## Burglaries investigated

The Colorado City Police Department is investigating two burglaries which occurred sometime after the close of business on Wednesday and before the businesses opened Thursday.

Chief Bobby Sparks said that \$350 in cash was taken from a cash register at Colorado Feed and Seed, First and Pine streets, and that \$265 was taken from the cash register at Higginbotham Bartlett Co., 189 Pine Street.

Sparks said that both burglaries appeared to be the work of the same individual.

The burglar gained entry to Colorado Feed and Seed by breaking out a window on the east side of the office, and entry was gained to the lumber yard office by breaking a window out on the south side of the building.

Sparks said that footprints found at both scenes appear to match.

## Loraine public hearing questioned

The Loraine City Council, meeting in regular session Thursday, conducted a public hearing on a Community Development Grant and scheduled a second public hearing for May 23, but not before several councilmen complained to Mayor Tommy Green that they were "kept in the dark" about things at city hall.

Following the public hearing, C. H. Hamilton asked Green why the council members were not told in advance about the public hearing. Hamilton said the council decided at the previous meeting to schedule a public hearing at the Thursday meeting, not conduct one.

Green explained that because of the time factor, the public hearing was scheduled and that a public notice was placed in the May 5 RECORD as well as at the post office and city hall in Loraine. He said the grant application must be submitted by May 31 and that two public hearings are required.

Hamilton and J. C. Hall Jr. stated they thought the council members should have been notified in advance of the hearing and that citizens should have been given more notice as well.

The council has agreed to reapply for the grant which was denied the city last year. Money from the grant will be used to

### PUBLIC NOTICE

On the 14th day of May, 1985, the City Council of the City of Westbrook will consider for second reading only, an ordinance which would prohibit weeds, tall grass, rubbish, garbage, or other objectionable, unsightly, or unsanitary material on private lots or yards in the City of Westbrook. Such conditions would be declared to be public nuisances found to be in need of abatement. The City of Westbrook would be authorized to abate such nuisances should the owner fail or refuse to do so after 10 days' notice and would be authorized to enter on to such property to accomplish those ends and burning would be one such remedy. The City would further have authority to assess its costs against the property owner after notice and hearing to the property owner and be empowered to file a lien in the County Records for cost of such work as well as seek restitution through other legal remedies. Finally, a knowing or intentional violation of the prohibition section of the ordinance would be declared a Class C Misdemeanor punished by a fine of not less than \$25.00 nor more than \$200.00.

replace a sewer line which runs under Interstate 20. Engineers have recommended that a new sewer line be installed within a casing. Engineer studies indicate that the highway may be settling on the present line which may cause an obstruction. The present line is not in a casing.

The grant last year for which the city applied was \$126,000.

Gary Smith, a planning consultant who will prepare the grant application for the city, said the city will have a better chance this year of receiving the grant since it was turned down for the same grant last year.

Smith said he will not charge anything for the grant application unless the city receives the grant.

In other business, Billie Ruth Tarrt, president of the Loraine Business and Professional Women's Club, was told to wait a month before scheduling a clean-up campaign for the city because of problems with the city's new landfill. The landfill was recently completed, but recent

rains have flooded parts of it, making it inaccessible.

In other business, councilman Hall was appointed to study the purchase of an air pack for the water department. He will make a recommendation at the next regular council meeting.

The council scheduled a budget workshop for Thursday at 7 p.m. Green has proposed a budget for the current fiscal year and Hall and Hamilton have recommended a number of changes. Councilman Jackie Walker asked that a workshop be scheduled so that council members will have time to discuss the various proposals.

Earlier in the meeting, Hall asked that the council go into executive session to discuss personnel, but city attorney Ralph Strother explained that the item was not on the agenda and the council could not legally go into executive session. There must be 72 hours notice given for any item placed on the agenda, including executive sessions, unless it is deemed an emergency item in which case two hours notice must be given.

## Oil drilling applications down slightly in Texas

AUSTIN—A total of 3,139 drilling applications were processed by the Railroad Commission in April, according to RRC Chairman Buddy Temple. In March, the total was 3,182.

So far this year, oil and gas operators have filed 11,793 applications. Through the same period of last year, they had filed 12,486.

The April total included 2,310 applications for permits to drill new oil and gas tests, 80 to deepen existing holes, 254 to plugback existing holes, and 71 for service (non-producing) wells. Operators also filed 424 amended drilling applications.

Applications for new oil and gas holes in April included 255 in the San Antonio area (District 1), 79 in the Refugio area (District 2), 179 in Southeast Texas (District 3), 107 in deep South Texas (District 4), 66 in East Central Texas (District 5), 99 in East Texas (District 6), 372 in West Central Texas (District 7B), 148 in the San Angelo area (District 7C), 292 in the Midland

area (District 8), 305 in the Lubbock area (District 8A), 324 in North Texas (District 9), and 84 in the Panhandle (District 10).

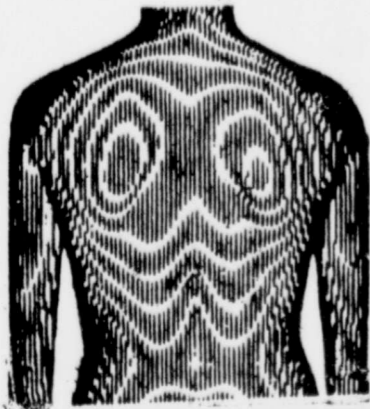

# Myers begins cooking at eight

When Delaine Myers was eight, every Sunday morning, she and her sister would get in the kitchen and prepare breakfast for her parents.

"We would have French Toast for breakfast. There was only one problem with the toast—it wasn't done. It was always raw in the middle, but my parents always ate it."

Mrs. Myers recalls that her mother always told her if she wanted to cook, get in the kitchen and make it.

"I remember anytime she told me that, I had to clean up the

mess also." She learned to cook from her mother and she also took Home Ec and cooked in college.

Mrs. Myers learned how to cook a roast after she got married.

"I knew how to cook nearly anything except a roast."

She likes to cook when she has time and her favorite thing to prepare is Italian food.

Supper is the big meal around the Myers home and her family are not picky eaters.

"I try to fix balanced meals and my family will eat anything

I put on the table."

After Mrs. Myers got married, she was preparing breakfast for her husband.

"I had decided to prepare pancakes for breakfast. I made a huge stack of pancakes and come to find out, he didn't like pancakes."

Mrs. Myers and her husband, Robert, have two children—Sara eight and Bubba, 15-months-old. Today she is sharing four recipes with RECORD readers.

**LASAGNA ROMA**

1 pound ground beef  
1/2 pound pork sausage

1 clove garlic, minced  
3/4 cup chopped onions  
15-ounce can tomato sauce  
1-pound can tomatoes  
2 tablespoons chopped parsley  
2 teaspoons sugar  
1 teaspoon salt  
1/4 teaspoon each—marjoram, thyme, oregano, basil  
1 1/2 cups cubed Mozzarella cheese

1 1/2 pounds Ricotta cheese  
1 cup grated Parmesan cheese  
8-ounce package lasagna noodles, uncooked  
Brown ground beef, pork sausage, garlic and onion in a large saucepan. Drain off all fat. Add tomato sauce, tomatoes, parsley, sugar, salt and spices. Simmer uncovered one hour or until sauce is the consistency of spaghetti sauce. Heat oven to 350 degrees. Pour 1/2 cup sauce into baking pan and alternate with layers of noodles, grated cheese, mozzarella, spoonfuls of ricotta cheese, tomato sauce until all ingredients are used. Top layer should be sauce and grated cheese. Bake for one hour.

**SAVORY HERO**

1 pound ground beef  
6 oz. can tomato paste  
2 tablespoons chopped onion  
1 teaspoon salt  
Dash pepper  
1 Vienna bread loaf, cut lengthwise

Sliced cheese, tomato, pepper  
Combine meat, paste, onion and seasonings, spread over bread. Bake 450 degrees for 20 minutes. Then after baking, add cheese, the top alternating tomatoes and pepper, return to oven to melt cheese.

**VEGETABLE CASSEROLE**

1 can French style green beans

1 can corn  
1 can cream of celery soup  
1 cup sour cream  
1/2 cup green pepper  
1/2 cup celery  
1/4 cup onion  
Drain vegetables. Combine all ingredients in casserole dish. Top with 1/2 box crushed cheese crackers and 1 stick margarine, melted. Bake 30 minutes or until bubbly.

**VANILLA ICE CREAM**

4 quarts 1/2 and 1/2  
4 tablespoons vanilla  
3 cups sugar  
1/2 teaspoon salt  
Mix all ingredients well, then churn in freezer. Makes 6 quarts. Add 1 box of pudding (same flavor you're making) per two quarts of ice cream. For fruit ice cream, be sure to use a pre-swetened fruit.

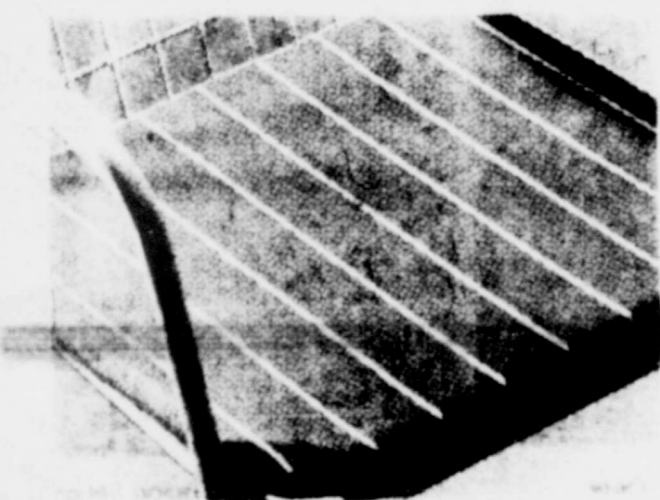

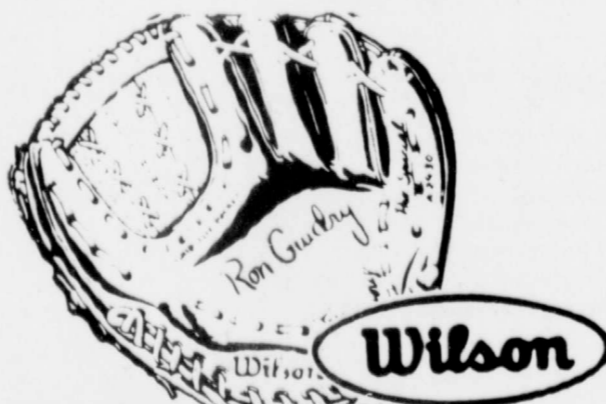

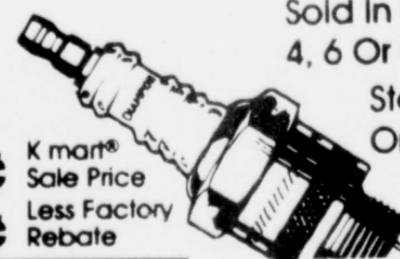
