The third reason we should forgive is because in 2 Corinthians 2:10-11, Paul teaches that when we don't forgive, we leave ourselves wide open to the tricks of the devil. Unwillingness to forgive one another opens the door for the devil to put within our hearts and our minds, bitterness, envy, strife, and many more things which are not a part of the "Fruit of the Spirit." This then creates a division in the church and in the community. When this happens then lost people will not see Christ in us and will continue on their road to the eternal flames of hell.

We have seen why we should forgive, now how can we forgive?

The first way to forgive is through our hearts for in verse 35 of our scripture Jesus said, "Forgive from your hearts everyone his brother their trespasses." If we cannot forgive from our hearts then we need a heart transplant with Jesus Christ being the surgeon. Listen: if our hearts are not right with man, how can they be right with God? Jesus taught that we were to

"love God with all our heart" and we can't if we are unwilling to forgive our fellow man.

The second way we can forgive is through prayer. In Mark 11:25-26 Jesus said, "And when ye stand praying, forgive, if ye have ought against any; that your Father also which is in heaven may forgive you your trespasses. But if ye do not forgive, neither will your Father which is in heaven forgive your trespasses." I believe that when we pray forgiving the devil will have no power to place within our hearts this bitterness and envy. You may say I can forgive but I cannot forget. You may not be able to erase it from your memory, but through prayer you can forget it to the extent that you will not be overcome by bitterness, envy and strife.

The third way we can forgive is through personal reconciliation. In Matthew 5:23-24, Jesus said, "therefore if thou bring thy gift to the altar, and there remember that thy brother has ought against thee; leave there thy gift before the altar, and go thy way; first be reconciled to thy brother, and then come and offer thy gift." We usually sit around in our self pride and say, "if so and so will make the first move then I will forgive." Listen: If Christ had waited for man to make the first move, we would all still be living in our sins bound for hell. The only way to really forgive one another is through our hearts, through prayer, and through personal reconciliation, all three combined.

If you are still carrying in your hearts bitterness and jealousy over something that happened a long time ago or just yesterday then you need to get rid of it by forgiving one another. As a Christian, God cannot use you if you are not willing to forgive.

Incredibly, during the years when stove wood was quadrupling in price, the cost of cooperative electricity was being cut in half. But that appears to be behind us. The higher cost of gas and oil means higher generating costs for our power supplier and thus higher electric bills. But when the Lone Wolf Electric Cooperative emancipated its members from the wood pile they made a promise they will honor today: dependable power at its lowest possible price. Its a promise they'll keep in the future as well.

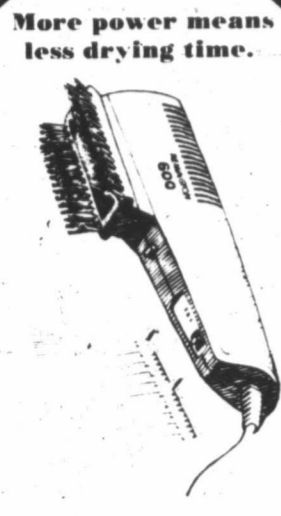

PS. Parents: Have your children see this message? If not, you may want to call it to their attention. Cut it out and use it to remind your children that they can help you and all of us conserve energy in many ways.

- Don't keep the refrigerator or freezer door open any longer than necessary.
- Turn off the lights when you leave a room.
- Turn off the TV set when no one is watching it.
- Turn off the radio or record player when no one is listening.
- Be sure the hot water is turned off after you've used it. Remind your mom or dad when a faucet leaks and needs repairing.
- Don't turn on more lights than you really need.
- If the furnace or air-conditioner is running, keep the doors closed. And don't make unnecessary trips in and out of the house.
- Ride the bus whenever you can, rather than asking your parents to drive you.
- Ride your bike or walk to the store for your parents. If they don't run the car, they will save gasoline.
- Help plan family errands that require the car so they can all be done at one time.
- If you're a little cool, don't ask your parents to turn up the thermostat. A sweater will warm you up.
- Tell your parents if heating or cooling ducts are blocked by furniture or draperies.
- If no one uses a particular room, close the heat registers and keep the door shut.
- If you're helping with cooking, use an element that is about the same size as the pan. And don't be an oven peeper.
- If the sun is shining on a cold day, open the drapes so the sun can help heat up your house.

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Post Office Change Made

Postmaster General E. T. Klassen announced that the postal service intends to discontinue delivery of unpaid mail. The new policy is seen as benefiting the general mailing public now paying for their postal service. "It is unfair," Klassen pointed out, "to burden the vast majority of mailers with costs created by the few who mail without payment of postage."

The Postmaster General said postage due delivery has also caused severe financial loss for utility companies, banks and department stores as well as other business establishments whose volume of unpaid mail has been increasing.

Postal service officials estimate annual postage due losses to recipients of unpaid mail and the additional losses to the service run in the million dollar range.

As of today, November 17, all unpaid mail--mail without any postage--will be returned to the sender. Previously unpaid mail was generally delivered postage due.

Mail matter of any class, received at either the office of mailing or the office of the addressee without any postage on it, will be endorsed: "returned for postage," and returned to the sender. No attempt will be made to collect postage due.

If the envelope does not contain a return address, it will be sent to the Dead Letter office for appropriate handling. The postal service said the new regulation does not affect business reply mail, Federal Government and free mail delivery to the blind, Armed Forces mail, or keys and identification devices returned to owners.

According to postal regulations, which have full force of laws, prepaid postage is required on all mail. In addition,

under the Federal Criminal code, any person who willfully deposits unpaid mail in a mailbox or collection facility with intent to avoid prepayment can be prosecuted and is subject to a fine of as much as \$300.
