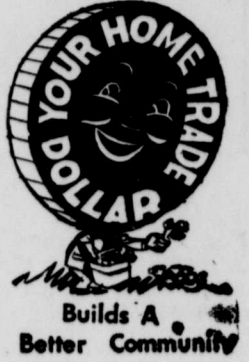


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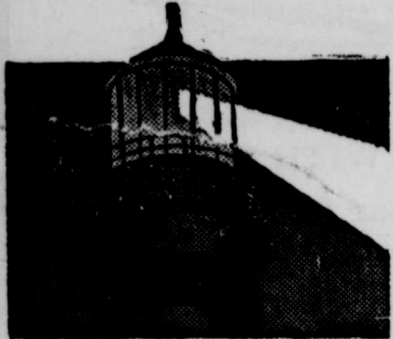

Dr. Oscar H. Majors, a Mitchell County pioneer, died in Root Memorial Hospital in Colorado City at 2:50 p.m. Monday after a weeks illness.

Dr. Majors 79, a Colorado City optometrist and jeweler, was born April 13, 1885 in Fort Payne, Ala. He had lived in Colorado City since 1898.

He married Elsie Low in Fort Worth in 1911. He was a member of the First Methodist Church and of the Masonic Lodge.

Funeral services were held at 3 p.m. Wednesday in the First Methodist Church at Colorado City with the Rev. Darris Egger officiating.

Survivors include his wife; one son, Dr. Marvin L. Majors of Colorado City; a brother, Sam L. Majors of Colorado City; five sisters, Mrs. Myrtle Vaughn, Mrs. Sam Goldman, Mrs. Carl Mayfield and Mrs. Murlin Toler, all of Sweetwater, and Mrs. Floyd Bowen of Lubbock; four grandchildren and five great-grandchildren.

Jones of Lamesa on their low bid of \$66,182.00. Allen and Allen of Lamesa are architects. The bids were opened at 2 p.m.

Miss Joretta Hall On Short Tour

Miss Joretta Hall, a member of the McMurry College Band in Abilene, will be with a group Dec. 7 when they begin a short tour to perform for churches and schools in the Cooper community near Lubbock, Andrews, and Brownfield.

Miss Hall is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Price Hall of Loraine. She is a "Maidenette" for the band and is a member of Wah Wah-taysee service club, Student Education Association, president of Gamma Sigma social club, vice-president of Interclub Council, Reservation Princess Runner-up, Totem Beauty, and was elected to Who's Who in American Colleges and Universities.

Dr. Raymond T. Bynum, widely known band master, listed in Who's Who in the Southwest, will conduct the McMurry musicians while on tour. Specialties and novelties for which the McMurry musicians have become known include their Calliopo, bag pipes, bass trumpet, a wide variety of flutes in a number of keys, piccolo cornets that play in top octavos, and a galaxy of Latin American rhythmic instruments. The 42 chorus English handbells are a favorite of the band members and audiences.

In 1955 the McMurry Band toured Europe and in May of 1964 the band members took a 2500 mile tour of Mexico where they played for audiences in Monterrey, Ciudad Valles, Mexico City, San Luis Potosi and Saultillo.

The floors will be refinished, all offices and the county court room, the stairways redone, new light fixtures will be installed and new plumbing.

Also included in the job will be a central heating and cooling system and the ceilings lowered.

The interior of the two floors will get a complete job. Nothing has been overlooked in the plans to bring the building into a modern and up to date as any in this section and Judge Martin said there would be no indebtedness against the building when it is completed and without a raise in taxes.

Jaybirds Fly Past Bulldogs Here Friday Night 36-0; Season Ends

The Jayton Jaybirds scored a 36-0 District 8-B victory over the Loraine Bulldogs here last Friday night. The Jaybirds riddled up five touchdowns in spite of the Bulldogs defense.

The victory lowered Loraine's record to a 2-3, while Jayton's is now 3-2.

The Bulldogs racked up 269 yards during the night's work. Most of this was run by Larry Rankin. Randy Britton and Kenneth Brame picked up some of the yardage. The inability of the Bulldogs to hang onto the ball kept them from scoring. The Bulldogs had several threats during the game, but the only serious one came in the third quarter when they were repelled at the one-yard line.

Eddie Morales paced Jayton to the win with touchdown runs of 11, 16, and 5-yards. William Smith and Ken Judy added the other scores.

The Jaybirds' first touchdown was made in the first period by Morales. Judy ran the conversion, placing the score 8-0. In the second quarter Morales ran 16-yards for the Jaybirds' second TD.

Judy scored in the third and Smith ran the double conversion.

In the fourth Morales closed out scoring with his five-yard burst. After a hard struggle all night the Bulldogs were unable to score, but they held the Jaybirds from several TD during the night. The game marked the end of the Bulldogs season this year. It also marked the end of High School football for six of the senior boys. They were Larry Rankin, James Mahon, Ronnie Blair, Gary Finley, Carroll Bowles, and Johnny Baumann. These boys played fine football during their High School years, and were all fine sportsmen.

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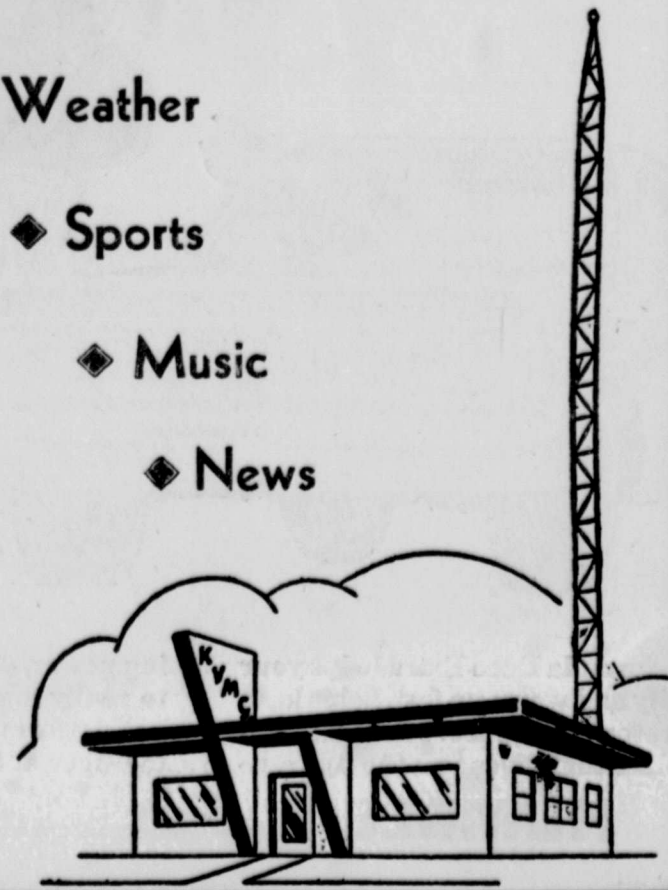

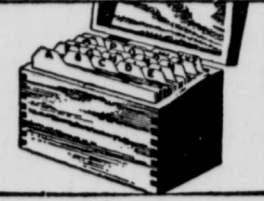

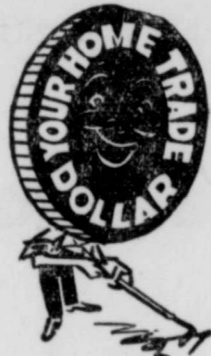
