willing endeavors of capable leaders and members. Mrs. Pettit mentioned that two of the charter members, Mrs. Joe Wilson and Mrs. George Winston, are now living and are still much in sympathy with the work and progress of the organization.

She then called Mrs. Wilson and asked her if she realized the party was given in her honor.

Mrs. Wilson answered in the negative and seemed to be overcome with the thought. Mrs. Pettit presented the honoree with a fine quality Morocco bound Bible upon which her name was inscribed in gold letters. The gift was made by the Women's Society of Christian Service of the First Methodist Church. Mrs. Wilson accepted the gift with many thanks and it was easily observed that the gift was more pleasing to her than any other would have been.

The group was invited to the serving table for refreshments, while lovely violin music was played by Misses Mona Lee and Nancy Cluck accompanied at the

piano by their mother, Mrs. R. N. Cluck. These talented musicians furnished music during the remainder of the afternoon.

The table, laid with a linen and hand-made lace cloth, was centered with a lovely floral arrangement of pink dahlias and Queen Anne's Lace with tall white tapers in crystal holders gracing the sides. The decorated birthday cake, presented to Mrs. Wilson, stood at an end of the table. Funch was ladled by Mrs. B. E. Morehart, Mrs. A. R. Westfall, and Mrs. S. H. McCannies. with her father and other members of the family, and has lived here since that time.

She was married to Joe W. Wilson on September 1, 1889. To this union were born eight children, four of whom are living.

All her life she has been devoted to the Methodist Church and at one time or another has held every office of the Women's Society.

Mrs. Wilson has ever been civic minded and has been active in the Rebekah lodge, Worthy Matron of Eastern Star Chapter No. 461; and later in Women's Federated Club work. She is an active member of First Industrial Arts Club, which she joined in 1912. She is also a member of "Merry Wives" forty-two club.

Besides rearing her own family Mrs. Wilson and her husband shared their home with his foster

parents, Uncle Billy and Aunt Nancy O'Neal, and Mrs. Wilson's father, the late R. W. Eddleman, made his home with them for many years before his death. They held open house to relatives and friends who stopped overnight often in the Wilson home to await the arrival of their train. When friends talk to her of her independent spirit she says "When a woman is past 60, she should be allowed to do as she pleases." A daughter often remarked "Common sense will take care of almost anything."

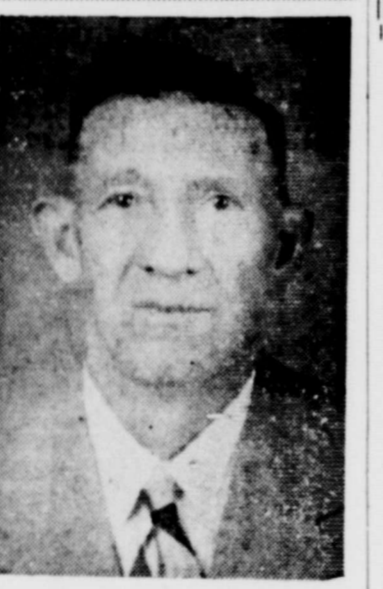

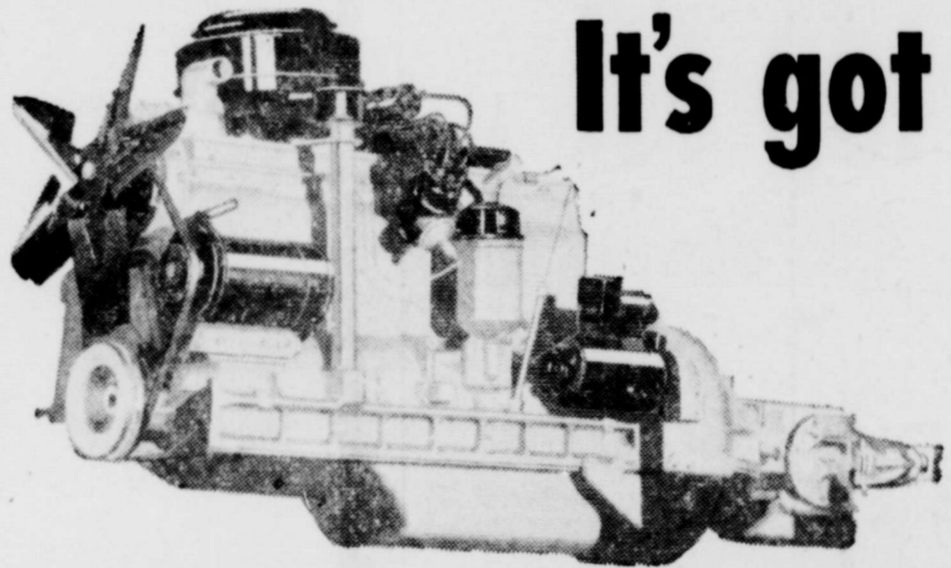

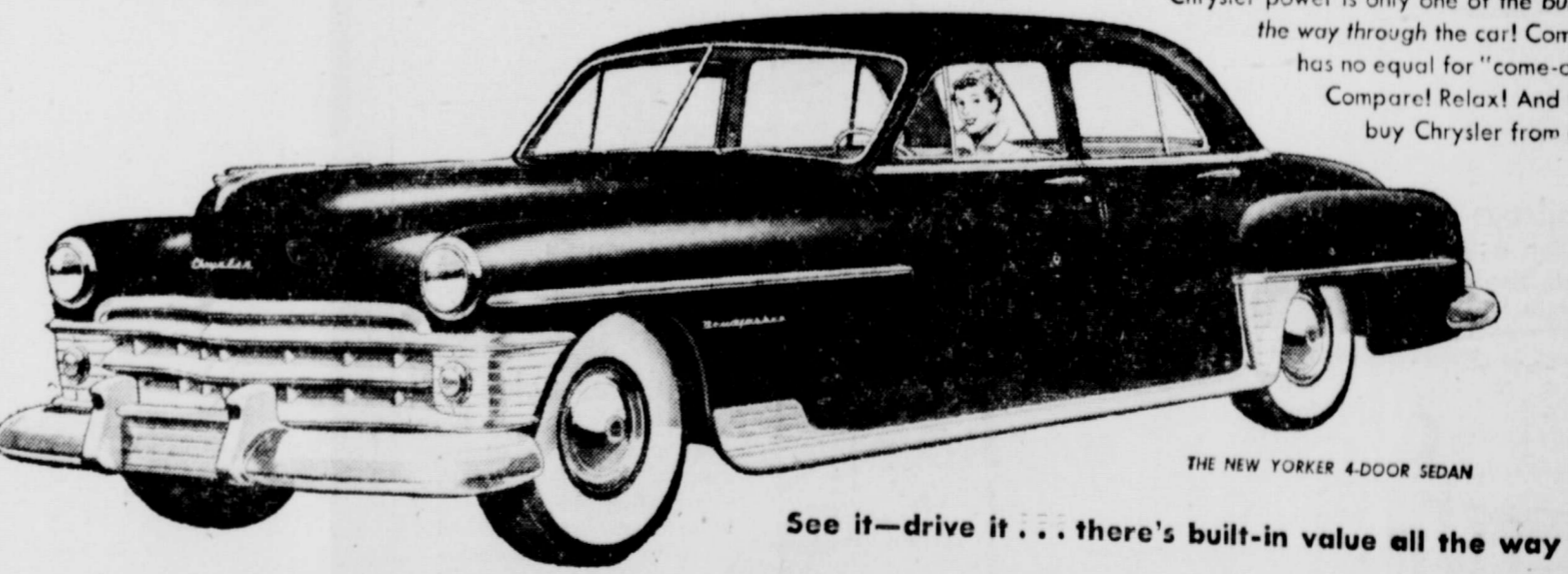
