Jess Mitchell Candidate for State Senate

Jess Mitchell, editor at Muleshoe, in Bailey county, announced his candidacy for State Senator for this 30th Senatorial District, to succeed the late Hon. Arthur P. Duggan, whose recent death left that office to be filled by an election called by Gov. Allred for September 28.

Mr. Mitchell, in making his announcement, says he is entirely mindful of the opportunity for service and of the grave responsibility this office entails. He considers holding of public office a sacred trust. "I verily believe," he said, "that aside from the duties of the church, there is nothing more serious and more sacred than duties of State."

"I make no pretensions whatever at being a skilled politician; have never held public office and am not interested in politics for me; but I am tremendously interested in the welfare of this great area of West Texas. I have, in years past, as a public spirited citizen been able to accomplish many favorable things for this section, and confidently believe that as an official I can accomplish even more and greater results."

"I am 55 years of age, virtually in the prime of business life, strong physically, alert mentally and sound morally. I am a college and university graduate. While I am now and have been for several years past a newspaper editor, I am also a farmer, owning three farms embracing several hundred acres, one of them being an irrigated farm near Muleshoe on which myself and family reside. I was born on a farm, have been an actual dirt farmer and am well acquainted with the farmer's problems."

"I was a soldier in the Spanish-American War, served in the secret service department during the World War, and was at one time United States Commissioner at Columbus, N. M., under appointment of President Woodrow Wilson."

"The Citizens of this State have spoken in large majority favoring old age pensions, repeal in some sections and abolition of the officer fee system. As your senator, it would be my privilege and pleasure to do all within my power to enforce these mandates by passing such laws as would grant to the needy aged this financial income and to arrange for its payment; to pass such laws as would regulate the sale of liquor to the best advantage of the State, as well as for the protection of those counties not favoring it and to us my strongest influence toward enforcing the Fee amendment as authorized by the citizenry."

"My one desire is to give consistent, conscientious and constructive service to the State in general and especially to this district in West Texas, looking toward eventually making this section the best part of this great Lone Star Empire. My great wish is to keep step with the citizens of this district, to work in unison with them, and to eventually participate with them in the blessings which will come to all of us because we have fought a good fight—we have kept the faith."

"There are innumerable benefits to which this area is entitled, ought to have and could have with proper representation in Austin. Strong, courageous men, men of ability and broad successful business experience are needed for such conquests against overwhelming odds. It will be my supreme pleasure to become the champion of the needs and rights of the citizens of this Senatorial district."

Special Election To Be Held Saturday

To Vote For State Senator Saturday

An election will be held on Saturday September 28 to elect a State Senator for this Thirtieth Senatorial District to fill the place of the late Senator Arthur P. Duggan.

The election will be held at the Court house here in Lamesa in the same manner as all other elections and at the different voting boxes in the county.

Five names will appear on the ballot. They are: G. H. Nelson of Tahoka; B. Reagan, Big Spring; Pink L. Parrish, Lubbock; Jess Mitchell, Muleshoe; and Wm. H. (Bill) Evans of Lubbock.

Immediately after the election the successful candidate will be sworn into office. The legislature is now in session and will likely be for some time to come.

All Dawson county citizens who have paid their poll tax are urged to vote for a State Senator in this Saturday election.

TORNADOES DEFEAT SNYDER 47-0

The Lamesa High School Golden Tornadoes took the ball on the kickoff at Snyder last Friday and drove to a touchdown in five plays and kept control of the playing from the beginning to roll up a score of 47-0. It was the first time in the several years of competition between the two teams that the local had held such a marked superiority over a Snyder team.

The Tornado backfield of veterans showed up to a considerable advantage with a diversified attack and a strong defense against running plays. Their defense against passes prevented substantial gains though Snyder completed two or three for short gains but the Tornado backs were on the spot to tackle the receivers thus preventing a semblance of scoring.

The Tornado line seems to have the possibilities of development into a formidable wall as experience is gained, as proved in the Snyder contest. Only slight gains were permitted through the Tornado line. In fact it appears as if the entire Lamesa line-up is as strong as in the past two years.

A large group of local fans who made the trip to Snyder to view the 1935 Tornado team, were astonished with the ease in which the victory was accomplished and many of them left for home before the game was finished as the game was so one sided that it wasn't even interesting.

It started with the resodding of the field and making an effort to get an even planting of Bermuda grass early after the close of school last year.

The field was watered during the dry spell and the grass mowed and otherwise treated to obtain good growth and even spreading. The wires of the fence were tightened, posts have been whitewashed, the bleachers have been painted and the reserved sections were re-numbered. The lighting equipment has been kept in condition and adjustment. The field is ready for the first crowd of the current season on next Friday night.

The grass is thick enough to make lining quite a job and to crowd out the heel-plugs which make football less attractive to those players who find themselves falling to the ground. The field is in fact in the most improved condition the Golden Tornadoes have ever claimed as a playing field. 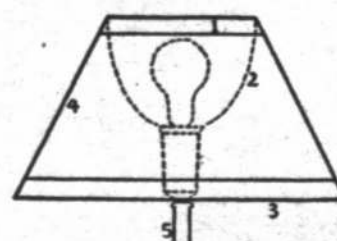

Part-Time Jobs For High School Students

Notice has been received by Miss Pauline Bulsterbaum, County Superintendent, that funds have been made available for a program of financial assistance for 20 single young men and women between the ages of 16 and 20 in Dawson county who are at present unable to attend school for want of money for text books, lunches, transportation, and other essentials from the beginning of the individual institutions fall term after September 30, 1935, to the end of the spring term, in no case later than June 30, 1936.

The following information is submitted for students desiring to make application for assistance under the high school student aid program of the National Youth Administration: Students who are eligible to participate in this program:

1. Students must be between the

ages of 16 and 25.

2. They must be members of relief families and must be able to do high grade work in school.

3. They must be able to show that they are not graduates of any school teaching 11 grades and that they will be unable to attend this year without such assistance.

Institutions which are eligible to participate in this program:

1. All institutions of less than college grade, both public and private are eligible to participate in the program provided they are non-profit making in character.

2. If you are not sure that the institution you wish to attend comes under this classification, consult your public school superintendent in the city, county or other school district in which you reside.

Type of Aid Available:

1. The aid provided high school students is in the form of part-time jobs which enables students to earn on an average of \$6.00 per month while attending school.

2. In the case of individual students who are especially well qualified, and for whom the assignment of work is impractical, due to some physical defect, aid may be granted for maintaining excellence in their school work. In such cases, the assistance granted shall be in the amount determined by the student's individual need, but in no case to exceed \$6.00 per month.

How to make application:

1. Make your application direct to the principal of the school you wish to attend. Do this at once.

A committee in each county, composed of the County Superintendent, the City School Superintendent in school districts having a scholastic population of 500 or more, and the Case Worker in charge of that county, will determine the amount of funds that each school in that county shall receive. (This amount is to be proportioned to districts according to scholastic population.)

After jobs are procured among the various schools in the county, the Principal of each school will submit to the County Superintendent a project application in affidavit form asking for his quota of jobs at \$6.00 per job, together with the students' applications properly executed. The county superintendent will sign and submit to state relief office all project applications in triplicate with students' applications and the total amount of funds asked for in all his applications must not exceed the total allotment to his county.

The student files application with the principal of the school he wishes to attend. The Principal places the applications. The Principal also submits a list of the eligible applicants to the Social Service Department in the county for verification of the relief status of the students' families. The original of the approved list, verified by the Social Service Department, with the names, mail addresses of the students to be aided, and the proof of their eligibility, is sent to the State Emergency Education Director, Littlefield Building, Austin, Texas. The copy of the approved list will be used by the Placement Committee in selecting the ap-

plicants to receive jobs.

Type of Work: 1. Socially Desirable work.

a. Clerical.

b. Library—school, city or county.

c. Extra janitorial.

d. Act as traffic officer at near-by elementary school as safety features.

e. Campus improvement.

f. Play Ground Supervisor.

g. Assistants to school nurses in giving physical examinations and in rendering first aid.

h. Laboratory assistants.

i. Etc.
