

HOME TOWN Talk

There is not much use, during the week of the Winters-Ballinger football game, to try and think of anything else, or to attempt to do much of anything that is not directly connected with that game. Even the coming general election has taken second place in the minds of most local fans — when the game is over, and has been re-played and re-hashed by the Saturday, Sunday and Monday-morning quarterbacks, then we can all get back to doing what comes naturally — trying to exist.

As usual the scramble for tickets to that seasonal classic has been one for the night owls. The line which eventually ended at the ticket window about 8 a. m. on Wednesday before the game began to form about 5 p. m. Tuesday afternoon. By midnight there were upwards of 40-50 people waiting for the ticket office to open.

We dropped by the high school Tuesday night about 7:30 and there were then 25 people in line. A card table had been set up and a game of dominoes started. Some waiters brought sleeping bags, and Joe Baker even brought a folding cot and mattress to spend the night. Portable heaters of all types were in evidence, and coffee jugs were scattered about.

To all of those who took turns keeping a place in line, and to those who spent the night on the sidewalk and grass in front of the school building, this wait-out, or whatever it can be called, was a lark. An all-night bridge game was still underway when the time came for the ticket window to open—to the consternation of the players, who seem to have forgotten the reason for staying up all night in the first place. A game of touch football was played during the night, too — never did find out what the score was.

Out - of - area people passing through at any hour of the night, if they had seen this gathering in front of the school, would have passed it off as just another demonstration of some kind, or a sit-down strike, or a sit-out in protest of something or other.

We wonder if the time will ever come when people will stand in line all night to get a poll tax or register to vote or to vote in an important election or to get tickets to watch a group of students compete in a science or math contest!

The committee trying to organize a big homecoming celebration for the week end of the Winters - Stamford football game — the last of the regular season — have sent out letters trying to contact ex-students. They have had a great deal of success, but there still are many people to be contacted. They are asked to write Mrs. Donnie Oaks who is heading the contact committee.

The following we clipped from some publication; don't know the origin, but the item contains much food for thought:

"The Constitution, with its simple and direct style, indeed has proved to be a true form of government, and its stability is strikingly demonstrated by the fact that more than 5,000 proposals to amend it have been made — but only 24 have been adopted. Pan American Industries Sees Good Year In Production and Sales

Another record year for production and sales of evaporative air conditioners, merchandise shelving and other metal products is anticipated for 1965 by Pan American Industries, according to O. O. Funderburg Jr., president of the company.

The company during the past few months has manufactured and delivered to Medallion Fixtures and Equipment Co., a subsidiary of Southwest Drug Co., more than \$110,000 worth of metal drug store shelving, and has received word from Southwest Drug that that company expects to purchase from \$800,000 to a million dollars worth of the product during the next year, for redistribution throughout the Southwest.

In addition to the shelving manufacturing, a relatively new project for the Winters company Pan American representatives recently reported that production and sales of the evaporative air conditioner manufactured here had increased 57 per cent over 1963 records.

Funderburg also announced the recent appointment of Roger R. Ringley of Hearst to head the sales program for evaporative air conditioners. Ringley was formerly with Wright Manufacturing Co., of Phoenix, Ariz.

The company president also said that complete rearrangement of the welding and stamping shop had been completed, to permit a better and faster flow of work on the assembly lines of the plant. Also, new warehouse space totaling 22,500 square feet was completed just a few months ago, to make the

Jim Ned School To Have Homecoming Saturday, Oct. 31

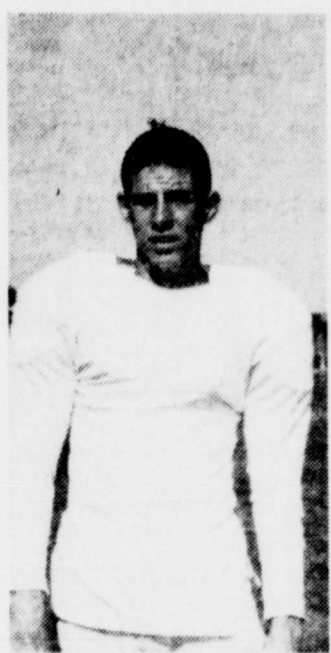
Homecoming at the Jim Ned School has been set for Saturday October 31, it has been announced.

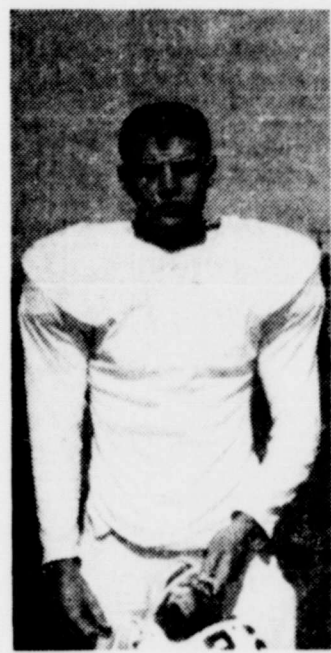

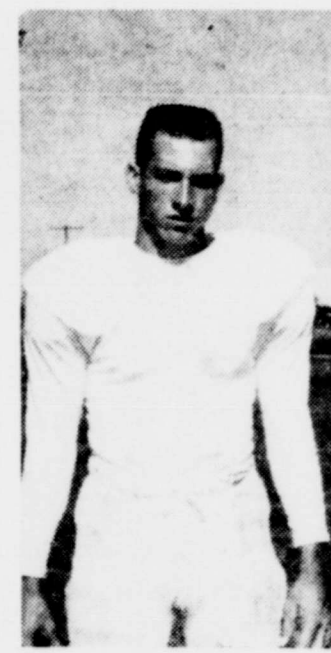

Blizzard-Bearcat Game Friday Nite

The 1964 District 5-AA championship is of no consequence, so far as the Winters High School versus Ballinger High School football game scheduled for Friday night is concerned. A seasonal classic of long-standing, the game will be played at Ballinger, with kick-off at 7:30.

A sell - out crowd is anticipated for Friday's game, which takes the district spotlight this week. Reserved seat tickets have long since been sold out, with only general admission tickets available at the gate.

For many years the Winters-Ballinger game has been scheduled to end the season, but because of the shuffle in re-

numbering the district this year, the game comes in mid-season.

Friday night's encounter will see the league - leading Ballinger Bearcats, with a perfect record for the season and for district play, go against a team which was picked before the opening of the season to go to the State Double A playoffs. Ballinger moved up fast as the season progressed, and now stands No. 2 in the Star - Telegram rating, while Winters, suffering the loss of a first - string quarterback in the opening game, slid off the rating ladder, and have come this far with a 4-3 season record and a 2-1 district record.

Coach L. G. Wilson said Wednesday that the Winters boys continue to be in top shape following their 29-0 win over Colorado City last week. Denny Aldridge, who was out of action following injury in the Lakeview game, returned to the field last Friday night, and will be in the game against Ballinger this week. During Aldridge's absence Richard Puckett has been steering the Blizzards from the quarterback slot. With the return of Aldridge, the Big Blue team from Winters will be reinforced by a pair of fast - action, quarterbacks.

During this season, Winters has played seven games, with three district games; Ballinger has played six games this season two in the district. The two teams have had three common opponents, Mason, Brady and Anson. Winters defeated Mason 16-0, Ballinger defeated Mason 37-0. Winters lost to Brady 6-14, Ballinger beat Brady 20-16. Winters lost to Anson 6-7; Ballinger took Anson 19-0. Brady is the only opponent of both Winters and Ballinger to cross the goal lines of either team more than one time during the game. Against Winters, Brady made two touchdowns; against Ballinger, two touchdowns. Anson made no headway against Ballinger, but eked out a 7-6 victory over Winters.

During the season, Winters has scored 92 points to opponents' 41; 52-13 in district. Ballinger has scored 142 to 26 for the season; in tough district competition, 50-6.

According to the figures, the two teams are about even in field play during the season. First downs: Winters 93, Ballinger 94; yards rushing: Winters 1301, Ballinger 1021; yards passing: Winters 309, Ballinger 569. Ballinger Friday night will be attempting to keep intact their record for wins on their own field. They have a 21-game winning streak for home games. The Blizzards, district champions in 1963, will be out for revenge for the 0-6 loss to Ballinger last year, at Ballinger.

Since 1949, in 15 games against Ballinger, Winters has won four, with Ballinger taking 11. In prior years, from 1924 to 1942, the two teams met 19 times, with Winters taking nine and Ballinger nine, with one tie score in 1925.

There will be little change from the previous week in the starting lineup for the Blizzards against Ballinger. The return of Aldridge to the QB slot will be the only change on the offense, and his return to the safety position the only change on defense.

AROUND THE 5-AA FOOTBALL LOOP

There were enough goose eggs around the circuit last Friday to make a king-size omelet — each of the three games which meant anything in the district fight saw the losers failing to come up with a counter of any kind. Only in the Hamlin-Cisco tie, an out-of-district game, did the losing team cross the counterstrike.

Family fighting saw Winters take Colorado City 29-0; Ballinger over Anson 19-0; and Stamford over Haskell 32-0. Hamlin beat Cisco 13-6.

Last week's games served to make change in the district standing picture, leaving Stamford and Ballinger as the only two undefeated (in district) and dropping Anson down a step to team with Winters for a 2-1 record. However, the picture is not complete because, even though they lead the league undefeated, Ballinger and Stamford have played only two district tilts, while Winters, Anson and Haskell have already gone half through their list of 5-AA opponents.

Ballinger is still the leader in 5-AA, and still is listed as the No. 2 Double A team in the state, by virtue of their season's record, and their potential. The Bearcats have an enviable record for the season, with six wins and no losses, scoring 142 points to 26 for opponents. There, again, the picture is somewhat muddled, because in district play — where it really counts — Stamford leads. In District play — evidence of the competition they're up against — Ballinger has crossed for only 50 points to opponents' 6. Stamford has crossed for 63, and held district opponents to a big round zero.

Ballinger meets the real test this week in their drive for top honors, when the invite the Winters Blizzards. Even though the Bearcats are favorites going into this game, because of their record, they stand to lose a lot — they could be, and may be, knocked off their perch by a come-back, fired - up Blizzards team, which was pre-season picked to go to State. It doesn't really matter what the stakes are in this game between the two Runtels County teams, however — this is a traditional grudge game, and the winner will be the WINNER regardless of the outcome of the district competition. Too, for practical purposes, the Blizzards must win this one to keep in the running for a piece of the championship.

Because there is a strong team such as Ballinger in the district threatening to take all comers and the championship, there is a tendency on the part of many to (Continued on page 8)

Metcalf Works For Approval of Amendment

When Texas voters go to the polls November 3, they will have a chance to save money — and write history — by approving Constitutional Amendment No. 1 on the ballot.

That was the statement today by a member of the State Board of Education, Penrose B. Metcalfe of San Angelo.

Amendment No. 1 would remove the present authority to transfer one per cent annually out of the Permanent School Fund for current school expenditures.

The State Board of Education, which administers the fund, has endorsed the amendment and urged its support. Board members congratulated the Texas Legislature for submitting to the voters this proposal to limit the legislative authority.

The Permanent School Fund originated as a "special school fund" in 1854 when \$2 million was set aside for development of public schools. The fund was to be invested and only the income spent for schools; the same pattern followed today.

The Constitution of 1870 changed it to a "permanent free school fund" and the 1876 Constitution called it a "perpetual public school fund." These constitutions and later legislative acts provided additional public land as endowment for the fund.

In 1891, however, an amendment was approved authorizing the Legislature to transfer one per cent each year from the Permanent School Fund to meet current school expenses. This was done until 1899. It was not until 1957 that such a transfer was again made, but since then five one per cent drains have been made on the fund.

Since 1957 more than \$20 million has been removed from the school fund by the transfer route. Board members pointed out that, at present investment rates, this \$20 million would have produced an equal amount of revenue for current use in 20 years. In addition, the \$20 million would still be in the fund to produce another \$20 million in the following 20 years, had not the transfers been made.

State Board of Education members see this as a dissipation of the trust fund which should be handed down to future generations. Adoption of Amendment No. 1 would preserve the school fund and continue its history of serving posterity, Metcalfe said.

Lake Pauline Open October 15

Lake Pauline near Quanah, Texas, will be officially reopened to fishing October 15 after a 16-month closed season.

In May of 1963, fish populations in Lake Pauline were totally eradicated by inland fisheries crews because rough fish heavily outnumbered desirable game fish.

Immediately following treatment in 1963, the lake was stocked with balanced numbers of catfish, bass and crappie. But two years of extremely dry weather sharply reduced the lake's water level and fisheries biologists recommended an early opening date so anglers could relieve overcrowding fish conditions by harvesting some of the one to two pound game fish.

Fisheries crews report catching bass in check nets that weighed one pound.

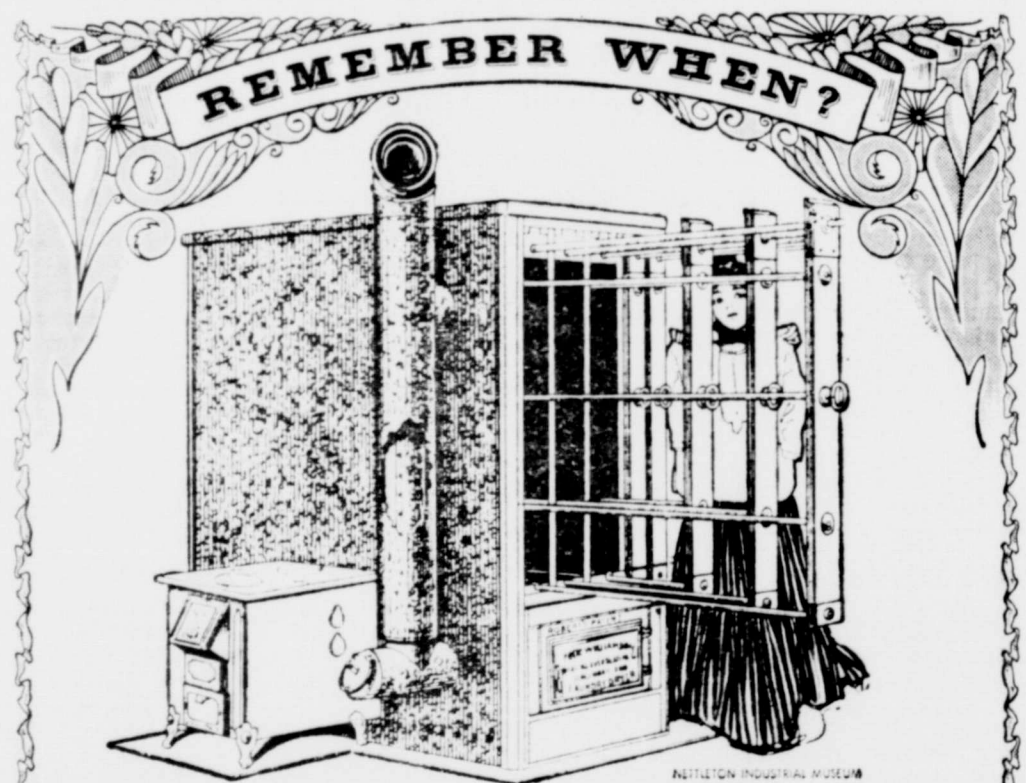

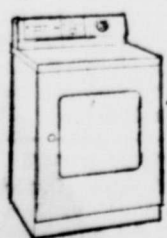

State Capital Highlights—

Commission Recommends Hiking of State College, University Tuitions

By Vern Sanford
Texas Press Association

An increase of \$107,000,000 in state expenditures for higher education and doubled tuitions in state colleges and universities is proposed.

Texas Commission on Higher Education recommends a \$457,100,000 budget for upper level institutions during the 1965-67 biennium. Figure includes \$307,500,000 for 22 state-supported senior colleges and universities.

Tuitions under the Commission's recommendation would be asked for \$50 to \$100 a semester. Last increase was in 1957, when the rate was raised from \$25. If the Legislature approves this hike, revenues would be boosted \$33,000,000 — leaving some \$74,000,000 more needed from tax funds.

Overall budget increase of 45.2 per cent would permit a 23 per cent faculty salary raise. Previously, the Commission had asked a \$5,900,000 supplemental appropriation for faculty salaries.

Commission also recommended "phasing out" Texas Southern University's law school.

CONNALLY GETS NEW JOB
Gov. John Connally returned from the Southern Governors' Conference in San Antonio with a new honor and a new assignment.

Already chairman of the National Democratic Governors' Caucus, he was unanimously elected chairman of the Southern Conference of chief executives.

In a three-day session, the governors discussed a variety of state problems and adopted 14 resolutions. Among the latter was one urging a federal constitutional amendment to permit states to take other factors than population into consideration in reapportioning their senators. Resolution was aimed at

nullifying a U. S. Supreme Court decision ordering both houses of state legislatures apportioned on the basis of population alone.

Three governors blocked action on Alabama Gov. George Wallace's resolution calling on the federal government to leave operation of public schools entirely in the hands of states.

TEXAS BIDS FOR NATIONAL CONVENTION
State Democratic Committee has authorized Chairman Marvin Watson of Daingerfield to enter a bid for the 1968 Democratic Convention in Texas.

Watson will name a committee to consider possible host cities.

COURTS SPEAK
Court of Criminal Appeals ordered a new trial for a man convicted of murder, because his attorney filed an appeal after the deadline. Court heard argument that the trial attorney for the defendant lacked sufficient experience.

Third Court of Civil Appeals heard pleas that the new state shark law was applied unconstitutionally in an Austin district court. Court had ordered package store owner E. L. Parker to stop lending money at rates over 10 per cent without a license.

State Supreme Court upheld an appellate court's "time is of the essence" ruling in deciding the contract contest between the Concord Oil Company of San Antonio and Alco Oil and Gas of Illinois. Court said termination of the contract by letter held precedence over a telephone promise to "wait and see."

TEXTBOOKS PROTESTS AIRED
Witnesses protesting adoption of three high school biology textbooks charged that evolution is an atheistic, unscientific and materialistic theory that should not be taught in public schools.

State Textbook Committee took protests into consideration after a public hearing. Actually eight books on the list were opposed. Principal targets were the three books developed by the National Science Foundation.

OIL PRODUCTION FIGURE SET
Texas Railroad Commission set oil production for November at 28.4 per cent of potential.

Figure represents a slight increase over October, which was limited to 2,860,000 barrels daily under a 27.9 per cent of potential order.

MENTAL HEALTH PLAN COMPLETED

A statewide citizens committee has approved a new program of mental health services.

Earlier, a steering committee had recommended creation of a single agency — Texas Department of Mental Health — to administer state-financed mental health services, including all mental hospital facilities.

Missing pieces in the Texas plan included facilities, financing and administration.

Hale County Judge C. L. Abernathy, chairman of the 112-member general planning committee, said efforts will be stepped up between now and next January to inform the public and officials about the recommendations which will be submitted to Governor Connally and the 59th Legislature.

PARK LAND ACQUISITION URGED

Parks and Wildlife Commission Chairman Will Odom said Texas may lose up to a third of its park land during the next 80 years because leases are expiring.

Odom called for a program of land acquisition to prevent loss of needed acreage when he spoke at the State Conservation Conference.

Earlier, he had lauded Gulf State Marine Commission for efforts to develop the fishing industry and bring sea resources to the public for general benefit.

WATER NEEDS TALKED
Atty. Gen. Waggoner Carr told Texas Water Conservation Association all units of government must work with private enterprise and individuals to assure a water supply adequate to meet Texas' needs.

Brg. Gen. R. H. Free, commander of U. S. Army Engineers, said Texas must have an overall program of water development.

SCREWORM BATTLE BIG SUCCESS
The screwworm eradication

program, which was conceived by individual livestock producers in Texas and later embraced by State and Federal animal health authorities, now is such a big success that only 102 cases of screwworm infestation have been reported in Texas this year. This compares to 3,000 by this time in 1963, and 50,000 cases in the last half of 1962.

According to Dr. Seymour J. Smith, State supervisor for the sterile screwworm plant in Mission, the picture is even brighter than those figures indicate because reporting of cases by farmers and ranchers has improved more than 100 per cent.

EMPLOYMENT UP
Employment statistics from the Texas Employment Commission shows a big increase in August. There were 3,322,200 jobholders in the non-farm category in July, compared with 3,325,600 in August. More significant was a drop in unemployment: 152,500 were looking for work in August, compared to 159,500 in July, and 174,500 in August of 1963.

COMMITTEE ON AGING PROPOSAL

Governor's Committee on Aging, chaired by State Senator Walter H. Richter of Gonzales, will ask the next Legislature to establish a permanent Texas Commission on Aging.

Purpose of the Commission would be to work with community groups interested in the problems of Texas' senior citizens and to coordinate efforts of local organizations with those of state agencies.

CITRUS CROP UP
Texas' 1964-65 citrus crop will be four and a half times greater than last season's 740,000 boxes, reports USDA's Crop and Live-

stock Reporting Service.

CLRS estimated a 3,400,000 - box fruit crop for the coming season, including 2,400,000 boxes of grapefruit and 1,000,000 boxes of oranges.

Widespread showers and heavy rains in the Falcon Reservoir watershed of the Lower Rio Grande Valley were credited with assuring proper fruit sizing.

SHORT SNORTS

State Savings and Loan Commissioner James O. Gerst postponed until December 15 the hearing on an application from Portland Savings and Loan Association.

Attorney General Waggoner Carr filed two more suits alleging slant - hole oil well activities in five Rusk County wells against H. L. Long and J. K. Maxwell, both of Kilgore.

Some bird dogs have the aggravating habit of refusing to relinquish birds retrieved. When your dog does this, lift up an ear flap and blow hard in his ear. His mouth will instantly open and the bird will drop into your other hand.

Winters Beats C-City 29-0

The Winters High School Blizzards responded to the return of Quarterback Denny Aldridge as a smoldering fire does to fresh air spontaneously. Aldridge, who entered the Winters - Colorado City game here Friday night in the first series of offensive downs for Winters in the second quarter, sparked the team to a 29-0 victory.

Highlight of the first quarter was a Winters drive from their own 12 yard line to the C-City 22. The Blizzards lost the ball as they lacked about six inches on a fourth down plunge by Larry Awalt, who had spearheaded the attack. As the second quarter started the Colorado City Wolves had just taken over the ball, and from the shotgun formation the Wolves moved to their own 49 before resorting to a fourth down kick.

Then the Blizzards lined up, Aldridge was at the helm, and in nine plays the Big Blue moved 75 yards for a TD. The drive went like this: Van Spill carried to the 28, and Awalt to the 44 for the first down. Jimmy Adams

moved to the C-City 47 and Aldridge hit Chip Puckett with a pass good to the 39. Another Aldridge pass, to Adams, moved the ball to the seven. Spill moved to the four. Awalt to the three and Kettler was stopped for no gain on the three. With fourth down staring them in the face, Aldridge chose Chip Puckett for his target and claimed the tee-dee with 5:41 left in the second quarter. Kettler rolled off right guard for two points and the Blizzards led 8-0.

The Wolves came back strong and aided by a pass interference call moved to the Blizzards 28 before losing the ball on downs. Richard Puckett was the QB and he attempted a pass to Spill but Wolf QB David McKay intercepted. Four plays later Aldridge moved in to intercept a McKay pass on the Winters 25, moving the ball back to the 42 before he was stopped. Three plays later the half ended.

C-City received the after-half kickoff but lost the ball on a fourth down kick six plays later, setting the Blizzards up on

the C-City 29. Aldridge utilized the running power of Awalt, Spill and Adams along with a nine-yard pass of his own to C. Puckett to move the team to the C-City two. Again on fourth down, the Blizzards called the pass from Aldridge to Adams for a TD. Another pass, this time from R. Puckett to C. Puckett for the PAT and with 3:03 left in the third quarter the Blizzards had a 16-0 cushion.

Eight plays deep in the fourth quarter Patterson intercepted a McKay pass on the C-C 24 to set up a third tally. On the seventh play Aldridge passed to Paul Jones for the touchdown with 5:24 left in the game. Van Spill's kick was good and the Blizzards moved up to 23 points.

Some of the crowd began to leave the stadium but the Blizzards were not finished putting the bow on the package. Mike Dieke completed the bow nicely as he ran a pass interception 22 yards to the tune of six points with 4:42 left in the game. The Spill kick was blocked and the scoring was over.

With the red candles burning

the Blizzards are ready to meet Ballinger this week as they march toward that place in schoolboy post-season play-off games.

Leading ground gainer in the Winters - C-City game was Larry Awalt with 50 yards.

PUP TRAINING SOCK

When training your bird dog pup, make the job easier by filling a nold sock with quail feathers. Give the pup a sniff of the sock so he'll know what he's looking for, then drag the sock along the ground to simulate actual bird movements. He'll soon learn to follow bird scent and point when he comes to the hidden sock.

BANDAGING DOG'S FEET

Dogs often cut their feet on stones, wire, or other objects. Or they may wear the pads raw from hard hunting. Doctor the paws immediately, bandage the foot, then tape a wool sock over the bandage to prevent dog from tearing the bandage off.

SQUIRRELS WITH A 30 - 30

When hunting squirrels in uncrowded country you will find "barking" them a great test of skill — and a lot of fun, too.

This hunting method was used often before the advent of small bore rifles. To "bark" use a large bore rifle, 30-30, 30-40, 32, or any other powerful rifle. Do not shoot at your squirrel's body — unless you want it fricasseed. Instead, aim just under the squirrel, low enough to kick off a hunk of bark. Bark will knock the bushy-tail unconscious thus killing it by concussion.

TO ATTRACT SQUIRRELS

If your gun has a noisy safety catch, as many do, try snapping the safety on and off when still-hunting squirrels. The unusual sound will bring them out of their holes.

Roger Babson Says—

Big Difference Of Opinion In the Future of American Stock Market

Babson Park, Mass., Readers are especially upset by the difference of opinion at this time amongst well-qualified investment authorities as to the future of the stock market.

DOW-JONES AVERAGE

The Dow-Jones Industrial Average — especially — is looked upon today by many as a very important index of the stock market. As readers know, it was started many years ago by the founders of the Wall Street Journal.

The editors simply took the prices of a small number of most active stocks and averaged them, publishing this average every day. It soon acquired much more importance than had been anticipated.

The managers, however, saw that stock dividends and other

changes affected these quotations in a way very difficult to index properly. I cannot state just how many times the Dow-Jones Industrial Index has been adjusted, but the number is considerable. In an investment column I have just finished reading, I noted a suggestion that this Index may go up to 1000. This may seem high to many people. However, it should be realized that the climb from 850, where the Dow now is, to 1000 is only 17 per cent; and the Index has risen over three times that much during the past two years.

STANDARD AND POOR'S INDEX

The Standard and Poor's people of New York publish each night an index of what a very much larger list of stocks have done for the day. This index rises and falls much less sharply than the Dow-Jones. On the other hand, because it is less sensitive it is not referred to so often by many investors, who want something which moves more rapidly.

There are also other indexes, including some prepared by individual newspapers and by the Associated Press. I have sometimes been tempted to combine all these into one; but fail to see what advantage such an average would give to investors. Furthermore, substitution of stocks in any of these indexes would complicate matters even more.

MY PERSONAL HABIT

I personally follow the custom of looking up the quotations of a few stocks in which I am in-

terested and writing them down in a notebook with the date and their quotation. My favorite stock is American News Company. This I buy as most people would a bond, because of its remarkable record.

The dividend which was declared by the Board of Directors at their meeting on July 30th is the 590th dividend paid by the company since its founding in 1864. This last dividend continues the company record for the longest uninterrupted number of monthly and or quarterly dividend payments of any company that is listed on the New York Stock Exchange.

WHAT ABOUT BONDS?

There are also indexes showing the fluctuation in bond prices. The fluctuation is very slight from day to day, but most of these sources carry a table which enables an investor to quickly note the changes in the bond prices over a period of a few weeks or more.

These prices are important to consider at this time. They show that while stocks have been going up, the prices of bonds have been going down. This does not necessarily mean that bonds are the best buy today; but when you can buy U. S. Government bonds to yield over 4 per cent, they could be an excellent purchase.

CROSSING BARBED WIRE FENCES

Crossing barbed - wire fences can be a problem, unless you carry in your pocket one or two short lengths of soft wire clothesline.

When you come to a fence that must be crossed, pull up second barbed - wire to top wire, twist a piece of your clothesline around both these wires, then push lower wire down as you crawl through the opening thus made.

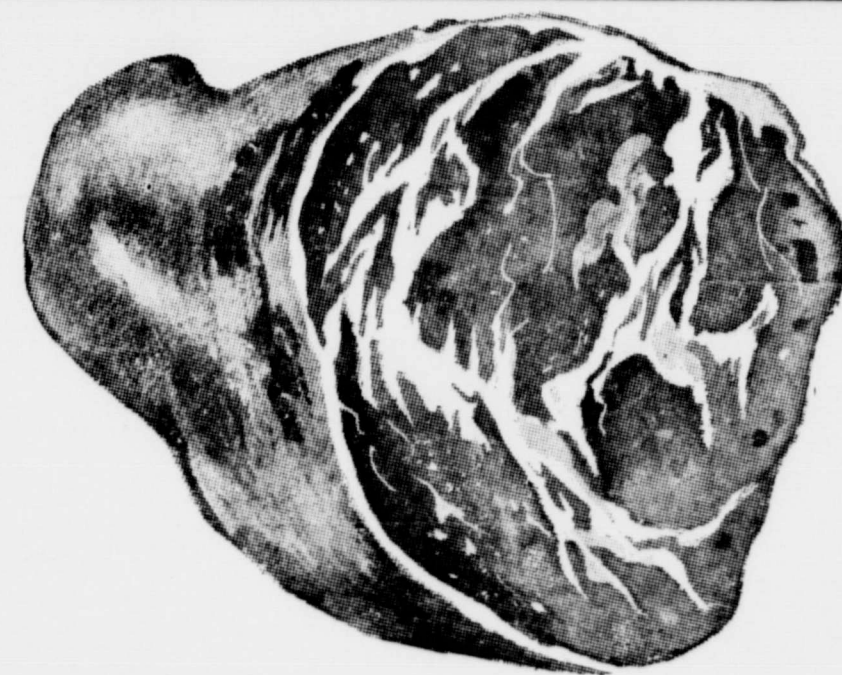

WASHINGTON NEWSLETTER: House Turns Thumbs Down On Medicare

By Congressman O. C. Fisher Medicare and a few other welfare - state measures were blocked by the House last week in a last - minute show of independence before the 88th Congress came to a sputtering halt.

The Senate had okayed the socialized medicare scheme, but the House turned thumbs down on it. The Senate had put its blessing on a \$1 billion welfare measure for Appalachia — a few states that were to be specially favored by federal hand-outs. But the House reneged on that one. In fact, on that bill the House leadership, after the counting of noses, wouldn't risk a show-down vote on it. A third welfare bonanza, to extend socialized Area Redevelopment, was blocked in the House after passing the Senate.

But the House record is nothing to write home about. It approved the \$1 billion so - called anti-poverty bill, the granddaddy of all welfare measures. It went along with a \$400 million food stamp for the needy measure, and a few others. It also favored the massive Mass Transportation bill for the benefit of the big cities, costing billions of dollars. And it went along with a mammoth Housing measure.

All in all, this has been essentially a Welfare State Congress. Certainly more so than any other in the past. And it has been a free spender. By voting to initiate a batch of new expensive welfare schemes this Congress upped the cost of government for years to come. Because every year these new programs get bigger and bigger. It granted federal pay raises

ed for the second year in a row. This session increased the public debt ceiling to \$324 billion — the highest in history, and continued the annual habit of spending several billion dollars more than was taken in.

This Congress refused to trim foreign aid, approved a so-called civil rights bill and a couple of farm measures which left much to be desired, and okayed an expensive manpower retraining program.

A glaring failure of this session was the Senate's refusal to approve a House - passed measure to curtail the Supreme Court on reapportionment of state legislatures. Instead, the Senate in effect commended the Court for what it had done in forcing both branches of state legislatures to be apportioned on a basis of population alone. But it could have been worse. The House did succeed in blocking new programs which would have cost several billion more. If the Congress had adjourned last July, as it should have, this country would be several billion dollars better off.

A necessary evil is one that we do not want it abolished.

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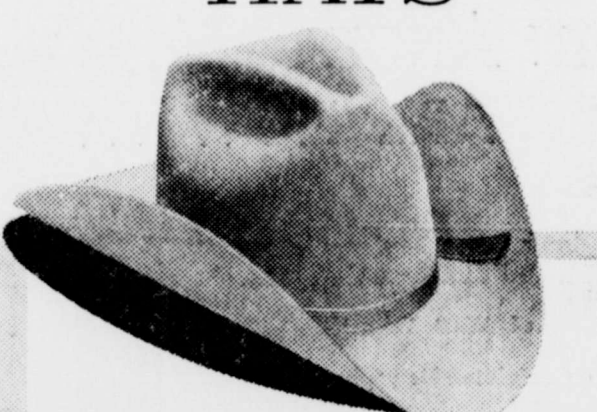

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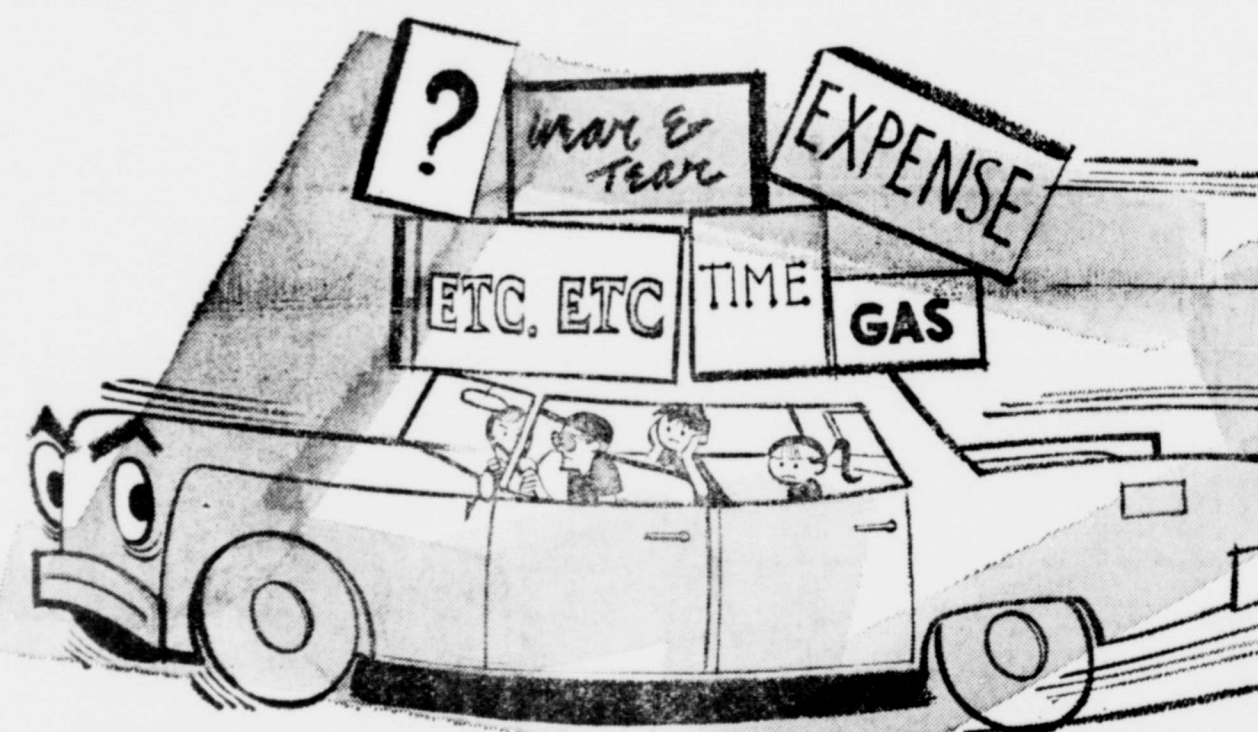

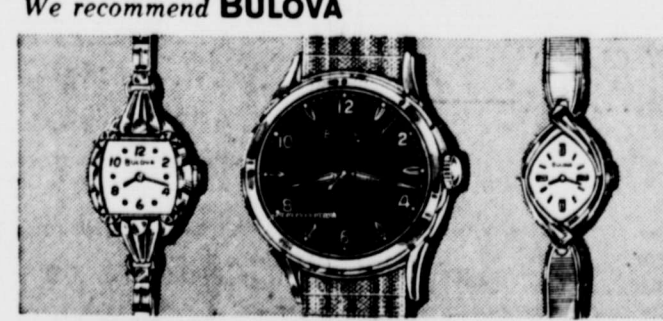
