HURN MOVES TO NEW LOCATION

EXPECTS TO BE LOCATED IN NEW BUILDING BY SATURDAY; BUSY MOVING

The Hurn Dry Goods Company expects to be located in their new building by Saturday and have their stock of goods arranged and ready for business. The change in locations was made this week, moving from their former location, just south of the Johnson Motor Company, to their own splendid new modern store building just north of the Perryton National Bank building.

The Hurn Dry Goods Company first opened their doors in Perryton on April 1, 1925, coming here from Higgins, where the firm also maintains a store. Their success in the mercantile business has been so pronounced that in two years and a half they are moving into a new building of their own. Much credit for this success is due R. P. The new building is a model store building, of brick construction, twenty-five by one hundred feet. The building is absolutely fireproof, with concrete floor, plastered walls, and metal ceiling. Many new shelves and fixtures have been installed and built in. A rest room in the rear, as well as dressing rooms have been arranged. Most of the large stock of goods carried by the Hurn Dry Goods Company has already been moved and every effort is being made to have it arranged by Saturday. HARD SURFACE STATE HIGHWAY

STATE HIGHWAY DEPARTMENT PUTTING GYP ROCK ON NUMBER FOUR THRU O'LEARY LAKE

State Highway Engineer R. A. Thompson, Austin, and W. A. French, of Amarillo, divisional engineer, were here last week inspecting State Highway No. 4 which runs north and south through Perryton. While they were here, the hard surfacing of the highway through the O'Leary lake, just south of town was started.

A large force of men under the direction of Lee Keith, maintenance foreman for this division, are on the job now. The road bed is being covered with about six inches of gyp rock hauled from the Wolf Creek canyon at Ochiltree.

The hard surfacing of this stretch of highway is being watched with interest by citizens of Perryton. There is an unlimited supply of this surfacing material in the county and if it is a success, the streets of Perryton and the roads of the county can be paved at a saving of thousands of dollars.

While here, Mr. Thompson made the statement that Perryton streets could be paved with this gyp rock at a cost of about one-fifth that of brick and that the paving would be as good and as lasting as brick or any other high priced paving material.

NEW DISTRICT CONVENTION IS GREAT SUCCESS

Three Hundred Delegates Gather From Thirty Panhandle Communities

Praise Perryton as Host

Next Convention Goes to Spearman After Spirited Election

Three hundred delegates from thirty towns of Kansas, Oklahoma, and Texas, assembled Monday in the school auditorium, Perryton, for the first meeting of the newly created Trans-Canadian Division of the West Texas Chamber of Commerce, said to be one of the most successful meetings in regional organizations.

A. F. Barkley, Spearman, director of the W. T. C. C., presided over the morning meeting which opened in the auditorium following a street concert by the Perryton Municipal band. Following the invocation by Rev. Martin T. Pope, the address of welcome was given by J. M. Bull and the response by Wm. H. Childress, Dalhart.

B. Frank Bennett, Amarillo, assistant manager of the parent organization, outlined the objects of district conventions, and of the West Texas Chamber of Commerce. "A convention such as this," Mr. Bennett stated, "is the gathering together of the thinking people of the territory, to discuss the needs of the section."

"Get Sold on Panhandle"

"The purpose of the West Texas Chamber of Commerce is to do every thing in its power to build a little empire in West Texas," Mr. Bennett continued. Among other things Mr. Bennett told of the efforts of that organization to obtain legislation, and he told of the exhibit at Philadelphia last year at the Sesqui-Centennial exposition from West Texas, winning first place over all other states in the union. "Get sold on the Panhandle," Mr. Bennett urged, "and get ready to receive the thousands of middle western farmers who are coming."

The resolutions committee was appointed, composed of Jack Allen, chairman; Jot Horton, Spearman; Wallace Hughes, Guymon; W. H. Childress, Dalhart; Geo. Temont, Liberal; H. E. Hoover, Canadian and John E. Hill, Amarillo.

The convention was then favored with two selections by the Dalhart Choral Club, an organization composed of ten young ladies, directed by Miss Margaret Dooley.

"We Dare You to Invite Us"

"I do not exactly know our status in the Oklahoma Panhandle, but I dare the West Texas Chamber of Commerce to invite us to join the Trans-Canadian District," stated Sen. Wallace E. Hughes, Guymon, Okla. Homer D. Wade, manager of the parent organization, jumped to his feet and declared that the door was open.

In continuing, Sen. Hughes said, "We have long felt the need of such an organization in the Oklahoma Panhandle. We are entirely out of touch with the rest of the state, very much in the same manner as the West Texas Panhandle, both being far removed from the seat of state government. We are connected with the state for the sole purpose of paying taxes into the state, much in the same manner in which we pay our annual assessments into our own state chamber of commerce. We are standing in the light of our own advancement by not discarding that imaginary line which separates us and carving out of the Panhandle of Texas and Oklahoma and new and separate state, with Amarillo as the capital. We have the same climate, the same soil, the same conditions.

Make Soil Produce Every Year
"Our best advertisement throughout this section is to make the soil produce as it should produce, year after year—and not induce farmers from Kansas, Nebraska, Iowa, Missouri and other states to come here until we can do this. Our primary purpose, then, is to solve our own problems. We must educate our boys and girls along this line, study our soil, climate and other conditions, and learn to produce."

Homer D. Wade told of the great amount of work being done by the

FOLLETT WINS OVER RANGERS

19 TO 0 TALLEY IS DECIDING
SCORE IN HARD FOUGHT
GRID GAME LAST
FRIDAY

The Perryton Rangers were held scoreless in the second game of the season, played on the local field last Friday afternoon, while the visiting team from Follett ran up nineteen points, scoring in the first third and final periods, making only one try for point.

Nine of the eleven players composing the Follett team were experienced players and were found in the lineup of the Perryton-Follett game last season, while almost the entire line and backfield of the Rangers is composed of new material. Although the visitors outplayed the locals in every branch of the game, making eleven first downs to six made by Perryton, they met with stiff opposition, real fight and a greatly improved team than the one that faced Canadian the week before.

The game opened when Follett kicked off to the Perryton 20 yard line. Shearer returning the kick to the 37 yard line. Todd hit the line for a 3 yard gain. Shearer clipped around right end for a 5 yard advance. Perryton was penalized 5 yards for being off side. Shearer makes a yard through the line. Bruner is rushed in making his punt on the next play and makes a bad kick, the ball bouncing back, is recovered by Harris. Follett's right end who runs 37 yards to cross the Ranger goal line for a touchdown in the first five minutes of play. Attempt for point fails.

Beardsley goes in for Shearer in the Perryton lineup. Tucker receives the Follett kickoff on his 31 yard line, returning 6 yards. Tucker hits line for 3 yards. McLarty races around end for 15 yards, making first down. Beardsley hits line for 3 yards. Todd goes through center for 2 yards. McLarty makes 2 yards on a line play. Beardsley punts to the Follett 13 yard line, where the receiving player is downed in his tracks. A line play by Heil gets only a yard. Cope makes an 8 yard gain around end. A two yard plunge gives Follett a first down. Three offensive plays net only a four yard gain and Follett is forced to punt to the Perryton 41 yard line, the ball being advanced 2 yards.

McLarty races around the end for a 6 yard gain and Todd makes a first down with a 4 yard buck. McLarty goes through tackle for 3 yards. Tucker makes a first down by advancing the ball 9 yards. Beardsley goes through the line for 5 yards. McLarty gains 2 yards and Tucker 1 on the next two plays. McLarty fails in an attempt to make a first down and the ball goes to Follett. On the first play the Follett runner is thrown for a 6 yard loss. Two plays net a 3 yard gain and Follett is forced to kick, the punt going out of bounds on the Ranger 37 yard line. McLarty gets away for a 21 yard sprint around right end, making another first down. On the next play, Beardsley fumbles, Follett recovering. A line play gains 1 yard for the Follett team. A short pass is completed for a 3 yard gain. A 5 yard gain is made just as the quarter ends, placing the ball in the center of the field.

Play is resumed in the second period, Follett making a first down with a 3 yard gain. Two 6 yard gains, one around each end gave Follett another first down. A 4 yard pass is completed by Follett, and two 4 yard end runs account for another first down. Follett fails to gain through the Ranger line, on the first play, but goes through for 3 yards on the next attempt. A 9 yard end run gives Follett a first down with the ball on the Ranger 11 yard line. The ball is advanced 2 yards on the next play, but a Follett fumble is picked up by a Perryton player and Follett's greatest offensive of the entire game is broken. Follett carrying the ball from their own 41 yard line to the Perryton 9 yard line only to lose the ball before they can cross the goal line.

Tucker makes a 2 yard gain through the line. Todd adds another 2 yards. McLarty loses 3 yards. Beardsley punts from the 11 yard line to his 35 yard line where the pigskin rolls out of bounds. Perryton substitutes C. Wilson for Jones. Follett gains 2 yards through the line. A 7 yard gain around end and a 2 yard line play gives them a first down. Three successive line plays advance the

ball 6 yards for Follett, but an end run accounts for as many more and gives them a first down. A line play fails to gain. An off tackle play adds a yard, while another line plunge again fails to show a gain. On the fourth down, Follett attempts to place kick, but the pitiful kick barely rolls over the line to Beardsley who is downed in his tracks on the 15 yard line. McLarty goes around end for a 6 yard gain. Todd runs around end for 3 yards more. McLarty fails to gain. McLarty tries again and plunges over for the necessary yard and a first down. Beardsley is thrown for a 2 yard loss and the half ends with the ball on Perryton's 24 yard line.

In the second half Perryton starts Shearer for McLarty. Bruner kicks off to Cope who returns the ball from his own 25 yard line to the 41 yard mark. Follett gains three yards. A line play fails to gain. Follett is thrown for a 3 yard loss. Todd receives the Follett punt on his 21 yard line racing to the 38 yard line. Shearer fails to gain through the line. An attempt to pass is incomplete. Tucker gains 4 yards. Beardsley punts to the opponents' 40 yard line, the ball bounding back to the 44 yard line where a Follett player fell on it. Follett gains 7 yards and 5 yards on end runs for a first down. McLarty is sent in for Shearer on the Perryton lineup. A Follett pass is incomplete. Follett races around end for a 6 yard gain. Another Follett pass is incomplete and they receive a 5 yard penalty for attempting two passes, both incomplete. Follett boots the ball to Todd on the Ranger 13 yard line who returns it 9 yards. Beardsley punts to the 36 yard line, Follett making a 4 yard return. Follett gains a half yard on a line play and loses the same amount on the next down. An 8 yard end run followed by a 1 yard gain through the line fails to net the required 10 yards and the ball goes to Perryton. Tucker loses 3 yards. Tucker fails to gain. McLarty loses a yard. Beardsley's punt is blocked and is picked up by a Follett player on the Ranger 9 yard line. A line play gains a yard. The Rangers throw Follett for a 2 yard loss, but on the next play Cope makes a sweeping end run and crosses the Ranger goal line. Brown adds a point by drop kicking between the goal posts.

Todd takes the Follett kick off on the 37 yard line and carries the ball to the center of the field. Beardsley makes a 3 yard line buck. McLarty loses 5 yards. Beardsley is rushed in attempting to kick, the ball hitting on the Follett 42 yard line and bouncing back to the 49 yard line. Follett goes through the line for 2 yards. A pass is incomplete. Follett receives 15 yard penalty for holding. The quarter ends with the ball on the Follett 38 yard

line, third down, 22 yards to go.

Perryton substitutes Lewis for Pittman. Follett punts to Tucker on the Perryton 40 yard line, who returns the ball 6 yards. Two Perryton passes are incomplete and the Rangers take a 5 yard penalty for same. McLarty gains 5 yards on an end run and Beardsley punts to the Follett 38 yard line. Brown takes Cope's pass and races 63 yards for a touchdown. Attempt at point fails. Follett substitutes Tetter for Heil.

Beardsley receives Follett's kick off on his 38 yard line making an 8 yard return. Shearer races around end for 9 yards. Tucker makes it first down with a 10 yard gain around end. McLarty fails to circle left end and loses a yard. Todd fails to gain. Beardsley passes to Shearer for an 11 yard gain and a first down. McLarty fails to gain around right end. Shearer loses 4 yards. A Perryton pass is incomplete. Another pass falls into the hands of Harris. Follett's right end, who carries the ball to the Follett 31 yard line. A 5 yard end run followed by a 12 yard gain and a first down. Follett loses 2 yards. A Follett pass is incomplete. They gain 8 yards on an end run Follett punts to Todd on the Perryton 19 yard line, who signals for a fair catch. Follett ends tackle Todd and receive 15 yard penalty. Tucker hits line for 2 yards. Shearer races around end for 5 yards. McLarty gains a yard. A Perryton pass is incomplete and the ball goes to Follett. They attempt to pass but it is incomplete. Follett gains 3 yards through tackle. Another line play adds two yards more. Follett kicks out of bounds on the Perryton 13 yard line. 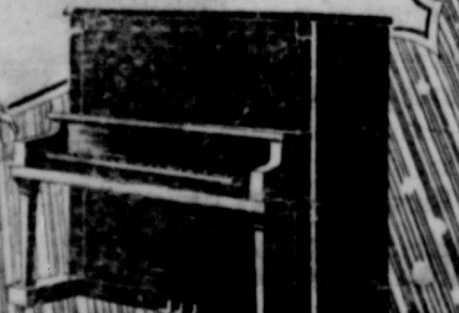

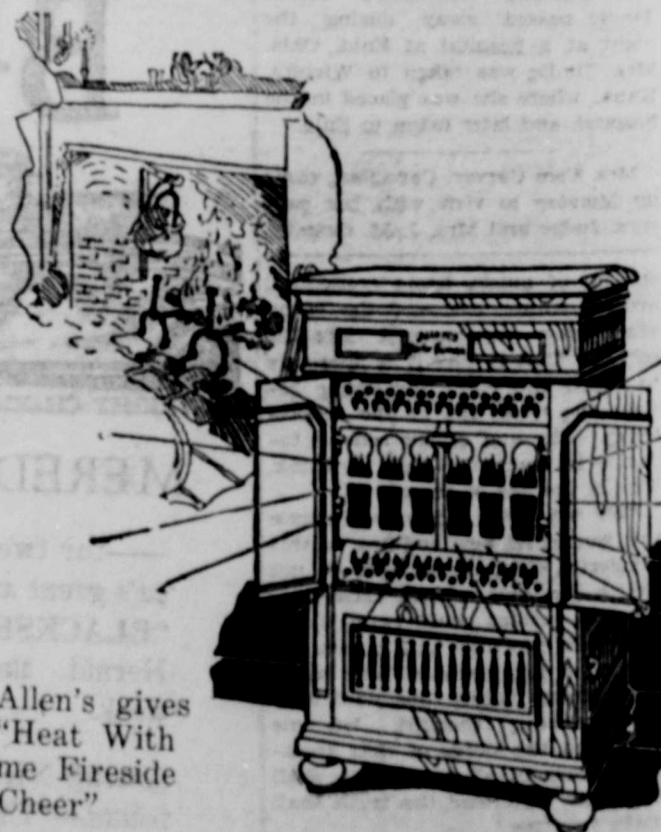

The Chamber of Commerce called attention to a number of accomplishments of that organization. Especially did he stress the department, telling of the department in freight rates on feed that has opened a market for grain throughout the south. He also told of the move by the West Texas Chamber of Commerce in preventing an increase in insurance rate throughout the section that saves West Texas more in one year than it costs to run the organization for the year.

Zimmerman, Liberal, gave a short talk, telling the audience that his city was anxious to co-operate with the organization and help in the work. He also told of the work of the newspaper and magazine people wonder why they do not get as much publicity as they should. "Ordinarily it is not the fault of the town," he said, "but the fault of the town. The newspapers of West Texas are most generous in the space they give to the chamber of commerce. They print almost all stories about them."

The speaker outlined the public relations being done by the regional chamber of commerce to assist in this work. The morning session was held only to reassemble at the tables which were prepared in the high school assembly. Henry Ansley of the Dallas News-Globe acted as master of the luncheon, which was served at the home economics room of the high school. Music was furnished by the Houston municipal orchestra.

During the invocation which was read by Rev. J. S. Huckabee, the assembly sang "America," led by the Dallas Choral club. The speaker told of the need for co-operation particularly between towns and counties. He said that through the West Texas chamber of commerce much has been done in hastening the development of this area.

The speaker told of the value of the chamber of commerce and cited his own experience as an example of what can be done where diversification, cultivation and crop rotation are combined.

Following Judge Hoover's address, Miss Margaret Doorley, Dalhart, sang two numbers, the first, "Indian Love Call," and the second, "Baby o' Mine." Dr. J. C. May gave a short talk followed by John E. Hill, Amarillo, manager of the Panhandle Lumber Company. "We must learn to grow more things," Mr. Hill stated. "We cannot expect to prosper through growing wheat alone. More interest should be taken in sheep. Every farm should have a small flock, along with cows, sows and hens."

Mr. Hill stressed the need for more chicken hatcheries, a condensed milk plant, de-hydrating plants, experiment stations and junior colleges. "What we need," Mr. Hill stated, "is not a new state, but a new state of ideas."

Take Up Building Habit
"No country can prosper until the people of that country are sold on their own country," said Homer D. Wade, manager of the W. T. C. C. "This brings us to the matter of co-operation of which there are three kinds. First there is moral co-operation, to think and talk good of the country in which you live. Second there is mental co-operation—that force which impels us to do good. And third, physical co-operation—when one actually does something."

"In the United States we find that the number of farms have decreased 12 per cent. Only three states in this nation have shown an increase. Florida, California and Texas. Florida has increased by 5,000 farms. California's increase numbers 14,000 farms. The increase of farms in Texas numbers 31,000 farms of which 71 per cent are in West Texas. The population of West Texas is composed of 96 per cent white, Anglo-Saxon Americans."

"The object of the West Texas Chamber of Commerce is the constructive development of the country it serves. We must get away from the one crop farm and develop our agricultural resources. West Texas last year produced, in cattle and calves, \$79,000,000; horses and mules, \$59,000,000; sheep and wool products, \$21,000,000; goats, \$10,000,000; poultry and poultry products, \$27,500,000; and hogs, \$4,000,000 with hogs topping the market. In 1925, West Texas produced \$205,625,000 in oil and gas. The chambers of commerce should develop agricultural resources. We must develop within, and then we will find outside capital will be anxious to come in. Cut out the boosting habit and take up the building habit."

W. M. Goodloe, Amarillo, representative of the Santa Fe railroad gave a short talk, as did J. E. Biggs, Amarillo officer of the chamber, and A. L. Carnahan, financial editor of

the Amarillo Sun.

Representatives Praise Communities

Two minute talks from representatives of the various towns were made by W. A. Miller, Canadian, who spoke of the diversified farming interests; T. W. Gray, Gray, Okla., who told of the moving of Gray to Perryton, uniting with Ochiltree; P. B. Harbaugh, Dalhart, who told of the 1,000,000 building program, the colonization of one family per square mile, the \$3.00 per acre and the raising of \$7,000 for that purpose; Sam Martin, Spearman, told of the increase in wheat acreage, from 125,000 acres in 1926 to 325,000 acres in 1927, of the eight blocks of paving, the new city hall and the sewerage bonds, of the 27½ acres in the high school, and claimed the largest membership in the West Texas Chamber of Commerce of any town north of the Canadian river.

Rose Ritzley, Guymon, Okla., spoke

of Texas county wheat, 7,000,000 bushels in 1923, and 12,000,000 bushels in 1926, the world's greatest wheat growing county. He spoke also of the new \$200,000 court house, and the diversification program. Beaver, Okla., was represented by Raymond Kimball who told of the county's greatest building boom in the past ten years, of the diversification, poultry farms, row crops, terracing and the planting of trees along the creeks, of the new court house, and of the dairy farms.

C. M. Light, Liberal, Kans., told of the building campaign, of the sixteen miles of gravel road that had been constructed to the north and the three miles south. He also mentioned that they would gravel the trail to the southwest this year. He spoke of the gas franchise and stated that a gas well was now being drilled. Judge W. R. Ewing spoke for Miami which he termed was the heart of the wheat district. He also spoke of the sewer

survey that was now being made and of the street improvement proposition and the new school building.

Speaks of Gruver Vicinity Club

Mrs. M. B. Turner, Gruver, spoke of the organization of the Gruver Vicinity Club, the only organization of its kind in the state, composed entirely of farmers and ranchmen. Mrs. Turner also stated that in the Gruver community they had broken twice as much sod as was planted in wheat last year. O. C. Goodwin, Borger, spoke of the problem of building a city in a year and a half, of the new \$230,000 school plant, of the \$30,000 city hall, of the concrete paving through the county, of the new carbon black plant and the one already established, of the large refineries already built and the two under construction, of the new brick Christian church and the six or seven other churches, and of the recently organized Borger Board of Trade & Commerce.

Frank J. Graves, Stratford, told of E. J. Wiggins, wheat grower of Stratford, who started ten years ago without capital, and in 1926 harvested 60,000 bushels of wheat. Graves spoke also of the \$60,000 court house that had been built in the past five years, of the \$40,000 school plant and the accredited high school, and of the \$20,000 worth of dairy products that were shipped last year.

W. T. Fleeson told of Perryton, the youngest "city" of the Trans-Canadian district, of the \$100,000 worth of municipal improvements including sewerage system, new water wells, new reservoir, city hall, and other improvements, of the new \$75,000 school, mentioned a \$60,000 hotel that was to be started within a few weeks, of the large building

International Sunday School Lesson

OCTOBER 16, 1927
Elijah in Naboth's Vineyard
Lesson Text—1 Kings 21:1-20

This lesson brings before us the story of a just man who suffered shameful wrongs with dignity and patience. Naboth, because of his fidelity to God and loyalty to the teachings of the Scriptures concerning the inheritance (Lev. 25:23-28), was stoned to death.

A small vineyard adjoined the enclosure of King Ahab's summer palace at Jezreel. Naboth was the owner. Ahab desired to add it to his estate. He well knew that the law forbade any Israelite from alienating the inheritance of his father. This was Naboth's sufficient reason—a conscientious one—for declining to gratify Ahab (v. 3).

Ahab, lord and king of all the territories of Israel, owner of vast estates, couldn't enjoy himself without Naboth's little vineyard. Naboth, a plowman, was not coveting anything that Ahab owned. The truly wealthy man is the man who is contented. The poor man is the man who is always craving more.

This king, with his two great palaces, who had all the pleasure that unlimited power and wealth could command, like an overgrown boy, threw himself on the bed, turned his face to the wall and refused to eat. He couldn't bear to be thwarted in any desire. He must have his toy garden (v. 4).

How childish and peevish some men become! One trivial want is stronger than many possessions. One little disappointment overbalances all their blessings. Like a spunky child, Ahab tells Jezebel all his trouble. He implied that Naboth's refusal came from mere obstinacy and desire to thwart his wishes, where as he knew that Naboth had put it on the high ground of obedience to God's law.

Just leave it to Jezebel! If she cannot think of a way to beat this man, no one can. "Arise and let thy heart be merry," she said, "I will give thee the vineyard of Naboth" (v. 7). Some people are very generous of other people's property.

Ahab knew that the queen would use foul means. He was an accomplice by his silence. Let us not think for a moment that God will not hold us responsible for wrongs of which we are aware and which we have the power to arrest. Such whispering moods as Ahab was in, and to which many others are subject, are sure to bring some Jezebel to suggest a crooked way of getting what is wanted.

"She wrote letters in Ahab's name and sealed them with his seal" (v. 8). She notified the elders and nobles of a fast day, when Naboth was to be exalted among the people (v. 9). Then what? Suddenly two men will appear to bear false witness against Naboth. They will say: "Thou didst blaspheme God and the king" (v. 10). He will be carried out and stoned to death and his property confiscated.

Never was a more impious mandate issued. Murder was to be committed under the color of a religious service. The forms of legal justice were to be employed while every rule of justice was violated. In it all she makes pretense of acknowledging God, for whom she had hitherto manifested nothing but scorn. But there was the king's

signet, the badge of authority. The orders must be carried out.

The religious assembly was convened, then transformed into a court. Naboth, suddenly finding himself in a conspicuous place, was charged by paid liars with blasphemy and treason. There was no opportunity for answer or disproof. Sentence was pronounced, and he was dragged off to his death (v. 13).

Where, in all the record of Jezebel, can one redeeming feature be found? She bears the stamp of utter depravity and demon possession. Her mind was a perfect nest of sins, hissing and coiling together. Why should such a picture be drawn upon the pages of Scripture? To show us the depths to which a soul may sink when under Satanic control.

"Jezebel said to Ahab, Arise, take possession of the vineyard" (v. 15). That sounds easy enough. But, as one has said, "there was other red on the vines of Naboth's vineyard, as Ahab soon found out." Every drop of grape juice should remind him of Naboth's blood.

Then, there stood the grim figure of Elijah, like an embodied conscience. "Thus saith the Lord, In the place where dogs licked the blood of Naboth, shall dogs lick thy blood, even thine" (v. 19). The man who puts forth his hand to take a fancied good by violating the laws of God, will get more than he expected. He will never fail to hear an accusing voice that has only evil to prophesy.

In due time Elijah's words were fulfilled. Ahab met his death from a bow. Then came the horrible mangling of Jezebel and the slaughter of all the king's sons! Heaven never defaults. The wages of evil are sure, sooner or later, and the man who has suffered wrongfully shall have his losses made up to him a million fold on the other side.

Was there any joy for Ahab in his new garden plot? Note his words to Elijah:—"Hast thou found me, O mine enemy?" (v. 20). Great is the power of conscience. A guilty heart can find no peace.

Will men never learn that sin while tempting us is loved—but when finished, is loathed? There is always some Elijah waiting at the gate of our stolen gardens. If conscience is our friend, there is peace. When once it is offended, bid goodbye to a tranquil mind.

While a man has his heart set upon evil, he imagines that ashes are gold, and thinks that the true sweet is bitter. He meets the messengers of God with the exclamation—"Hast thou found me, O mine enemy?" Thus men stumble about in the darkness of sin and unbelief, mistaking the faces of friends for the faces of foes. An awful day of disillusioning is coming.

The best thing that can happen to a man is that God should not let him alone in his evil course. Thank God for messengers of His Gospel! Thank God that He makes men feel the rod! Pity the Ahab and Jezebel who are so hardened that they have "sold themselves to work evil in the sight of the Lord" (v. 20). Nothing but outer and eternal darkness can await such souls.

The man who sells himself to the devil, will have to take his own medicine. It is a voluntary act. It is deliberately submitting to the

dominion of sin. Let him remember that in the end, what he is giving for his unhallowed pleasure and dishonest gain is himself—forever.

The 25th verse is a summary. "There was none like unto Ahab, which did sell himself to work wickedness... whom Jezebel, his wife, stirred up." A wife brings out either the best or the worst there is in a husband.

Beware of Jezebels who prey upon the weaknesses of men. Remember that there is to be a resurrection of acts as well as bodies. The Christ-rejecting man who chooses to live his life independently of God, will find himself surrounded in the judgment day, by the ghosts of his own sins.

As each perhaps forgotten sin appears before his face, will he not cry out as did Ahab to Elijah:—"Hast thou found me, O mine enemy?" And will there not come the answer: "I have, because thou didst sell thyself to work evil in the sight of the Lord?"

PITH AND POINT

There are plenty of tempters for spineless people (v. 7).

Some who have no regard for God will make religion a cloak for selfish schemes (v. 9).

Elevation has proved a death trap for many a man (v. 12).

One may get possession of what it is not God's will for him to have but he will be certain to get a "lemon" with it. The fellow who thought he had gained a vineyard by craft, in reality had lost a throne.

Some sell themselves (v. 20) to Satan; others rent themselves out by the day.

Pleasure won by peace is lost. A sinner is blind to his true friends and foes (v. 20).

Covetousness is the father of robbery and the mother of murder.

What change do we see in Elijah since the last lesson? (v. 17; cf. 19:1-3).

What was the end of Ahab and his sons? (v. 19; cf. 2 Kgs. 9:7-10; 10:1-7, 11).

What New Testament character forms a striking contrast with Ahab? (20:43; cf. Phil. 4:11).

What were Naboth's motives in refusing Ahab's request? (v. 3; cf. Josh. 22:29, 34-16:1 Sam. 12:23; 24:6, 26-9-11; 1 Chron. 11:19).

The proprietor of a bakery shop tells how a rat was found one morning, imprisoned in a hole it had made in a loaf of bread. The rat had nibbled into the loaf and continued feasting until its whole body was inside the loaf. It became so fat as the result of eating so much of the soft bread that it could not get out again. The baker found it in the morning, caught in the trap made by itself. Many a man has been caught in the same way. Bad habit has at last closed the trap on him, and struggle as he would, he could not escape.

program, of the rotation, cultivation, diversification program, of the \$10,000 dairy to the north, of the model chicken farm nearby, of Farnsworth, the sheep center of the North Plains, to the west, and of the best cattle in West Texas to the south. He spoke also of the Retail Merchants Association, of the \$100,000 court house project under discussion.

B. E. Farrell, Darrouzett, stated that more wheat was shipped from that point this year, than from any town on this branch of the Santa Fe, and told of it selling at an eight cent premium because of its high protein content. He told also of the thirty sections of ranch land that was being broken up into small farms, and of the new \$5,000 hotel under construction and the other new buildings completed. Walter Allen, Stinnett, told of the year old city of 500 with its good buildings, its railroad which would have service into Stinnett within two weeks, of the new \$75,000 school building and of the 1 1/2 miles of concrete highway already completed in the county and of work progressing at the rate of 1,000 feet a day.

L. R. Conner, Farnsworth, spoke of the sheep center of the plains, telling of the four business houses in Farnsworth, three of which were members of the West Texas Chamber of Commerce, of the \$80,000 worth of sheep and wool products shipped this year, of the 500 cars of wheat shipped last year. A. L. Clarke, Booker, told of that great wheat belt and of the splendid row crops. He told also of the amount of butter and eggs marketed in Booker and spoke of the fine school, also mentioning the proposed city water plant. Mrs. J. B. Cartwright, Huntton, spoke of that vicinity as being the finest country in this section. Mrs. Cartwright told of the fine school, the chickens, produce, the pure bred hogs, and the agricultural development.

Henry Ansley in speaking of Amarillo said briefly that Amarillo will grow as these towns grow, and that they will grow as Amarillo grows.

Spearman Wins Convention
Dalhart and Spearman both put in bids for the next convention of the Trans-Canadian District and after a spirited election Spearman won by a 41 to 32 vote.

Delegates who have attended a number of district conventions declared that the first meeting of the Trans-Canadian district was the best convention they have ever at-

tended and praised the spirit of co-operation and the earnest desire displayed by the delegates from every city to aid in the development of this great empire, now in the making.

The following is the report of the resolutions committee:

Resolutions

To the Officers and Members of the Association:

We, your committee on resolutions, beg to report as follows:

1. We recommend that this branch of the West Texas Chamber of Commerce be known and designated as The Trans-Canadian Division of The West Texas Chamber of Commerce.

2. We believe in the policy and the great objects which the West Texas Chamber of Commerce as a whole seeks to bring about in a united effort to accomplish the purpose in view, and we feel and believe that its benefits should be extended to all, irrespective of imaginary lines, who are similarly situated and desire to co-operate with it in the up-building of our common country. We do not believe that the interests of a common people should be divided or severed by imaginary lines.

3. For the purpose of the up-building of this portion of the country served by the West Texas Chamber of Commerce, we believe that the idea of diversification, rotation and cultivation is of primary importance and we therefore, recommend that such be impressed upon the people as one of the cardinal objects in view and the key-note of our future success and prosperity. With this object in view we desire to endorse the splendid work of our various experimental stations and ask that the West Texas Chamber of Commerce make special effort to induce the State and Federal Governments to locate and maintain additional Stations so as to serve the varied climatic and soil conditions peculiar to this part of the Association now designated as the Trans-Canadian Division of the West Texas Chamber of Commerce.

4. We believe in the improvement of our public Highways under a system whereby a dollars worth of improvements may be obtained for each dollar expended. We further believe that this organization should favor the building and maintenance of Trans-Continental Highways. We think this object can best be obtained by the co-operation of the Federal, State and County governments.

5. We believe in the development, not only in our agricultural possibilities, peculiar to this section of the country, but we believe it equally important to adopt a sane

and economical method looking to the development of our general and water resources. We believe that this end and object can best be accomplished by extending to outside capital, an assurance that their aid in its development will insure fair treatment and compensation, as a just return upon the capital invested and the energy extended. We do not think it advisable to raise objections which cannot be sustained by the laws of the land, which has a tendency to discourage capital from making investigations among us. We believe that the peculiar advantages for local factories by reason of location and resources will overcome all other difficulties.

6. We believe that after resources are developed and discoveries are made at great expense that the corporation or individual, making the discovery and spending its means in its development are entitled to the just revenues derived therefrom, and that all attempts on the part of government or individuals to reap the just fruits of their labor and their capital should be strongly discouraged.

7. We recommend public education and the maintenance and support of our educational institutions and the convenient location of similar institutions when demanded and made advisable by the future development of the country.

8. We feel it our duty especially to congratulate the officers of the West Texas Chamber of Commerce in the splendid work they have given to the public, their loyalty, and unselfish devotion to the institution and the objects to be accomplished is worthy of our highest commendation.

9. We desire to thank the Perryton Chamber of Commerce; the Perryton Municipal Band and Orchestra; the Dalhart Choral Club; the Perryton Schools for the use of its splendid building in which we held the first meeting of this division. We desire to express our sincere

appreciation to the Home Economics department of the Perryton High School for the excellent Banquet served. We desire also to express our thanks to the press, both the daily and weekly papers, for their co-operation in making this meeting a success.
