### TREASURE HUNT FOR \$1,000 SET

In keeping with the historical background of this area, a pirate-buried treasure hunt, complete with maps and clues, is scheduled as one of the more intriguing events of the nine-day Aransas County - Rockport Centennial celebration which opens Saturday.

Buried treasure, in the form of certificates redeemable for cash, will total \$1,000. The smallest treasure will be \$5. A total of 126 treasures will be buried in five designated areas in Aransas County and Rockport.

Maps which will provide clues will be printed on parchment-type paper, and sold for \$1 each. They are expected to become valued souvenirs of the Centennial. Each map will contain clues for only one area. Although the five general areas will be identified with signs, only the maps will provide sufficient clues to direct a hunter to the immediate vicinity of the treasures. Treasure certificates will be buried in plastic containers.

Digging will continue during daylight hours of the nine days of the Centennial and will be confined to hunters owning maps. Only one treasure per digger will be allowed.

### Witte Museum Item To Be Displayed

The Witte Museum of San Antonio has loaned the Inclining Sundial Compass to the Rockport-Aransas County Centennial, Inc. for display during the Centennial.

The instrument which dates back to 1767 was owned by Captain Peter A. Johnson and used on his many trips aboard his mail schooner which sailed between Port O'Connor and Port Isabel. Captain Johnson settled on St. Joseph Island in 1841.

This compass was secured from Witte Museum by Mrs. J. Martin Shaw, a great-great-granddaughter of Captain Johnson. It will be displayed during Centennial Week at Johnson Drug Store, the former owner of which was a descendant of this family.

### Cent. Barbecue Set For June 20

The Rockport Lions Club will put on a barbecue for Centennial guests at the Navigation District Park (across the street from the Woman's Club Building) on Saturday, June 20.

The price will be \$1.50 per plate, not \$1.75 as erroneously listed in the Centennial folder. The Lions Club also will hold its annual Fourth of July barbecue at its pit in the Navigation District Park.

### Antique Displays For Centennial

To add flavor to the June 13-21 Centennial Celebration, a number of local business establishments have set up interesting and attractive historical displays, according to Mrs. Frances Iles, chairman of the historical window committee.

In the lobby at First National Bank, the display includes 85 different types of barbed wire and two books of the Civil War printed in 1870. United Savings Association features a map of this area handmade 85 years ago, and an antique doll collection.

At Central Power and Light Company, one can see black milk china dating back to the late 1800's, antique clothing from the Civil War era, and a slop jar that was part of the original furnishing of the Fulton Mansion.

On display at Mitchell's Jewelry are a large assortment of old photos, bills receipts and stationery dating back to 1870.

He studied Greek at the Hellenic American Union in Athens and married an attractive young Greek woman, and they now have one child.

He recently graduated from the General Theological Seminary in New York.

## County Population Up 20% in 10 Years

The population of Aransas County climbed from 7,006 in 1960 to 8,468 in 1970—a gain of over 20 per cent—according to figures released by the U.S. Census Bureau.

In contrast, five counties in South Texas registered losses in population during the past decade. Those counties are Jackson, San Patricio, Goliad Live Oak and Refugio.

County Judge John D. Wendell said he thinks the 8,468 population figure for the county for 1970, as announced by the U.S. Census Bureau "is too low."

"I don't think everyone in Aransas County was counted,"

Judge Wendell said. "From every indication, such as new installations for electric and gas service, and also on the basis of many new homes built for many new residents, I think the figure should be closer to 10,000."

The 1970 count of 8,468 was announced by Mrs. Mary A. the 12-county area, including Aransas, of the U. S. Census Bodger, district manager for Bureau.

She said the 1960 census figure for Aransas County was 7,006. Thus the growth in 10 years, according to the Census Bureau was 1,462.

Thousands of people are expected to visit here to participate in the nine-day celebration of the Aransas County-Rockport Centennial, June 13 to 21.

More than a week of almost continuous entertainment has been planned, including parades, dances, eating events and various land and water contests, and exhibitions, as well as a street carnival complete with rides and other amusement devices. A four-day art festival, June 19-21, is attracting artists from all over the nation. Feature of the civic celebration will be a historical pageant entitled "BUSTLES TO BIKINIS."

A total of more than 2,000 local residents already are involved in the program, including members of more than 30 committees, 800 members of the pageant cast and 1,300 Centennial Belles in chapters organized to promote the Centennial and raise money for it.

Mayor Delmar Hiller has said that no other event in the history of the area has aroused so much enthusiasm and public support. "The entire life of the community has been enriched and we will continue to benefit from the Centennial spirit for years (Continued on Page 8)

## EDITORIAL

### SO LONG WABASH CANNONBALL!

One day, while broadcasting a baseball game, Dizzy Dean burst into song, rendering the "Wabash Cannonball" and from that day on he was branded as a musician of sorts and people pleaded with him to sing the song of the famous old train.

Dizzy may have learned the music and the words while playing for the Gashouse Gang that played baseball for St. Louis back in the early 1930's for St. Louis was one of the terminal points for the train.

St. Louis better memorize the train and the song because times are changing and the Wabash Cannonball running between St. Louis and Detroit may soon be no more. The Norfolk and Western Railroad has again asked the Interstate Commerce Commission to drop the St. Louis to Detroit run.

The dropping of the famous train is a sad commentary on our times, of course, as are the other well-known trains that are being dropped by other lines. It's because people seemingly are forsaking the rails for the airliners. Railroads are giving up the passenger business without much of a fight. One exception is the new, speedier train put into service between Washington and New York that is designed to attain speeds of up to 150 miles an hour. This train is still in the experimental stage, however.

It is too bad the railroads didn't get off of their rears sooner and make a more serious effort to keep the passenger traffic. Better merchandising like the airlines have used might have accomplished it, and the Wabash Cannonball and the Twentieth Century Limited might still be the hooty-tooty train rides they once were. There must be still plenty of travelers who like a nice comfortable night's sleep on an overnight train. If so, they're at a loss to find such a ride today. In fact, it's hard to even find a passenger train, day or night, to any place any more. And it's a shame, too.

### MIDDLE CLASS PEOPLE CRUISING

Time was when someone mentioned taking a cruise, he was looked upon as one of the rich folks.

But times have changed, according to Travel Weekly. Cruises are now for the middle-income folks and they're flocking to the travel agencies to the tune of some \$230-million this year.

The extended 80-day world cruise isn't as popular as it once was. Rather, it is the seven-day or two-week trip and who's taking it? It's the Wall Street broker, the school teacher, the plumber, and the candlestick maker.

Fatter pay checks and more leisure time are making it possible for the working people to get

away from it all. Not just the ultra-rich and the coupon clippers.

Life aboard the cruise ships has changed, too, to meet the trend of the times. No longer are there "classes" for the big spenders and the economy travelers. The liners don't restrict passengers to certain decks and levels. A cruise passenger has the run of the ship. A barber, a plumber or a baker, may be sitting beside a millionaire at dinner.

The cabins are air conditioned and stabilizers provide all passengers ultimates in comfort.

Most of the short cruises are to the Caribbean, West Indies and those dreamy places in the tropics.

But for some of us—even though we don't even rate with the middle-income cruisers—we can dream can't we?



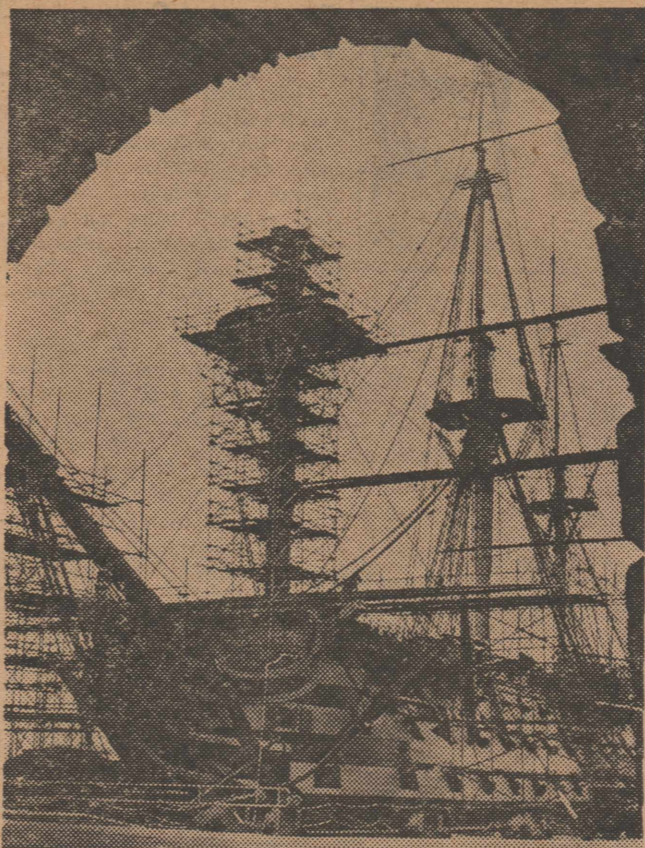

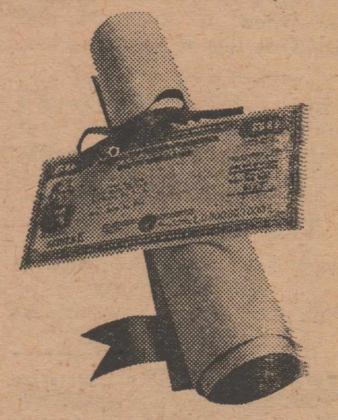

Hill compiled and wrote most of the booklet from material supplied by scores of residents of this area and from historical records. The pictures, likewise, came chiefly from individuals.

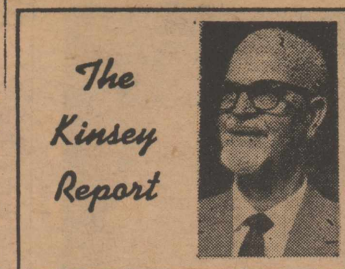

Classified Ads Get Results



It won't be long before you'll be buying a new boat . . . that is if you haven't done already.

Seems like nearly every family has at least one boat. It's "The Thing" nowadays. Double garages, or dual carports, now sport at least one car and one boat; sometimes two boats and one car, with the car—more often than not—left outside in the weather.

A statistical study made by the Boating Industry Association and the National Association of Engine and Boat Manufacturers reveals that in 1969 the recreational boating industry increased its annual dollar volume in retail sales by an estimated 4.5 per cent. Peak now is \$3,292,000,000. That's an aggregate total of nearly three and a third million dollars. Wow!

Included in these purchases are new and used boats, motors, accessories, safety equipment, fuel, insurance, docking, maintenance, launching, storage, repairs and club memberships.

Total number of boats in use in the United States jumped an additional 2.4 per cent or 206,000. This made the grand total 8,646,000 water pleasure craft. That's a lot of boats!

A million more people participated in recreational boating in 1969, with the total estimated at \$43,230,000. This also represented a 2.4 per cent increase in those using the waterways more than once or twice during the year. It's obvious that boating is growing in appeal as more people seek leisure-time activities for the whole family.

Figures reveal also that sales of larger and more expensive boats and motors contributed to the general rise in dollar volume.

Like to know the breakdown on the boat population, Here it is by types of boats:

Inboard motorboats (including auxiliary-power sailboats), 615,000.  
Outboard boats, 5,101,000.  
Sailboats, without inboard

power, 598,000.  
Rowboats, canoes, dingies, prams, and other miscellaneous craft in use, many with outboard power, 2,332,000.

Number of outboard motors in use during 1969 reached 7,101,000 . . . topping seven million for the first time. Sales during the year reached an estimated 510,000 . . . a 2 per cent rise.

There was a marked increase in the size of the average outboard motor sold in 1969. In '68 the average outboard ran 31.5 h.p., in '69 it was 33.1.

Motors of 45 h.p. and up commanded 34 per cent of the market.

Motors up to 6.9 h.p. dropped from 29 per cent to 28 per cent.

Motors 7 to 19.9 h.p. dropped from 21 to 19 per cent of sales.

Those 20 to 44.9 h.p. fell by the same figure . . . down from 21 percent of sales to 19.

Naturally there was a preference for larger boats to go with the desire for motors of greater horsepower. This shoved the average length up to 15.9 feet . . . the highest ever.

Estimated sales of outboard boats hit a 10-year high in 1969, reaching 301,000.

Sales of stern-drive boats continued to climb, hitting an estimated 235,000 units.

Marinas, boat yards and yacht clubs increased by 100 for a total of 5,900 such facilities on the American scene.

So, the popularity of boating goes up, up, and up . . . nationwide. As for Texas . . . our guess is that the percentages are even greater for the Lone Star State. Why shouldn't they be . . . with Texas' multiplicity of impoundments and virtually year around boating weather?

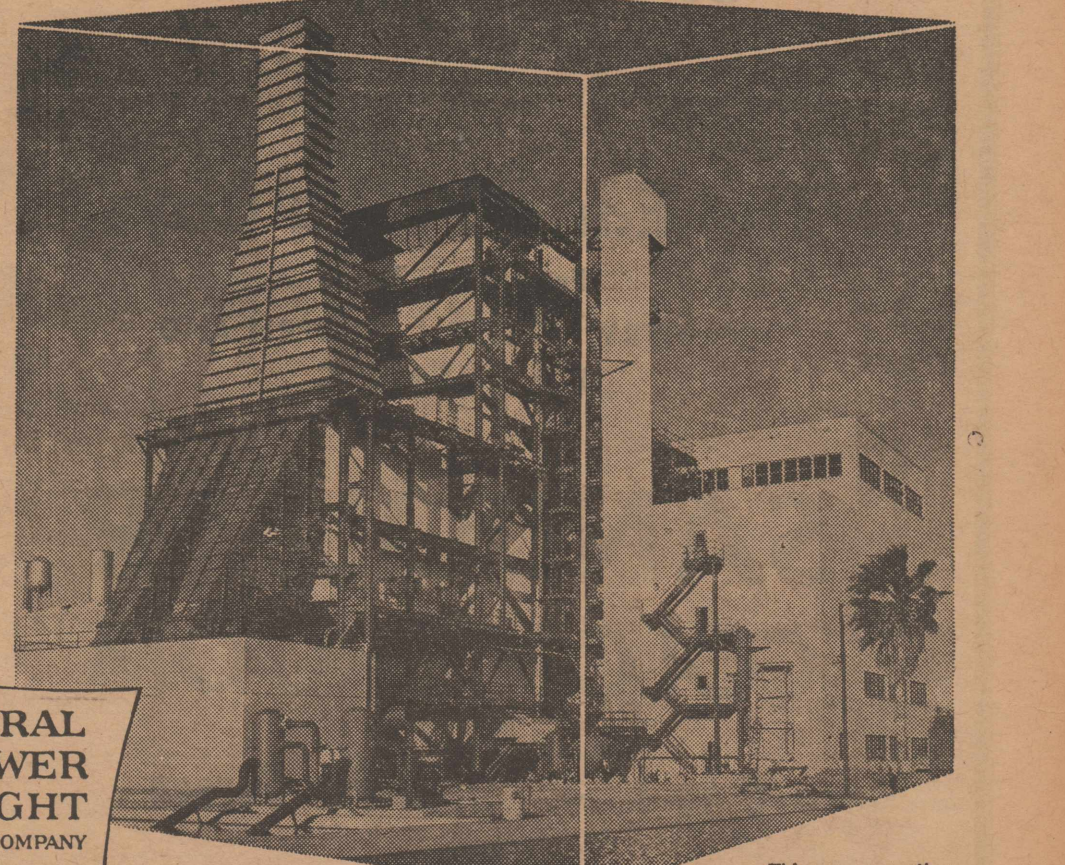

owing income types of people:  
A one-person family with an income up to \$125 a month.  
Two-person family with an income up to \$170 per month.  
Ten-person family with income to \$330 per month.

The state also will have authority to issue emergency orders for 30 days.

Heads of households who think they are eligible to receive donated foods from the State Department of Public Welfare's commodity distribution center have to apply and be certified first.

Persons now receiving public assistance should apply at the local office of the State Department of Public Welfare, County Courthouse.

Certification of eligibility for the foods will be made on the basis of maximum standards set up by the State Department of Public Welfare by the end of June.

To facilitate processing and

certification, applicants must bring:  
W-2 income tax forms  
A statement from employer (Pay checks or stubs)  
Record of Social Security grants.

Persons who are unemployed should bring a statement from the State Employment Commission that shows registration for employment.

Eligibility of each family that receives the food will be reviewed regularly.

Merten be permitted to park a motor home on the bay side in front of his home at 1627 Water Street on weekends and during short vacations, subject to several restrictions including one that the vehicle be parked 25 feet from the street.

**ROTARIANS ARE TOLD OF WATER POLLUTION**

Pollution problems in the Aransas Bay area, which includes Copano, St. Charles, Port and Mission bays, as well as their tributary streams, was discussed by Ernest Simmons, coastal fisheries district superintendent, Texas Parks and Wildlife department, at Rotary club's luncheon meeting at Corky's restaurant Wednesday.

He reported that extensive studies in this area show that oil well brine emptying into Copano Bay is a serious threat to marine life.

Simmons pointed out that shrimp, crabs and many types of fish develop in tributary creeks and rivers before moving to the bays and Gulf of Mexico.

A comparison shows that Chiltipin creek, into which a large volume of oil well brine is dumped, was almost devoid of marine life, while it is abundant in Copano creek, he said. Chiltipin creek brine discharge already has seriously polluted western Copano bay, Simmons added.

Monday, June 15 will be devoted to events of special interest to children, including a bicycle parade, kite flying and fishing contest and pet show. There will be another free street dance in the evening.

Tuesday and Wednesday lo-

cal merchants will have old fashioned bargain days. There will be a Mexican Fiesta dinner Wednesday afternoon, and free street dances both nights.

The principal parade of the Centennial will start at 2 p.m. Thursday, June 18. Scores of floats and bands will be in the parade which will feature Miss Texas and a flyover by the Navy's Blue Angels precision flying team. The local Masonic Lodge will celebrate its 100th anniversary and banquet.

The first of four performances of "BUSTLES TO BIKINIS" will start at 7:30 p.m., Thursday, with the crowning of the Centennial Queen and Princesses of her court. Another free street dance will follow.

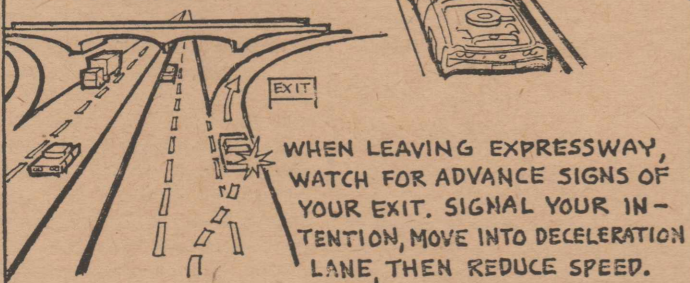

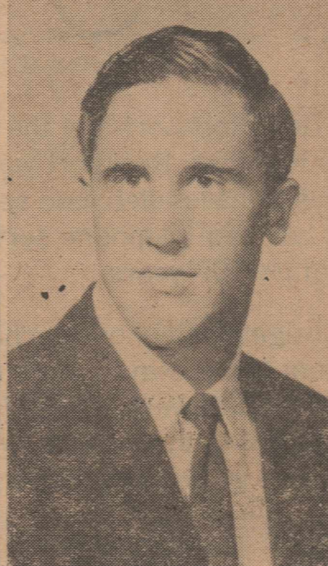

**Emergency Action Plan Handbook Distributed Here**

"In Time of Emergency" a citizen's handbook on nuclear attack and natural disasters, has been mailed to every resident of this area by Aransas County Civil Defense. The handbook was prepared by the U. S. Department of Defense, Office of Civil Defense.

A message from County Judge John D. Wendell and Mayor Delmar R. Hiller, headed "Emergency Action Plan for Aransas County," accompanied the booklets. In their message, Wendell and Hiller state:

"In case of nuclear attack upon the United States, you and your family would need to know where to go and what to do. The instructions contained in this handbook are vital to the interest of your family and the community, not only in event of a nuclear attack, but also in case of natural disasters and other emergencies.

"This project has been undertaken locally, with Federal and State Government assistance, and has been approved by your elected officials."

Under the subtitle, "Attention All Citizens," the message says:

There is no fallout shelter in your county, and fallout from a nuclear attack on the United States could arrive in the county within 30 minutes after an attack.

The information contained in this handbook, "IN TIME OF EMERGENCY" may possibly save your lives in event of an attack. The radiation from fallout can be fatal to living things exposed to it. You can protect yourself by getting heavy material between you and fallout particles.

Because you live and work in a county in which there is no public shelter, study this handbook, and keep it where it is readily available. Make your preparations now. The use of any underground or heavily constructed building may save the lives of many.

The warning to take shelter is a 3 to 5 minute wavering tone from sirens. Take your battery powered radio with you because it will be the primary means of keeping you informed.

Under the subtitle, "Your Family Emergency Plan," is the following:

It is important that each family develop its own plans for emergency action. Not all family plans will be alike but all should include at least the following:

1. Know the emergency warning signals and the system of warning used in your area.
2. Keep your radio tuned to a station broadcasting official

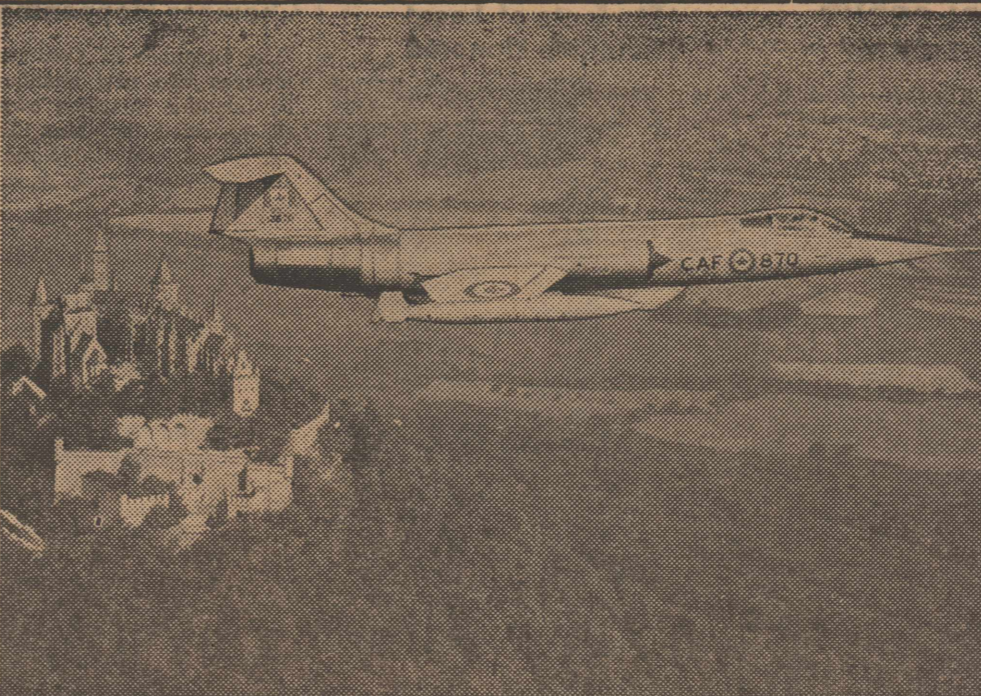
