## CWA TO BUILD OKLAHOMA 83

ALLOT \$105,000 FOR WORK ON FEDERAL 83 THROUGH BEAVER COUNTRY IN OKLAHOMA

The old vision of seeing a hard surfaced highway across Beaver County, Oklahoma, on the Federal 83 route is nearer a reality today than it has ever been in the past with the allotment of \$105,000 CWA funds for the building of this important link in this great international highway system that extends from Canada to Mexico.

Highway enthusiasts and Beaver County officials are obtaining a right-of-way from the state line along an old highway survey to the existing up the grade on the north side of the highway from the Kansas state line south to Federal 64 already been started and is in progress. It is planned to put three miles on the highway project when it is all surveyed, according to reports.

With the completion of this unimproved gap in Federal 83, it will practically conclude a highway program, started a number of years ago by the Great Plain Highway Association, calling for an all-weather road from Canada to Mexico.

## Profit With 10c Eggs

Ochiltree County Farmer Shows Profit From Poultry Project In 1933

With \$83.04 in cash and \$32.11 in the form of poultry and eggs eaten at home to show for his flock of 150 hens last year, Curtis Roach, Ochiltree county farmer concludes that a little money can be made from 10-cent eggs. The flock averaged 149 eggs per hen for the year or the A and M Big Five ration which cost an average of 4 cents per dozen eggs, not counting skim milk, reports Guy R. Sheets, County agent. After all cost for building upkeep, interest, hatching and raising 450 chicks and maturing 145 for flock replacement was charged to the hens, it was found that they had made an average net profit of 55 cents per hen.

The Big Five ration used consisted of 200 pounds finely ground wheat 100 pounds ground oats, 100 pounds ground milo, 50 pounds meat meal and all the milk they could drink.

## ALL HONOR TO THE PRESIDENT

ENTIRE NATION UNITING IN HONOR OF ROOSEVELT'S BIRTHDAY; BANQUET AND BALL HERE

Perryton is joining hands with 5,000 other cities in the United States in making preparations for a banquet and ball on Tuesday evening, January 30 honoring the fifty-second birthday of our President, Franklin D. Roosevelt. But the purpose of these parties is far more important than just observing the birthday of the person of national repute.

All profits from these thousands of balls, banquets, and parties go to form an endowment fund for the Warm Springs Foundation at Warm Springs, Ga., an institution founded by President Roosevelt and dedicated to combat the ravages of infantile paralysis among the children of this country.

The plans call for the establishment of similar centers in many other sections of the country and for the carrying on of research work in a national crusade against this dread disease which every year exacts its toll in crippled bodies. It is estimated that 300,000 people in the United States are partly or wholly crippled and of these unfortunate thousands, at least one-half are victims of infantile paralysis.

Max W. Boyer, president of the Young Democrats of Ochiltree County, sponsors of the movement here, announces that a ball will be held at Donley Hall and a banquet at the Hotel Perryton. Radio sets will be installed at each place for the purpose of receiving the personal message of the President and the one hour program to be broadcast to the nation at 10:15. Tickets will sell for one dollar.

## DEAN OF CANYON COLLEGE PRAISES SCHOOL

Professor Frank R. Phillips, Dean of the agricultural department of the West Texas Teachers College, Canyon, was a visitor in Perryton last Friday and while here made a thorough inspection of the Perryton Schools.

Mr. Phillips is also president of the association of school board trustees of the twenty-two northern counties of the Panhandle.

Mr. Phillips was very profuse in his praise of our school system. He stated that never had he seen a school with such a well balanced curriculum and all round course of study. College entrance requirements for both boys and girls are fulfilled. For the boys there are the highly specialized vocational agriculture and manual training departments; for the girls, Mr. Phillips mentioned the home economics and commercial departments.

He stated that from his observations, the Perryton school was planned and operated to serve the Perryton community, and not as a feeder or builder school for some college, as is the case with so many public schools.

The fact that the Perryton school is highly departmentalized also received praise from Phillips. He mentioned the science department in particular.

A. C. Nies, custodian of the Perryton buildings, was complimentary very highly for the excellent condition of the school buildings, both from point of cleanliness and upkeep. Phillips said that he had never seen a building in such good condition.

He also remarked about the honor system which has been installed into the pupils by Superintendent Irvin and his assistants. Thefts are very rare in our schools, and when a window glass or other school property is damaged, the pupils, with very few exceptions, immediately report to some member of the faculty and request that they be allowed to repair the damage.

Mr. Phillips paid high tribute to W. B. Irvin, under whose supervision the Perryton schools have attained such a high ranking.

## CUDD IS SEEKING REELECTION

PRESENT TAX ASSESSOR ASKS FOR ELECTION AS SHERIFF, TAX COLLECTOR AND TAX ASSESSOR

M. M. Cudd, who has served Ochiltree county in a very capable manner for past two terms as Tax Assessor, has announced his candidacy for the office of Sheriff, Tax Collector and Tax Assessor. By a recent act of the Texas legislature, later being ratified by the vote of the people of Texas, the offices of sheriff, tax collector and assessor were combined in counties the size of Ochiltree.

Mr. Cudd, in announcing, states that he is running for re-election to the office in which he is now serving his second term, and that he is not running against any other candidate or candidates. Since the offices of assessor, collector and sheriff have been combined into one, this is the case.

## SMALL FARMER GETS A BREAK

MEAT PROCESSING TAX SUSPENDED ON SELLING OF 800 POUNDS OF PORK DURING ONE YEAR

WASHINGTON, Jan. 11.—The small farmer was given a break today when the Department of Agriculture passed a rule permitting a man to sell 800 pounds of hog meat during the course of a year without having to pay the government processing tax.

In granting this exemption to the "little man", the government has made it possible for the farmer to kill a few hogs during season for home consumption, then realize a little revenue by selling whatever excess meat is on hand, without paying a processing fee. Heretofore, hogs could be killed only for use by the farmer's family, and none could be sold without paying the fee.

Records must be kept on the hogs that are killed, and the number of pounds of meat secured, but it will not be necessary to make a report unless sold. On any amount between 800 and 1,400 pounds, the processing tax will be paid only on that in excess of 800 pounds. If more than 1,400 pounds are sold during the year, no exemption whatever is allowed.

Marvin Jones of Amarillo, who appeared before the Department of Agriculture in behalf of this measure, is largely responsible for its passage.

## International Sunday School Lesson

Lesson III Jan. 21, 1934  
Jesus and His Helpers  
Memory Verse Jno. 2: 25  
I. Residence In Capernaum  
Mt. 4: 12-16

Nazareth was to be the home of our Lord no longer. John no longer preached in the wilderness. Instead he was a prisoner in the fortress of Machabrus, east of the Dead Sea, because he had exposed the wicked life of Herod and Herodias. So with the deceasing of John, Jesus must increase. Hence Nazareth is left, with its memories of the past, is put in the background, and the sea-side town of Capernaum, on the shores of rippling Galilee, becomes the new field for the work of the Christ.

II. The Calling Of Four Fishermen  
Matt. 4: 18-22

No idle men can be used in the service of the Lord. When Jesus set forth to choose followers, he always took men who were busy. The hard toil of a fisherman's life was a good foundation for endurance. A disciple of the Master must be prepared to go through hard places and difficult trials. If he has learned the patience of a fisherman's life, the tediousness of unfruitful hours; if he has mastered the lesson of patience, then he has begun to have the timber and fibre development that will hold when the strain comes.

What a picture Simon and Andrew made as they cast their net into the Sea. Some day they would be casting the life-line of the gos-

pel into the sea of life and rescuing lost men and women. So Jesus said to them, "Come ye after me." On the first Pentecost after resurrection Simon preached the final gospel sermon ever uttered upon earth, and true to the prophecy of Jesus, he became a fisher of men—three thousand men and women heard the message, believed it with their whole hearts, repented of their past sins, made the good confession, and were baptized for the remission of sins.

James and John were in a boat mending their nets when Jesus called them. The remarkable thing about their calling was that they left their father and the nets immediately. When people hold on to something in the world which will prevent their rendering service to Christ, they would do well to take the example of these two sons of Zebedee to heart.

The message of Christ was to make an appeal to the common people. Therefore he chose men from the rank and file of life. They were men who knew what problems and disappointments were. In the school of hard knocks they had learned much that would serve them well in battling the forces of evil. Some day they would be ambassadors of heaven, telling the terms of pardon and law of the christian life to the world. ## CHEVROLET OUT WITH NEW CAR

**"KNEE-ACTION" WHEELS ARE FEATURED IN NEW CHEVROLETS AT SLIGHT PRICE HIKE**

NEW YORK, Jan. 6.—Prices on new 1934 "knee-action" Chevrolets were announced here today by William E. Holler, general sales manager of the company, upon his return from Detroit for the New Automobile show.

Prices on the new line of cars range from \$565 for a five-window coupe, \$605 for a sedan with rumble seat, \$605 for a sedan, \$645 for a town-sedan with trunk, \$615 for a sport roadster with rumble seat, \$545, and a cabriolet with rumble seat, \$665.

These prices represent an average increase of \$70 in list price over the prices of the 1933 Chevrolets. The increase is directly in line with the recent prediction of Alvin Sloan, Jr., president of General Motors, that automobile prices in 1934 would advance approximately 15 per cent; however, the cooperation between Chevrolet and 10,000 dealers, the actual increase in the cost to the purchaser is only 8 per cent.

Mr. Holler points out in his statement, Chevrolet's delivered prices throughout the United States generally, would show an increase of only 8 per cent over the delivered prices which prevailed in 1933. This is made possible by the Chevrolet dealer organization's admirable cooperation in the factory in sharing with the dealer a reduction in profits.

"Delivered prices," said Mr. Holler, "are what the public is interested in because it represents the cost of an automobile standing in the purchaser's home. List prices, of course, are f. o. b. the factory."

It is particularly fitting at this time when the buying public is being reminded to carefully weigh values before making a purchase, to emphasize delivered prices rather than list prices. National delivered prices will vary in different parts of the country, due to differences in freight charges, but the average delivered price will show an increase of approximately 8 per cent.

The decided increases in material and labor costs during the past few months, together with the cost of improvements on the cars, as factors necessitating the increase, Mr. Holler said. He emphasized too strongly the appreciation of Chevrolet toward our 10,000 dealers for their splendid cooperation in making the low delivered prices of the new 1934 Chevrolet.

**Whooping Cough**  
Whooping Cough Is Treacherous Disease; Many Children Die From Disease

Alexander, Texas, Jan. 10.—Whooping cough was formerly regarded as one of the infectious diseases of minor importance. According to Dr. W. Brown, State Health Officer, this is not so. Each year thousands of children die of this disease; it causes more deaths than diphtheria, measles and smallpox combined. Whooping cough is a treacherous disease. It resembles the common cold in its early stages. Gradually, causing parents to be lulled by the fact that the child has only a cold, until the characteristic whoop appears. Unfortunately, the disease is most infectious in the early stages. Children in the first years of life are in the greatest danger of developing pneumonia, the most severe complication.

Chief hope in controlling epidemic of whooping cough lies in measures which help to prevent spread of disease. Children with disease should remain at home in isolation for a period of ten to fifteen days. Children with disease should be reported to family physician or local health officer.

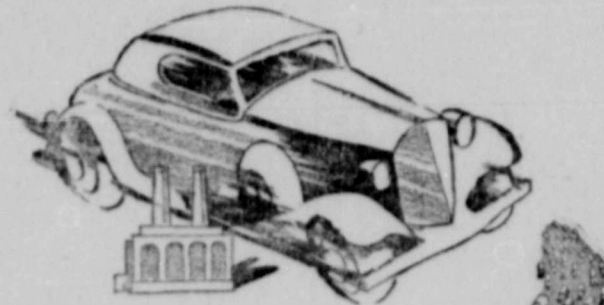

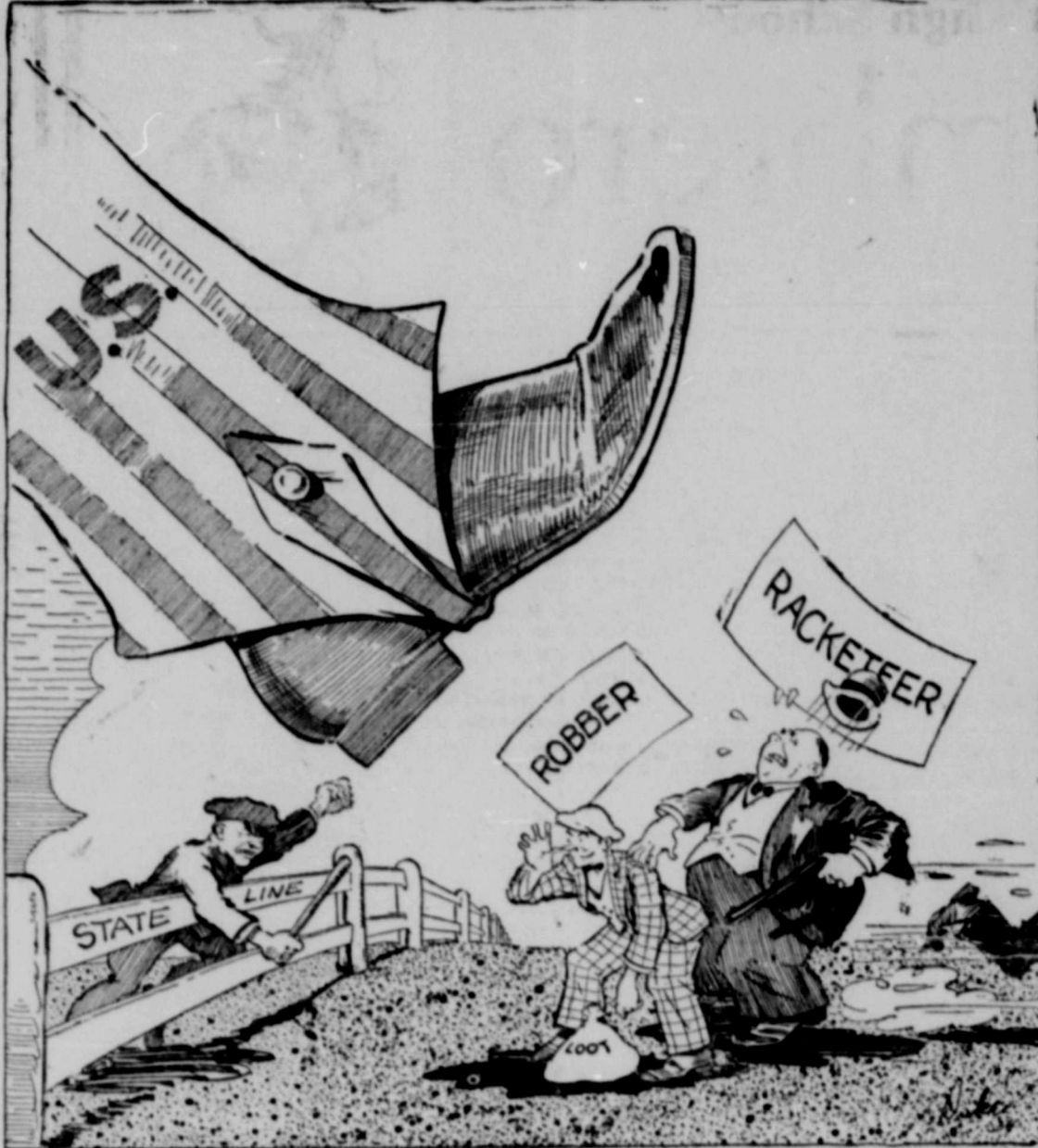

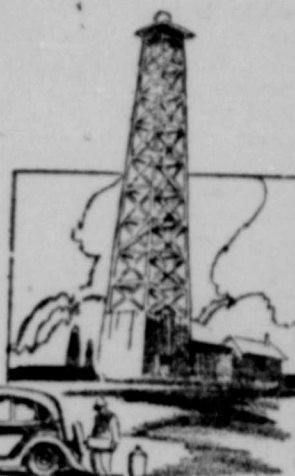

## Political Calendar Sets First Primary On July 28

1934 Brings Elections for All Officials in Texas, Constable To Governor

The political calendar for 1934 set the date for the first primary on July 28 of this year.

With much interest in the political situation, it appears that candidates are going to begin announcing earlier than usual, and that there will be a "healthy crop" in Randall county. Here are the dates which should be kept in mind by the voter and candidate:

Jan. 31—Last day to pay poll tax.  
Feb. 12—Election judges appointed by Commissioners Court.

April 1—On or before this date, tax collectors furnish county election boards with list of poll tax payers and exemptions.

June 4—On or before this date, candidates for party nominations for state and district offices shall file applications for place on primary ballot.

June 6—On or before this date, candidates for party nominations for offices to be filled by voters of a single county or a portion thereof and candidates for county chairmen shall file legal applications with the county chairmen for places on ballot.

June 18—County executive committees meet at county seat to determine by lot the order of names on primary ballots, estimate the cost of printing the official ballots and other expenses incident to the holding of the election, and apportion the cost among the various candidates (except candidates for state offices); name a sub-committee of five members to make up the ballot; decide whether the nomination of county officers shall be by majority or plurality votes. If the committee fails to decide, then the nomination shall be by a plurality of votes cast. (Run-off for state or district offices is mandatory if no candidate receives a majority in the first primary.) Arts. 3108 and 2117 R. S.)

June 25—On or before this date candidates must pay ballot fees.

June 28—First day to file first statement of campaign expenses.

July 3—Last day to file first statement of campaign expenses.

**Absent Voting**

July 8—First day for qualified voters, who are away from county of their residence, to make application for absentee ballot.

July 9—Subcommittee appointed June 18 shall meet and make up official ballot for primary.

July 16—First day to file second statement of campaign expenses.

July 18—Last day for qualified voters who are away from county residence, to make request for official ballot to vote absentee ballot.

July 18—First day any qualified voter within county expected to be absent election day may appear before county clerk and vote an absentee ballot.

July 20—Last day to file second statement of campaign expenses.

July 23—On or before this date tax collectors shall deliver to the chairman of the county executive committee list of qualified voters in each precinct in the county, arranged alphabetically and by precincts.

July 24—Last day for one within county expecting to be absent election day to vote absentee ballot.

July 28—Primary election day. Election open from 8 a. m. to 7 p. m. except in counties over 150,000; it is open from 7 a. m. to 7 p. m.)

July 28—Third and final statement of campaign expenses in first primary may be filed. Last day allowed Aug. 7.

Aug. 1—Presiding judges of election, which make returns first primary on or before this date to county chairmen.

Aug. 1—Not more than 30 days nor less than 25 days before second primary, first statement of campaign expenses must be filed. This is the last day for that statement.

Aug. 5—Qualified voters outside the county of their residence expecting to be absent on election day shall arrange to vote absentee ballot in the same manner as required in first primary under date of July 8.

Aug. 7—Final statement of campaign expenses in the first primary election must be filed on or before this date.

Aug. 15—First day for absentee balloting by those within county of residence but expect to be away on day of election.

Aug. 15—Last day for those outside the county of residence to make requests for absentee ballot.

Aug. 21—Last day to vote absentee ballot by those within county of residence but expecting to be absent election day.

Aug. 25—Second primary election day (runoff), also district convention day.

Aug. 29—On or before this date presiding judges shall make returns to county chairmen.

Sept. 1—County executive committees meet and canvass returns of second primary election.

Sept. 4—On or before this date

final report of campaign expenses must be filed. State convention day to announce platforms of principles and nominations.

## TO ORGANIZE FOR GREATER BUYING POWER



THROUGH their county corn-hog control associations, American farmers can follow the pathway to increased purchasing power for corn and hogs. Under the corn-hog reduction plan, they can organize to control production and they will receive the full benefits for their efforts. Although the Agricultural Adjustment Administration is charged by

law with the responsibility of directing the corn-hog reduction program, the actual sign-up of contracts and the local administration will be in the hands of the corn-hog control associations which will be organized in major corn-producing counties by contract signers. Each farmer who signs a reduction contract becomes a member of the association and

is entitled to a vote in its affairs. The Board of Directors of the County Corn-Hog Control Association will be composed of representatives from the county, elected by contracting producers, themselves. In each community a permanent committee of three to five members also will be elected by farmers.

### FARNSWORTH MEETING CLOSED SUNDAY NITE

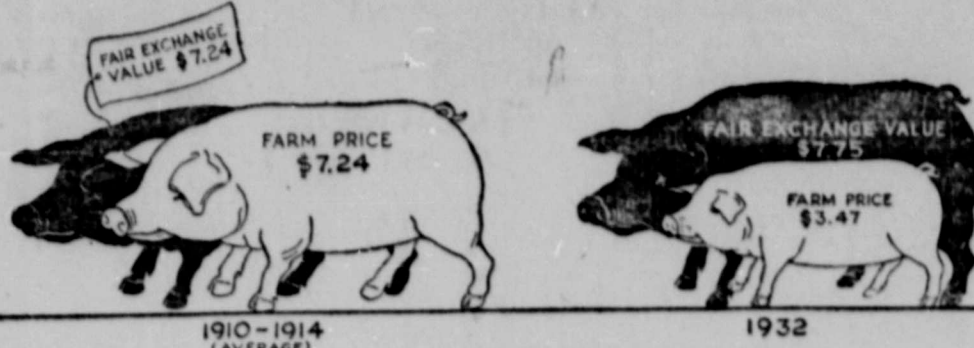

## FARM PRICE OF HOGS AND FAIR EXCHANGE VALUE



IN the pre-war period (1910-14) the farm price of \$7.24 per hundredweight and the fair exchange value were one and the same. When prices at the farm are again high enough to give live hogs the same purchasing power they had in the pre-war period, then they will be equal to the fair exchange value of hogs. Fair exchange value at any given time is the amount (represented in the cartoon by black pigs) which repre-

sents what hogs have to bring in order to give them the pre-war purchasing power with respect to prices of commodities farmers buy. Largely because of a lack of balance between supply and demand, hog prices since the World War have averaged the fair exchange value only in one year (1926) when it happened that the size of the hog crop was considerably decreased. In 1932 the farm price of hogs averaged only \$3.47 per hundredweight, but

as the prices of commodities farmers buy averaged a little higher than their pre-war level, the fair exchange value in 1932 was proportionately higher, or \$7.75 per hundredweight. The disparity, therefore, was \$4.28 per hundredweight. Adjustment of hog production under the Agricultural Adjustment Act in 1934 will help wipe out this disparity and again restore hog prices to the fair exchange value.
