RAINS FALLING DURING WEEK MEASURE 1.24 INCHES COOK URGES FARMERS TO ENROLL AT ONCE IN FREE POULTRY COURSE

MEETING OF CLASS TO BE HELD OCTOBER 5, 8 P. M.

ALL HAVE ENROLLED IN NIGHT COURSE IN POULTRY PRODUCTION—OTHERS ARE URGED TO JOIN AT ONCE

Principal R. J. Cook, vocational agriculture teacher at Perryton high school is urging farmers and all interested in poultry raising to join the class to be conducted free of charge, by a number of vocational agriculture men in this section of the country, starting on Monday evening, October 5.

Unless a class of twenty-five can be secured, Mr.

will not feel that it will justify the out-of-town speakers on the trip to Perryton on the class will meet. A number of men and women have already expressed their intention of the course, but Mr. Cook expects many others present at the meeting Tuesday evening at the high school auditorium.

The course is free of all charges, and a regular extension course will be carried on by vocational agriculture men. Mr. Cook will be assisted by County Agent Hutchinson, Geo. E. Voss, principal of the schools and vocational agriculture agent, A. H. Wilcox, instructor in vocational agriculture at Perryton, and by Sam Martin, Hansbrough agent.

Those who will consider such jobs as brooding the chicks, raising the baby chicks, culling for production, feeding for egg production, housing and care, controlling pests and diseases, marketing the poultry and eggs, and other records.

Farmers, farmer's wives, and all interested in poultry, whether on a small scale or large, are urged to join the class, and to be at the first meeting Tuesday night.

FIRST TRAIN TO ISOM TOMORROW

SANTA FE STARTS FREIGHT AND PASSENGER SERVICE INTO NEW BORGER FIELD

The first Santa Fe train will pull into the Isom station at Borger Friday morning, October 1, at 9 o'clock according to the schedule arranged by T. B. Gallaher, general passenger agent, leaving Amarillo at 7 o'clock in the morning.

A return train leaves Isom at 5 in the afternoon arriving at Amarillo at 6:50 o'clock. Four freight turnarounds will be made daily, enabling the movement of 700 cars of oil from the field every day.

Elaborate switching facilities and yards have been built in Isom and Borger, enabling the handling of a huge amount of traffic. Six operators will go on duty at the new station and approximately thirty other station employees.

GAMEL PLAYS ON WINNING CANYON TEAM

The West Texas Teachers' college defeated the Clarendon college Bulldogs, 2 to 0, Saturday afternoon at Tri-State Fair park, playing on a sea of mud and water which made football virtually impossible.

The score presented the Buffaloes came in the second quarter when Hardin Boyles, Canyon Center, gave Parker, Clarendon center, a hard blow on the neck, causing him to pass low with the Bulldogs on the Buffalo eight yard line. The ball slipped to the left of Corbin and Boyles shot through, but the plucky Clarendon quarter was able to fall on it, behind the goal line, before the former Amarillo boy could recover.

Corbin saved his team four points by making a safety out of the play.

No indication of the strength or ability of either team could be had on the field yesterday. The Tri-State gridiron, formerly a wheat field, would have been in excellent condition without rain, but with the heavy rain which fell the night before and continued to fall throughout the game, it was impossible.—Amarillo News.

The slow rainfall, which was much heavier at many places than that recorded in Perryton was a wonderful benefit to the newly planted wheat crop. Estimates are to the effect that approximately forty per cent of the new wheat crop has been drilled, and planting will be speeded as soon as fields dry up sufficiently to allow farmers to enter them.

With the recent rain, enough moisture has been received to insure the sprouting of the grain and will carry the new crop until the first of the year.

The rain is said to have damaged the open cotton somewhat, but the extent of this damage could not be ascertained.

The bright sunshine Wednesday and the breeze did much toward drying up the roads which were all but impassable and badly cut up with heavy traffic. Many parties on trips were forced to abandon their cars and return by train.

GAME WON UNTIL LAST 2 MINUTES

LONG PASS, HAMILTON TO MILLER EVENS UP SCORE FOR GATE BEFORE GAME ENDS

Under murky skies, in a cold, drizzling rain, Perryton High School Rangers played the Gate, Oklahoma gridsters a 12-12 tie, Saturday afternoon, allowing the visitors to even the score in the last two minutes of play, after having the game won for nearly three quarters.

Gate kicked off to the north to L. Shrader on Perryton's 5 yard line, who returned 35 yards. After two failures to gain through the line, Smith punted 50 yards. Gate completed a long pass for a 35 yard gain. A long end run gave them another first down. L. Shrader intercepted a Gate pass. Perryton's ball on their 26 yard line.

Shrader's punt was blocked, Gate recovering on Perryton's 24 yard line. Three efforts to gain through line plays failed to net Gate a gain. Gate's drop kick was blocked by Beardsley who broke through the line, Perryton recovering the ball.

Thrush made a brilliant 40 yard end run carrying the ball to the Gate 45 yard line. A fumble lost 10 yards. Smith kicks to the Gate 28 yard line as the quarter ends. Score 0-0.

Play resumed. Gate lost 5 yards on a fake pass. L. Shrader intercepts a Gate pass and runs 24 yards for a touchdown. Try for point fails. Score Perryton 6, Gate 0.

Smith kicked off, Gate returning to their 40 yard line. Gate punted but play was called back and Perryton penalized 5 yards for off-side, giving Gate first down. Perryton time out. Gate makes 25 yards through line. Two passes are incomplete, and Gate punts outside behind goal line. Ball in play on 20 yard line.

Thrush plunges line for 12 yards. L. Shrader punts 30 yards. Sullock threw Gate for 10 yard loss. Gate makes 45 yard pass to Perryton's 6 yard line. Gate passes across goal for a touchdown. Try for point failed. Score Perryton 6, Gate 6.

Smith Kicked off, Gate returning to 30 yard line. Gate makes 30 yard pass. L. Shrader intercepts pass. Half ends with ball in middle of field. Score Perryton 6 Gate 6.

Smith kicked off. Gate gained 42 yards on forward pass and long end run. Perryton holds Gate for downs. L. Shrader punts 45 yards.

Gate fumbles on punt, Perryton recovering on the Gate 28 yard line. Thrush thrown for 15 yard loss. Smith kicked outside on 35 yard line. Gate loses 10 yards on fumble. Deming intercepted pass, Thrush and Deming running together. Time out for Perryton.

Smith kicked 30 yards to the Gate 15 yard line. Gate completed pass for 20 yard gain. Quarter ends with ball on Gate 35 yard line. Score 6 to 6.

Play resumed and Beardsley goes through line, throwing Gate for a 10 yard loss. Gate kicks, Thrush making a dazzling run to the 50 yard line. Perryton lost 7 yards on a fumble, but recovers ball. Smith kicks to Gate 18 yard line. L. Shrader intercepts Gate pass, giving Perryton the ball on Gate's 25 yard line. Time out for Shrader.

LaMaster in for Shrader, who was taken from field with sprained ankle.

Smith plunges through line for 7 yards. Gate off-side and penalized 5 yards. Perryton's first down, with ball on 11 yard line. Perryton off-side, 5 yard penalty. Pass Smith to Deming nets 8 yard gain, ball on Gate 8 yard line. Smith through line for 2 yards. Smith makes 1 yard through line. Last down, 4 yards to go. Smith lunges through right tackle for Touchdown. Try for point fails. Score Perryton 12, Gate 6.

MORE PAY? TERRIBLE!
RELIGION'S POWER.
DUST AS AUTO FUEL.

Men that own railroad stocks, and never do, never did, never will do any hard work, think it sad that the men working on the railroads should get one hundred million dollars more a year. That would be a great deal less than thirty cents a day average for each man, while the railroads get the hundreds of millions more and have the Government and its interstate Commerce Commission always ready to force the public to pay higher rates if railroads need them.

The Government, compelling the public to pay more for railroad service, without giving the public anything to say about it, should also compel railroads to pay more to working people without giving railroads anything to say about it. But Government and its workings are arranged by those that OWN the railroads, not by those that WORK on the railroads.

Fifty years ago, fewer than two million women worked for pay in the United States.

Half of them were in domestic service. Now 9,000,000 women are engaged "in gainful occupations." That pleases the practical mind. Farmers like to see the horse and mare working. German farmers harness the cow.

Our boasted "gainful occupations for women" take women out of their only occupation really gainful to civilization, the production of good children.

A young man arrested for robbing the house of Cardinal Dougherty of cash and bonds told the police, "I didn't dare take the Cardinal's diamond studded gold cross, worth \$25,000. I was afraid it might jinx me. I also left a gold cup. Something told men they used it in church. I wasn't looking for any trouble like that."

The modernist will call that "superstition," others will see in it proof that religion has power even in the case of a young criminal who tells the police, "I have no religion."

To treat prisoners cruel is vile.
To make a joke of their crimes is stupid.

The Governor of New York should tell officials of Sing Sing what he thinks of their Labor Day pie-eating contest, twelve convicts with their hands tied behind their backs, eating pies, like swine, for a \$5 prize.

How does that impress men and women, out of prison, working to buy food for their children.

However, stupid as it is, a prison with pie-eating contests is not as bad as the prison of that good bishop in which prisoners wore iron collars, with sharp spikes turned inward so they could not lie down to sleep, or the Spanish prison in which the noble-hearted English prison reformer found a man fastened to the wall, his feet above ground, starving, "his face clotted with blood and tears," or the prison mine, in which Peter the Great chained each prisoner to his wheelbarrow, to stay chained night and day until death released him; better than the ancient galley, where the man chained to the oar was released when he fainted or died, his hand cut off to save time, body

thrown overboard and another slave chained in his place.

When men talk of harnessing the electron it should be remembered that Providence does not allow trees to grow into the heavens, or permit conquering man to move up too rapidly. Air, water, the earth, nature gives to us free, and the sun's light and heat. We must work for everything else.

It takes a long while for human beings learn how to get on with each other. It is much easier to revolt and stand for our rights than patiently seek a status quo.

The main thing for a people to learn is that there can be no abiding peace that is not founded upon justice.

CULLING THE FLOCK FOR BEST PRODUCTION

Economic production of eggs is possible only when poultry culling is practiced continually from the time the chicks are hatched until the oldest breeding stock has passed its period of usefulness. All slow maturing or deformed chicks should be disposed of as soon as they are hatched.

The male birds should be of vigorous, early maturing and well-devel-

oped stock. Killing the early maturing cockerels for broilers is extremely detrimental to the development of the poultry industry. The pullets that mature early and begin laying before cold weather sets in are the most profitable because of the high price of eggs during the winter. Carelessness of selecting the breeding stock often results in weak, runty chickens.

There are a number of characteristics by which one can distinguish the good laying hen. One of the things to consider is the manner in which the average hen molts. The better producers lay late in the fall and molt rapidly, while the early molters are usually poor layers. Hens should not molt before September or October if they have a long-laying season. The shanks and beaks of hens that are naturally yellow in color will be faded in time of molting if they have been laying heavily. The hen that has a large, moist, white or pink vent is laying and is usually a better producer with a small, dry, yellow vent. Another indication of a good layer is her waxy red comb, which shows that it is full of blood and life. The bones that are found on each side of the vent are called pelvic bones. When these bones are thin and flexible the indication is that of a laying hen. If these bones are spread so that three fingers can be placed between them the hen is a good producer. Heavy producing hens must consume nearly twice the amount of food required for maintenance, thus the abdomen is larger and more flexible. Also the egg producing

organs are larger, making it possible to lay four fingers between the pelvic bones and the rear end of the breast bone.

In order to keep the poultry industry progressing one should continually cull their flock. In culling, he should be very particular to hold the hen in the proper position which will make it possible to test the various parts of the producing hen. When the poor and sick hens are taken from the flock it is advisable to band the best layers for breeding stock. When only one culling can be made each year the best results are obtained from a July or August culling at which time the non-producer is easily found.

DRILLING ACTIVE NORTH OF RIVER

MANY WELLS HOLDING BACK FOR COMPLETION OF NEW ROAD. SHOT MAKES BIG PRODUCER

The Gulf Production Company has recently made eleven new locations north of the river in Hutchinson county and the Phillips petroleum company have made four new locations. This would indicate that business will be brisk all winter in the oil fields and that it will open with a bang in the spring. Several large storage tanks have recently been completed in the field, which relieves the congestion of production considerably. This has a tendency to keep business in the field going good. Another thing that is making things more interesting down that way is the completion of the Santa Fe branch to Isom. Pipe lines running from the north side fields will soon be allowed to unload at Isom, and the crude will be transported from there to the refineries by rail. This will be a tremendous help to the wells north of the river. The north side production is now estimated at eleven thousand barrels daily. This will be greatly increased in the near future, as several wells will be completed that were being held back by lack of storage and pipe line facilities.

KRUGLE NO. 1 HIT BIG SALT WATER FLOW

The Wilcox Oil & Gas Company Test, Zea Well No. 1, sw. se. 21-3-13, is awaiting a socket to clear its hole, and will be drilling again this week, it is thought, with all obstacles removed. They have been fishing there for months. At their second well, Hovey No. 1, se. se. 21-4-14, they are underreaming at 3710 feet.

The Allison-Garber-Pulse Well, ne. se. 4-1-12 is drilling at 1830 feet.

The Valerius Well No. 1, nw. sw. 18-3-12, is setting eight inch pipe at 3050 feet. Valerius Well No. 2, sw. se. 32-5-12 is drilling at 3670 feet.—Guymon Herald.

OKLAHOMA AND TEXAS PAN- HANDLE TO BE AMERICA'S OIL SUPPLY OF THE FUTURE

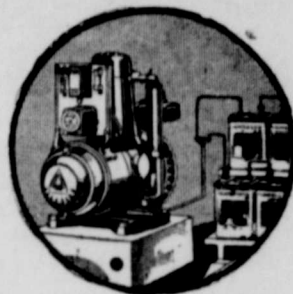

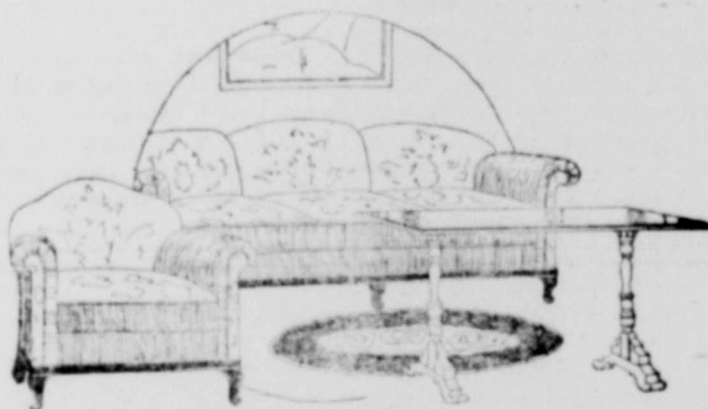

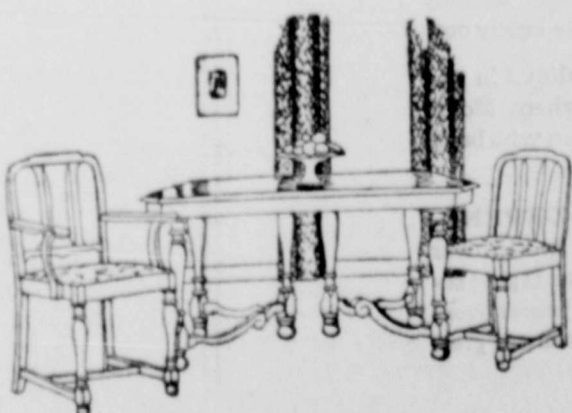

BOY AND GIRL KILLED AT RAILWAY CROSSING

Miss Myrtle Brenton was killed instantly Sunday afternoon and Jess Croissant received injuries resulting in his death early Monday morning, when the car they were driving was struck between Tyrone and Liberal by a Rock Island train.

Both of the young folks lived at Moreland, Okla., and were driving toward Liberal. At the point where the accident occurred, the track runs diagonally across the road. The train was in full view of the car and no cause for the driver not seeing it could be learned.

Croissant's brother, Harry, was driving behind in another car and said that he saw the train and heard it whistle for the crossing. He thought that his brother saw it until it was too late.

ORDER OF THE COURT PERTAINING TO SCHOOL LAND: On this the 13th day of September, 1926, came on to be heard and considered at a regular term of the Commissioners' Court of Ochiltree County, a quorum being present, the matter of subdivision of League No. 204, Ochiltree County School Land in Bailey County, Texas, into tracts and the separation and segregation of the County's Lien heretofore held against the entire League so as to make each separate tract stand for its part of the original purchase price due Ochiltree County, and due and owing under the sale made to Wiley Pearce on the 12th day of April, 1912. It appearing to the Court that the present owner, J. S. McMurtry, has divided said League No. 204 into twenty-six (26) tracts as fully appears by plat hereto attached and made a part of this order, and

It further appearing that such tracts are to be sold to actual settlers who will improve same and thus greatly enhance the security of Ochiltree County, and that the subdivision is and will be to the financial interest of Ochiltree County. On motion duly made, seconded and passed it is ordered, adjudged

and decreed by the Commissioners' Court of Ochiltree County that the original purchase price of \$23,911.20 shall be divided so that each tract shall bear and stand for the amount set opposite the number of each tract herein below described and that each of such tracts as numbered below shall be free and clear from the blanket or general lien existing against the said entire League No. 204, and each tract shall stand only for the amount set opposite the number of such tract, same being its purchase price under this order.

The plat set out and attached hereto shall be known as the J. S. McMurtry Subdivision of League No. 204, Ochiltree County School Lands, the description of each tract fully appearing on the attached plat and the amount owing and due Ochiltree County against each separate tract is named and set out in the Southeast corner of each tract, on plat. (See plat on file in Clerk's office.)

It is further ordered, adjudged and decreed by the court, that all the terms and conditions of the sale to the purchaser Wiley Pearce, shall remain in full force and effect except as herein modified and the original vendor's lien existing on the date of the sale to said Wiley Pearce shall remain in full force and effect as original written and reserved except only it shall be divided so that each tract will be free and clear from the general lien and stand only for the amount set out above, and such lien may be released by the County Judge of Ochiltree County and his successors in office upon the payment of the respective amounts set out above due and owing on each separate tract to the county treasurer of Ochiltree County, Texas, and when the said J. S. McMurtry or any assign shall pay the amount due and owing against any particular tract, he or they shall be entitled to a release from the County Judge of Ochiltree County, which release shall be sufficient if it describes the land as being certain tract number out of J. S. McMurtry Subdivision of League No. 204, Ochiltree County, School Lands in Bailey County, Texas.

Each of the amounts above set out shall bear interest at the rate of 5% per annum, and be due and payable forty years after April 12th, 1912, as originally provided in the sale to Wiley Pearce, and the original sale to Wiley Pearce is hereby ratified and confirmed as well as the ownership if said land in said J. S. McMurtry upon the above terms and conditions.

This order, together with the plat, shall be recorded in the minutes of the Commissioners' Court of Ochil-

tree County, Texas.

The County Judge of Ochiltree County, Texas, is hereby authorized to enter into a written contract with J. S. McMurtry embodying the terms and conditions of the above order.

Contract is duly made and entered into by and between J. M. Grigsby, County Judge, as First Party, and Jno. S. McMurtry, as second Party, covering the conditions set out above.

It is the order of this court that Sheriff, J. S. Talley, have the prairie dogs killed on Sections 317, 316, 359 and 389, Block No. 43, Ochiltree County, Texas.

Fence ordered moved along J. B. Cartwright road: It is the order of this court that Dave Shanks, Co. Clerk, notify H. Holdeman, agent for owner of Sec. No. 933, Blk. 43, in Ochiltree Co., Texas, to move fence from road as road petition calls for 40 foot road.

It is the order of the court that the claims presented to this court for payment be and the same are hereby allowed, and the Clerk of this court is ordered to draw warrants in payment of the following claims:

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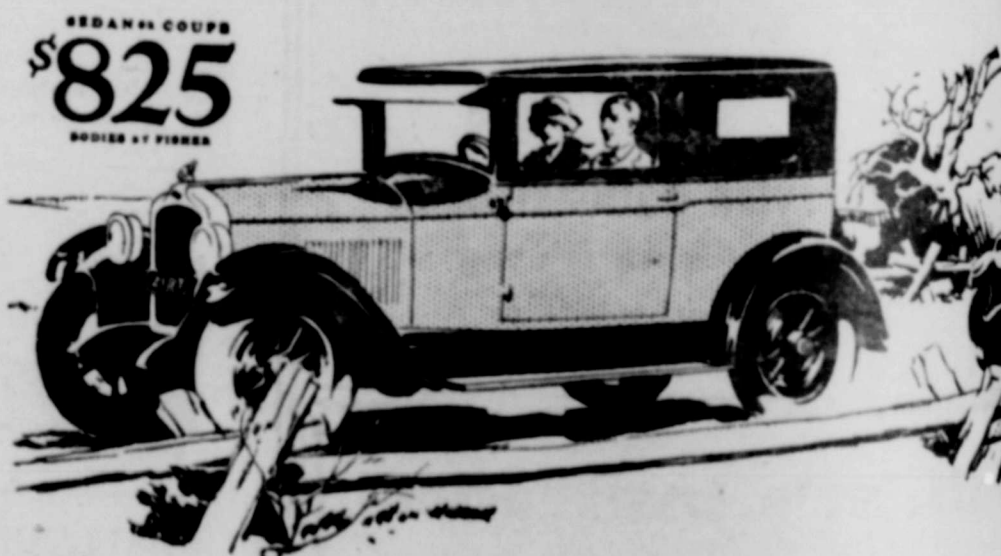
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
