The carob fudge brownies are especially good for those persons who love chocolate but cannot include that in their diet. The yogurt is one that Neoma has used often the past few years. She says the whole wheat hot cakes are "heavy" but very good.

CAROB FUDGE BROWNIES

This is for those who love the taste of chocolate but wish to avoid it.

$\frac{2}{3}$ c sifted whole wheat pastry flour
 $\frac{1}{2}$ t baking powder
 $\frac{1}{4}$ t salt
4 T Carob Powder
 $\frac{1}{3}$ c melted butter or margarine
1 c firmly packed brown sugar
2 eggs, well beaten
 $\frac{1}{2}$ c broken nut meats or hulled sunflower seeds
1 t vanilla

Combine flour, baking powder, salt and sift twice. Add Carob Powder to the melted shortening. Add the sugar gradually to eggs, beating thoroughly. Blend in Carob mixture. Add flour and blend. Add nuts and vanilla and mix. Spread in oiled 8" x 8" x 2" pan. Bake in preheated 350 degree oven 25 minutes. Cool in pan, cut in squares.

Note: Carob Powder may be purchased at health food stores.

YOGURT

Beat or blend in liquefier:

2 c tepid water
 $\frac{1}{2}$ c non-instant powdered skim milk
Yogurt culture or 3 T commercial or previously made yogurt

Pour mixture into a pitcher containing:

1 qt tepid water
1 lge can evaporated milk

Stir well and pour into drinking glasses or pint jars. Set glasses or jars in dry yogurt maker. If yogurt maker is not used, put into large pan of warm water; bring water level to rim of glasses or jars. Cover pan, and set over pilot light or in warming oven where a temperature of 100 to 120 degrees can be maintained.

Check consistency at end of 3 hours. Continue to check until desired thickness is reached; chill immediately after milk thickens. Yogurt will keep in refrigerator 5 days or longer.

VARIATIONS:

Serve with brown sugar and cinnamon, honey and finely shredded orange or lemon rind, or sweetened berries, peaches, or other fresh fruit.

Fresh milk may be used if it is known to be penicillin-free. Cows are given penicillin frequently these days, and the penicillin in the fresh milk destroys the bacteria and prevents the yogurt from thickening.

Yogurt popsicles: Stir together 1 pint of yogurt, 1 small can frozen orange juice, 2 t

vanilla. Pour into paper cups, put tongue compressor in center, and freeze.

ORANGE WHOLE WHEAT HOT CAKES

2 c sifted stone ground whole wheat flour
 $\frac{1}{2}$ t soda
 $\frac{1}{2}$ t salt
2 eggs
 $\frac{1}{4}$ c soy oil

Enough fresh orange juice to make hot cake batter. Mix eggs and oil and beat. Add dry ingredients alternately with orange juice. Bake on lightly oiled, medium hot griddle. One cup of corn flour may be used instead of stone ground whole wheat flour. These are very delicious.
