Ranger Coach Among 10 At CAP Workshop

BOULDER, Colo., Aug. 27 — There are ten persons from Texas who are attending the first National Aviation Education workshop this summer at the University of Colorado.

Participants in this summer seminar on aviation are mostly high school and junior college teachers and instructors of cadets in the Civil Air Patrol. They are spending five weeks at the University of Colorado, picking up the latest of information, materials, and teaching techniques which will enable them to explain in a popular way the complex and fast-growing field of aviation.

The workshop is jointly sponsored by the Civil Air Patrol and the University of Colorado and is offered as a five-weeks graduate credit course at the University. Other cooperating agencies in the project include the Civil Aeronautics Administration and the National Aviation Education Council.

Those registered from the state of Texas: Mrs. Janis F. Romanio and Mary Muscare of Dallas, Thomas R. Elrod and Hamp Edwards of Edinburg, Francis R. Brown of Greenville, Walter E. Farber of Houston, Albert C. Hollinger, of Kilgore, Richard E. Henderson of Ranger, Gustavus H. West of Waco, and Elwood D. Marling of Wharton.

Workshop students have come from 28 of the 48 states, as well as Alaska, Hawaii and the District of Columbia. Close to 150 students participated in the project.

While in Boulder the teachers will be given orientation flights in both light and heavy aircraft. They will visit commercial and military air installations, including Stapleton Airport and Lowry Air Force Base in Denver. Also, demonstrations of subsonic and supersonic wind tunnels, portable jet engines, and other aviation equipment have been arranged.

An outstanding roster of civilian and military experts in various phases of aviation have been scheduled to lecture to the group. These experts include professors of aeronautics from the University of Colorado and the University of Denver, Air Force ROTC officers from various universities in Colorado, and high school master teachers of aviation education selected from different parts of the nation.

Altogether, the teachers will get a sweeping introduction to the social, economic, and political aspects of aviation as well as instruction "at the layman's level" in meteorology, theory of flight, aerodynamics, and other aviation studies.

The workshop began July 25 and will wind up on August 26.

Turkey Growers Plan Barbecue September 12th

Preliminary plans for the occasion were developed at the monthly meeting of the group at Gorman recently when over 100 turkey growers from five different counties were present.

A man in Ranger has agreed to barbecue the birds and to furnish the meal which will begin at 6:30 on the date set.

A buyer from Corsicana was present at the Gorman meeting and gave his views on the market now and the future market for the Thanksgiving and Christmas markets.

Wheat, Eastland, Agricultural Representative of the Texas Electric Service Co., talked and gave a demonstration on the use of infra-red heat lamps for brooding poult.

Two Government Departments Work Stevenson Tideland Plan

WASHINGTON, Aug. 27 (UP) — Staff experts of two government departments and a Senate committee already are working on Gov. Adlai E. Stevenson's proposal for legislation to settle the tidelands oil dispute, it was learned Wednesday.

The Democratic presidential nominee announced last week end that he opposes state ownership of the oil-rich submerged coastal lands because the Supreme Court has ruled the federal government has "paramount rights" to them. He called the legislation "mindful" of both state and federal interests to administer the lands and distribute revenues from their oil.

Staff members of the Interior and Justice Departments and the Senate Interior committee promptly started "exploratory conferences" to see what sort of compromise could be worked out.

Will Be Prepared

One participant, who declined to be quoted by name, said the purpose was to "be prepared" in case Stevenson wins the presidency.

He said the staff conferences are discussing the possibility of giving the coastal states a share in control of the submerged lands and a bigger cut of the oil revenues than federal control bills previously have proposed. An estimated \$40 billion worth of oil reserves lie off the shores of Texas, Louisiana and California.

Meanwhile, Sen. Allen J. Ellender D-La. said he will introduce another state ownership bill when the new Congress convenes in January. President Truman vetoed a similar measure last May.

Says He Assured Louisianans

Ellender said Stevenson's stand on the tidelands issue "seriously jeopardizes his chance of carrying Louisiana." He said the Democratic nominee's statement "will cause a lot of people to vote for General Eisenhower," but that it is to early to predict which man will win in Louisiana.

Ellender said he will vote for Stevenson even though he disagrees with the governor on the tidelands issue.

"I'm a Democrat," he said. "I'm certainly not going to vote Republican."

Ellender said he had felt "confident" Stevenson would not oppose state ownership of the submerged lands and had given that assurance.

California Will Vote For Adlai, Regardless

SACRAMENTO, Calif., Aug. 27 —State Attorney General Edmund G. Brown has expressed confidence that Gov. Adlai Stevenson will hear both sides of the tidelands argument.

In California's Democratic party ranks despite the defeat of his favorite, son presidential slate by Sen. Estes Kefauver, said Tuesday night that Stevenson took his stand without knowing California's side of the case.

"I feel confident Governor Stevenson will listen to both sides of the question," Brown said. "I don't know how he could know California's side."

The decision of the Supreme Court that the government should control the submerged coastal lands has resulted in the loss of more than \$9,500,000 in taxes a year to California. Of that total, 70 per cent went for state beaches and parks and 30 per cent for general state purposes.

Jailhouse Composer Gets New 3 Year Term

MILWAUKEE, Aug. 27 (UP) —Frank Grandstaff, the jail cell composer, returns to prison Wednesday with enough time to finish his autobiography.

He suggested in his trial for stealing a ring, wrist watch and a piggy bank that Judge Herbert J. Steffes sentence him to enough time to complete the book, "Would one to three years be enough?" the judge asked.

"Yes, your honor," Grandstaff said. "In fact, I'd appreciate it if you would shave that a little."

Steffes declined to do so and handed down the three-year sentence in Wisconsin prison for burglary and attempted burglary.

Grandstaff won freedom from a Tennessee prison by composing a cantata about Texas, the Big Spring Cantata, on the prison walls.

Gov. Gordon Browning of Tennessee permitted the composer to attend the centennial celebration at Big Spring where his work was given its premier performance. Browning later pardoned Grandstaff.

'LIST HEADED BY SHIVERS AS GOP MOVES FOR DEMO BALLOTS

SAN ANTONIO, Aug. 27 (UP) —Texas Republicans made it painless Wednesday for the traditionally doggedly-Democratic Lone Star state to pick Dwight D. Eisenhower for president and still "vote 'er straight."

In an unprecedented action, the GOP at its state convention unanimously embraced the entire state Democratic ticket of 15 nominees, headed by dissident Democratic Gov. Allan Shivers.

It also includes Attorney General Price Daniel, the U. S. senatorial nominee, who earlier this week urged a Texas "revolt" against national party candidates and leaders and selection of a double set of presidential electors—one set pledged to Eisenhower—for the Democratic column on the general election ballot.

By "cross-filing" the entire Democratic state ticket, the Republicans took advantage of a new Texas law permitting listing of a candidate on the November general election ballot as the nominee of more than one party.

Candidate May Refuse

Unless a Democratic nominee for state office specifically withdraws as a Republican nominee within 20 days, his name will appear on election day in both the GOP and Democratic columns.

If a Democrat does not choose to run for the GOP, the Republican executive committee was empowered to choose another nominee for the post.

Acceptance or rejection of the bid to be Republicans, too, was expected from the Democrats Sept. 9, when they held their state convention at Amarillo.

The "New Guard" GOP, swept to power in Texas with Eisenhower at Chicago, smoothly engineered the cross-filing at the closing session of the Republican convention Tuesday.

Try For GOP Texas

It was an admitted effort to lure to the Republican column Texas voters who only once in history have voted Republican, for Herbert Hoover against Al Smith in 1928.

The tidelands controversy did much to spur the Republican action.

Shivers flew to Springfield, Ill., last Saturday in a last attempt to Gov. Adlai Stevenson, the Democratic presidential nominee, to the Texas viewpoint on tidelands.

Shivers was rebuffed by Stevenson, who said further he would, as President Truman twice has done, veto any legislation returning tidelands to the states.

Shivers, meanwhile, was coy Wednesday with regard to the proposed state-level political marriage. He declined to say yes or no immediately to the GOP overtures. He said he was surprised, and added that his own final decision would be dictated by the will of Democrats of Texas.

Glad No Opposition

Said Daniel: "I was not consulted and did not consent to the action of the Republican convention. But, as a Texas Democrat who intends to remain a Texas Democrat, I am glad the Republicans have decided not to run opponents against our state nominees."

But while repudiation by Shivers and Daniel of Stevenson spurred the union, Republicans also were recognizing the traditional reluctance of most Texans to split a ticket. This way they can vote for Eisenhower, the Republicans hope, and still "vote 'er straight" for favored state Democratic candidates.

Republican pacesetters, in their convention nominating committee, also called Shivers "a better Republican than you can find anywhere."

Unanimous Vote

The vote to cross-file every state Democratic candidate onto the GOP ballot was a unanimous voice vote. A chorus of "ayes" rolled across the City auditorium, and not a single "no" was sounded.

The R. & P. a. l. l. c. n delegates stood and cheered, some enthusiastically letting go with a "yippee-hi-yi."

Earlier, convention keynoter and convention chairman a Malcolm MacQuardale of Houston had urged the GOP not to miss their "great chance" to get Shivers and Daniel to "join us."

Orville Bullington, resigned state GOP chairman, also waded in on President Truman for "stealing" the oil-rich tidelands from Texas.

"And Adlai Stevenson is just as bad," Bullington shouted. "In Texas, you're as guilty if you receive stolen goods as if you steal."

Police Seek To Link Slayer To 1947 Kill Case

RIVERSIDE, Calif., Aug. 27 (UP) —Police Wednesday probed the past of an ex-convict, charged with the sex slaying of his 16-year-old niece, to determine if he was linked to the unsolved "Black Dahlia" murder case in Los Angeles.

The investigation was launched when police learned that John Chauncey Lawrence, 37, owned a knitting mill near the vacant lot where the mutilated body of Elizabeth Short—the "Black Dahlia"—was found in 1947.

Los Angeles Detective Chief Thad Brown instructed Ray Pinker, Los Angeles police chemist, to investigate Lawrence as a possible suspect in the "Black Dahlia" case. Pinker had been loaned to Riverside police to help in the murder case of Kathryn Knodel, Lawrence's niece.

Lawrence is accused of slaying pretty Redlands, Calif., high school drum majorette on a lonely desert road after attacking her. He claimed that the girl submitted willingly to sexual relations and was killed accidentally when struck by a jackhandle while helping him change a tire.

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Texas Aggie Track Stars Receive Medals

COLLEGE STATION, Aug. 26.—One of Col. Frank Anderson's top thrills was watching his two Texas Aggie track stars receive their Olympic medals in Helsinki, Finland this summer.

Col. Andy, veteran track coach at A. and M., can remember no greater moment in his career than when Walt "Buddy" Davis and Darrow Hooper stood on the platform after their great Olympic performances.

Davis who threatened the world high jump record in the Southwest Conference meet this past spring with a leap of six feet, 10 1-2 inches, won the Olympics and set a new record with a jump of six feet, 8.32 inches.

Hooper, who'll be a senior and the offensive left end for the Aggie gridder this year, was nosed out by inches in the shot put. His effort of 57 feet, .65 inches, good for second place, was barely shy of the winning toss by Parry O'Brien, Southern California.

Anderson believes the terrific rivalry between O'Brien and Hooper is one of the greatest in modern track. He says their competition is always the featured one at track meets since both will be back for another year, the rivalry will be much more interesting next spring.

The veteran track and field mentor returned to the campus this week after spending the past two and a half months on tour with a group sponsored by the Track and Field News. After attending the national meets in California in June, Col. Andy joined the 40-man tour in New York where the group flew to London.

After visiting in London, Copenhagen, Hamburg and Stockholm, Anderson and his colleagues arrived at the Olympics in Helsinki where they were quartered in private homes.

In addition to seeing what he termed "the greatest and best organized of any of the three Games I have seen," Col. Andy enjoyed a visit with his wife and son, Frank, Jr., in Paris. His son, a medical student at Galveston, toured Europe with Mrs. Anderson this summer. Col. Andy also visited his other son, Walter, at Annapolis before leaving for the Games.

The coach was impressed with the efficient manner in which the Finns operated the Olympics and also in their manner of entertaining the visitors at the Games.

"We were treated very warm. We found no fault with the Finns. They're the greatest hosts I've ever seen in my travels. They think more of the Americans than does any other nation and they're with us to the last man."

The coach, who has had a split tenure as track head here, said the food was plentiful and reasonable, "much cheaper than our prices here in the U. S."

Anderson was coach here from 1922 to 1935 when he became commandant of the A. and M. ROTC. He also served in World War II and returned as Aggie track coach in 1946.

His greatest thrills, before the 1952 Olympics, were his winning the Southwest conference title in 1922, his first year as coach, and all the SW titles his Aggies wrapped up. Andy also mentioned other high points of his life—his marriage and his first new car after driving several used Model-Ts. But all these must be shoved aside when he's thinking of watching Davis and Hooper climb those steps to world fame at Helsinki.

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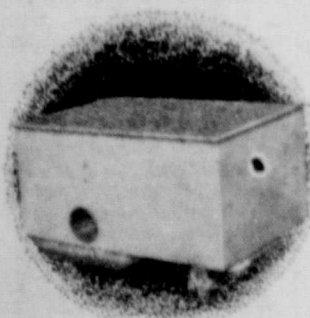

United Press Staff Correspondent HOLLYWOOD, UP—The usual movie Cinderella story is about a pretty, hard-working girl who is standing behind a department store ribbon counter when a producer spots her and, taken with her beauty, converts her overnight into a screen glamour queen.

Today we have another kind of Cinderella story. This one is about Anthony Numkena, a year ago he was an average American boy, attending grade school nearby in Culver City, playing baseball after school with his pals and going to the matinee on Saturday afternoons.

Now, at the age of nine, wearing only a pair of moccasins, a breech cloth and a turkey-feathered headband, he is playing the part of Tyrone Power's adopted Indian son in "Pony Soldier" at 20th Century-Fox.

The picture is his screen debut but the other day he carried off his first scene like a veteran. A group of Cree warriors was bent upon dispatching Power to the Happy Hunting Grounds and Tony snaked through the undergrowth towards the band of bloodthirsty Indians, powwowing around a campfire. He whipped out his bow and arrows and in quick succession knocked off three of the braves. Then he leaped on his horse and galloped off through the forest.

Trained For It

Tony's conversion was not really an overnight matter—any more than the conversion of a working girl to a glamour queen. For most of a year he was learning to ride horses, manipulate a bow and arrow and perform the manifold dramatic chores of an actor.

A serious boy of Hopi and Yaki Indian descent, Tony is considered by Joseph Newman, director, as the acting find of the semester. He won his coveted role after the most intense talent searches of recent years, during which Newman and Samuel G. Engel, producer, interviewed more

than 500 other youthful screen hopefuls.

The day he was tabbed for the job, Tony also engineered an acting assignment for his father, Anthony Sr.

"You need good Indian actors in this picture, don't you?" he asked Engel.

Job For Father

"That's right," Engel admitted. "Well, sir," said Master Numkena, "my father is a fine actor. He also is one of the few Indians in Hollywood who can shoot a bow and arrow with skill. He also can sing. He also can ride horseback—?"

"Sold!" the producer said. So Papa is making his debut, too, in "Pony Soldier."

Tony did so well in his debut that the studio already has other roles lined up for him. Tony doesn't intend to be an actor all his life, though—just until he is old enough for college.

"That's what I am saving my money for," he said. "Then I want to be a doctor."

Texas To Keep Fame, Fish Data

AUSTIN, Aug.—The Executive Secretary of the Game & Fish Commission said arrangements are being made to make a record of unusual specimens of wild game and fish harvested in Texas.

He said cooperation of individuals, sportsmen's clubs, newspapers, radio stations and other facilities will be recruited to provide a permanent, accurate file of the rare specimens.

The Executive Secretary said the plan, which is the outgrowth of a suggestion formally submitted to the Commission by Kenneth Force, outdoor editor of the Dallas News, will be valuable for several reasons.

"It will be designed primarily to provide maximum pleasure for the hunter or fisherman harvesting the biggest trophy," he explained. "But, if the system can be established on an accurate basis, much vital information will be obtained for Game Commission purposes."

"We know that some species change over the years. Some become larger, others become smaller. This method may enable us to expand present facilities for keeping tab of periodic changes. The Commission personnel now uses available data showing trends in game management routine."

The Executive Secretary said present plans are to chronicle practically every kind of species encountered by hunters and fishermen. For example, extraordinary game fish and rough fish catches alike would be registered.

He said present plans are to set up the system through distribution of literature in time for the main fall hunting season.

WEEKLY WILDLIFE WISDOM

Funds for wildlife restoration work in Texas for years have been attributed to the Pittman Robertson Act. This Federal law levies a special tax on sporting arms and ammunition. Another measure, the Lile-Johnson Act, which similarly taxes sports fishing equipment, helps improve fishing. The different states get back the amount collected from their sportsmen through the taxes. It is also

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ated to the state on the basis of the number of licenses sold and also on the basis of the state's area. The money reimburses states for Federal-aid approved projects. Three dollars of the Federal-assigned money is allowed to every \$1 of state game department funds advanced for the particular purpose.

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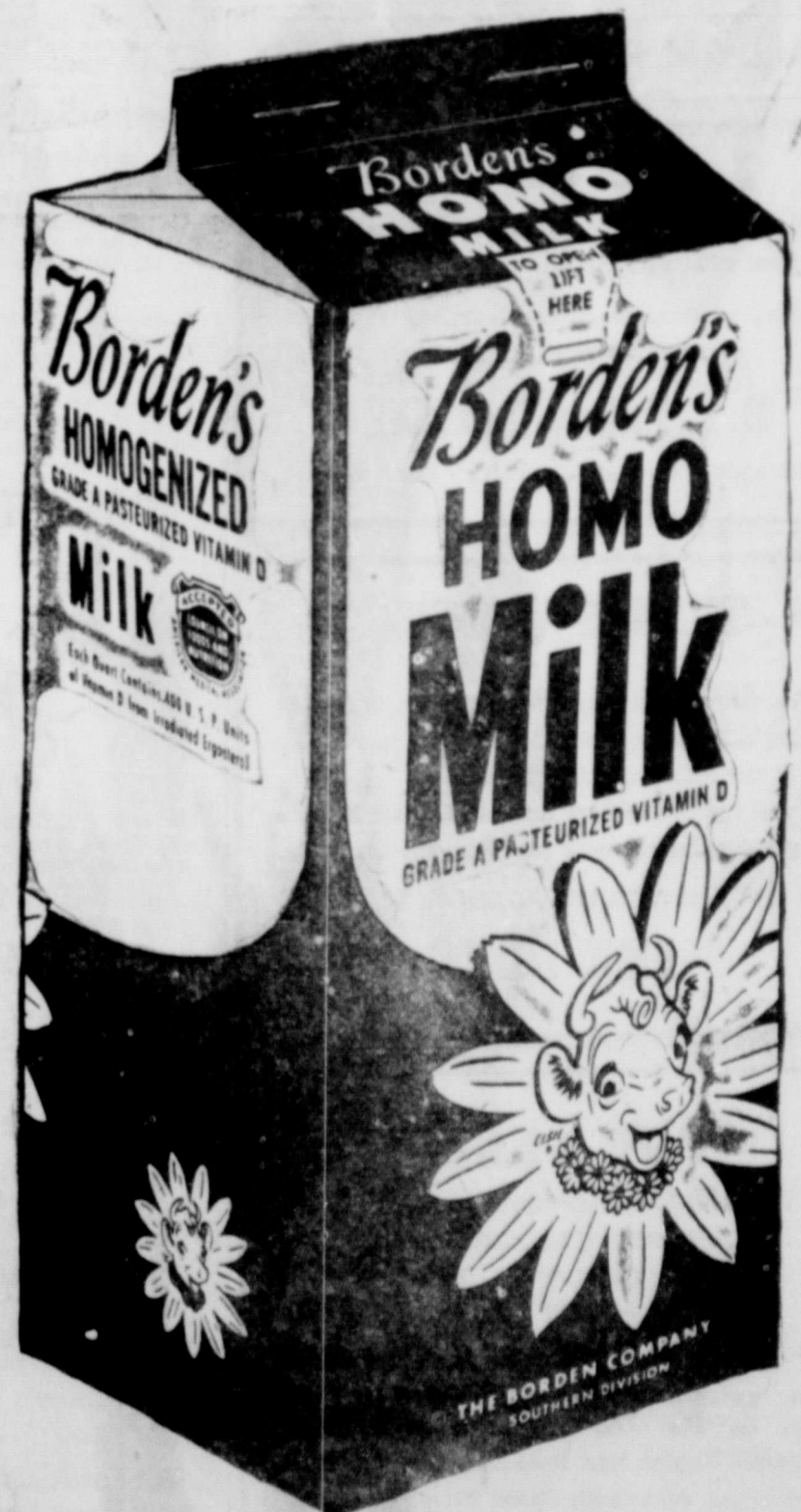

incident and have their mind's eye on the persons or person they believe to be the ignoramus committing the indecent crime.

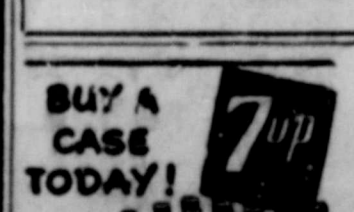
They have said that the person doing the peeping will either get shot by someone or they will place one of the longer arms of the law about his carcass and let the law take it's course very soundly and abruptly.

10 Point Buck Is Too Docile

AUSTIN, Aug. 26.—Somebody's tame deer has been agitating the folks in the Rocky Hollow and Briggs neighborhoods, according to the Game Warden Aubrey J. Shaw of Georgetown.

The "pet" which has a mere ten points and weighs just over 150 pounds, first appeared at the W. R. Weese farm, 12 miles northwest of Georgetown.

Weese investigated a noise in his barn lot at milking time one morning to find his horses chasing the buck deer. His dogs were also trying to get into the meek.

When Weese appeared, the deer ran toward him and before he knew it, the big buck had struck its rack under the astounded man's arm.

As Warden Shaw reports it, Weese regained his own equilibrium, restored order in the barnyard and called the game warden for reinforcements.

When the warden arrived, the deer was temporarily out of sight. He opened the back door of his car to get a rope and just then the deer reappeared and stepped right into the back seat.

There was a slight hassle because the tonneau of the car was small for the animal's big rack.

Later, the buck was kept in a pasture near Briggs while a small leg infection was treated. The deer, at first, seemed content with farm animals. But one evening when someone opened the kitchen screen door, the buck stuck his

rack into the opening and went on inside to begin munching on a piece of watermelon on a table.

The game warden emphasized that summertime docility of tame deer usually turns into dangerous hostility by fall.

He suggested it might be well for all concerned that this buck begin showing wariness before the big game hunting season. "I shudder to think what might happen," said Warden Shaw, "if some buck-fever victim should wake up in his tent some November night and find this 10 point rack in his sack."
