THE A R & E RAILROAD

Mr. Kennedy President of the Altus Roswell and El Paso Ry. Says Work Will Begin Soon

According to a statement given out by Edward Kennedy, of Houston, Texas, president of the road, who was in Oklahoma City on his way to Altus, it was learned that construction work on that road would begin within the next 30 days.

Mr. Kennedy, who is one of the pioneer railroad builders in the southwest, is authority for the statement that the new road will prove of incalculable benefit to Oklahoma City, inasmuch as it will shorten the distance between the Panhandle of Texas, St. Louis and Kansas City by approximately 146 miles, and open the metropolis of Oklahoma a market that has always been predominated by Dallas and Fort Worth business interest.

The fact that \$600,000 was raised in the shape of bonuses is offered to show that the people along the right of way are deeply interested. The bonus money is being used for the grading purposes which is progressing satisfactorily all along the line. The stretch between Altus and Hollis, a distance of 36 miles, has already been graded and actual railroad building will begin immediately after the engineers have completed the light bridging that has been found necessary to put in places.

The new road will make direct connections with Duke, Gibson, Hollis, Arlie, Rowe, Silverton and Lubbock and continue direct to Roswell, thus draining southwestern Oklahoma and the richest section of the Texas Panhandle. Grading work between Hollis and Lubbock will begin at once from both places in order to make ready for rail setters and timber men at the very earliest moment possible.

According to Mr. Kennedy the new road will be tributary to the Fort Worth & Denver, 50 miles south of the Santa Fe and 60 miles north of the Texas & Pacific, thus splitting into the south plains country. The Altus, Roswell & El Paso road will also make connections with the Mexican Santa Fe at Roswell for points in New Mexico. About 18 townsites are to be opened along the route.

The road will cost \$155,000 a mile to complete and is incorporated for \$3,000,000. The officers of the company are:

Edward Kennedy, Houston, Texas, president; Cage Beach, Altus, vice president; Edgar Chapman, Houston, secretary, and William Russel, Altus, director—Oklahoman.

WOMEN AT STATE FAIR.

Magnificent New Building Erected For Their Division.

In its plans for the twenty-third annual meet, Oct. 17 to Nov. 1, the management of the State Fair of Texas, at Dallas, has been careful to add many features of interest to the ladies' department. A magnificent new building for this department, including the textile and culinary classes, has been erected at a cost of \$35,000. Built of cement and steel, it is absolutely fire-proof, and affords the liberal space so richly deserved for the exhibition of the handwork of the women of the south.

In dimension this new structure is 150 feet square, divided into the textile, culinary and fine arts departments. The facilities are double those of last year, and in spite of the fact that at the fair of 1907 there were more than 300 exhibitors in the ladies' division, coming from twenty-seven different towns in the state of Texas, and eleven different states in the Union, the number of exhibitors this year, it is confidently predicted, will be double.

In this division will be exhibited and entered for the prize offered by the management, 101 lots of work, fine work, knitting and crocheted work, plain and fancy sewing, embroidery, decorative art, miscellaneous exhibits, children's work and baskets. There will be collected decorated china pieces, fans, drawn and Mexican work, plain sewing, painted sofa pillows, tapestry paintings, pyrography and other handwork for which the women of the south are noted. Old documents, war relics, Indian relics, heirlooms, bead work, baskets, etc., promise to make this department one of the most interesting of the fair to every man, woman and child that attends the meet.

The culinary is a new department of the fair, and is divided into three classes, namely: Bread, cakes, puddings, pickles, canned goods, etc. In full though there be no competition.

The twenty-third annual meet of the State Fair of Texas will open in Dallas Oct. 17 and continue sixteen days. Hon. T. M. Campbell, governor of Texas, will deliver the opening address and will be responded to by President E. J. Kist of the Fair association. Business sessions will be held and will render a special program and the new buildings of the fair dedicated to their various purposes.

PRESS DAY AT STATE FAIR.

Monday, Oct. 19, is Press day at the twenty-third annual meet of the State Fair of Texas at Dallas. On this day visiting editors and their families will be the guests of the Fair association. The grounds will be turned over to them, and they will be given carte blanche to visit all shows on the grounds and anything else that they desire. The Fair association does not consider this as a favor for they realize the fact that but for the good will and efforts of the press in its behalf it could never have achieved its present success. In other words, the management of the fair feels, and rightly so, that all courtesies extended the newspaper makers of the southwest on their special day at the fair is but a small part of the compensation that is due them.

Who Owns the Fair?

The Texas State fair, as far as its organization and operation are concerned, stands without a parallel in the history of fairs. The property used by it for exposition purposes was virtually donated to the city of Dallas by the stockholders of the association, and in addition to this donation, they gave the city \$30,000 with which to complete the present exposition building on the grounds.

The operations of the Fair association are owned and conducted by more than 1,500 stockholders, citizens of Dallas, who entered into a contract with the city of Dallas to give a fair annually for twenty years, using Fair park for the purpose, at their own cost and expense, with no liability or cost to the city whatever, and to expend each year every dollar of their net earnings in the improvement of Fair park and the betterment of each succeeding fair.

The stockholders further agreed with the city that no owner of stock or stocks should derive any benefit from the stock, or never be paid back the principal of his stock, and that no officer or director, except the secretary, should receive any remuneration for his services, but to devote every dollar of the net earnings each year to the development and betterment of the people of the city of Dallas and the state of Texas.

Asylums for Insane.

How to properly care for all classes of mentally defective persons in this state is a problem rapidly assuming enormous proportions. Each new administration comes into office pledged to make proper provision for the indigent insane, and yet the cry continues that the jails are filled with them and that to the state's disgrace, it is treating this helpless class of citizens as if they were willful criminals instead of helpless unfortunates.

The facts of the case are indisputable, yet no blame seems attachable anywhere. In the matter of building asylums the state has been less parsimonious than it usually is. It has even been liberal, it may be said, but there is much more in the question than the mere building of houses and taking in whomsoever may be offered as a charge upon the state.

Another fact is the surprising increase in the insane population. In 1884 we had only one asylum in the state and only five hundred patients. That seemed to answer pretty well for those times. Yet we now have four such institutions, with a total of 1,550 patients, and many more insane lying in the jails awaiting admission to the asylums, all of which are as badly crowded as Rogers Q. Mills once said hell was with prohibition penitents.

Gov. Campbell intends to use all his influence to have the next legislature make such provisions as will meet all the legitimate demands on the state for several years to come. His plan looks to enlarging the present asylums rather than build new ones, for the reason that a large number of patients can be cared for at one asylum at a smaller cost per capita than a limited number. Every time a new institution is built the cost of administration is multiplied. However he may agree to another institution in order to make separate provision for the colored insane, who are being cared for in a separate ward in the state asylum.

It is also thought desirable by some alienists to separate different classes of the insane in separate institutions. For instance, the criminal insane have a very bad influence over those who would otherwise be harmless. Bringing the different classes in contact in the same walls or on the same grounds has many bad results.

Additions to the asylums, or new ones entirely, were built by Governors Lanham, Sayers, Culberson and Hogg, and each seemed to think they had solved the problem at the time. However the policy of each administration seems to have been to provide only for the immediate needs. As soon as the insane in sight were taken care of, another lot bobbed up, the possible magnitude of this reserve supply is causing the authorities to scratch their heads and do some thinking.

The aggregate number of insane and epileptics now confined in the institutions is as follows: North Texas asylum at Terrell, 2,000; state asylum at Austin, 1,400; southwestern asylum at San Antonio, 750; epileptic colony at Abilene, 400. Total 4,550.

Live Stock Exhibit

San Antonio, Sept. 20. At ready 1,500 entries have been made in the livestock division of the International Fair association, the exposition of which will open in San Antonio Sept. 26 and close Oct. 11. This is greatest number of entries of livestock ever known in the Southwest, and is second in importance from the standpoint of the stockmen only to the great show of the National Feeders and Breeders association.

Every stock growing section of the southwest is represented in the entries made, some of them being reserved by exhibitors from New Mexico, while the Panhandle country is strongly represented. Several Mexican exhibitors are arranging to have their cattle exhibit brought to San Antonio "on bond," and the matter is now up with the treasury department.

The biggest exhibit of Angora goats ever brought together in the United States will be seen in the division, and in addition to the mohair-bearing animals will be shown the manner of handling the product. Ward & Garrett of Kerr county, Texas, are the largest owners of Angoras in America, and they will bring 100 specimens of their best breeds to the fair. Charles Schreiner of Kerrville will also have some imported Angora stock on exhibition.

Raising Bonus.

Seymour, Tex., Sept. 17.—At a mass meeting attended by about 300 citizens of Baylor county, it was voted to raise a bonus of \$50,000 and a right of way through the county, to be donated to a proposed railroad from Dallas to this point, by way of Jacksboro.

This road is a completion and extension of the old grade, known as the Dallas and Mexico road, and which was recently bought by McDargel and associates of New York. The route proposed traverses one of the richest sections of the state, and will supply a long felt want of these people, a direct connection with Dallas and Eastern markets.

This road will strike in the vicinity of Lubbock and of course we will "give 'em" a bonus right-of-way and depot grounds" to come by.

The Baptist church at Big Springs was destroyed by fire last week entailing a loss of \$5,000.

If you had the finest horse or the finest bunch of white face cattle in the whole west, you would boost 'em. The same should be true of your town. Lubbock is the finest town on the plains. Boost her.

Better get in on the ground floor, Mr. East Texan. If you wait till the train whistles in Lubbock it means that you must pay \$5 or \$10 per acre for your land. If you are trying to keep out of paying a railroad bonus you will not do so by staying away, if you ever expect to come to this country. Now is the time. Come, you are welcome.

Treasurer Haskell is busy punching the patriotism cash register. Receipts, aside from national committee work, average \$3000 a day. This information should break the apathy of the man who has failed to chip in his dollar and who thinks \$2000 of 'em is big as the national reserve fund. However, there are seven weeks of hammer and tongs campaign ahead, and contributors will have to come in thick and fast if the pace is to be maintained. Ft. Worth Star.

In a recent speech at Washington Park New Jersey Mr. Bryan, Democratic candidate for President, said his nomination for the presidency for the third time, with no president to help him with his patronage, was due solely to the ideas for which he stands, and the people that he is on their side. He said that the time had come when the people of all sections could unite on a platform, and he was ready to defend that platform in all sections of the country. He believed the measures in the platform are good for all the people alike, no matter in what section they live. He said that there had been a great change in the sentiments of the people; that men who were against him on account of the ideas he represented were for him now. "There are," he said, "no people who are fearful of danger if I am elected." Mr. Bryan ridiculed the idea of a panic as a result of his election; that was a scarecrow invented by the people's enemies every time he was a candidate. The Democratic party, he said, had no monopoly on panics and he didn't carry them in stock. He made a vigorous attack on the tariff and trusts, discussed guarantee of bank deposits and labor question, and closed with a broadside of solid shot which he poured into Mr. Taft.

Last week's shipment of hogs into the Fort Worth markets is said to have beaten all previous records. Among the large number of shipments were several car loads from the Plains country, which were hogs fattened on the alfalfa fields, and they were over the average of the hogs on the markets. Great is the Panhandle. Raise more hogs!

We are all too much like the fellow that closed and locked the barn door after his horse had been stolen. We wait till some calamity comes before we apply a preventative, and this is going to be the case in the matter of that fire extinguisher if we sit down on the stool of do nothing and let the matter die out from sheer neglect and indifference. We should be wise and profit by the experiences of others, and prepare ourselves for battle against the probable attack upon our town by fire. It has not been a great many months since the entire west side of the business part of Snyder, was consumed by fire, and no facilities by which to stop the destructive monster. Big Springs has also suffered severe losses of late because of inadequate fire protection. And too, you will call to mind how narrowly a serious fire was averted here last winter, and that it was controlled in such a way as to confine the fire to one building still, we may not be as fortunate another time. Big Springs people, (as also did Snyder) held a mass meeting and are raising funds to provide the town with adequate fire fighting facilities, but this action was taken only after these towns had lost thousands of dollars worth of property. Now it is only a matter of time, and that time may be short, when Lubbock will have another fire, and in the face of these experiences are we going to rock and fall victims to the same calamities? No, Let us be wise and purchase that fire extinguisher without further delay. Let that committee get busy and complete their work of raising the amount necessary to purchase an extinguisher and get it in working order.

VINEGARONE HARMLESS

Entomological Expert Reports on the Vinegarone and Says it is Harmless. Is not Poisonous.

Since sojourning in the West the writer has heard many and varied accounts of the poisonous qualities of the Vinegarone, coupled with the tales of horrible death resulting from their bite.

Not more than four weeks ago, we read an account in a newspaper published not more than one hundred miles east of here to the effect that one who is ever bitten by a vinegarone need not send for a doctor at all, as the victim will be dead ere the messenger could mount a horse. But persistent inquiry for the term of three or four years on the part of the writer had failed to locate anyone who had ever been bitten, or even to unearth a single authentic case of the insect having ever been known to inflict a bite upon anyone or anything.

Some three weeks ago, W. L. Dodd, who is a compositor on the Reporter, unearthed a vinegarone while chopping weeds in his yard, and brought it down to the office in a bottle. The editor forthwith embalmed it in a phial of formaldehyde and forwarded it to the Smithsonian Institute at Washington, D. C. for classification. The following reply was received, which should prove conclusive to every reader:

Dear Sir: The specimen which you transmitted on Aug. 15th has been examined by Mr. Nathan Banks, Custodian of the Arachnida, who has furnished the following information concerning it:

"The specimen is a true vinegarone, Eremobates Pallipes say. It does not however, grow larger than the tarantula, nor is it poisonous, but it can pinch severely with its large jaws. It catches and eats insects, and wanders mostly at night."

With your permission the specimen will be retained for the Museum collections. A franked envelope is inclosed for your reply.

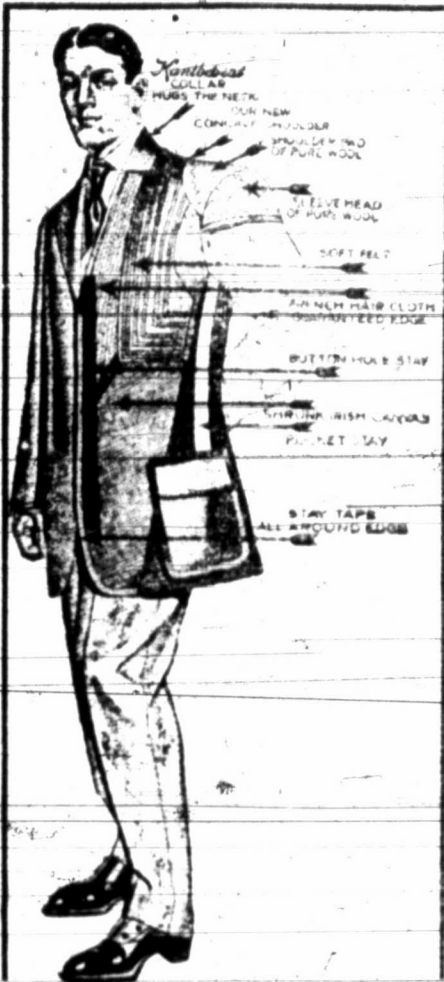

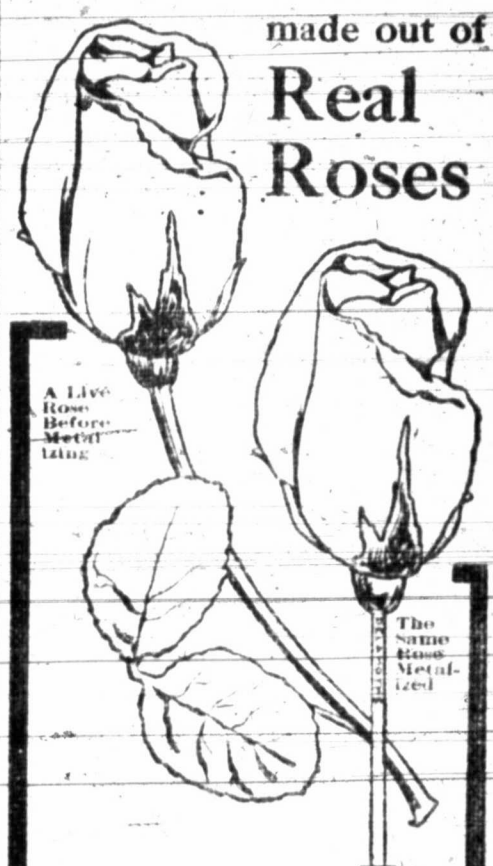

SOME BIG LAND DEALS

Bailey and Garza County Lands Attracting Attention of Eastern Buyers. 117,000 Acres Sold.

J. L. Breathwit, who was one of the promoter of the present Arlington Heights Realty Company, and who owned a quarter interest in that company, has traded his interest in that company as part payment for a track of land comprising four leagues, or 17,712 acres situated in Bailey county.

The price paid by Mr. Breathwit for this land was \$10 an acre, so the deal totals about \$177,000. His interest in the Arlington Heights Realty Company was put in the deal at \$81,000, and he paid in addition to that amount \$19,000 in cash, making the first cash payment \$100,000.

The sellers were Dr. A. L. Taylor, of Hereford, and Dr. L. F. Taylor, of Farwell. The deal was made through C. Collee & Co.

It is the intention of Mr. Breathwit to cut the land up into small tracts and settle it to farmers. His plans however, are not yet finally completed and he may change his mind.

The Arlington Heights Company, from which Mr. Breathwit withdraws, was promoted by him about four years ago. It was capitalized at \$100,000, but the four original stockholders put up only \$48,000 in real money to acquire the property on the hill west of the city. Besides paying all expenses this company now has property of a book value of over a million dollars, which merely shows that Breathwit never got any too much for his quarter interest.

Another four league trade is now pending for Garza county at the same figure paid by Mr. Breathwit for the Bailey county land, and it is probably that this trade will be closed Monday.

Texas Feed Oklahoma Cattle.

For the first time in the history of this state, Texas oil mills will be surrounded this fall with Oklahoma cattle. And for the first time in the history of Texas railroads, there will be a general movement of feeder steers from the pastures of the new state into Texas. The unprecedented condition of affairs is attributed by the general live stock agents in Fort Worth to a shortage in Texas feeder steers.

Already heavy orders are being sent to pile up in the offices of the live stock agent for cars to be delivered at Oklahoma feeding points along in October and the latter part of September. The vast bulk of this movement of Oklahoma cattle will be through Fort Worth and will be directed to the numerous western and southwestern oil mills where cattle are fed during the fall before being marketed. Fort Worth Star.

Plan Big Hotel

Amarillo, Sept. 16.—Leading business men of Amarillo have induced C. B. Pash to undertake the promotion and building of a \$260,000 hotel in Amarillo. Pash inaugurated the construction of both the Amarillo Plainview railroad, the Amarillo Street railway, both in successful operation. The hotel movement following on the heels of the packing house is enthusiastically received.

Wherefore, plaintiff asks that defendants be cited by publication in terms of law and plaintiff prays for judgment setting aside and cancelling said judgment lien and holding same for naught and declaring the record thereof of no force and effect, declaring the said judgment dormant and of no force and effect and that plaintiff be discharged from further liability by reason thereof, for costs and for general relief.

HEREIN FAIL NOT, but have you then and there, before said Court this writ, with your return thereon, showing how you have executed the same.
