Producers Faced With Many Decisions

According to Texas Agricultural Extension Service specialists at the Texas A&M University Agricultural Research and Extension Center at Overton, decisions made in the next four to six weeks are

critical to the agricultural economy for the next year. To be considered are weather, markets, oil imports, consumer buying habits, energy and government policy. All of these factors are important to the

outlook for agricultural commodities. Wayne Taylor, Extension area economist-management, says that small grain and ryegrass pastures this winter will cost in excess of \$100 per acre. The amount of gain a

producer is able to put on stocker calves will greatly determine profits from grazing calves on winter pasture. Also, the prices paid to purchase the calves and the projected sale price next spring must be taken into account.

Taylor indicates that the supply of calves to go on winter pasture may be short. The situation could be further complicated this year because the calves being weaned are heavier due to better forage conditions during the spring and summer.

To avoid buying these fleshier calves, buyers might wait until September or October to purchase calves. Generally, calves weaned during these two months are lighter and not carrying as much flesh as earlier weaned calves. If buyers wait too long, however, the supply of calves could be a problem.

As a producer, it may be best to sell calves that are being weaned in August and early September at 500 pounds or more. These calves will lose considerable weight before winter pastures are ready for grazing, thus they will be required to regain that weight. The final decision depends on the individual producer's situation and desires.



One Brother Survives Talco Wreck

James Robert Wright, Talco, was killed in a car-truck accident at 8:30 a.m. Sunday, July 29, on FM 71 one mile east of Talco.

Larry Cochran, a passenger in the Datsun station wagon which Robert Wright was driving was taken to the Titus County Memorial Hospital in critical condition. James Carl Morgan, a passenger in the dump truck driven by Todd Wright, Robert's brother was also taken to Memorial Hospital, and released Monday according to a hospital spokesman.

Todd Wright suffered minor injuries. The vehicles were traveling west on FM 71, going from their father's office to clear land for the site of an oil well. Officers said James Robert turned his station wagon around and was returning to town when

he met his brother in the dump truck.

"Todd said the brakes on his dump truck grabbed when he tried to stop," Highway Patrolman Ira Covington said. "We don't know what happened, but it appears the truck was on the wrong side of the road."

Proper Home Medicine Storage Important

Preventing medicine from Grant Awarded For Lankford Lake Improvements

Senator Lloyd Bentsen was advised Monday that The Heritage Conservation and Recreation Service had awarded a grant of \$147,100.00 to Lankford Lake Recreation area in Clarksville.

Funds are to be used to develop the area and will include roads, parking, restrooms and concession buildings, swimming area, picnic area, multipurpose court, tennis courts, ball field, playground, water fountains and area lighting.

Clarksville is providing an additional \$146,600.00 and the State \$500.00 toward the project making a total of \$294,200.00.

Highway Use Tax Return

To Be Filed

August 31, 1979, is the date by which most owners of large trucks, truck-tractors, or buses must file a Federal Highway Use Tax Return, Form 2290, the Internal Revenue Services says.

The tax year for the Highway Use Tax begins July 1, 1979, and runs through the following June 30, 1980. Vehicles placed in service after July must have Form 2290 filed with the taxpayer's Service Center by the last day of the month following the month a vehicle is used on a public highway for the first time.

According to the IRS, the tax generally applies to single unit trucks weighing 13,000 pounds or more, 2-axled truck-tractors weighing 5,500 pounds or more, 3 or more axled truck-tractors regardless of weight, trucks of 9,000 or more pounds equipped for use in combinations, and buses with a gross weight of more than 26,000 pounds.

Revenue from the Highway Use Tax Program assists states in financing the Interstate Highway System, but the tax is imposed on those vehicles using any public highways, city streets, state roads and interstate roadways.

Form 2290 and the free IRS Publication 349, "Federal Highway Use Tax on Trucks, Truck-tractors, and Buses," are available from IRS District Offices.

speed deterioration of many drugs, especially tablets and powders. Vitamins are often sold in dark plastic containers to protect them from light. In general, drugs need protection from intense light, heat and moisture. Some may need refrigeration.

The bathroom, a popular place to store medicines, is often steamy and warm. The kitchen presents a better atmosphere, if the drugs are stored away from the stove, not above the refrigerator, and the kitchen is well ventilated. Cabinets with a special section used only for drugs should be clearly marked and set apart from regular food storage.

Wherever drugs are kept, a prime consideration is that they are out of reach of young children.

Some signs of deterioration may help consumers know when medicines shouldn't be used anymore. Aspirin: a vinegar-like odor or the tablet may be puffy or have a change in color. Liquid or syrup medicine: cloudy, residue collected on the bottom, and

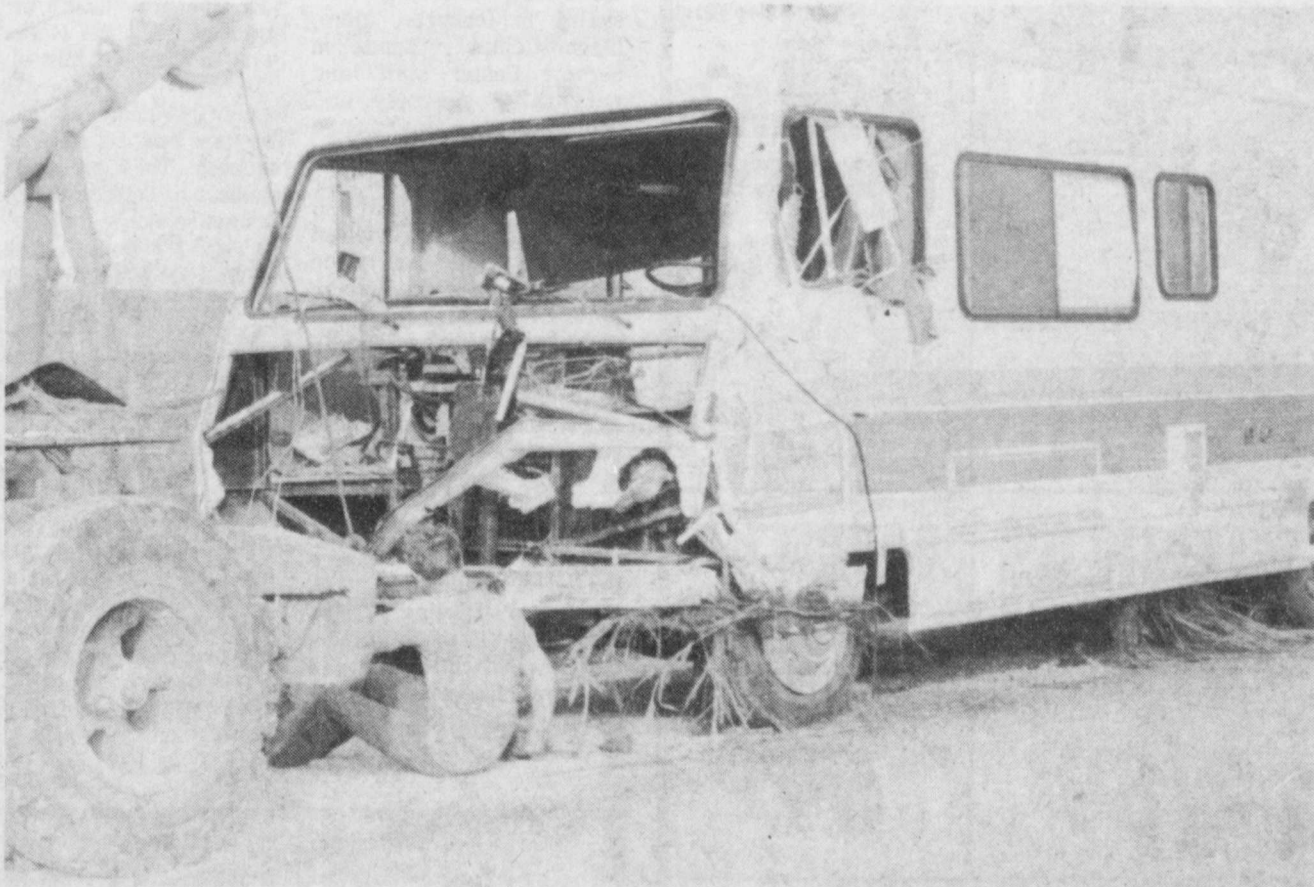

Project SPICY Workshop Held

A workshop was conducted the week of July 9 at Region VIII Education Service Center titled Project SPICY (Severely and Profoundly Impaired Children and Youth) by Dr. Les Sternberg and Mrs. Sylvia Jenkins from the University of Texas at Dallas' Special Education Department. SPICY, based at UTD is one of only ten national demonstration projects for severely and

profoundly handicapped children. Region VIII offered the workshop on teaching these handicapped children in a public school setting to special education teachers and support staff. Monte Parker, Resource and Referral Specialist for Region VIII said, "First hand experience was received by the participants who worked directly with severely and profoundly handicapped children at the workshop in new methods of behavior management and language communication. We had 19 participants at the week-long sessions consisting of teachers, aides, diagnosticians, Education Service Center staff, and parents of severely and profoundly handicapped children. We discussed the use of new equipment, the role of the occupational and physical therapist, reviewed resource and reference material, ways to involve parents more, reactions-problems of other family members, and the relationship of teachers, aides, therapists, etc. in a public school setting for the severely and profoundly handicapped child. We are discovering that it is a misconception to believe that these children are limited in learning. These severely and profoundly handicapped children are a great deal like us in that we are always in need of new learning experiences."

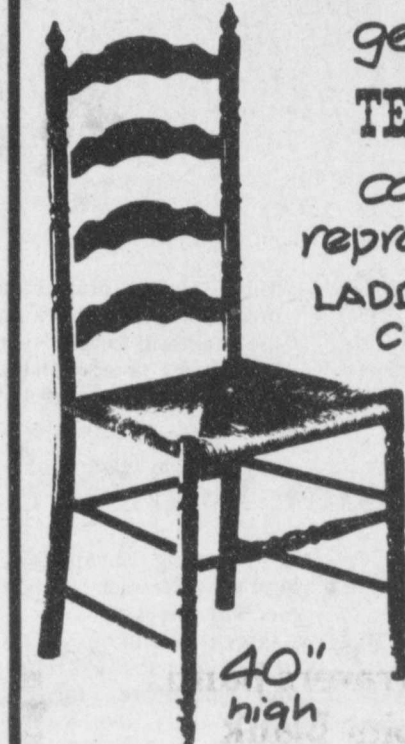

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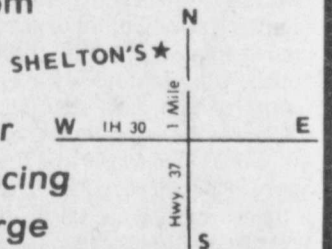
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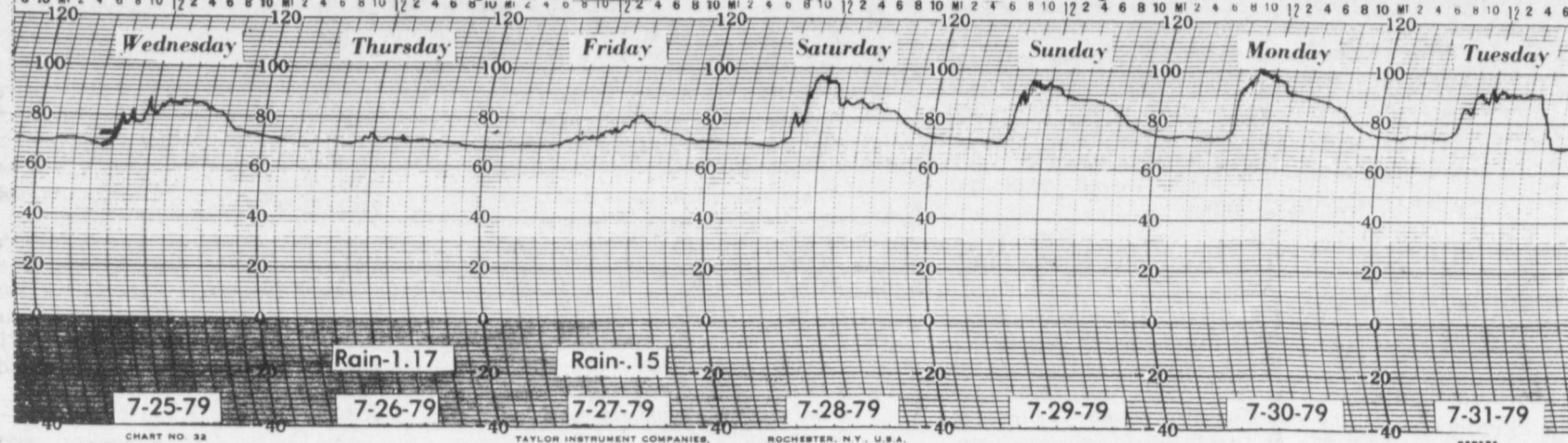
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Weather Recorded In Deport, Texas During Past Seven Days

East Texas Eating

This summer's fresh, red-ripe tomatoes make marvelous tomato sauce.

Today's recipe-Fresh Tomato Sauce-is easy and fairly quick. The resulting sauce is a bright satiny red, slightly thickened sauce that has a full fresh tomato flavor. It freezes or cans well.

Several seasons of experimenting with different tomato sauce recipes and keeping an eye open for pointers have yielded these helpful tips:

1. Start with fully ripe, very red tomatoes. The Italian plum type, such as Roma, help to give body or thickness to the sauce, but they are hard to find.

2. Cook the sauce in a stainless steel or enamel lined pan or kettle. Do not

use aluminum because aluminum reacts with the acid in the tomatoes and dulls the bright red color.

3. Put the slightly cooked tomatoes through a sieve or food mill to remove the seeds and skins. Do not use a food processor or blender-or the seed will be crushed and the color and flavor clouded.

4. Forty-five minutes to an hour at most is sufficient cooking time to blend the flavors of the ingredients. Longer cooking time will reduce the sauce slightly, but yields a less fresh tasting flavor.

5. Additional seasonings such as garlic, parsley, thyme, carrot, and celery may be cooked with the tomatoes and the whole mixture put through the sieve or food mill. The carrot and celery may dull the color slightly. The herb flavorings

tend to become more intense in frozen or canned tomato sauce. I've decided that, for me, the Fresh Tomato Sauce recipe is easier, quicker, more versatile, and more likely to get made. I add the other ingredients when they are needed for a specific recipe.

Fresh Tomato Sauce
4-pounds fully ripe, very red tomatoes.

½ cup butter.
1-large onion, peeled and halved.

2 to 3 teaspoons salt.
¼ teaspoon sugar.

1 pimento pepper, seeded and halved (optional)

Wash tomatoes and cut into chunks.

Cook tomatoes and butter over medium-low heat for about 15 minutes.

Put the mixture through a sieve or food mill.

Cook the sieved sauce mixture with the onion, pimento pepper, salt and sugar at a very slow simmer for 45 to 60 minutes. Makes 5 to 6 cups.

Fresh Tomato Sauce may be used in any recipe that calls for tomato sauce.

I like to freeze a supply for year-round use. One or two cup portions are handy sizes to have in the freezer or on the shelf. The sauce may be canned using the hot water bath method, as you would can tomato juice.
