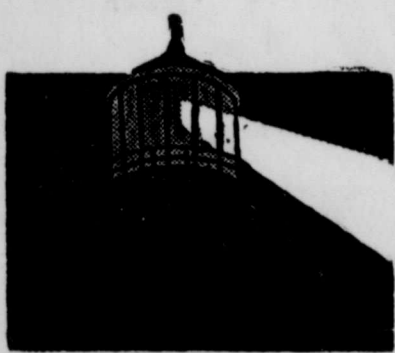

Former Lorainian Helping Make America Musical

John W. King, Jr., a graduate of Loraine High School with the class of 1939 and son of Mr. and Mrs. J. W. King, Sr. of Loraine, has been awarded a high honor by the School Musician in its October 1965 issue. The School Musician is the professional magazine for directors, teachers, students, and parents.

The magazine in closing an article giving an account of events connected with King's teaching experience had this to say: "The School Musician Director and Teacher Magazine is proud to welcome John W. King, Jr., of Hale Center, Texas to the list of distinguished persons whom the magazine feels are the ten most outstanding directors in America for the 1965-66 school year. He is truly helping in the great work of 'Making America Musical'."

J. W. received his B. S. Degree from Texas Technological College, Lubbock, Texas. Additional graduate study has been taken at the University of Texas, University of Colorado, Teachers College, Columbia University, and West Texas State University.

His teaching experience includes positions as high school band director at Westbrook, 1941-42; Big Spring, 1947-53; and Hale Center, 1953 to the present. He spent three and one-half years in the Air Force. Much of this time in Air Force Bands. He was assistant to D. O. Wiley, Director of Texas Tech Bands in 1946-47.

Under his direction the Hale Center High School Band has earned superior ratings in all events in Regional Competition from 1956 to the present; was the sweepstakes winner of Class CC in the Tri-State Music Festival, Enid, Oklahoma, 1961. Cotton Bowl Parade winner in Dallas in 1962; runner-up for Class A Honor Band in Texas Music Educators Association Honor Band Auditions in 1959 and 1963 and is the current nominee from Region 1 for the 1965 audition; winner of the Class A Division of the Lubbock Fair Parade for the past seven years.

King is a member of the American School Band Directors' Association, has been president of the Alpha Chapter (Texas) of Phi Beta Mu, and is currently president of the Texas Bandmasters Association.

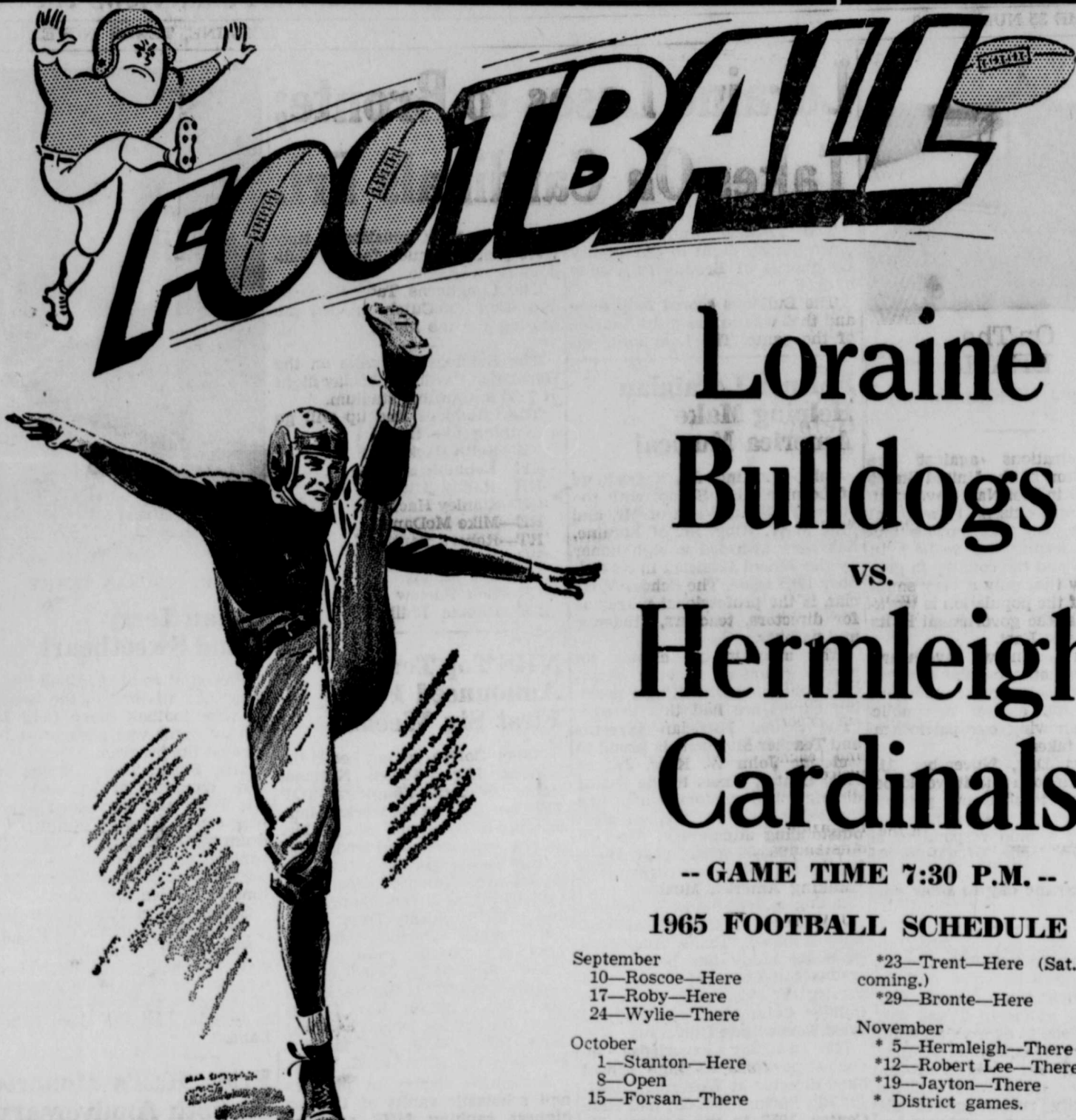

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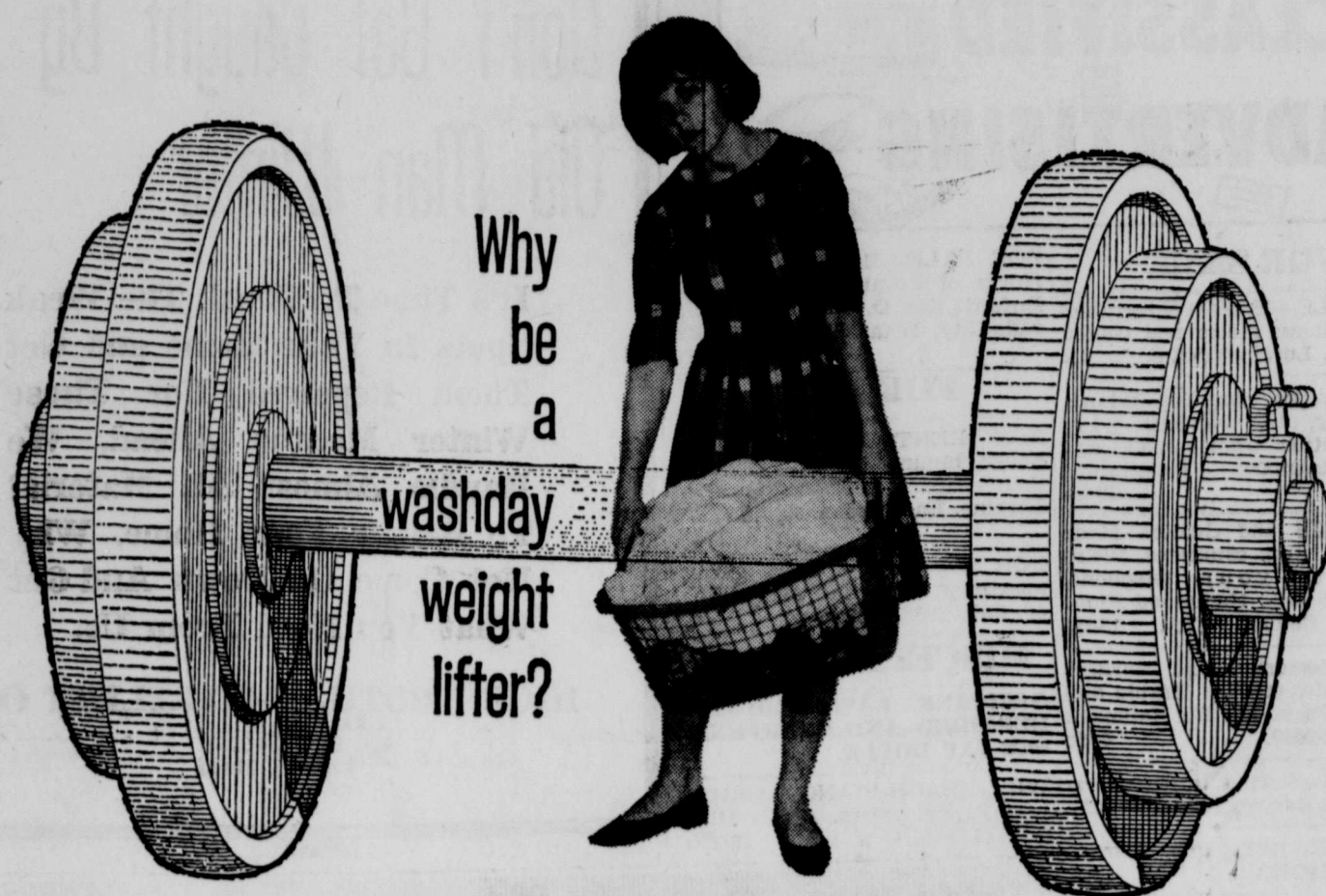
