Chamber To Be Included In City's New Civic Center

The city council of Colorado City Monday night voted 5-1 to build a \$100,000 civic center to include space for the chamber of commerce.

City Manager J. A. Sadler Jr., asked for a motion to include the Chamber of Commerce in the building, saying he wanted direction from the council in order to get off "high center" in regards to building the new facility.

The council has been engaged in debate over whether or not to include space for the chamber of commerce ever since the chamber asked for offices in the civic center in July.

Several councilmen and the city manager were of the opinion that it is not legal to include space in a city building for the chamber of commerce.

However, several members of the council insisted that the city could find ways to make it legal.

City Attorney Dell Barber told the council that in his opinion, the council could do whatever it is big enough to do and it appeared to him that including the chamber office in the new civic center would be the logical thing to do since both the city and chamber work toward the same goals, the promotion and betterment of Colorado City as a place to live.

The meeting Monday night was called to discuss the civic center and how it could be financed. Sadler told the council how the building could be financed and said he has been working with one builder who will build the facility for between \$80,000 and \$100,000, not including kitchen facilities and furnishings which will be paid for with \$25,000 the Colorado City Jaycees received for the sale of Colorado City's original civic house.

Hank Bryant voted against the proposal, saying that although Colorado City needs a civic house, there are more pressing needs now.

However, the issue was not completely settled as the council did not set the rent to be charged the chamber of commerce. In earlier discussions some of the council talked about charging more than what chamber officials say the chamber can afford to pay.

Further discussion of the civic center is expected to take place this coming Monday night at the council's regular monthly meeting. At that meeting final specifications for the building could be approved, if all the plans are ready. The building is to be located at Second and Oak.
