"Since my 'culinary' art has become publicly known through this column I've been asked to publish a few 'prize' recipes. Some have doubted my ability as a cook and have asked for proof—which I haven't had time to give, as yet.

Just the other day I carried an angel food cake to a fellow and told him I'd been slaving over a hot stove cooking it. He seemed to doubt me—and him a preacher—by asking what weight oil I used in it, 20 weight or 30 weight. I told him I used Esso Extra, that good Humble gasoline that you get up at Huffmyer's Humble Service Station. Anyway, I'm told he ate the cake. Angel's food, you know.

My tastes run only to the "delicate" foods such as angel food cake, divinity candy, and salads. Today I'm passing on my "special" ice cream recipe:

Six eggs, one cup sugar, one can Eagle Brand condensed milk, one pint whipped cream, one tablespoon vanilla and milk.

You beat the egg yolks until light; add sugar, condensed milk, vanilla, and whipped cream while turning mixer slowly. Then you add the stiffly beaten egg whites and enough milk to fill a gallon freezer. Fruit may be added if desired.

The real "art" in making good ice cream is in the freezing part, which is the part I do best. You have to use plenty of salt with the ice, and plenty of elbow grease. When frozen remove the flash and pack. Let set for an hour or two before serving.

Another kitchen duty at which I am adept is dirty dishes. One has to be careful of the soap he uses to avoid those "dish-pans" hands.

If anyone has a special recipe you would like tried, I'd be glad to have it. The finished sample, I mean.

HUNTERS POLISH SHOTGUNS FOR OPENING OF DOVE SEASON HERE

Cisco area hunters were cleaning their shotguns today in preparation for the opening Friday of the annual dove hunting season. And, according to all reports, the pickings will be good. For there is a plentiful supply of doves.

Shotgun shells appear to be in good supply at the moment, but dealers don't know about the future. They were almost unobtainable during the last war.

According to the state game laws, the dove season will be open from Sept. 1 to Oct. 15, both days inclusive. Shooting hours are one-half hour before sunrise to sunset. The bag limit is not more than 10 birds per day and not more than 10 on your possession at any one time.

You don't need a hunting license if you confine your shooting to your home county. But if you branch out, you may as well buy the big game license, as it

Economy Agency Gets Pledge Of Jaycee's Support

AUSTIN, Aug. 30. — Two state wide young men's organizations, The Junior Chamber of Commerce and the State Junior Bar of Texas, will assist members of the Texas Economy Commission in unorganized counties in setting up active county branches of the TEC, it was announced here today by John Ben Shepperd, TEC Secretary.

Clarence Guitard, of Dallas, president of the Junior Bar, and William McDaniel, also of Dallas, president of the Jaycees, have offered to recruit help from within their respective organizations to assist the TEC, Mr. Shepperd said.

A speaker's committee of the State Junior Bar is being set up to make available young lawyers as speakers on the need for the Texas Economy Commission in designing a legislative program for efficient reform of the executive branch of the state government.

The Jaycees will assist TEC members in their communities in the leg-work of setting up meetings at which county officials in the TEC organizations are to be elected and committees will be appointed.

"The 600 members of the economy commission welcome the co-operation and interest of the two fine groups of young men," Mr. Shepperd said. "We of the TEC are more than ever convinced that our work is vital to an improved, efficient and economical state government."

The TEC is an advisory body appointed by Governor Allan Shivers to study the state government and to present to the Legislature a program of efficient reform.

Job Exams Are Planned by Civil Service Agency

Examinations were announced today by the U. S. Civil Service Commission for filling the following positions in the Rural Electrification Administration: Telephone engineer, with the options of (a) equipment design and (b) plant design and appraisal, \$4,600 to \$6,400 a year; telephone specialist, \$3,825 and \$4,600 a year; auditor (telephone), \$5,400 a year; and loan appraiser (telephone facilities), \$4,600 to \$6,400 a year.

Most of the positions to be filled require almost constant travel throughout the United States.

No written test will be given. To qualify for telephone engineer, applicants must have completed a 4-year college course in engineering or have had 4 years of experience in technical engineering; in addition, they must have had 1 year of general engineering experience and from 1 to 3 years of specialized experience in one of the optional fields covered by the examination.

Applicants for telephone specialist must have had 3 years of experience in work such as the installation, maintenance, and repair of telephone equipment or as an electrical draftsman in connection with the design and layout of telephone plants. For auditor (telephone), applicants must show 4 years of general experience in responsible accounting and auditing positions, preferably public utility accounting, and an additional 2 years of specialized experience in maintaining accounting systems and records of telephone companies.

Applicants for loan appraiser (telephone facilities) must have had at least 3 years of general experience in organizing and managing utility properties; in making appraisal, evaluation, or cost studies of utility properties; or in organizing and developing farm groups or cooperatives.

Draft Dodgers Are Not Wanted In Guard Units

There are no openings in the 49th Armored Division for draft dodgers.

Maj. Gen. Albert S. Johnson of Dallas, commander of the Texas National Guard division, made this policy clear today in a statement to unit commanders in 56 Texas towns.

"We do not want to fill our units up with individuals who are attempting to evade or delay their draft," said General Johnson. However, he called their attention to a new memorandum from National Headquarters of Selective Service providing postponements for men of draft age who have signed up with the National Guard.

"This provides a wonderful opportunity to build your unit up to strength with choice young men from your community who do want to serve and who want the advantage of serving in a unit composed of their friends and relatives," said General Johnson.

The General pointed out that the strength of a National Guard unit is its tie with the local community, its principal advantage that of serving with local boys and under officers from the home community.

NEW CISCO - EASTLAND ROAD IN DOUBT UNLESS ROUTE SPEEDED

Cisco and Eastland citizens today faced the prospect of having their new Highway 80 4-lane divided road project placed on an "indefinite status" unless action on obtaining right-of-way is completed this week. The Press learned from reliable sources.

According to plans for the new highway, which will be similar to the new road between Weatherford and Fort Worth, it was necessary for the county to buy considerable new right-of-way. This was necessitated by the plans to make the road wider and to straighten out several sharp curves.

County Attorney Elzo Bean told The Press today that one condemnation suit has been filed on right-of-way sought near the Eastland western city limits. The suit is styled State of Texas vs.

Grover C. Cain. He indicated that a second suit from the Eastland end might be filed today.

It was understood that there are some five holdouts — persons who have declined to sell — on the Cisco end of the road. It could not be learned whether condemnation suits were planned.

The Highway Department made plans seven months ago on the highway improvement program, turning over to the Commissioners' Court at that time the right-of-way requirements. The project has been scheduled for letting by the Highway Department at its Sept. 18 meeting in Austin.

"Unless the right-of-way is assured this week," The Press was told, "the department will be forced to cancel the Sept. 18 letting plans and place the project on an indefinite status."

Former Ciscoan Is Laid to Rest In Rites Tuesday

Funeral services for Claude C. Bishop, 72, former resident of Cisco, were conducted at 3 p. m. Tuesday in Gladewater under the direction of Rev. Ben R. Stripling at the Crews Baptist Church. Burial was in the Gladewater cemetery.

Mr. Bishop died at 1:30 p. m. Monday from a heart ailment after an illness of some three weeks.

He came to Cisco in 1920 from Ranger and operated the old depot cafe and rooming house. The family lived at 205 West 12th St. Mr. Bishop left here five years later. He had been in Gladewater in the cafe business for some 15 years.

Born on Oct. 23, 1882, he was married to Miss Nora Knick in 1898 at Dalton, Ga. They came to Hico, Texas, soon after their marriage. Mrs. Nora Bishop, Cisco, survives.

Survivors include five daughters and two sons. The daughters are Mrs. Annie Burnette, Cisco; Mrs. J. D. Skinner, Lubbock; Mrs. R. H. Williams, Cisco; Mrs. B. G. Watson, Iraan, and Mrs. Ernest Hogg, Bay City. The sons are E. J. Bishop of Wink and Ernie Bishop of Lubbock.

Also surviving are 16 grandchildren, two brothers and two sisters.

TWO WILDCAT OIL TESTS ARE ANNOUNCED FOR EASTLAND CO.

Two new wildcat oil tests had been announced for Eastland

County today. The Primo Oil Company of Dallas will drill the No. 1 Irvin Phippen two miles northeast of Dothan, and Joe G. Lane will drill the No. 1 C. D. Lane et al. two miles southwest of Pioneer.

The Phippen test is just east of the Callahan County line. It will be a 4,100-foot rotary project, and location was given as 330 feet from the north and 1,537 feet from the east lines of Section 3166, TE&L Survey.

The location is only 13.5 feet inside Eastland County, a surveyor's report showed.

The Lane well is to be a 3,100-foot wildcat. Location was given as 360 feet from the north and 400 feet from the west lines of the northeast quarter of the S. H. Hine survey.

Abilene Square Dance Day Will Be Held Sept. 9

ABILENE, August 30 — Plans for "Abilene Square Dance Day," on September 9, have met with such enthusiasm that it was necessary to secure larger quarters for the spectacle, it has been reported here. Exhibition teams, callers and square dance clubs throughout Texas and the adjoining states of New Mexico, Colorado, Oklahoma, and Kansas will attend.

There will be square dancing for every one, the dances being called by a group of nationally famous recording artists and authors.

Oil Flows Over Top of Derrick

The new Owens oil pool five miles northeast of Cisco was given a one-half mile northwest extension today as the Crossman and Savage No. 1 D. B. Perdue came in with prospects of being one of the field's best producers.

The well was cemented last week and equipment was moved in early today to perforate the casing. After perforating a 10-foot section at about 3,370 feet, a solid five and a half inch stream of oil flowed over the top of the 85-foot derrick before all the tools were brought out of the hole.

Pressure was 830 pounds per square inch on a loaded hole. The well was expected to be opened to enable it to clean itself out and to run potential tests in the next day or so, as tanks have already been built.

Bottom of the hole was 3,385 feet. Operators said they cored 35 feet of the Lake Eastland sand, including 24 feet of soft sand.

The operators are John Crossman of Mohrre, La., and J. G. Savage of Overton, Texas. They have 166½ acres in the Perdue lease, and Mr. Crossman said they planned a second well north of the No. 1 in the near future.

Cooper & Hemphill To Drill In Field

Cooper and Hemphill, local oil operators, will drill their No. 1 Joseph R. Carlisle on an 80-acre tract adjoining producing leases in the Owens field five miles northeast of Cisco. C. E. Cooper reported today.

Location is 330 feet from the south line and 330 feet from the east line of an 80-acre block north of the east half of the northeast quarter of section 38, block 4, H&TC Survey.

Location for the well was staked today and plans were being made to begin drilling in the near future.

Gilchrist Prepares To Begin New Well

Gilchrist Drilling Company of Eastland was digging a slush pit and clearing the location today to drill their No. 1 Ayers in the new Owens pool northeast of Cisco. Drilling was expected to begin in the near future.

Fairbairn and Day Well Is Producing

The Fairbairn and Day No. 1 Fairbairn, 1,700-foot Strawn sand well located some six miles northeast of Cisco, was back on production today after being treated with hydrafrac and re-completed. The old well had been a small producer for some years. After hydrafrac, production was about 35 barrels per day.

Bankline Well Nears Lake Pay Horizon

Bankline Oil Company's No. 5 Briggs Owens was drilling at 2,530 feet — some 500 feet from the Lake sand — early today in the Owens field northeast of Cisco.

Potential tests were run Tuesday on the No. 6 Owens. Although results were not available, it was understood that the well was a large producer.

Bankline has announced location for their No. 7 Owens.

Latch Well Nears Ellenberger Lime

The McElroy Ranch Company No. 1 Lela Latch was drilling at 3,820 feet early today just west of Cisco. Projected for the Ellenberger lime, the bottom is expected to be reached probably Thursday.

According to reports, no indications of oil were found in the Ranger lime. As soon as the hole is bottomed, electrical log surveys were to be run to determine any oil possibilities.

CONSTRUCTIVE CRITICISM NEEDED

In a recent syndicated column, David Lawrence says: "Whatever the immediate significance of the Korean war, a profound effect has been produced upon the long-range military policy of the United States. Never again can America depend on that narrow concept of a one-weapon strategy."

Mr. Lawrence then raises some very important points about which all our people have been thinking. Who is responsible for having deprived the Navy of its status as a "fleet in being"? Who took away from the United States Army its own airplane units capable of operating always with the ground troops? Whose idea was it that land armies of the U. S. could fight without "armored divisions of tanks"? Who deprived us of overseas bases — floating or fixed?

Mr. Lawrence is bitter in his condemnation of civilian or military officials for what he says is one of the "worst blunders in all American history. It is a blunder inexcusable because it defied the plain lessons of history taught in every naval and military war college in every nation of the world for centuries past."

"The price of peace is never inexpensive and the price of survival always is economic discomfort and sacrifice."

Tragically and inexcusably the exigencies of domestic politics cut the ground from under national defense at the moment when decisive strength was needed. As a result, thousands of Americans will lose their lives.

The kind of criticism backed with facts that is now being leveled at those in control of the military establishment is too serious to gloss over, or attempt to muzzle with admonitory advice that it is ill timed. The confidence of the people in the wisdom of top military policy has been shaken. Only honest correction of mistakes can restore that confidence.

All types of foods, including ration items procured at U. S. air bases in foreign countries, are inspected for wholesomeness and quality.

The air force does have some animals, though, mostly sentry and guard dogs and a few sled and parachute dogs for Arctic rescue work.

After we mentioned on the air recently that a friend of ours abhors red barns because the color red is supposed to be hard on the nerves, a listener wrote in to say that she had always heard that one reason so many barns are red is that they repulse birds and bugs.

We haven't looked up the answer to that one yet. Do you know?

Mention of a free bulletin on the multiflora rose brought in a covey of requests for it recently. We still have a few left. Write if you want one. A thousand plants will make a mile of living fence, useful and ornamental. West of Fort Worth it will require some irrigation, mostly likely.

It would hardly be fair to those cotton farmers who have complied with acreage regulations this year, if the U. S. Dept. of Agriculture up and lifted controls now. Next year would be a different matter.

We read that world rainfall is the same every year, regardless of how wet or dry it gets where you are. There certainly must have been a terrific drought somewhere outside of Texas this year.

"Mohair is wool," we learn from the Wool Bureau. The Wool Products Labeling Act says so.

That means, then, that when we say "wool AND mohair," we are being rather ambiguous. But chances are the sheep producers would rather have us ambiguous.

By the way, did you know that the word Ankara (capital of Turkey) is another way of saying "angora"?

All this is brought on by a recent visit from some of the ladies in the Texas Sheep and Goat Raisers Association who are sponsoring the "make it yourself with wool and mohair" contest among girls of high school and college age. Some handsome prizes are offered.

Meanwhile, people in high places are saying that there'll be a wool shortage if the war keeps going.

A letter from one of the national officers informs us that the American Goat Society, Inc., meets in Abilene the first week in September. They're not getting off the "bleatin' path," either.

FARMER OF THE WEEK....

15 Year-Old Bobby Cleveland Proves Ability As Farmer

Bobby Cleveland, 15 year old son of Mr. and Mrs. Grover Cleveland, is one of the most successful young farmers in this area. A member of the Cisco Chapter of the Future Farmers of America Bobby's achievements are worthy of notice.

This year, young Cleveland made a very interesting experiment with a six acre tract of land, located about 10 miles northwest of Cisco. He divided the six acres off evenly and used six different kinds of fertilizer in raising oats on the land.

Although he received a good yield from all six acres with each acre yielding over 50 bushels, he found that one fertilizer was better than all of the rest. The chemical composition which he designates as "16-20-0", made of 16% nitrogen and 20% phosphate, proved to be the best fertilizer for his land. This particular acre produced 66 bushels and Bobby's father believes that it would have easily produced a hundred bushels if it had not been for rust on the blades and stalks. Mr. Cleveland explains that the rust was probably caused by too much rain and late planting.

The acre which came in second in the experiment was top-dressed with ammonia nitrate fertilizer after the grain was already out of the ground. Bobby

considers this also as a valuable fertilizer for his land. Both Bobby and his dad agree that it pays to fertilize in Eastland County.

In a further effort to determine the best fertilizer for this area, the young farmer recently mailed a sample of his soil to A & M College for an analysis. Though he has already received some information from his inquiry, he plans further research in soil fertilization for this area.

The six acres not only produced over 350 bushels of oats but also yielded 186 bales of oat straw. This is proof enough that Bobby's labors were not in vain.

During the year, he also helped his dad with the 200 acres they now have in cultivation. Most of this acreage is planted in wheat and oats which is used to feed some 60 head of cattle on the Cleveland farm.

In years past, Bobby has also been very successful as a young cattleman. For three years straight, calves which he raised took the Grand Prize at the Eastland County Livestock Show. In 1947, one calf netted \$540.00 including prize money and sale price. Three calves paid off to the tune of \$1,080.00 in 1948.

Bobby will be a junior at Cisco High School this fall and the 120 pound farm boy has already gone out for football. Although

he realizes that his lightness of weight will be against him, he hopes that he will be able to play somewhere in the backfield.

According to his dad, Bobby is getting to be quite a fisherman. More than anything else, he enjoys fishing with a rod and reel in a large 10 acre lake on the Cleveland farm. Very often, he brings in a bass and sometimes he brings in other varieties of fish from the lake.

Cold winter days, often find Bobby and his two dogs out hunting. He is sportsman in every sense of the word.

He was born and reared on the present home place just off the Moran highway ten miles northwest of Cisco. With seven brothers and one sister, all older than himself, Bobby is the only one still at home.

Almost every Lord's Day, he and his parents are found in Sunday School and worship services at the local Church of the Nazarene.

Although Bobby Cleveland often talks about someday attending the Agricultural and Mechanical College of Texas at College Station, his plans for the future are a bit indefinite at present. With his ability, we predict great success for this young farmer and rancher.

Big Company To Build New Plant At Fort Worth

FORT WORTH, August 30 — International Minerals and Chemical Corporation, whose \$53 million in sales last year was one third of the country's volume of plant food, has selected Fort Worth as a location of a new chemical fertilizer plant.

International has plants and offices in 50 cities and 20 states and its headquarters are in Chicago. Maurice H. Lockwood, vice president in charge of International's plant food division, announced that a \$500,000 plant would be built on a 30-acre tract on Fort Worth's North Side, adjacent to the factory of Consolidated Chemical Industries, which will supply sulphuric acid used in International's manufacture of superphosphate. In addition to superphosphate, the Fort Worth plant will produce mixed fertilizers used in growing wheat, hay, cotton, corn, truck and pasture crops.

One of the major concerns in the chemical industry, International is the world's largest producer of phosphate and monosodium glutamate, third in the plant food field, and third in domestic production of potash.

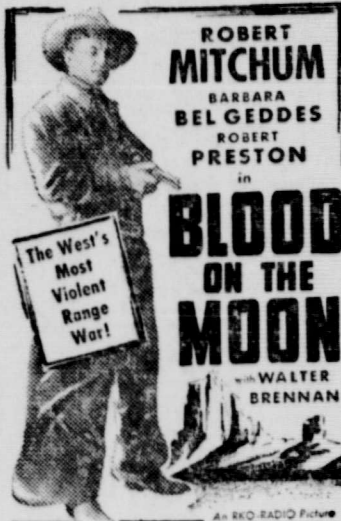
