Community Chest Combines Fund Campaigns; Public Likes Program

The Community Chest Drive for 1952 needs, conducted in the fall of 1951, anticipated the needs of five agencies instead of the four provided for in the first campaign. The Rotary Club in Cisco voted to direct the campaign during this year and named W. P. Guinn as director of the drive.

The four original participating agencies found that their needs had not been so great as the original estimate, so that even with the addition of the Hobby Club the total budget for 1951 drive was \$4,200 — \$1,300 less than the year before. The drive that year brought in funds of \$4,460, which allowed a reserve fund beginning of \$260.

The 1951 drive was definitely

successful both in the fact that the budget was attained, and that the non-participating agencies were beginning to appreciate the premise that Cisco could and would "coordinate charitable activities and other programs of a civic nature requiring public subscription and cooperation." 1952 saw the people of Cisco conducting the same separate drives as in 1951, but with a growing conviction that these separate campaigns would not be necessary in 1953.

Full-Fledged United Fund
The idea of the Community Chest began to bear mature fruit in the fall of 1952 when the Cisco Community Chest became

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Cisco Offensive Attack Clicks

Cisco High School's fighting little Loboes spotted the heavier Brady Bulldogs a six point lead in Brady Friday night, and roared back in the second half to score two touchdowns and win a non-conference tilt 12-6.

The lone Brady tally came late in the first quarter after they recovered a Cisco fumble on their own 48 yard line. The scoring drive was aided by a 15-yard penalty against the Loboes. Clyde McLean carried over from the two for the score. The second quarter was scoreless but the Loboes were close to pay dirt on two occasions. One of the times they lost the ball on the four and on the other occasion they failed on the 10.

Cisco's first score came in the third quarter when Tommy Reynolds carried over from the two. Benji Lipsey made Cisco's second six pointer in the final period when he sprinted through the line from the seven.

Fred Hayes, Lobo quarterback, was hurt in the last few minutes of the second quarter and will probably be out of the Rotan game. Harold Phippen was injured in the third quarter but will be able to play in the game this week. Hayes received a bruised ankle and Phippen received a cut over his left eye. The cut required several stitches.

The entire Lobo team showed improvement over play in the Eastland game, but the biggest improvement was in the running attack. The offensive blocking was sharp, and the backs were finding the holes. Hayes and Tommy Reynolds handled the ball well at the under position and made several nice gains on option plays. The slants of Phippen, Benji Lipsey and Marcus Gallegos went for yardage on almost every play. Lipsey, 120 pound freshman, was one of the leading ground gainers. Phippen averaged better than five yards per try and Gallegos picked up considerable yardage. Smith ran and punted well in his fullback post.

The defensive team played a top game. The secondary defensive line had little to do all evening as the forward wall stopped most of the Brady runners at the line of scrimmage. Outstanding on the line were Bob Qualls, Jim Reynolds, Joe Farrow, Arzel Hale, Benny Edwards, Edward Bernie and Bill Miller. Cisco used a five-four-two defensive pattern most of the game.

The Loboes play Rotan in Cisco Friday night. Kent Davis will make his debut in that game and Bill Smith will probably be used at end. Rotan tied Roscoe Friday night.

First Quarter
Brady won the toss and elected to defend the south goal with the wind to their backs. Cisco elected to receive. Vernon Ryans kick went to the one yard line where Phippen took it and ran it back to the 10. On the next play the Lobo backfield was in motion and the Loboes were penalized to the five. On the next play a Cisco lineman was offside and they were penalized to the one. Bill Smith punted out to the 36 but Brady drew a 15 yard penalty for running into the kicker, giving the Loboes a first on the 16 yard line. Plunges by Hayes and Smith netted three yards and on third down Smith quick kicked out to the 39.

McLean and Anderson picked up two yards on two tries and on third down Joe Farrow fell on a Brady fumble on the Lobo 37. On an option play Hayes carried to the 45. Gallegos picked up one and Hayes, on a quarterback sneak, made it a first on the Cisco 48. Smith failed to gain and Phippen fumbled. Brady recovered on the Bulldog 48 and Cisco drew a 15 yard holding penalty to their own 37. McLean lost to the 40 and Young picked up 10 around end. Young failed on third down but Nicholas made it first and 10 on the Lobo 27. McLean picked up three and on the next play carried to the Lobo 11 for a first. Nicholas made five and McLean

HUNTER COOPERATION IS ASKED IN STUDY OF STATE GAME BIRDS

AUSTIN, Sept. 19. — Hunter cooperation through forwarding bands from game they harvested is being manifested in specimens reaching Game and Fish Commission Headquarters.

The Director of Wildlife Restoration for the Commission said bands already have been received from mourning doves taken in the north zone where the season opened September 1, and from the white-winged dove season opening in the Rio Grande Valley, September 11.

The first band received at headquarters was forwarded by a policeman. He was Patrolman H. H. Frye of the Johnson City force. The bird was banded by Game Warden Travis Gilbreath as a nestling on July 23 this year about four miles northeast of Johnson City. It was harvested on the opening day of the north zone season about five miles southwest of Johnson City.

The first white-winged dove band was sent in by Wayne Frost of Edinburg. The bird was banded September 13 in Hidalgo County in which it was tagged May 29, 1949, thus being more than four years old.

One strange incident in connection with the first batch of mourning dove bands was reported by A. S. Jackson, Wildlife Biologist stationed at Canadian. Three banded doves were found dead under a fence on the Benton Farm in Gray County, apparently having been killed by reckless flying. The dead birds were found near the place where they were banded.

Jackson's letter of transmittal explained: "In the late summer, doves are prone to fly recklessly from the tree grove and collide with fences, limbs, etc. I have found two with crops cut open from locust thorns."

Bands from wildlife are needed by Game and Fish Commission biologists to help piece together the habits of game, such as determining migration, life span, feeding and nesting routine.

The Director of Wildlife Restoration said the band receipts later will include those from doves in the South Zone, beginning October 1, waterfowl, deer, antelope, and wild turkey and the like. Persons forwarding the bands receive a formal acknowledgment from the Commission, including a "case history" of the specimen involved.

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Before the summer finally passes, then, why not take advantage of these long summer-into-fall evenings and plan an outdoor steak supper? For easy eating, prepare Steak Finger Sandwiches in the following manner. Select a steak one and a half inches thick. Brush it on both sides with garlic butter and grill over hot coals, turning several times and brushing with garlic butter each time. (To make garlic butter, you mash a clove of garlic and add it to a quarter pound of melted butter and heat gently for ten minutes.) When the steak reaches the desired degree of "doneness," cut into half-inch strips, place each strip in a hot frankfurter roll, and serve.

On the side, have an accessory tray set with relishes, mustard and

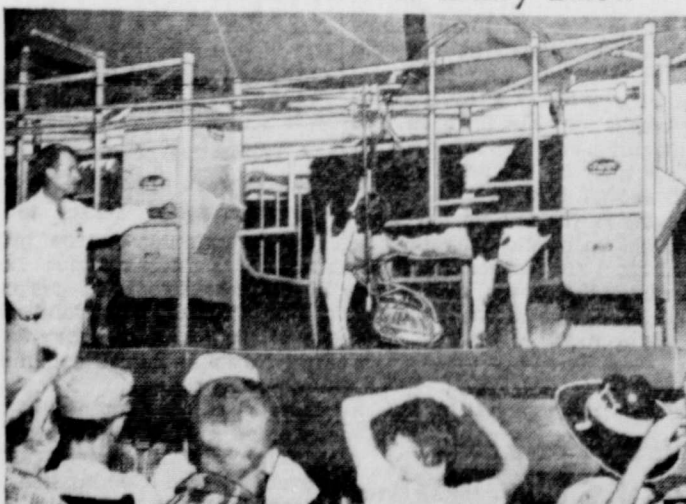
so on; a platter of sliced tomatoes, onions and cucumbers, and a bowl of scalloped, radishes and carrot sticks. The best dessert to follow such a feast is an assortment of fresh fruit, thoroughly chilled.

The whole meal should be accompanied, from start to finish, with coffee of perfectly made steeped coffee, served from an outside pot. Here's the way to be sure of producing a superb brew

Steeped Coffee

Boil as much fresh water as you will need in a big, clean pot, using as a guide the fact that a quart and a half of water will make about eight servings. (Three-quarters of a measuring cup of water is required for each serving.) Then move the pot to one side so that the water remains very hot but is not quite boiling. Add one Standard Coffee Measure, or two level measuring tablespoons, of coffee for each serving. Stir vigorously for half a minute, then let the brew stand for ten minutes to steep and settle. Don't let it boil! A few drops of cold water will settle the grounds. Serve immediately.

Ciscoans were just a little smug and they could afford to be so, last March when they read about the Red Cross roll call being conducted in neighboring cities—our part (\$1750) had already been paid from the Community Chest funds.

Even when an appeal for additional funds went out across the nation to help with the Gamma Globulin program for polio inoculation, our Community Chest treasurer was able to send our share because we had subscribed a reserve fund to our Community Chest for just such emergencies.

The year 1953 saw no Heart Fund containers placed for public contributions because Cisco had already contributed \$100 to the Heart Association—it saw no Salvation Army solicitations in Cisco because we presented the Salvation Army with \$600 early in the year. Of course, we had no separate Cancer Crusade in Cisco nor a USO drive; and our own local organizations were able to do their work better, secure in

the knowledge that the people of Cisco believe that their work is important to the city as evidenced by the support given in the Community Chest.

One New Agency

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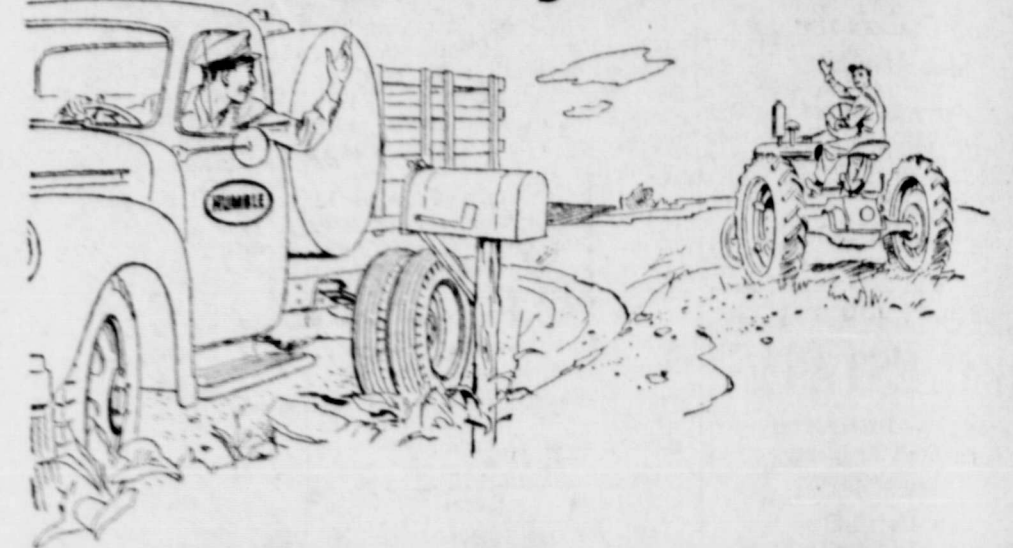
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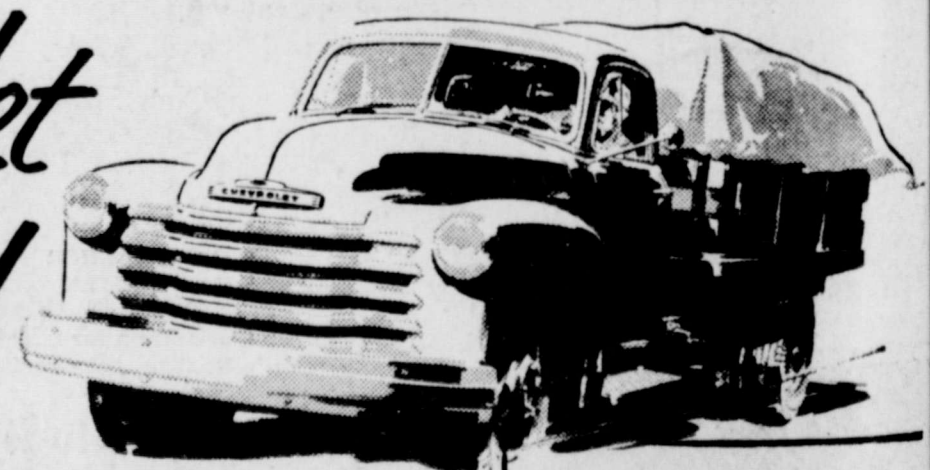
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
