Four persons from Anderson, Ind., were injured shortly after noon Tuesday when their car apparently went out of control in the east bound lane of Interstate 20, smashed through the railing and caught onto the bridge on the west bound bridge over Dorn Road. The pictures show the sequence of events: Top--Freeway view of the wreck with front half of car jetting into the air above overpass. Middle--Views wrecked car from Dorn Road below overpass.

Notice the steering wheel, ripped from the car, has fallen onto Dorn Road. Bottom--Shows the car hanging on overpass railing post with a milk coat hanging out the window. Occupants of the auto were Mr. and Mrs. Beecker Kurtz, 61 and 63 and Mr. and Mrs. Kenneth Ballinger, 65 and 61. Mr. Ballinger was dismissed after treatment at Root Memorial Hospital and the others were transferred to an Abilene hospital.



Barber Is Candidate

Perry Barber On Demo Ballot

Perry Barber has filed as candidate for county attorney on the Democratic Party primary election ballot.

County Democratic Chairman Tom Rees Wednesday confirmed that Barber had become a candidate with a ballot place.

Barber, who practiced law here for a long period of years before moving to Abilene and Houston in recent years, is the lone candidate at present for the county office being vacated by his nephew, Dan Barber.

With his official candidacy and his experience as assistant district attorney in both Abilene and Houston, Perry Barber also becomes a prime prospect for appointment to the attorney's post when it is vacated by his nephew.

Commissioners Court is expected to discuss the county attorney's office next Tuesday in its regular meeting. That is

when Dan Barber's written resignation will be placed before the court.

Dan Barber submitted his resignation, effective April 1, last week in a letter to Commissioners Court.

In his letter, the present county attorney recommended his uncle, Perry Barber, to succeed him when he left the office April 1.

At the same time, Democratic Chairman Rees said the resignation necessitated an extension in the filing period for the May Democratic Party primary ballot for the place of county attorney. That additional filing period is for 15 days ending March 15.

There is a six-months residence requirement listed in the Texas Election Code for candidates and appointees to the county office. However, this is not expected to conflict with

Perry Barber's candidacy or his possible appointment because he began his move back to Colorado City last August.

A Commissioners Court appointment to fill the county attorney's post will be a necessity for the interim period between Dan Barber's April 1

resignation and the finalizing of the 1972 elections.

Dan Barber already is preparing for the move of his office from the second floor of the Courthouse to the downtown offices of his father, Dell Barber, with whom he will return to the private practice of law.

Rose Named In Felony Charge

Another criminal charge has been filed against Sylvester Rose of Loraine.

The new case accuses Rose of theft of three head of cattle from C. A. Rees.

And it adds to the legal box score that now has pending against Rose 2 misdemeanor counts in County Court and 2 felony cases at the higher District Court level.

Although filed only Tuesday in Precinct 1 Leonard Henderson's Justice of Peace Court, the latest charge accuses Rose of fraudulently taking possession of three of Rees' cattle last Aug. 21.

The pair of cases pending against Rose in Court allege possession and sale of intoxicants within a dry area and were filed last November.

A second felony charge pending in District Court accuses Rose of receiving stolen tires from a person who already has pleaded guilty in 32nd District Court to tire theft.

And, another misdemeanor case -- worthless check writing -- against Rose was dismissed Jan. 19 in County Court after the defendant made restitution.

The Loraine man's wife, Opal Rose, two weeks ago was found not guilty by a County Court jury when tried for bootlegging--possession and sale of intoxicants. However, she still faces another possession and sale charge filed in the same court last December.

A daughter of the Roses, Florida, also is accused of bootlegging in a County Court case filed Nov. 24 and still pending.

Jury Awards \$15,400

To Widow Of Heart Victim

A jury in 32nd District Court Tuesday awarded \$15,400 to the widow of a man who died following a heart attack suffered while at work.

The award was to Mrs. Helen Powell of Colorado City, whose husband, William T. Powell, died April 9, 1970.

Defendant in the civil suit before District Judge Weldon Kirk was Trinity Universal Insurance Company.

Powell was stricken with a heart attack April 7, 1970, while at his job at the Col-Text Station, East Second at Hickory, when it was owned by Leroy Henderson and Valton Cawthron.

At the time of the heart attack, Powell was attempting to break lose a clogged shackle while greasing a motor vehicle.

The plaintiff contended that the exertion while working on the grease job was contributory to the fatal illness.

The defendant insurance company contended that Powell had a diseased heart and that heart disease was the sole cause of Powell's death.

Judge Kirk accepted the jury's verdict that decided that heart disease was not the sole cause of his death. Included in the verdict were answers to 5 special issues presented to the jury.

Testimony in the trial did not reveal a history of heart illness for Powell, but did reveal other illness that could contribute to a heart ailment.

Attorneys for the plaintiff

were Dell Barber and Dan Barber. Representing the insurance company was J. M. Lee.

The insurance firm did not immediately declare whether or not it would appeal the verdict.

Hopkins Only Wolf Named

Jerome Hopkins, 6-foot, 4-inch Colorado High School senior, for the second year in a row, has been named to the District 3-AAA all-district team.

District coaches met in Snyder Monday to cast ballots on their selection for the all-district squad. Ten players were selected with 11 honorable mentions.

While Hopkins, among the top scorers in the district, was the only Colorado City player named to the top 10, two other Wolves, Melvin Jackson and David Matthews, received honorable mention.

Jackson, a 5-foot, 11-inch junior, was one of the top scorers in the district. He along with Matthews, a 6-foot, 5-inch, senior were the playmakers for the Wolves as they set up plays from the outside.

Hopkins and Matthews were the top rebounders for the Wolves and Matthews awed the crowd with his jumping ability as he jumped center and often blocked shots by opponents.

Three players rated a unanimous selection in the balloting. Those were Lamesa's Kent McCurley, a 6-3 sophomore; Van Garner, a 6-7 senior from Brownfield, and Tommy Washington, Snyder's 5-11 senior.

The construction in Mitchell County calls for the expenditure of \$171,500 for a total of 0.4 miles between south of Colorado City and the Coke County line.

The construction will consist of widening bridges and approaches.

The 1971 cotton season has finally ended.

County Agent Bobby Lemons reported Tuesday that the final bale county totaled 18,665.

During last fall's farm tour, Mrs. Harry Dockrey estimated that the total bale count would be 18,643 and that was the closest estimate.

While the 1971 cotton crop was not as good as hoped for, higher than usual prices for cotton allowed 1971 to be about the same as 1970, money wise.

But what the total figures don't tell is the wear-and-tear on the nerves of farmers during this last year.

Farmers have enough worries during regular years. But 1971 was far from normal.

It started out much too dry, then in July, August and September, it was too wet, an unusual worry for West Texas farmers.

Then in the fall, it didn't get hot enough to mature the cotton so farmers had to worry about when the first freeze would hit and they just hoped it would be late.

Fortunately, the freeze was later than usual, although some farmers wanted it to be even later.

Despite the fact that you haven't heard much about the Colorado City Industrial Team lately, its members have been hard at work, especially Charles Root, member of the team and chairman of the Chamber of Commerce's committee on industrial development.

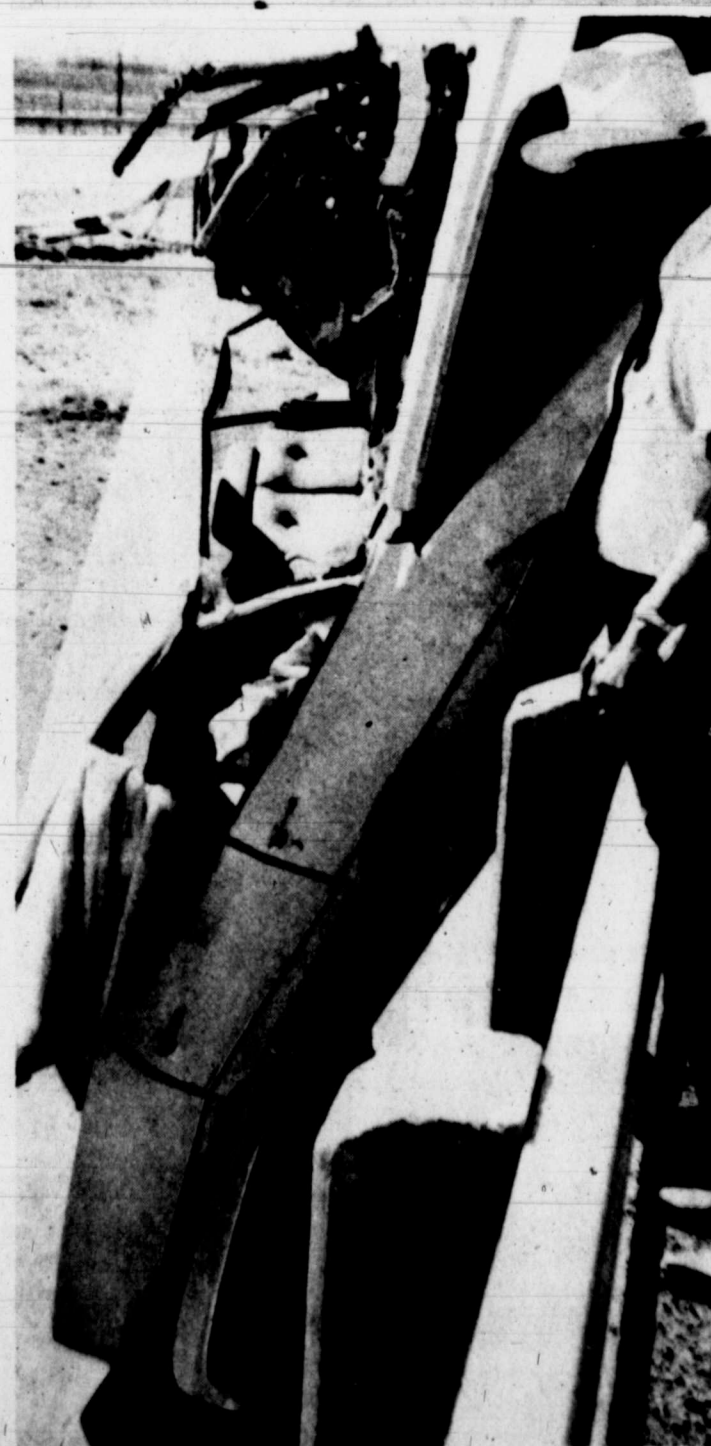
The Team held a meeting Tuesday and another meeting is scheduled for this morning (Thursday) with an official from the Small Business Administration.
