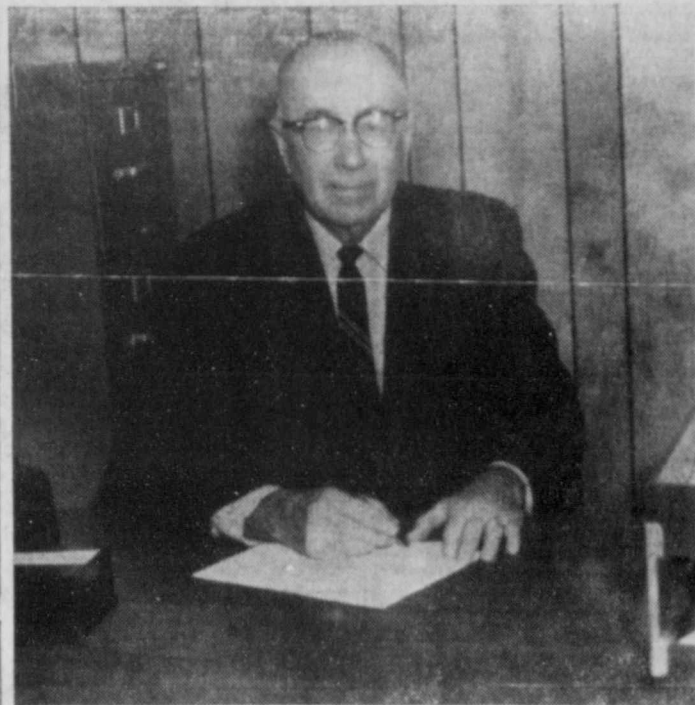
Six girls from Goldthwaite Jr. High and Freshman classes will be on hand to present ribbons.

The seventh and eighth grade teams placed third in the District 9-A junior track meet at Bangs last Thursday night. Cross Plains placed first and Early came in second. The Eagle freshman team took fourth place in their division, with Early capturing first place.

Goldthwaite winners in the seventh and eighth grade division included Roy Watters who too first in the 880-yard run with a time of 2:21.8; Johnny Miller, first place winner in the 60-yard high hurdles with a time of 9.9; and Mark Wiggins who did 21 pull-ups to take first place.

Freshman Gary Summy won the shot put in the freshman division with a throw of 43' 1".

Open house will be observed this coming Sunday, April 20, for the Goldthwaite low-rent housing units which were recently completed and are now in the process of being occupied by tenants.

The public is being invited to visit the new units and inspect them Sunday afternoon from 2 to 4 p. m., according to announcement by the Housing Authority officials.

Clyde Cockrum, executive director, and L. B. Burnham, chairman of the housing authority board of commissioners, stated this week that they hope many will come to visit the housing units during this open house and see first hand what they are like.

The open house will give local residents and visitors an opportunity to visit both the housing units for the elderly and those for low-income families. It will also provide interested parties an opportunity to ask any questions they may have regarding the housing project.

The 36 unit project includes 24 units for the elderly and 12 units for low income families. All units are of duplex design with two units to a building and of brick veneer construction. They are located on two sites.

Office for the entire project is located at the corner of East Front and Sixth Streets.

The 24 units for the elderly are located on two blocks of ground located between East Front and Lynch Streets. The property was formerly known as the old Greathouse Gin location. All of the units for the elderly are of one bedroom design.

The 12 units for low income families are located on a block of land acquired from Mrs. W. E. Fairman. It is located between West 5th and 6th Streets bounded by Roseman St., and McIntosh on the East and West. These units are of two and three bedroom design.

Good heavy soaking rains covered the entire Mills County area during the past week with some un-official reports of measuring up to four inches.

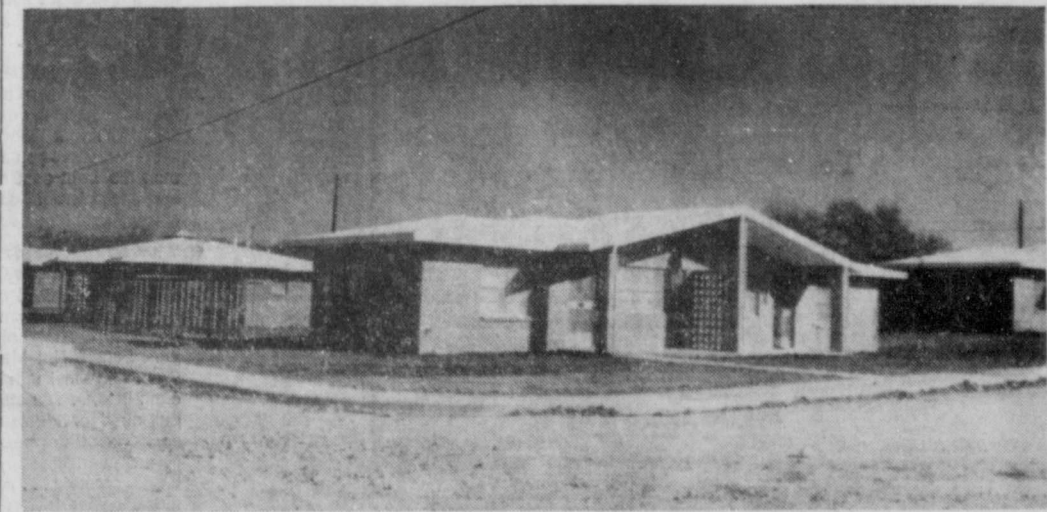
Goldthwaite received 3.31 inches of precipitation, according to report from official Weatherman Harry Allen.

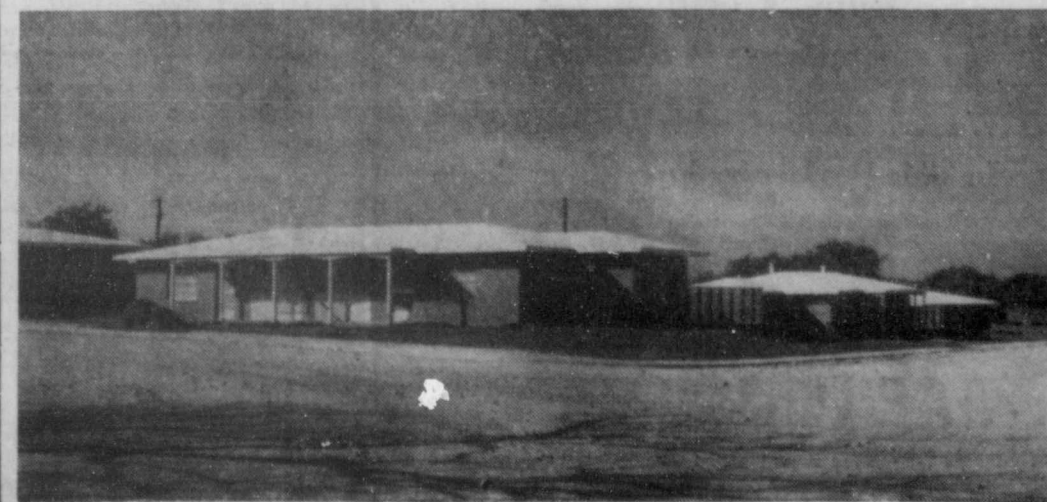
BANK HOLIDAY NEXT MONDAY

Mills County State Bank will be closed next week Monday, April 21, in observance of San Jacinto Day.

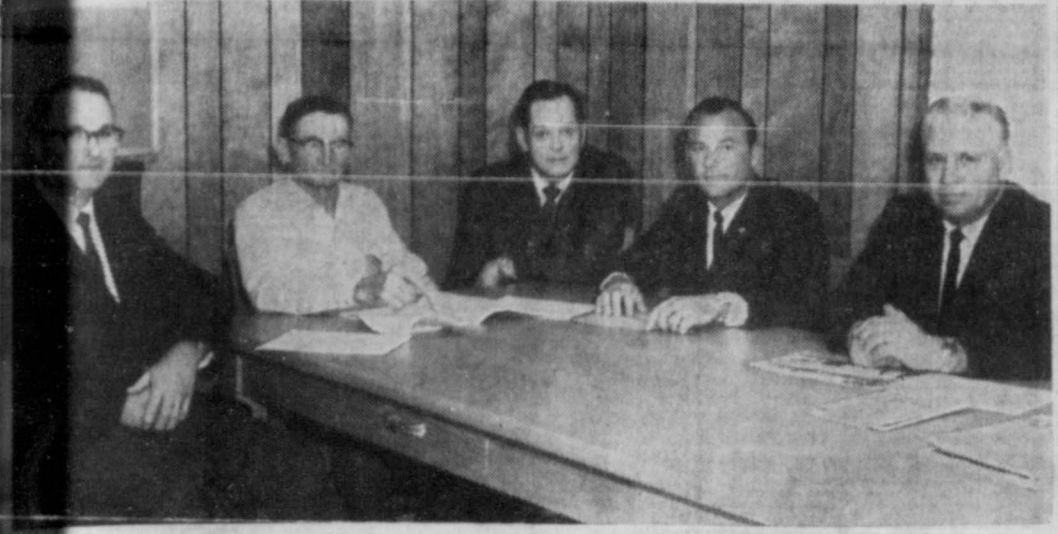
This is one of the regular Texas bank holidays that are observed during the year.

Notaries Public Should File With County Clerk For Re-Appointment

Secretary of State Martin Dies, Jr. announced that all qualified Notaries Public desiring re-appointment for the new term which begins June 1, 1969 and ends June 1, 1971, must pay the required fee and file a new oath and bond with the County Clerk between May 1, 1969 and

May 15, 1969, inclusive.

Mr. Dies emphasized that Notaries Public should NOT send requests for re-appointment or for commissions directly to the Secretary of State inasmuch as the law specifically requires that the County Clerk approve Notary Bonds and forward copies of the Application to the Secretary of State.

Secretary of State Dies further stated that any person not now a Notary Public who desires appointment for the beginning of the new term on June 1, 1969, should apply to his County Clerk before May 15, 1969. The applicant must be at least 21 years of age, a citizen of the United States of America and Texas, and a resident of the county for which appointed. The required Application Forms may be obtained from the County Clerk.

Half Million Dollars Issued To County Wool & Mohair Producers

Payments under the national wool program made to wool and mohair producers in Mills County for the past year amounted to more than one-half million dollars, according to announcement by Bob Jarvis, office manager of the Mills County ASCS.

Last of the checks were mailed out this week.

The payments were broken down as follows:

WOOL	\$231,500
MOHAIR	\$276,170
TOTAL	\$507,670

Wool payments were made to 589 producers while mohair payments went to 402 producers.

Shorn wool payments were made at the rate of 65.4 per cent of the dollar returns each grower received from the sale of shorn wool marketed during 1968. Mohair growers received payments at the rate of 71.2 per cent of returns each grower received from the sale of mohair.

Each grower's wool payment is determined by multiplying his dollar return from sale of

wool (less marketing charges) by the payment rate of 65.4 per cent. For each \$100 in sales returns, the grower receives an incentive payment of \$65.40. The grower who gets the best possible market price for his wool also gets a high incentive payment and is thus encouraged to improve the quality and marketing of his wool.

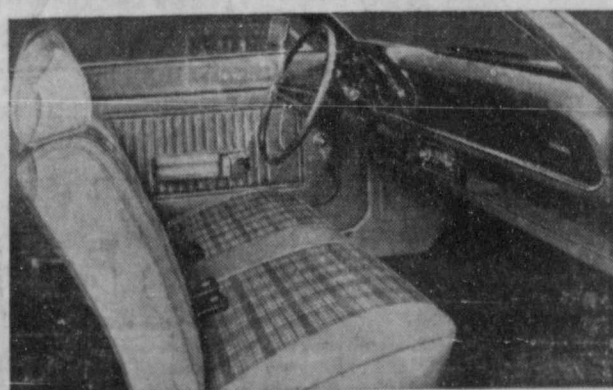
The payment rate for wool is based on the difference between the incentive price of 67 cents and the national average price of 40.5 cents received by growers.

The payment rate on unshorn lambs sold or slaughtered during the 1968 marketing year is \$1.06 a hundredweight. This compares with the 1967 rate of \$1.05 a hundredweight. Payment on sales of live lambs that have never been shorn is made to discourage unusual shearing of lambs before marketing. It is based on the payment rate for shorn wool, average weight of wool per hundred-weight of lambs, and value of lamb's wool relative to the value of shorn wool.

The payment rate on mohair marketed in 1968 is based on the difference between the Support price of 77.4 cents and the average price of 45.2 cents a pound received by growers.

JAYCEES INSTALL NEW DRINKING FOUNTAIN IN HIGH SCHOOL GYM

A new refrigerated drinking water cooler has been purchased by the Goldthwaite Jaycees and installed in the foyer of the High School Gym. The new cooler replaces the old drinking fountain which leaked and caused a wet floor during any functions at the gym.

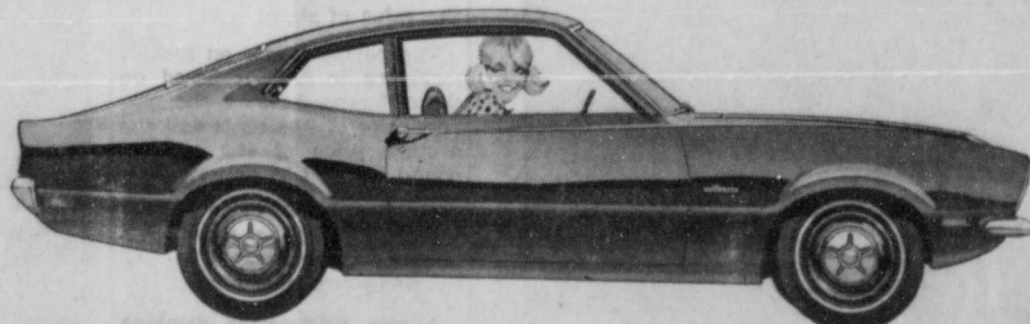

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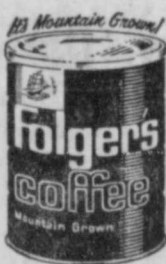

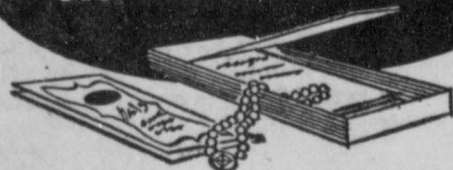

**Property Tax And Assessment Study
Released By Education Committee**

The Committee on Public School Education today released a study of property tax values and assessment practices for all school districts in Texas. The study was made for the Committee by Mr. Charles Bartlett, and the report includes estimates of the ratios of assessed value to market value for seven broad classes of property, compared to the ratios claimed by the various districts.

The Bartlett estimates include ratios of assessed to market value for (1) undeveloped land, (2) commercial and industrial properties, (3) business personal property, (4) utilities, (5) banks, (6) oil and gas properties, and (7) residences. The report also shows the average assessment ratio for all classes and indicates whether or not the individual district assesses privately-owned automobiles. In addition, the average assessed value per acre of undeveloped land is listed for each district.

Committee Chairman Leon Jaworski stated that the Bartlett report was being released at the request of Senator A. R. Schwartz and Representative DeWitt Hale, co-sponsors of legislation designed to implement the Committee's proposed long-range plan. Chairman Jaworski explained that the report had not been made public at an earlier date because disclosure of the wide variation in assessment practices for various classes of property in many districts could lead to litigation. "The purpose of the Bartlett

study was to provide an accurate estimate of the taxable property in every district as a basis for equitable distribution of State financial aid," Mr. Jaworski stated. "This objective does not require equalization among various classes of property within a given district, and it certainly does not require that every district assess property at market value. Having established district-wide market values, our Committee was reluctant to publish data on ratios by class of property which might lead to embarrassment for many local districts. However, we recognized that it might be necessary to release the Bartlett study data in order to establish its validity," Mr. Jaworski concluded.

Senator Schwartz and Representative Hale explained that they had requested the Com-

mittee to release the Bartlett report because some members of the Legislature felt they could not evaluate the proposed program of State financial aid unless they had access to the detailed estimates and procedures. "We realize that publication of assessment ratios showing, for example, that some districts assess banks at a lower rate than residences — or vice versa — is not necessarily germane to the measurement of a local district's total taxable values," the legislators stated.

"We realize, also, that the publication of such data may expose some districts to charges of discrimination and perhaps to legal action. However, we believe the citizens of this State have a right to know the facts about the taxes they are required to pay in support of public education. And we think the members of the Texas Legislature have both a right to know the facts and an obligation to take appropriate action," Senator Schwartz and Representative Hale declared.
