4-3 IN 10 INNINGS

Wolf Baseballers Lose On Errors to San Angelo

Colorado City Wolves lost a 10-inning heartbreaker to San Angelo's Class AAA Bobcats, 4-3, on the Bobcats home grounds, Guinn Field, Thursday.

Coach Ken Kearns' charges now own a 14 record on the young season. The Cats are undefeated in 2 starts. The Wolves met AAA Brownfield in Colorado City Saturday afternoon — results were not available at press time Saturday.

Three unearned San Angelo runs cost the locals the game. The final came in the bottom of the 10th inning off of relieving pitcher Larry Dambrowsky — who was the loser. Dambrowsky relieved lefty fireball starter Steve Hillhouse to open that frame.

With 1 away in the bottom of the 10th, 3 straight Wolf errors cost them the contest. Cat second sacker Alex Decuir started the error-inspired rally when Wolf shortstop Mike Hart erred. Decuir went to second when C-City catcher Richard Smith failed to field a dribbler down the

first base line. Dambrowsky had a chance at the same type of slow hopper down the first base line off the next batter, but stumbled and threw wild to first. Decuir crossed the plate with the winning run on the throwing error.

Hillhouse and Bobcat starter Bobby Fox both went 9 innings. Scotty Chastain picked up the victory in relief of Fox. Through their 9 inning of hurling, Hillhouse allowed only 6 hits and Fox 7.

Hillhouse got the locals off to a good start in the top of the first inning by singling home right fielder Jimmy Womack who had walked and advanced to second when Hart drew a walk.

Two Wolf errors and a sacrifice fly put the host San Angelo squad into the lead in the bottom of the second. But the Bobcats got the jitters in the seventh to muffle a chance to win in the regulation 7 innings and throw the game into extra.

Wolf third sacker Freddie Fox led things off in that frame by reaching first when

Bobcat hurler Fox dropped a throw at first base while covering — it was the first Bobcat error of the season.

But the Cats made it 2-in-a-row as Womack got in on an error by Decuir at second base and Fox didn't stop until he had reached.

Third, A groundout pushed Fox across with the second. Wolf-run to knot the score at 2-2.

Dale Walker, Fox and Smith all singled to load the bases for the Wolves in ninth. Womack pushed Walker across by hitting into a force play. Cat centerfielder Butchie Terrell ended the Wolf rally by tossing out Fox at the plate as Fox tried to score after a flyout to Terrell.

Hillhouse led the Wolves' batting attack with 2 hits in 4 official trips to the plate. The Wolves had 8 in all. Hillhouse continued his amazing strikesout hurling by fanning 11 Bobcats in his 9 innings. He walked only 1 and allowed only 1 earned run on 6 hits in that 27-out stint.

Wildcat Is Testing; Dual-Pay Producer

Activity Rises in County Oil Fields

Drillstem tests are being made on a wildcat in the southeast part of Mitchell County, a site for a wildcat has been staked in the southwest part of the county and 5 wells, 1 a dual producer, have been completed as oil activity increases in the county.

Two projected sites have been staked in established county fields and activity continues in fields adjoining the county line.

Headwaters No. 1 McCabe, a wildcat 5 miles north of Silver and 1 1/2-mile west of the North Jameson (Straw) field, ran drillstem test on a section between 6,953, 3,392 and 3,497 feet. The pay was 6,965 feet in latest activity. The latest test had the tool open 1 hour and 40 minutes with a fair blow.

Initial pressure was 120 pounds and final flow pressure was 270 pounds. Recovered oil was 155 feet of oil and gas-cut mud, along with 300 feet of salt water.

The operator is now drilling below 7,038 feet in lime and shale.

Drillstem test number 2 on a section between 6,912 and 6,953 feet had the tool open 1 hour with a fair blow through oil. Gas surface in 17 minutes and 200 feet of oil and gas-cut mud and 30 feet of salt water below the circulating sub were recovered.

First test was at 6,209 and 6,240 feet with tool open 70 minutes. Recovery was 45 feet of slightly gas-cut drilling fluid with a trace of oil. The wildcat drillsite is on SW NE in section 4, block 12, H&TC survey.

Shell Oil Company will drill a 9,100-foot wildcat 15 miles southwest of Westbrook and 1 mile northeast of the Albaugh (Fusselman) field. It is No. 1 Scott.

The Albaugh field has only 2 marginal producers. The explorer's site is approximately 3 1/4 mile northeast of McAlester Fuel No. 1A Roy Largent, a Fossilman discovery of May, 1954.

The venture will test the Ellenburger.

Drillsite is to be 1,980 feet from the north and east lines of section 7, block 17 of the SP survey.

Mobil Oil Company opened a new pay, the Abo, with completion of the No. 12 W. R. Sterling in the Sharon Ridge field. The well also produces from the Lower Clear Fork.

It spots in section 130, block 97, H&TC survey.

SWEETWATER LEADS SELECTIONS

Steve Hillhouse Named to First Team All-District Spot

LAMESA (Sp.) — Steve Hillhouse, Colorado City Wolves' leading basketball scorer in 1962, was named to the first team of the 1962 District 3-AAA All-District selections announced here today.

Hillhouse, a 5-10 senior, tied Sweetwater Mustang Jim Tindall in the balloting by the District's coaches and sports writers to gain the first team berth in the annual selections compiled by Speedy Nie-

man, sports editor of the Lamesa Reporter.

Six men were named to the first team due to the tie between Hillhouse and Tindall. Hillhouse was the only Wolf named by the selections.

District champion Sweetwater placed 5 players on the first and second teams to lead the selections. Lamesa, the runner-up in the final poll standings, had 2 unanimous choices on the first team — all-stater Gene Westmoreland and the loop's leading scorer,

Wallace Franklin, Don Gor-

son and Steve Eves. Hillhouse and Tindall rounded out the first team.

Lake View's Dan Tomlinson was the top vote getter on the second team — there was no honorable mention list picked.

Franklin was the lone junior on the first team selections.

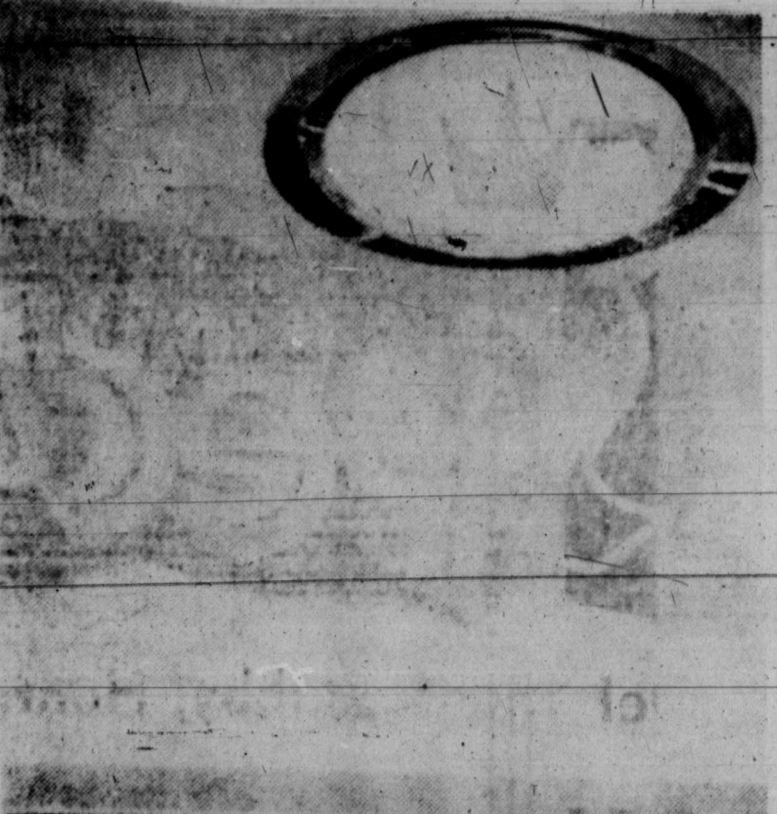

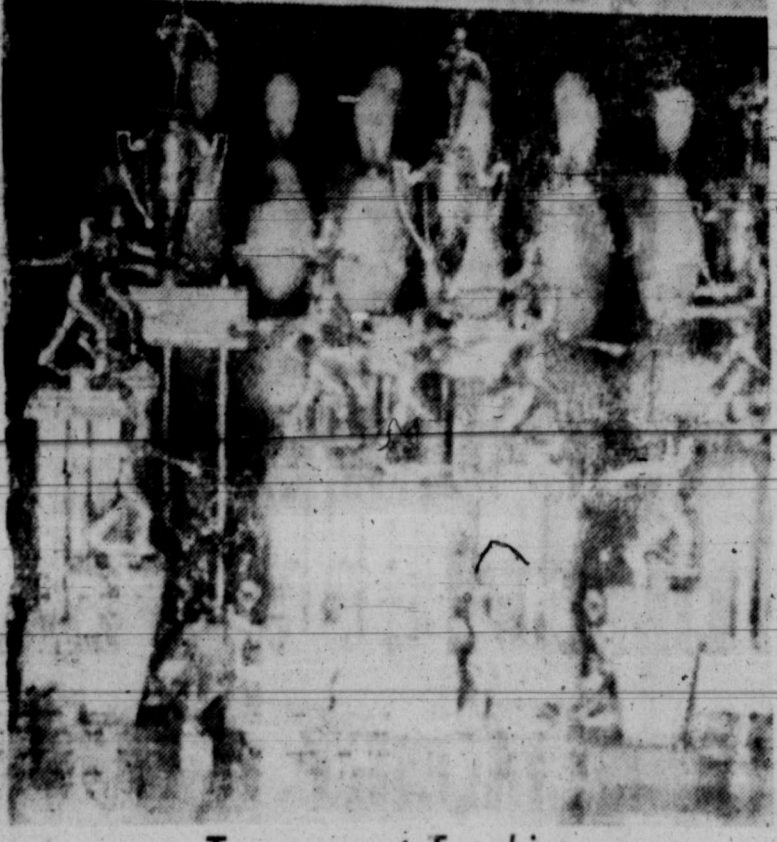

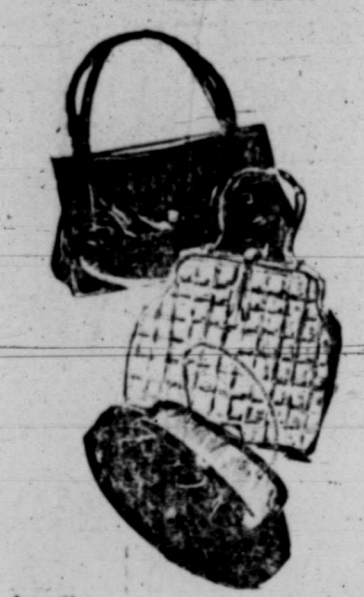
