HEDGEPEATH WINS WITH KNOCKOUT

SEMI-FINAL IS FEATURE OF BOXING CARD TUESDAY AT AMERICAN THEATRE

Perryton's first legal boxing exhibition attracted a capacity house at the American Theatre, Tuesday evening, as a splendid fight card between two local champions, Seidon Caradine and Dick Hedgpeath, were the promoters of the club.

The feature attraction proved to be the semi-final bout between Dick Hedgpeath, weight 150 and Earl Madden, weight 151. Spearman, given decisions over Hedgpeath in local exhibitions, Madden was slated to win, but Hedgpeath, the dopebucket by knocking him out in the seventh round.

Was Hedgpeath's Fight
For the opening two rounds, Hedgpeath was content to block Madden's rushes placing in enough punches to make draws out of the two fight periods. Hedgpeath, leading the fight in the third round, was rushed out of his corner by his opponent's groggy taking the third and fourth, but taking considerable punishment while doing it.

Madden's best exhibition came in the fifth when he came back in supreme effort to draw the round, in Dick returning to take the sixth to finish the fight after one and a half minutes of the seventh and had expired. The knockout was a one-two combination of the uppercut to the chin and a powerful right to the midsection. Madden was crouched in an effort to cover up. Referee Compton administered the ten count.

Main Go Is Flashy
After this slugging bout, the main seemed tame but in reality was a scientific match between two clever fighters. Tiger Jack Thompson, Dulhart, was overmatched when went into the ring with Odie Bow, 161, Vici, but gave a very good account of himself. Both were fast and hard to hit and never backed took the smack of hard blows. Judging from the last three rounds which all went to Hedgpeath, the Oklahoma was making an effort during the first seven rounds which were all drawn, dispose of his less experienced opponent but was intent on putting a good show.

FEDERAL MEAT ARRIVES HERE

SHIPMENT CONSISTS OF 1,033 POUNDS OF SALT PORK; IS FOR RELIEF WORKERS

A shipment containing 1,033 pounds of salt pork was received by the local relief committee, Tuesday morning, to be distributed among the families on the relief rolls in this county.

The shipment coming out of a carload received at Amarillo, was delivered by the R. M. Brown Truck line and is a part of the Federal Relief program. The meat, it is understood, is supplied from the stocks being purchased from farmers by the government, on which a bonus is being paid. According to Mr. Brown, the truck lines out of Amarillo are distributing the meat from that point, all over the Panhandle, donating their services. The shipment came from Wichita, Kans.

According to Herbert Shindler, county relief administrator, the salt pork will be perated among the relief workers according to the size of their families. The meat is being furnished them without charge of any kind.

STATE HIGHWAY COMMISSION WILL LET CONTRACT FOR DRAINAGE STRUCTURES ON OCTOBER 30TH

Publication of the legal notice asking for sealed bids for the construction of large and small drainage structures on No. 117 from Perryton to Booker appear in this paper. Bids will be accepted until 9:00 a. m., Monday, October 30 at Austin, Texas. The Highway Department will accept bids at the same time for the construction of an overpass on No. 117, east of Darrouzett, and a bridge over Ivanhoe Creek, east of Follett. The two latter projects are in Lipscomb county.

Minimum wages of 45c per hour for skilled labor and 35c per hour for unskilled labor must be paid by the contractors on this work.

The grading construction on No. 117 from Perryton to Booker is progressing very well. At the present time the main force is working three miles west of Huttoon, the road bed being completed with exception of blading from Perryton to that point. The grading and most of the drainage structures in Lipscomb county has been completed for some months.

TRUCK LICENSE FEE REDUCTION

FIFTY PER CENT REDUCTION ON FARM TRUCKS USED FOR HAULING OWN PRODUCE, ETC.

Farmers and ranchmen of the Panhandle and the entire state should feel very grateful to Representative B. L. Rogers of Ochiltree county for the effective work which he put forth in securing the passage of the bill in the last session of the legislature, reducing by fifty per cent the license registration fee of commercial motor vehicles when same is used by the owner thereof only in the transportation of his own poultry, dairy, livestock, and farm products to market, or to other points for processing, or the transportation by the owner thereof of supplies, from the place of purchase, to his own ranch or farm, exclusively for his own use.

This reduction applies only to motor vehicles with a registered gross weight of from one to six thousand pounds or from six thousand and one to eight thousand pounds, consisting of a truck with out a trailer or semi-trailer.

Special plates will be provided for this sort of motor vehicles so that they may readily be distinguished from other cars. Owners who use or allow their trucks to be used in violation of this regulation are subject to conviction on a misdemeanor charge, carrying a fine of not less than \$25.00 or more than \$200.00, each use of the vehicle or each permission for use, constituting a separate offense. This law became effective at once on passage.

At the present time the license for commercial or 1,000 lbs. covering most pick-up bodies runs about \$13. Trucks weighing 3,000, carrying a 3,000 load, require a \$24.00 license, while \$40.00 is charged for the 8,000 lb. trucks. These amounts will be reduced one-half for farm vehicles. This new law will save the farmers of Ochiltree county hundreds of dollars each year.

LOW PRICE AT FEEDERS SALE

ANNUAL SALE AT CANADIAN BRINGS TOP OF SIX CENTS FOR CALVES

Canadian—Eight hundred and thirty-three cattle were sold at auction here Friday morning, by the Northeast Panhandle Feeders Association at prices that were much lower than those obtained previous years. The top load of calves was sold by the Crane Land and Cattle Company to Ralph R. G'ellers, Burns, Kans., for 6 cents a pound.

Following the cattle sale the Northeast Panhandle Hereford Breeders Association auctioned off 15 bulls. Buyers were here from many states through the corn belt and feeder cattle were shipped as far as Maryland. Col. Fred Reppert of Decatur, Ind., conducted the sale.

The local cattlemen are not discouraged by the low prices obtained for their stock and are already making plans for another sale next year.

Following the auction, a barbecue was held with Homer Jamison and Fred Hargrave, Glazier, chief cooks, Jep Todd superintended the feed. It is estimated more than 1,500 persons attended the barbecue—Canadian Record.

The Lesson Story
Our last lesson saw the beginning of the church at Antioch. The present study finds a strong cosmopolitan congregation there. This place is to be the new center of Christian activities, a center from which three missionary tours are to be launched. The story of the old rugged cross must be told abroad as well as at home. Therefore Barnabas, Saul and Mark go forth to this great work with the blessings of the Holy Spirit and the church upon them.

About fifteen miles almost due west of Antioch is its seaport, Seleucia. Boarding ship from this place the missionaries came to the home of Barnabas, Cyprus.

SALAMIS was the first town reached. Passing through this island from east to west they came to Paphos, the seat of the worship of Venus, goddess of love. Gross immoralities existed generously in this base worship. Elymas, a sorcerer, tried to prevent a deputy, one Sergius Paulus from accepting the preaching of the gospel. Here Saul comes to the front. His withering rebuke results in the sorcerer being stricken with blindness. The deputy believed and turned unto the Lord.

The missionaries now take ship and sail to Perga in Asia Minor. John Mark went no further with Paul and Barnabas, but returned to Jerusalem. Undaunted by Mark's desertion, the heroic trailblazers of the gospel press on to ANTIOCH in Pisidia, ninety miles north of Perga. (some authors give the distance as one hundred and twenty miles) contained a synagogue. Into it went the missionaries, bearing the tidings of the gospel. The second Sabbath that Paul and Barnabas were there, nearly the whole city came together to hear the word. Gentiles were glad and glorified God for Paul's messages and what deliverance from sin meant to them. But the Jews were stirred up against the pair and expelled them out of their coasts.

ICONIUM was the next point on their journey. They "so spake" as to make believers. The words, "believed" and "disobedient," are used as opposites. A saying faith is an obedient faith. Belief without obedience is only a dead thing.

LYSTRA is the next place mentioned. There they preached the gospel. What a powerful message. With clouds gathering over the cross, with silence and sadness around the tomb. Satan seems triumphant. But, lo, the first day of the week comes. The bonds of death are broken, backward rolls the great stone from the sepulchre, and the Son of God comes forth. The healing of a lame man brought Paul and Barnabas were Gods. It took vigorous protest to prevent the people and priests from doing sacrifice to these missionaries.

But trouble came soon. The Jews from Antioch and Iconium came to Lystra, persuaded the people, and stoned Paul so severely that he was dragged from the city as dead. But he revived and the next day came to Derbe where they preached the gospel and taught many people.

THE RETURN JOURNEY: The missionaries returned through the same cities as far as Perga encouraging the new disciples to continue in the faith. Elders were ordained

In each of these congregations. THE HOMECOMING: When the missionaries at last entered Antioch, the starting place there was no doubt of great rejoicing. Then came the rehearsal of his eventful journey. God had opened the door of faith unto the Gentiles. With the Christian Jews, they had become one in Christ by the blood of the great harvest of souls made possible by this, FIRST MISSIONARY JOURNEY.

May Form Game Refuge

Game Warden Recommends Refuge To Protect Migrating Geese From Hunters

Canadian—Do you like to shoot geese? Who doesn't! There is no thrill for the wild fowl hunter that will compare with trying the trusty gun on a flock of the big gray honkers just down from the north. They are a prize worthy of the ambition of any hunter.

Where have the geese gone? Game Warden Buck Harris has been asked this question many times recently by Hemphill County sportsmen. The Canadian River and lakes in Hemphill County used to furnish some good goose shooting but in recent years the flights of geese have been fewer and farther between and gunners miss the shooting which formerly had given them so much sport and the fowl that adorned the table center at goose dinners.

Warden Harris has seen the same situation arise in other parts of the Panhandle from the same cause and has seen the remedy applied which has again afforded the sportsmen good goose hunting.

Here is the cause. Geese shot on their roosting places, that is, on the lakes or river will not return to them but will stop at some other place when migrating. Geese live many years and are very wise. When gunned for on a lake or shot at on the river with a rifle from long distance range they will not return again. It that kind of hunting is kept up, in a very few years the geese will avoid all such places where they have been hunted or may change their line of flight completely and be seen no more in that territory.

Here is the remedy and it has been tried out and proven successful in the Panhandle. First, do not hunt geese on their roosting places and second, establish a game refuge on the river where they will have a safe place to roost with no chance of being hunted. Then the question arises as to where they can be hunted and the answer is, on the feeding grounds. When they are not molested on the roosting places they may linger for days at one place.

This has been tried out in Oldham and Dalham Counties and has worked out to the hunters' satisfaction and sport. In Oldham County a refuge twenty miles long has been established on the Canadian. This method has been in operation for three years and the hunters get plenty of geese by hunting from blinds on the feeding grounds. A refuge on Coldwater creek near Buffalo Springs in Dalham County has been maintained for five years. Gunners there get better shooting than before the refuge was established. Warden Harris says that geese have stayed on these refuges up to and through March. When they know they are not going to be disturbed on their roosting places they are in no hurry to move on.

Why not establish such a refuge on the Canadian in Hemphill County? Goose shooting is a long way from being good here now and it couldn't possibly do any harm. If you are interested in goose shooting talk it over with Buck Harris the next time you see him. He can give you some facts—Canadian Record.

Storing Vegetables

Winter Storage of Garden Truck Is A Wise Practice For The Panhandle of Texas

The following article on the storing of winter vegetables was sent out by J. P. Rosborough, extension horticulturist of A. & M. College. Mr. Rosborough will be in Perryton, October 19, and conduct a public demonstration on special phases of garden work.

October Garden News

Beans should be thoroughly dry when stored and the storage place should be dry. Before they are stored they should be treated for weevils by being kept for at least 48 hours in an air-tight container into which has been placed 1 pint of carbon disulphide (high-life) for every 1,000 cubic feet of space. The gas is dangerous near a fire, so treat it with the same precaution as you would gasoline.

Beets cannot be stored successfully in South or Central Texas, but in the Panhandle Section storing may be done. Beets require moist conditions and a temperature just above freezing. They may be piled on a dirt floor kept covered with moist soil, and dug out as needed. They should be young and tender when stored. About 1-2 inch of the leaf stem should be left to prevent bleeding. Detroit Dard Red is a good variety for storing. At best beets do not retain their quality in storage so well as carrots or some other vegetable.

Cabbage can be stored with safety only in the Panhandle section of Texas. The heads should be mature, but should not stand long after reaching that stage. Heads should be solid and free from disease or injury, and without loose leaves. Danish Ballhead is a good variety for storing. Cabbage does not keep well where moisture collects on the leaves. If kept in the same storage room with root crops, it should be kept on shelves where air can circulate around it. It should not be stored near butter or milk as these products will absorb the odor of the cabbage. The temperature of the storage room should be about 30 F. Where there is continuous cold weather throughout the winter, cabbage may be stored in outdoor pits, trenches, or in mounds. A common method for storing cabbage outdoors is to prepare a trench 8-10 inches wide and a foot deep. The trench should be lined with straw, hay, or other litter. The plants are pulled and only the outer leaves are removed. The plants are placed head down in the trench and covered with straw over which a layer of soil is placed. As cold weather approaches more soil is added to prevent freezing. By this method a few heads may be removed without disturbing many of those left in the trench.

Carrots require moist storage conditions and a temperature barely above freezing. The tops should

be cut to a length of 1 1-2 inches. Carrots may be piled on the storage room floor and kept covered with moist earth. Denver's Half Long and Chantenay are good varieties for storing.

Onions should be well ripened when stored. They should be thoroughly cured by being spread in layers in a dry place for several days. Direct sunlight discolors white onions. All thickneck onions, splits, and doubles should be destroyed. Onion crates allow air circulation and are excellent containers in which to store onions. The storage place should be cool but dry. The root cellar will not do. Onions should not be allowed to freeze, but if they do, it is better to keep them frozen until they are used.

Pumpkins and squash should be well ripened when stored and should be handled carefully to prevent bruising. They should not be exposed to freezing or injury from frost while in the field. They need a dry room with a temperature of 42-52 F. Cellars in the Panhandle section are well suited for the storage of pumpkins and squash.

Potatoes. Only sound and well matured potatoes should be stored. Following harvest they should go through a curing period of 10-20 days at a temperature of 80 to 90 F. Later the temperature should be around 55 F. and the air dry. A dry storage house is best, although a bank made with ventilation in the center and with a covering of straw over which there are 4-6 inches of soil will act as a simple farm method for storage.

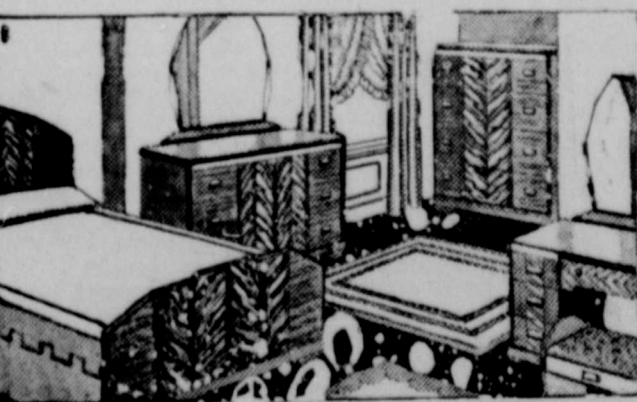

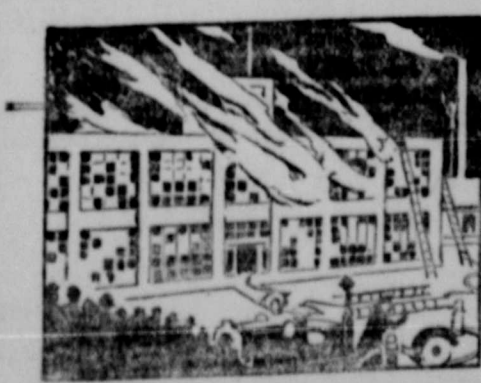

RED CROSS IS WORTHY CAUSE

ASSIST APPROXIMATELY 826 PEOPLE IN COUNTY IN PAST YEAR REPORT SHOWS

The American Red Cross has been active in Ochiltree county during the past year, the annual report of Mrs. Ida Garrett, secretary to the local chapter revealed at the luncheon of the Roll Call executive committee last Friday noon.

The extent of the assistance given the needy of this county during the past year, came as a surprise to many members of the committee who did not realize the scope of Red Cross activities. For this reason the report is being made public that all may know.

A total of 1,784 yards of cotton piece goods has been received by the local chapter, including 350 yards of outing, 30 yards of birdseye, 450 yards of shirting, 300 yards of muslin, 34 yards 9-4 sheeting, 620 yards of dress material. According to Mrs. Garrett, the local chapter will receive 500 yards more which will be the last to be distributed by the National Red Cross as all the cotton appropriated for this purpose has been used.

56,100 Pounds Of Flour
In addition to the piece goods, the chapter has also received 12 dozen sweaters for men, women and children, 41 dozen union suits for men, women and children; 47 dozen pair hose assorted; 8 dozen pair men's and children's overalls, 4 dozen pair pants for men and boys; 2 dozen men's jumpers; 25 comforters; and 35 pair blankets.

A total of 56,100 pounds of flour has been received and distributed to the needy during the past year by the local chapter, with the exception of about 75 sacks which are still on hand. A total of 300 sacks 50 pound and 411 sacks 100 pounds each have been received. This amount is all that is available as the wheat supply is used up.

Many were not aware that during the July tornado that did considerable damage in Perryton and this county, that the Red Cross sent workers into this section and that from the results of this survey fifty needy families were assisted at a cost of \$450.00 which was sent from the national association as a special disaster fund.

The total number of people assisted by the Red Cross during the past year include 110 families in Perryton, with 300 children; six families in Farnsworth with 20 children; ten families in Waka with 37 children and 42 families in the rural sections with 121 children. Twelve individuals without families were assisted making a total of 826 people receiving some aid from the Red Cross during the past year.

Assisted When Needed
The report was given in full to the executive board that the members might know just what the Red Cross has been doing during the past year and be in position to sell the organization to the public when the Roll Call drive opened on November 11 to 12. The past year has been the first time in history, it was reported that Ochiltree county had ever been given assistance, but when the emergency arose, the American Red Cross answered the call with every help possible.

"When the public knows these facts," Mrs. Jno. E. Eldridge, Roll Call chairman stated, "they will not hesitate to assist in every way possible this year. We want to repay the national organization by going over our county quota in the Roll Call drive."

The names of the Roll Call workers under each captain will be published next week, Mrs. Eldridge advises. The captains of each team will meet Monday to complete their organization.

W. T. S. F. C. To Meet Kansans In Big Game On Butler Field In Amarillo

AMARILLO—Friday, November 3, has been designated in Amarillo as "College Football Day."

The occasion is the meeting of the powerful and colorful Ravens of St. Benedict's College, Atchison, Kansas, and the up and coming sensational Buffaloes of the West Texas State Teachers College of Canyon. This football game between outstanding minor colleges of the Southwest and Midwest will bring to the Panhandle the first inter-sectional grid game of importance.

St. Benedict's College is just commencing to attain national recognition as a producer of great football teams. Two years ago officials of the school secured the services of a former All-America player, "Moon" Mullins as the first step in a new athletic program. Mullins made his name famous throughout this country as a fullback on the late Knute Rockne's Ramblers of Notre Dame. Mullins last year coached his team to six wins and two losses. This year he hopes to better this record. He was given J. Harris, last year's All-America guard at Notre Dame, for an assistant.

St. Benedict's is a Catholic institution, being headed today as "the Notre Dame of Kansas."

In the Buffaloes of Canyon, the Ravens will meet a team that promises to become one of the greatest ever put out on the Panhandle. Under the tutelage of Al Baggett, himself a believer in the famous Rockne system, the Buffs are just beginning to round into a slashing ball club.

The game will be played on historic Butler Field. The entire City of Amarillo is behind the event and her citizens pledge themselves to leave nothing undone to make November 3, a gala day for football fans. Prices for reserved seat and dates when tickets will go on sale will be announced in the near future. Interest in the clash is already high, and local sponsors of the game predict a record-breaking crowd.

Increase Farm Income

Farmers Need Increase In Income Instead Of More Loans And Relief Bills

The latest proposal of President Roosevelt to bolster up the price of farm commodities is to create a non-profit corporation to purchase and distribute the necessities of life to the needy. Harry L. Hopkins, Federal Relief Administrator, is charged with the duty of setting up the proposed corporation and getting it to function with the least possible delay.

The President is represented as believing that in many states and municipalities relief allowances are now inadequate, and that they should be substantially increased as rapidly as possible.

While the declared purpose of the Agricultural Adjustment Act is to place farm commodities on the same price level as commodities that farmers must buy, during recent weeks agricultural prices, as reported, have stood at 64 per cent of the pre-war level, while industrial prices have risen to 112.

At prevailing prices, the best that government statistics have been able to do is to indicate that the total farm income for 1933 will be slightly in excess of \$6,000,000,000, or about \$1,000,000,000 more than in 1932, one of the most disastrous years that the farmers of the country ever experienced.

Nothing short of a \$12,000,000,000 a year income will put the American farmer back on his feet, enabling him to pay his debts, interest and taxes, besides consuming his share of the products turned out by our industrial establishments. Any further increase in prices of manufactured commodities, without a corresponding increase in the market value of farm products, will simply prolong and aggravate the conditions from which we have been suffering the past four years.

MANY APPLYING FOR ALLOTMENT

OCHILTREE ONE OF LEADING COUNTIES IN STATE FOR NUMBER SIGNED

COLLEGE STATION—Following the deadline for signing applications for Government wheat contracts a check reveals there is a prospect that 40 percent to 50 percent of Texas wheat growers will cooperate in carrying out the domestic plan, and that from 60 percent to 80 percent of the total Texas wheat acreage will be represented in contracts. This is the belief of Extension Service workers at headquarters at Texas A and M College based on early October reports of county agents in 100 wheat counties.

That the interest in the wheat relief plan is greatest in the large wheat counties is indicated by the fact that of 4005 farmers applying for contracts up to October 1st, 80 per cent lived in 10 counties. These growers represent about 85 percent of the total sign-up, it is said. These counties are Ochiltree, Swisher, Castro, Farmer, Deaf Smith, Carson, Hemphill, Potter, Hartley and Lubbock.

Latest reports to the Extension Service show that 16 percent of Texas growers have applied for contracts and that they raise about 30 percent of the wheat of Texas. It is estimated that considerably more than half the applications for contracts will be made in the last 10 days of the campaign.

Reports from other wheat states to the Wheat Section in Washington show that immediately after the end of the application signing date September 25th a total of 380,472 applications had been tabulated, representing 30,952,655 acres signed up. The closing date for signing applications was extended in Texas to October 15th because of the delay in receiving cotton checks tied up county agents' time, and also because an investigation of the accuracy of the Texas wheat allotment is under way. This investigation is the result of a protest made by Congressmen Marvin Jones of Amarillo, chairman of the House Agricultural Committee.

Kansas is reported from Washington as having signed up 11,791,427 acres out of a possible 12,541,000 acres, and Nebraska has a sign-up representing 97 percent of its acreage.

Officers of the Wheat Section of the Agricultural Adjustment Administration are urging final intensive efforts in order that a high percentage of the national crop be signed up in contracts.

FARMERS WHEAT REVIEW BOARD

NATIONAL COMMITTEE COMPOSED OF FARMERS TO GIVE FINAL CHECK

Farmers familiar with conditions in the wheat producing regions of the country will be among members of the "county acceptance organization" a review board which will give final inspection to acreage-reduction contracts when the contracts are sent to Washington. It was announced today by the wheat section of the Agricultural Adjustment Administration.

George E. Farrell, associate chief of the wheat section, today announced plans for the organization to review county records and the contracts. The board will include farmers, statisticians, and extension service workers from the principal wheat states.

"With these men from the major wheat areas on the board, farmers may be certain that the records from their counties will receive sympathetic and informed consideration," Mr. Farrell said.

"The records of each county will be accepted as a unit; the county records will be considered in the order in which they are received," the wheat section head announced.

"After the county wheat production control association has made the individual farm allotments and contracts have been signed, the application contracts and association records are forwarded to Washington, where the acceptance board will check the county totals of farmer who participate, the total acreage involved, and also the acreage not included in the wheat program. Another item which the board will check is the budget adopted by the county association. This is done to insure that expense to farmers in every county is held to a minimum."

"In addition to checking county totals, the board will review in detail a number of contracts selected at random from each county."

"As each county is accepted, it will be given a number, and adjustment payments under the program will be paid in the order in which the county records are approved. If for any reason a county report cannot be accepted, the member of the board who is from the area in which the county is located will be given an opportunity to present the case to the board."

"Rejected county reports will be returned to the county for correction when necessary. Such rejected reports will not receive a number until they are corrected in the county, sent back to Washington, and given final approval by the county acceptance organization."

Round Trip Trips To Coast And For Seasonal Holidays Are Announced

Chicago—Following a meeting of passenger officers of Western railways held today, H. W. Siddall, chairman of the Trans-Continental Passenger Association and of the Western Passenger Association announced reductions in passenger fares in addition to those announced after a meeting of the Western Association of Railway Executives on October 6th, effective December 1st, as follows:

All year excursion fares with nine months limit to and from Pacific Coast, at radical reductions. Tickets will be good in all equipment. The present trip rate for example from Chicago to California is \$144.00 under the reduction, the rate will be \$111.00.

Round trip fares with ten day limit will be applied between all points in the West on basis of 2 cents per mile in each direction. Slightly higher for longer limits.

For the Thanksgiving holiday period, 2 cent fare tickets in each direction will be sold November 28th to 30th, with a limit of ten days.

For the Christmas and New Year holiday period, a rate of 2 cents per mile in each direction was authorized. Tickets will be on sale from December 14th to January 15th. This is the lowest holiday rate ever named by the Western lines.

All winter excursion rates to Southwest territory, such as Texas and Mexico points, will be reduced approximately 20 per cent. The passenger representatives are now working on cheap summer rates, which will be announced later.

These rates will apply on all roads west of Chicago, St. Louis, Memphis and New Orleans.

Beaver, Okla.—On October 4th, the Beaver County Wheat Allotment Committee met with Mr. W. F. Callendar, Chief of Federal Bureau of Crop Estimates, and the Oklahoma State Board of Wheat Directors. They were informed that since Beaver county wheat farmers had turned in over 50,000 acres more than were allotted us under the wheat program, it will be necessary that our acreage be brought within the limited number of rigid check of each application.

The County Allotment Committee, composed of Fred Ginter, C. F. Arnot and D. W. Grimwood, were in session this week checking over the 2300 applications and hearing complaints where acreages have been protested.

A great number of acres have been taken off of the applications by conscientious farmers coming in and correcting their own applications and by reductions made by the county allotment committee on protested farms. This number of reduced acres is comparatively small, however, compared to the excess number and we were informed by Mr. Callendar and the Oklahoma State Board of Wheat Directors that unless it could be reduced otherwise, a percentage reduction will be necessary which would be unfair to those who have turned in correct figures.

Every possible effort is being made by those in charge to bring our county acreages down to where it belongs and we ask the support of
