Criminals In "Bargain Day" Rush

Plead Guilty to Get to Sing Sing

Before New Parole Law Takes Effect

NEW YORK, June 30.—A spectacle of unique in legal history a "bargain day" rush for prison terms took place in the busy old criminal court building Wednesday.

Swarthy men, their shrewd faces streaming with perspiration, collars wilted, clothes awry, jostled and struggled to reach the desk of Judge Collins to plead guilty on behalf of their clients, the felons, who waited nervously in the tombs across the way.

The grey walled prison, largest county institution of its kind in the United States, was emptied of its felons by nightfall. Eighty men and women were on their way to Sing Sing penitentiary.

On the faces of these prisoners, many hardened offenders, was written, not dejection, but a sort of saturnine glee. They had beaten the strict new state parole law by a few hours. Prisoners sentenced for felonies from now on will pay a much severer penalty.

Throughout a broiling summer day the rush to plead guilty and receive a sentence kept up. All offenders indicted by the grand juries had to plead before Judge Collins and the judge himself gave every prisoner charged with felony an opportunity to be sentenced under the old law, which expired at midnight.

Most of the lawyers who clamored for Judge Collins' attention had entered appeals for their clients. These were hastily withdrawn, amid loud arguments with nearly frantic clerks, in order that nothing might prevent the felons from starting up the river Wednesday night.

"It is a simple act of justice to allow prisoners to be sentenced under the old law," said Judge Collins. The new law adds months and in some instances years to a Sing Sing inmate's term—the same applying to women convicts at Auburn—and strictly limits the opportunities for parole on the ground of good conduct.

Fashion Notes

NEW YORK, July 1.—Stockings are the most expensive luxuries in the feminine wardrobe today. The underdressed girl and the society woman may wear vastly different frocks and hats but their stockings are of the same chaff texture. The society woman wears a stocking as an inconspicuous part of her costume whereas the cash girl lets her silken legs overpower her cheap little frock. No girl today wears cotton stockings and very few of them wear those which have cotton tops and silk lowers, this being due to the prevalence of short skirts. It seems incredible that the little Miss who earns \$12 week can afford to wear stockings costing at least \$1.35 a pair. Yet she does wear them and she buys on the average of one pair every two weeks.

Hose with mended runs are entirely taboo. Most of us are unaware of the sacrifices a pair of chaff stockings cost these busy-legged working girls. One young woman informed me that one-sixth of her wages were spent on stockings. She insisted that she couldn't hold her position as a saleswoman in a fashionable gown house if she wore cheap stockings or stockings that had been mended. Standing on her feet all day caused runs from the garters downward and once the runs appeared, she had to buy a new pair.

Where the average woman complains about the number of pairs of stockings she buys each month, the working girl might also add the complaint of an empty stomach since many of them skip on their lunches to provide silk hosiery for their legs. Many shops guarantee their stockings but those so-called guaranteed stockings are only replaced when the tear or run comes from a defect in the stocking, in most cases.

Mending machines can now mend runs so that they are practically unnoticeable but the mending costs from 5 cents to \$1.00 which is beyond the means of the working girl. There is no way to beat the high cost of stockings.

Buying three pairs exactly alike at one time will give one the use of four pairs in the long run. Washing stockings before wearing them and while they are new and washing them after each wearing will add to the lasting qualities. One also saves a bit by buying several pairs at once as some shops make a special price on such purchases. As a rule, stockings cost around \$50 a year.

PONZI AT HOUSTON SAYS SEERESS PREDICTED ARREST, BUT ALSO FORETOLD GOOD FORTUNE LATER

HOUSTON, June 30.—Sitting in a dingy little cell of the Harris county jail, the dapper "financial wizard" who set staid Boston a-flutter with his \$10,000,000 manipulations, Wednesday was making plans to institute habeas corpus proceedings on the grounds that he is held illegally for Massachusetts authorities.

And with lines of worry stealing into his jovial smile, Charles Ponzi held for Boston police as a "common and notorious thief," turned his eyes toward his cell window, where, a short distance away, Buffalo Bayou winds down into the Houston ship channel and thence to the gulf of Mexico and sunny Italy.

Moving to a seat on the edge of his cell bunk, Ponzi, smiled and shook his head.

"I was just thinking about fortune tellers," he said wistfully. "You know, last March, Rosa my wife, and I went to one in Jacksonville, Fla.

"After she had looked at me and studied me carefully, she told me that I was in for a serious disaster on the seas the latter part of June."

The little Italian paused a moment and added:

"I guess she saw in the stars and heavens that I was going to get caught."

"But then she told me," Ponzi continued, "that I'd make a whole lot of money in 1927, and the two years following. So I guess I can stand this jail stuff if I'm going to have such good luck following it."

Meanwhile, Boston officers are speeding toward Houston with extradition papers signed by the governor of Massachusetts for Ponzi's return to face a prison sentence in that state. The erstwhile "financial genius" desires to secure his freedom on bail so that he may better fight this extradition.

Ponzi's decision to institute habeas corpus proceedings followed a conversation Tuesday with Police Inspector John F. Mitchell, of Boston. In Mitchell, Ponzi found a "customer" whom he couldn't out-trade.

Ponzi wished to exile himself from the United States or to return to Boston with Texas officers; Mitchell insisted that Massachusetts authorities would come for him with extradition papers.

"We'll come after you, Charlie," Mitchell told Ponzi. "You can't come up here with Texas officers."

"Then it's a fight," Ponzi replied.

"Come on down here and try to out me."

Ponzi was arrested in New Orleans Monday afternoon when he was discovered to the wharf from the Italian steamer Sic-Vas Non Vobis, whose home port is Genoa, Italy. He had been recognized by Houston officers while employed as a roustabout at the ship channel wharves here. Shipping on the Italian steamer as a waiter, "the financial wizard," had planned to exile himself in sunny Italy. Houston officers, however, had other plans for him and trailed him to Louisiana.

When Mitchell refused to "trade" with him, Ponzi choose Sheriff T. A. Rineford, of Harris county, as his next "customer."

The propose to the sheriff that he be allowed to stay in a fashionable hotel under guard. The ex-seeress, he explained, could be met with the \$500 he had received from a Boston newspaper for a new story he had written.

Again the dapper little man was out-traded.

So Wednesday night, Charles Ponzi, outwardly jovial and always rarrulous, lolled in a bare cell with a southeast exposure overlooking Buffalo Bayou—which meanders into the Houston ship channel from which he sailed last week for Genoa.

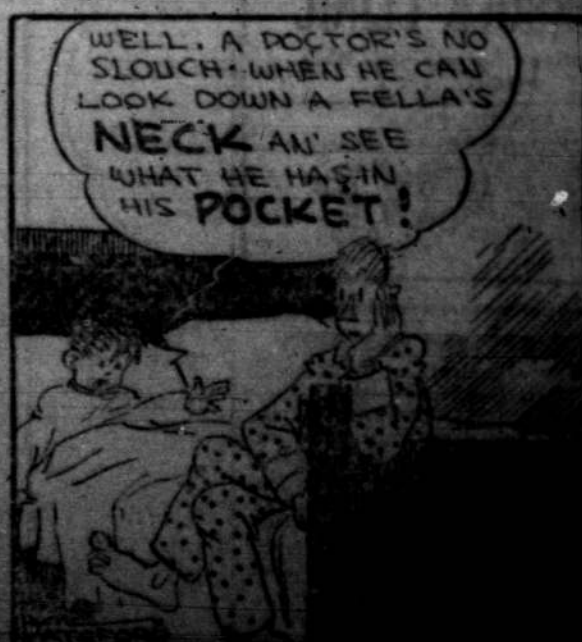

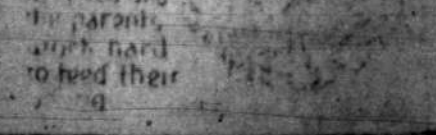
Here from the branch of an elm tree the Orioles are winding strings and letting them form a loop hanging as long as they wish the nest to be.

SUBSTITUTE FOR QUININE USED IN TREATING MALARIA CASES

WASHINGTON, June 29.—The malaria commission of the League of Nations is experimenting with a substitute for quinine in treating malaria patients in the Balkans and the Mediterranean countries, according to the latest report of the League Health Committee, which was received at the Department of State.

Due to the high cost of quinine, certain of the secondary alkaloids of cinchona have been substituted in the hospitals in Algeria, Spain, Italy, Rumania and Jugoslavia, where malaria is especially prevalent. The commission is not yet ready to pass judgment on the final value of this substitution.

ABILENE MAN GIVES FIVE HUNDRED DOLLARS TO START SUBSCRIPTION FOR PERMANENT W. T. C. OF C. HOME

ABILENE, June 30.—The largest regional chamber of commerce in the world must have a permanent home in keeping with its importance, in the opinion of C. W. Fry of Abilene, general manager of the West Texas Utilities company who has started a fund for the purpose of erecting a building to serve as permanent home for the organization. Mr. Fry while here Monday announced a contribution of \$500, as the initial contribution to the building fund. The S. M. Swenson & Sons company of Stamford have contributed a building site located in the business section of Stamford on a paved street and have already executed a deed to the West Texas Chamber of Commerce to the site which will be ideal for the purpose. Stamford business men, justly proud that Stamford is the headquarters of the great west Texas organization have undertaken to raise a fund of \$3,500 to go into the building and half of this sum was raised in less than one hour today. President Claude Esterling and Secretary Hamilton Wright are pushing the campaign to complete the fund and declare the \$3,500 will be raised this week. The action of Mr. Fry is expected to be matched by other patriotic west Texans and it is thought probably that the organization will be housed in its new quarters by January 1, 1927.

In the opinion of Mr. Fry and others who are behind the project the home of the West Texas Chamber of Commerce should be a real west Texas building and should be constructed insofar as possible of materials of west Texas production of manufacture. Several manufacturing concerns represented here have already signified their desire to be allowed to contribute material for the building which they manufacture and it is thought that the organization will not have to get out of their

ry material. West Texas has great brick plants cement and plaster mills, granite and marble quarries while right near Stamford are the greatest lime stone quarries in the country located at Lueders. There are in west Texas great lumber finishing and cabinet making plants while Fort Worth is headquarters for steel concerns able to provide all steel material for the building and Wichita Falls can manufacture the necessary glass. As visualized by those who conceived the idea of the home of the West Texas Chamber of Commerce will be a real monument to west Texas industry and enterprise and the building will be an edifice in which all west Texans will feel a justifiable pride.

Several Amarillo men estimated the number of students who would attend from there at between 40 and 50. A prominent Clovis man who was here the other day stated that a majority of the graduates of the Clovis high school would be here in the fall. Several students are coming from Colorado City. The neighboring towns will send a number as they did this past session.

The majority of these inquiries come to the school of Liberal Arts while the other schools are receiving their quota also. The school of Engineering has had a number of letters asking about the courses during the past few days. As the summer progresses the secretaries will be busy with the correspondence of this nature. The college officials are jubilant over the present prospects and Texas Tech seems on the road toward another record in enrollment.

Urges Regulation of Broadcasting

WASHINGTON, June 30.—Regulation of radio broadcasting is absolutely necessary, Senator Dill, democrat, Washington, told the senate Wednesday in a speech urging passage of his radio bill to set up an independent commission for licensing and regulating broadcasting.

Dill pointed out that there are only a limited number of "channels for broadcasting," and added, "congress must legislate in accordance with that condition."

HALF BOY'S FACE BLOWN OFF BY EXPLOSION IS RESTORED BY OPERATION

SYDNEY, June 30.—Two years ago a nine-year-old boy in a Victorian township had the lower half of his face blown away by the accidental discharge of a shotgun, and today, thanks to the skill of an Adelaide surgeon, he has a new half-face.

The surgeon, Dr. Simpson Newland, gained a worldwide reputation by his surgery achievements in the World War and the British Government endeavored to retain his services in England, but Newland returned to Australia in order that his services should be available to Australian soldiers if they were needed. But the operation on the boy is said to be more remarkable than any he performed in war hospitals.

Newland took pieces of flesh from various parts of the boy's body, and began the work of building up a foundation for the missing half of the boy's face. Six operations were spread over a year before the boy began to resemble his former self.

In the last operation the doctor cut two strips of skin from the boy's temple over the forehead, and up on to the skull. These he laid back and turning them, brought them down around the flesh that he had built up as a chin. The skin grew and so did some of the roots of hair contained in it. The 11-year-old boy is growing a beard.

In a few weeks' time will come the last operation. Newland will take out one of the boy's ribs, and fashion it into a complete lower jaw-bone. This will be let into the built-up flesh and grafted on to the ends of the original jaw-bone, which was blown completely off at the last tooth in the lower jaw. This is said to be comparatively simple, and the success of the whole operation is assured.

BAKER—BOOTLEGGER

PHILADELPHIA, June 29.—A bread making machine which manufactures alcohol on the side will be exhibited at the Sesqui-Centennial exposition, Kurt Zimmerman, who represents the German inventor, said 30,000,000 litres of alcohol could be produced daily if every German baker utilized the invention.

Since Austria became a republic its hydro-electric development has jumped from 170,000 to 431,000 horsepower.

Bill to Codify Laws Approved By House

WASHINGTON, June 30.—Senate amendments to the codification bill, House Bill No. 10000, were accepted by the House, June 26.

The bill would codify all Federal laws. It is said to be the longest bill ever passed by Congress; it is several inches thick. It was passed by the Senate, June 25.

Representative Madden (Rep.) of Chicago, Ill., suggested that the code be corrected at each session of Congress. Representative Roy G. Fitzgerald (Rep.) of Dayton, Ohio, chairman of the House Committee on Revision of Laws, said the committee intended to follow the suggestion.

"The two greatest law publishing companies in the country," Mr. Fitzgerald said, "whose selfish interests should be against this code, have given invaluable assistance."

The House also concurred in the Senate amendments to House Bill No. 11318, which provides for the publication of the code.

Farm Light Plant Popular on Plains

J. F. Beyerle, traveling representative for the Westinghouse Company, left yesterday for Galveston after spending several days here with C. D. Hodges, district salesman for the company in this territory.

During his visit here Mr. Beyerle inspected and gave service on the twenty Westinghouse light plants that are in operation in this county. This service being given Westinghouse light users as a means of keeping their plants giving the highest type of service possible.

Mr. Hodges, who has been in Lubbock for more than a year, is a special representative of the Bittick-Balard Electric Company of Taylor, Texas, and has just been given the aid of T. C. Smith of that company in launching a sales campaign in this territory that will result in the placing of a large number of plants before this fall.

Electric lighting plants on farms in this section are growing more popular all the time. Mr. Hodges reports, and a number of farm homes in this county will be provided that service as a result of the big harvest that will be made this fall, enabling farmers to add such improvements to their places.

PRESIDENT NOMINATES TARIFF COMMISSIONERS

WASHINGTON, June 29.—President Coolidge on June 23, sent to the Senate for confirmation the nomination of Sherman J. Lowell, of New York, to be a member of the United States Tariff Commission for a term expiring September 7, 1928. Mr. Lowell would succeed A. H. Baldwin, of New York, recently resigned. The President also renominated Edgar Barnard Brossard, of Utah, as a member of the Tariff Commission for a term expiring September 7, 1932.

Other nominations sent to the Senate included three Registers of Land Offices, all reappointments, as follows: William Ashley at Coeur d'Alene, Ida; John Widlon at Pierre, S. D.; and Edwin E. Winters at Montgomery, Ala.

DAN SAYS JIM SURELY WHIPPED

PEOPLE SICK AND TIRED
OF FERGUSONS, HE SAYS

DALLAS, June 30.—"I never felt better in my life, and I find the enthusiasm getting stronger as the campaign progresses. It looks like a sweeping victory against Fergusonism." This is the statement issued by Dan Moody, Attorney General and candidate for governor, as he began the final month's campaign for governor of Texas.

"I am more thoroughly convinced than ever, through my travels over Texas in this campaign, that the people are sick and tired of Jim Ferguson's dictatorship without responsibility or accountability to the laws or to the people. During the week-end, letters, telegrams and telephone calls have come to me from all sections of the state, not only assuring support for my candidacy, but reporting such support is so strong that there is a probability that there will be no need for a second primary. The most constructive thing that could be done at the present time in Texas would be to get rid of Fergusonism and Fergusonism."

Unless that is done, and done emphatically, it will be futile to speak of anything else as a constructive nature. I believe that the people will accept the opportunity they have to accomplish this, July 24th in the most decisive manner."

Citing as evidence of the wholesale defection of support from Ferguson, the fact that in one day he (Moody) was introduced in three different counties by men who, two years ago, were campaign managers in their respective counties for the Fergusons, Mr. Moody declared that he, himself, had been surprised at the large number of "rock-ribbed" Ferguson men who are opening and actively campaigning against the Fergusons.

"Forgetting all of the other misdeeds of Jim Ferguson—and they are legion—these former supporters just couldn't swallow Old Jim's statement that 'we don't owe these road bonds,' and his attempt to repudiate the bonds, when every good citizen of Texas knows they are honest debts, and ought to be paid."

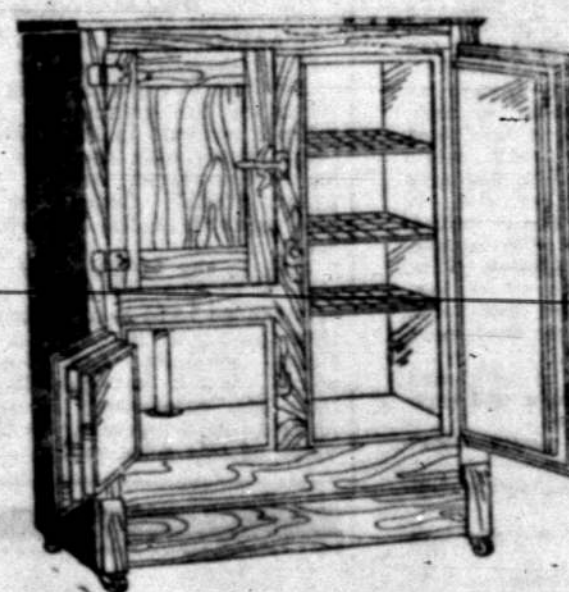

NEW YORK, June 30.—Put to the test, steel common's leadership of the stock market has been maintained. After seven days of irregularity with considerable profit taking under cover of the strong advance in the leader. Wednesday's further advance into the new high ground for all time brought in the hoped for flood of buying orders from the interior.

The total turnover for the day was only about 1,700,000 shares, not a very broad market for a bull movement, but the tone throughout was very good. In connection with steel's rise to 144, the market is full of rumors. The most common impression is that common stock will be split up on very advantageous terms for the stockholders. Ample basis for this belief is afforded by the heavy surplus and the strong current earnings of the corporation. Expectations as to the dividend rate on the new common range from \$8 to \$10 per share as applied to the present common. The street contends that if steel was worth \$5 to 100 as a five percent stock, it should be worth twice that as a ten percent stock. The reasoning is good up to the point where the extras enter. As a five percent stock, steel was drawing two per cent extra per year. As a ten per cent stock the chances for an extra are of course not so bright.

One factor which was more encouraging in a general way than was the strong rise in steel was the character of the buying which accompanied it in other stocks. This was very obviously of an investment character and answered the question regarding the stability of the market basis. For the strong two years of strong investment demand, there has always been one basis which could not be ignored. This country is now

FLOYD MAKING FIFTY, BUSHELS

ACTUAL TEST SHOWS BIG
WHEAT YIELD ON
PLAINS

FLOYDADA, June 30.—From twenty bushels per acre on volunteer land to fifty on summer fallow land at the yield from wheat fields in Floyd county. This statement was found to be true by actual test. All the wheat is testing from 60 to 63 1-2.

On the farm of J. C. Newsome, thirteen miles southeast of Floydada the yield averaged forty bushels. From twenty acres of summer fallow land the average yield was fifty bushels, all of which tested number one wheat.

From two hundred acres on his place Mr. Will Pool, living twenty-three miles southeast of Floydada, the average yield was forty-three bushels, and to quote Mr. Pool, he had not gotten into his good wheat yet.

On Monday of this week there were twenty-six cars of wheat shipped out of Floydada on Tuesday there was twenty-seven and a larger number is expected to leave before the end of the week.

More than eighty thousand acres of cotton in this county has a good stand and for the reason that it is much earlier than the 1925 crop, which was almost completely destroyed by the early freeze, the prospects for a bumper cotton crop is good.

While in some parts of the county the feed crop is not in such a splendid condition as the wheat and cotton due to the fact that little work is being done on it during the harvest, the outlook for a splendid row crop is very promising.

Durwood H. Bradley, candidate for district attorney of 72nd judicial district court, will speak at Shallowater Friday evening at 8:30 o'clock, and all county candidates have been invited to attend and will give opportunities to present their claims to the voters.

MYSTERIOUS UNKNOWN DONATES TO BRITAIN

LONDON, June 30.—An unknown man, whose only identification is his statement that he was born in England but has lived in the United States for the past 50 years, has sent Winston Churchill, Chancellor of the Exchequer, bonds to the value of \$6,850 to be applied to the reduction of the Anglo-American debt.

This is the third donation sent by the man during the past three years as a contribution toward the English war debt.

Churchill was unable to write the man through lack of address, but publicly thanked him through the press.

KIPLING HOME AGAIN

BURWASH, Sussex, June 30.—Rudyard Kipling, the novelist, who was seriously ill with bronchial pneumonia last winter has returned to Burwash after several months convalescence in Southern France. He appears none the worse for his illness and has resumed his writing and the management of his six hundred acre estate which lies in the valley of one of the most beautiful rural districts in England.

IMMIGRATION OF LEPERS ALARMS RUSSIAN CITY

BAKU, Azerbaijan, June 30.—Large numbers of lepers, who have arrived here from Persia, are becoming a serious problem to government authorities.

In the absence of an isolated leper colony, the immigrants afflicted with the deadly disease are walking the streets freely and are congregating in public places among native inhabitants.
