FARMERS ARE GIVEN EXTRA SIGNUP TIME

Producers of Eastland county have been granted a final extension to file work sheets in the soil conservation program. County agent Elmo V. Cook announced Tuesday. The new deadline date is June 10.

Producers who want to sign the sheets must do so at the county agent's office, Cook stated. "We are told with emphasis that this will be the final extension," Cook, stating the extension is statewide, declared. Approximately 675 farmers have done the work sheets. This represents 28 per cent of the county's producers. It is expected this percentage to 30 per cent. Approximately 90 per cent of the county's producers participated in the Agricultural Adjustment Administration program before its institution.

Cotton Crop Yield Is Below 1928-32

AUSTIN, May 27 — (UP) — Revision of instruments of the 1935 Texas cotton crop made by the U. S. Department of Crop Estimate here today showed 2,956,000 bales. This estimate is below the previous estimate of 3,000,000 bales because insect damage was greater than was expected. Yield was 35 per cent below the five year average of 1928-32.

Hearing of 'Black Legion' Gang Postponed

12 MEMBERS SENT BACK TO JAIL---NO BOND

DETROIT, May 27 — (UP) — Examination of twelve members of the black legion charged with the kidnapping and murder of Charles Poole, 32, was adjourned today for six days despite the objections of their attorney. All were ordered returned to county jail after Judge Ralph Liddy refused to entertain motions for bail. Wayne County Prosecutor Duncan McCrea, who is investigating reports of widespread terroristic activities of the legion requested the adjournment in order that his office might pursue its inquiry. He promised the court that "within four or five days I anticipate we will be able to bring other defendants into court and have a hearing for all of them at one time."

John Doe warrants, charging twelve other members of the legion with the murder of Poole who "know too much" about the innerworking of the band have not yet been served. Meanwhile inquiries into the black legion were to be extended. State wide efforts to determine whether other mysterious deaths of torture, bombing and arson could be attributed to the vigilante group. Today's examination, called to satisfy the court that the defendants should be held on charges of murder and kidnapping, brought brief testimony of only three witnesses, relatives of the slain man, and the medical examiner, who performed the autopsy on his body.

Sullivan spat out his cigar, took four deep breaths, and less than two minutes later was dead.

South Texas Flood Waters Receding

HOUSTON, May 27 — (UP) — Flood waters in south Texas receded slowly today, dispelling fear of a major disaster. At Houston where heavy damage resulted last December, Buffalo creek continued to rise slowly to fill its banks in the heart of the city, but all danger believed passed. Rainfall was intermittent at headwaters of the stream pushing it out of its channel only in the lowlands. The crest of the Colorado river raced away from the Wharton district and failed to get out of its banks. The flood was expected to continue harmlessly into the Gulf of Mexico.

COURT RULES INDIVIDUALS CAN SUE STATE

AUSTIN, May 27 — (UP) — The theory that the State cannot be sued by an individual without permission by a legislative bill was wrecked by Texas Supreme Court in a decision here today. The court ruling on a certified question from a lower court, ruled that permission may be granted by a simple resolution in the legislature, providing it does not set up a liability to the state. For several years the attorney general's department has held that suit must be brought in Travis county district courts. The supreme court declared this an error when it ruled that suit against the state may be brought in the home county of the plaintiff.

Produce Market To Plan Milk Increase

Lloyd Griggs, efficiency man for the Western Produce company with a milk and produce station in Cisco, is here from Oklahoma City, making a survey of proposed routes as feeders for the plant here, which makes daily shipments to the cheese and milk plant at Abilene. Mr. Griggs visit here is understood to be for the purpose of increasing production in the Cisco territory, preliminary to the establishment of a cheese plant here when production should have reached sufficient volume. Rains are said to be hindering functioning of routes already established, it was said at the local plant.

Tree Planting Plan Found Impractical

WASHINGTON, May 27 — (UP) — The \$100,000,000 great plains shelter belt project, designed to prevent deterioration of midwestern farm lands from Canada to the Gulf, was tried and found wanting. Widely acclaimed as the salvation of millions of acres of farm lands when it was proposed by President Roosevelt two years ago, the project is to be "liquidated" this year. The nearly \$3,000,000 already spent on it is to be written off as experimental work found impractical. The program laid down by Mr. Roosevelt, envisioned millions of trees planted in a shelterbelt strip one hundred miles wide, extending through the Dakotas, Nebraska, Kansas, Oklahoma and into the Texas Panhandle.

Eugene Moore Found Guilty of Murder

SHERMAN, May 27 — (UP) — A jury deliberating thirteen minutes today found Eugene Moore guilty of murdering Dale Ford at Dennison on March 15. Prosecutors had asked the death penalty. Sentence will be pronounced later.

Railway Crossings To Get Attention

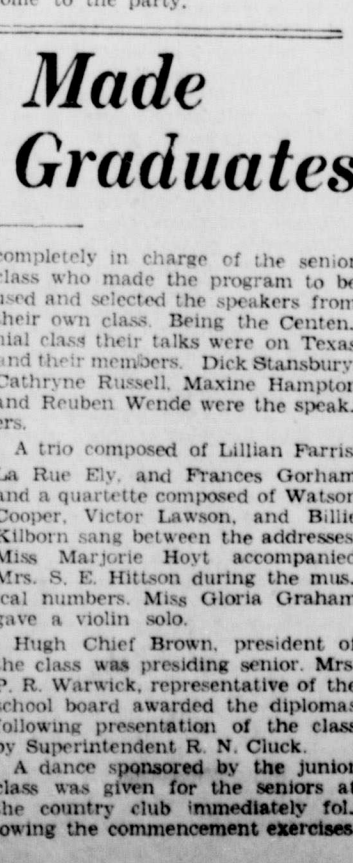

They were accustomed to roosters stepping high and rolling in the dirt, but never before had they seen one flopping around without a head. The decapitated cock could not have harmed the chicks for he had no bill with which to peck; but he looked strange so they showed speed.

A boy blacked his face with burnt cork and went around to see his dog. The dog had high hysterics; he was torn by conflicting emotions; his eyes told him one thing and his nose another. He saw a black stranger and he smelled his white master. He barked frantically and at the same time wagged his tail vigorously; one end of him was afraid of the boy and the other end glad to see him. The mystery of the thing got the dog's goat.

Human beings are just as much flabbergasted by the eerie things as are animals and almost as easily stampeded. In a certain battle during the Civil War a seasoned regiment that had been holding a line for 24 hours was withdrawn and replaced by a detachment that had not before been in action.

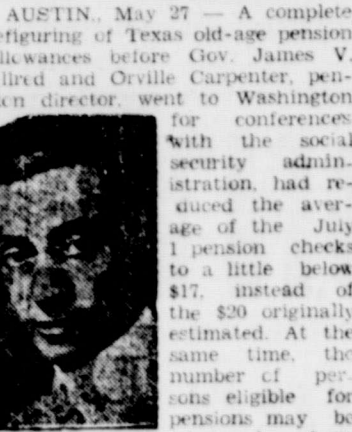
The men who had been relieved withdrew to a grove where, after eating and resting, they removed all their clothing and sat down to hunt cooties. Texas Topics

AUSTIN, May 27 — A complete refiguring of Texas old-age pension allowances before Gov. James V. Allred and Orville Carpenter, pension director, went to Washington for conferences with the social security administration, had reduced the average of the July 1 pension checks to a little below \$17, instead of the \$20 originally estimated. At the same time, the number of persons eligible for pensions may be increased above original estimates of 80,000. It now appears 60,000 to 65,000 will get checks on July 1; but all those later ruled eligible will receive retroactive pensions from July 1.

Texas highway commission is now listing about \$75,000,000 of projects, out of which \$15,400,000 finally will be admitted on the 1936-37 federal matched aid program to be started July 1 of this year.

The highway commission is holding back \$7,700,000 state money to apply on a 50-50 matching agreement for the regular federal aid program. Meantime, all the projects to which the commission has pledged itself to delegations, all that it has promised the federal public roads bureau to complete within the next year, and all those the engineers consider emergency projects will be listed. Together these will be four to five times as much as the regular program can handle, here will be a lot of paring to bring the list within available matched funds.

This will not represent all the road work here will be three other dockets: 1, works progress roads, especially farm-to-market feeders; 2, unmatched state construction and the maintenance program, including some light grading, surfacing and culverts.

The federal social security administration has called for civil service examinations, so far as the regional setup in which Texas appears is concerned, only for the following positions:

Administrative officer in charge of grants to states for the children's bureau; director of the child welfare division; director of the division of maternal and child health; public health consultant and public health research assistant.

Dr. Will Beck resigned from the Texas senate to join the state health department in administering the division and maternal and child health. Senator Margie Neal has been selected to head one of the divisions, but the scope of her jurisdiction is not yet known at Austin.

Besides the list of executive officers, the social security administration plans later to have civil service examinations held for the numerous clerkships and positions in its setup.

Candidate Roy Sanderford, in his opening speech, criticized Gov. Allred as spending much time officially in "queen crowning" exercises over the state.

When callers asked where Acting Governor Walter F. Woodul was one day the week he presided at Austin, the answer came, "he is out at a queen crowning." Woodul had gone to West Texas to take part in a local Centennial observance.

The Texas capitol building distinctly has been in dishabille for the many Centennial-year visitors of the past few days. Its floor tiles have been scraped off, leaving the rough, jagged mortar matrix exposed with swirling limestone dust covering everything and piles of broken tiles and debris all about the corridors.

This has been a necessary incident to the reflooring of the capitol, when a fine terrazzo surface will be laid. Its central feature: a 36-foot circle containing in true colors and exact replica, the coats of arms of the six nations whose flags have flown over Texas.

Much of the work has been done at night, to spare capitol workers the noise and obstruction which daytime work entailed.

There will be a little problem of tact for someone at the capitol when Gov. James V. Allred leaves office. In the picture gallery of all presidents of the republic and governors of Texas, Gov. Miriam A. Ferguson's portrait is hung between those of Pat M. Neff and Dan Moody. Then after Moody and Ressa S. Sterling's in the row, another oil painting of the only woman governor now appears. This is a precedent—two pictures of the same chief executive. When Allred leaves office the legislature will provide for placing his portrait on the wall, and normally it would go into the panel where the second portrait of Mrs. Ferguson has been placed. There aren't but a few panels left. Artists are very eager to have their work in this group, and if one of Mrs. Ferguson's pictures is withdrawn—both are excellent—it will cause professional heartburning no doubt, even though tentatively it has been considered that one of the pictures was there only temporarily.

A marble bust of Mrs. Ferguson, presented by admiring friends at the close of her first administration, stands in the rotunda of the capitol.

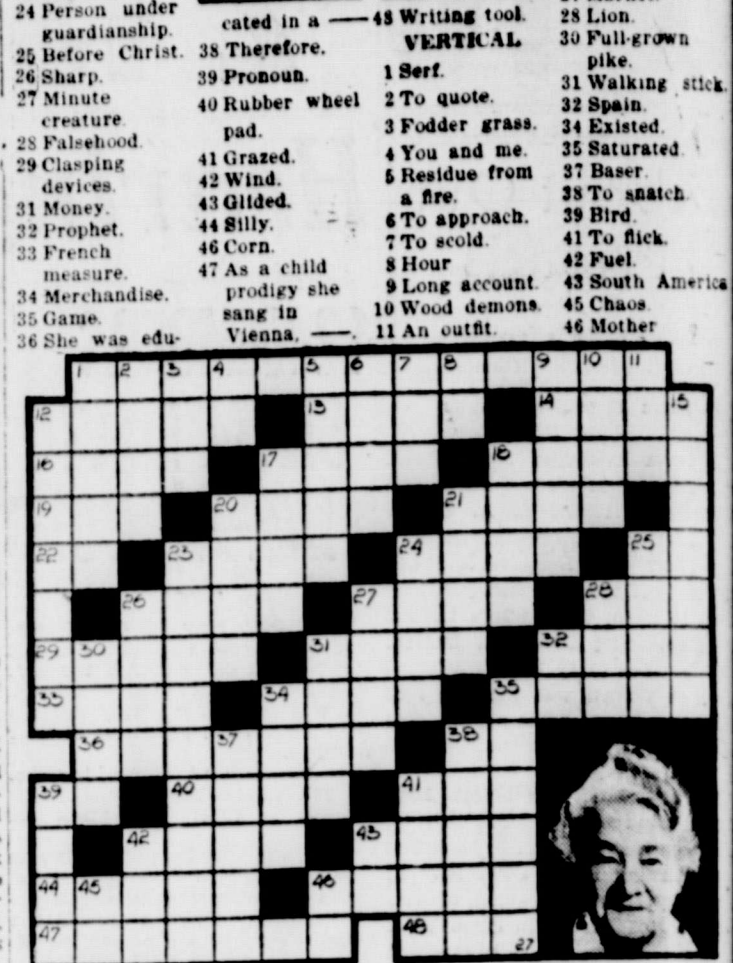

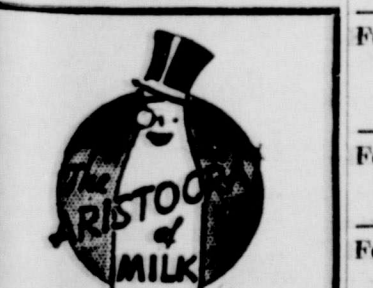

LIQUOR RAISES PRIMARY ISSUE IN N. CAROLINA

RALEIGH, N. C., May 27.—(AP)—

The state sales tax tobacco and liquor are major issues in the North Carolina Democratic primary campaign closing with a state-wide election June 6.

The sales tax, 3 per cent on all purchases with no tax of more than \$10 on a single purchase, has been disputed since enactment by the last General Assembly. Tobacco has become a vexatious issue this spring after it became apparent that no system similar to that of the invalidated AAA would be worked out North Carolina produces five-sevenths of the nation's tobacco grown in the United States. It is the state's major money crop.

Also somewhat unusual to this state is the liquor situation.

Dry Sentiment Strong.

The electorate in 1933 by upward of 75,000 votes defeated a measure which favored repeal of the 18th amendment. Despite this dry sentiment, the legislature enacted bills permitting 17 of the 100 counties to operate county-owned liquor stores, profits to go to the county treasuries. Now dry counties, less prosperous and burdened with debt, are looking for distribution of the liquor profits or authority to operate liquor stores.

Governor J. C. B. Ehringhaus, who is automatically barred from seeking re-election after his term of four years, has held the reins which direct the administration's handling of the tobacco problem. He, or his administration aides, have defended attacks on the sales tax.

Instead of meeting demands of tobacco growing groups to summon the legislature for passage of bills to enforce reduction of the tobacco acreage, Ehringhaus has suggested formation of a commission to direct planting and marketing of the crop. Similar boards were advised by the chief executive in other tobacco producing states, the governing bodies to act in unison.

Four in Race.

Two of the four candidates for the democratic nomination for governor have found disfavour with the tobacco situation. Dr. Ralph W. McDonald, one of the two, has been campaigning principally against the

sales tax. Lieutenant Governor A. H. (Sandy) Graham, grandson of a former governor, with McDonald an advocate of immediate summoning of the legislature to handle tobacco legislation and enact measures to make possible federal aid under the Social Security Bill, is outspoken in suggesting reformation of the liquor measures.

With John McRae, a Charlotte lawyer, and Clyde A. Hoy, former congressman from North Carolina, they make up the quartet seeking the gubernatorial nomination.

Bailey Faces Fight.

The gubernatorial race has overshadowed the other contests, including the re-election campaign of Joseph H. Bailey of Raleigh, senior United States senator, who has three opponents in the primary. Bailey, recognized as one of President Roosevelt's strongest backers in the senate, is expected to face a close fight. Observers, however, believe he will win.

Seven of the 11 North Carolina congressmen also face opposition in the primary. All have been strongly supporting the Roosevelt administration and their fight to retain their seats will be over issues which

have arisen in their districts and not over their allegiance to the administration.

Voting is expected to be heavy.

CEREMONY SPEEDED.
