Jewel Brooks Retires After 20 Years Service

Friday was the last day for Postmaster Jewel Brooks, who retired after 20 years with the post office. She has been postmaster the past 11 years.

Mrs. Brooks was presented a service award Friday afternoon by Leo Riley of Amarillo, senior postal systems examiner. Later that day, Betty (Mrs. Dean) Sanders, was sworn in as officer in charge of the local post office. She will service until a postmaster is named.

Moving with her husband Robert to Hart in 1941, the Brookses owned and operated a grocery store here for five years. Later, Mrs. Brooks worked for Hill's Grocery Store and was employed with Bruegel Elevator in Dimmitt when she took a civil service exam and began work at the local post office.

The post office moved from quarters in the Patterson Barber Shop (today's Longhorn Barber Shop) when new facilities were built in 1959.

Retirement has been anticipated by Jewel so that there will be more time for her family and for indulging in her favorite hobby, oil painting. She has taken art lessons four years and looks forward to more in the

future.

After Mr. Brooks' recuperation from surgery this week, the two plan a leisurely trip to California which will be a honeymoon, Jewel says. "We didn't have one before."

The former Jewel Matsler, and Robert Brooks celebrated their fiftieth wedding anniversary in October. They are

parents of a son, Bobby Brooks of Amarillo, and a daughter, Mrs. Deward (Sue) Armstrong of Farwell. Another son, Ernest Lee, was killed in an auto accident in 1964. The Brookses have 10 grandchildren and six great-grandchildren.

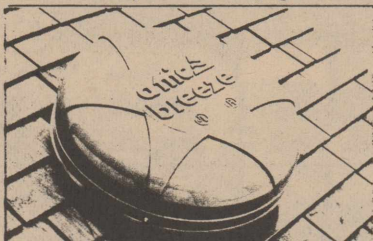

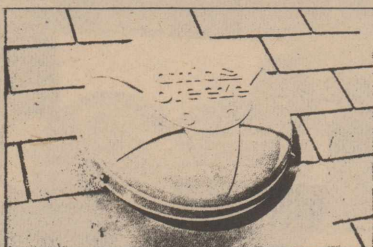

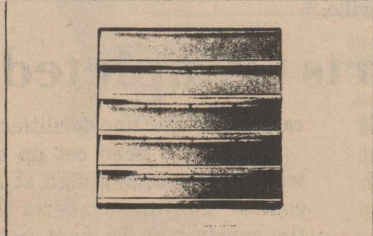

PORK CHOPS & RICE

4 pork chops
1 can beef consomme
1 c rice
1 c water
1 sm onion
salt & pepper

In oblong pan put rice, consomme and water. Stir to mix. Salt and pepper mixture. Salt and pepper pork chops and brown in grease. After pork chops are browned, saute onions in grease, then put them on top of pork chops - which you have put on rice mixture. Cover pan and bake one hour at 350°.

2 pkgs instant lemon pudding
1 lg Cool Whip

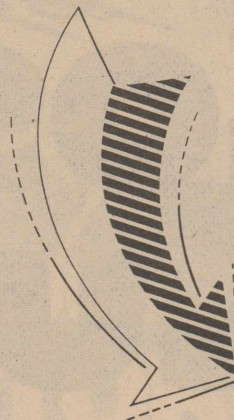

Lions Hear Report On Eye Banks

Don York of Canyon, Director of High Plains Eye Bank, was guest speaker Monday at the luncheon meeting of Hart Lions Club. Serving as president of Texas Association of Eye Banks the past year, York said the High Plains Eye Bank is a member of that organization as well as the Eye Banks Association of America.

"The first eye bank in the United States was founded in 1944," York said. "High Plains Eye Bank, in 1961."

Mainly through the support of Lions Clubs, eye banks have spread over a great deal of the world, into Canada, England, most of the European countries and, three years ago, into Mexico.

Laws in Mexico, York stated, had prohibited eye transplants and led to smuggling. "Lions members, on their own, smuggled eyes into Mexico and operations were performed after hours, often at night, by doctors who themselves were

Lions, on patients who can now see. I won't say the smuggling was justified, but there are persons who now see who could not if there had not been the smuggling."

Eye Banks, York said, are dependent on ham radio operators to help in getting information concerning available transplants and eye donors. "When we learn of a need, we contact our ham operator in Amarillo who broadcasts the need each day at 7 a.m. and 7 p.m. If there are any available in the U.S. or Canada, we know of them in a few minutes and arrangements are made in a few hours because time is of the essence. The same thing applies if we learn of available eyes."

York said that Lions and the eye banks had worked with the state legislature at length and, since January 1, 1976, persons wishing to donate their eyes to an eye bank or other vital organs may have that desire recorded on their driver's

licenses.
