Circus Animal Walk Scheduled Downtown Friday

The Ringling Bros. and Barnum & Bailey Circus 38 car silver train with an incredible aggregation of animals including elephants, desert dromedaries, horses and other rare beasts plus over 300 performers and other personnel will arrive late Thursday evening at the Santa Fe Depot.

To kick off the appearance of

the 108th Edition of the Greatest Show on Earth scheduled for six spectacular performances Friday through Sunday, the animals will be unloaded from this longest private train in the world to start the traditional "animal walk" on Friday at 9:30 a.m. The "walk" will move down Broadway, turn North on University and proceed

to the Lubbock Municipal Coliseum where the circus will perform.

High atop a select group of elephants will be Lubbock notables such as Alan Henry, Lubbock Mayor Pro-Tem, John Montford, Criminal District Attorney, Sunshine Sally, TV Personality, Abner Euresi, KCBD-TV newsmen, Dottie Townsend and Vicki Key of the Lubbock Memorial Civic Center and Lubbock Municipal Coliseum/Auditorium.

The ponderous pachyderms will proceed at a fast pace in their customary position as leaders of the "walk", directed by Buckles Woodcock, one of the world's foremost elephant experts and animal trainers.

Following the elephants will be herds of Thoroughbred Arabian stallions, prancing ponies, llamas and camels. Other four-footed entertainers such as tigers, leopards, panthers, pumas, chimpanzees will follow in their cages. Joining the caravan will be members of the Clown Corps, the largest laugh brigade in existence.

Suit Filed Against Mt. Gilead Pastor

A suit filed in 137th District Court by Willie Ross, chairman of the Mt. Gilead Baptist Church board of deacons, names the Rev. A.L. Patrick, pastor, of failing to discontinue preaching at the church and misappropriation of church funds.

Ross claims in the suit that an "overwhelming majority" of the congregation met in April and voted to oust Patrick, and that Ross has the notarized signatures of all that were present at the meeting.

Ross claims that Rev. Patrick was informed of the congregation's wishes, but that he has continued to preach and collect money from the church. Ross' suit

alleges that Patrick has collected large sums of money during his term as pastor, and will not let the congregation know how much money has been collected and what the money has been used for. Ross claims that the money is in Patrick's personal bank account.

The suit asks for an injunction against Patrick to prevent him from preaching or collecting money from the church. "I'm still preaching, and I don't have charge over the financial records, I never have," says Patrick. "There's a finance committee to handle those records."

Rev. Patrick has been pastor of the church since 1977.

Apartment Manager Killed in Dispute

The manager of the Sunnyside Apartments, 1027 East 29th Street was stabbed to death Saturday when he tried to break up a disturbance at the apartments. The manager, Ben P. Guzman Jr., 38, was stabbed six times in the heart and lungs, according to the police. A 19 year old Marine military policeman on leave was arrested, and a 16 year old youth. The police are searching for a third youth believed to be involved.

The incident occurred around 3 a.m. Saturday when Guzman confronted a group of people who were drinking beer and causing a disturbance at the apartment complex swimming pool, police said. Guzman got into an argument with several members of the group. Witnesses told police that the Marine took Guzman's shotgun from him and beat him on the head with it, and then several other men joined the fight and Guzman was stabbed.

When the police arrived on the scene, a large crowd had gathered, and three persons were arrested for assaulting a police officer. The police found Guzman lying near the pool with the Marine kneeling over him. A witness said that the Marine had killed Guzman with the shotgun and then threw the gun in the pool.

Several fights broke out when other police units arrived. An EMS ambulance driver had to brandish a shotgun in order to get the crowd to move away from the body, police said. The Marine was arrested at the apartment complex as a murder suspect, and later Saturday, police took the 16 year old into custody after a witness said that he had stabbed Guzman. An autopsy revealed that Guzman was stabbed three times in the chest, and once each in the hip, back and arm. He also suffered a laceration of the head.

Services for Guzman will be held Wednesday at Templo El Redentor with the Rev. Joe Davila officiating. Burial will be in Peaceful Gardens Memorial Park under direction of Henderson-Singleton Funeral Home.

Survivors include three daughters, Sylvia Ann, Diana and Janie, and two sons, Alfonso and Rudy, all of Craigville, Ind.; his mother, Connie P. Guzman of Lubbock; his father Ben P. Guzman Sr. of Craigville, Ind.; seven sisters, Mrs. Eliseo Hernandez of Phoenix and Mrs. Henry Montoya, Mrs. Noe Hernandez, Mrs. Amor Esqueda, Janie Guzman, Susy Jo Adame and Mrs. Pete Moyo, all of Lubbock; two brothers, Rudy Guzman and Jesse Guzman, both of Lubbock; and one grandson.

Studies Show Arab Oil Shieks Plan to Continue High Prices

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WASHINGTON—Some government strategists believe the Middle East is turning into a powder keg that could ignite World War III. Their studies have been conducted in the strictest secrecy. But the American people are entitled to know what these experts foresee.

They expect the Arab oil sheiks to continue demanding higher prices and political concessions for their oil. It is possible, even probable, that the militant Arabs might succeed in their efforts to shut off oil shipments to the United States. They want to withhold oil from the United States as long as we are providing oil to Israel.

A prolonged Arab oil boycott, of course, would cripple the United States. We would be forced to take action. Contingency plans have been discussed in the secret policy councils. One calls for the United States to support an Egyptian invasion of Libya's oil fields. Another calls for a joint Israeli-Egyptian operation to take over the oil fields of Kuwait or Saudi Arabia.

We should stress these are contingency plans. They may never be implemented. But the military action in the Middle East, if it should come, leads to a somber question: Would the Soviet Union intervene?

The Soviets have been put on notice that the United States is dependent upon Persian Gulf oil and, therefore, has a "vital interest" in the area. This is diplomatic talk which means we would go to war to protect our interests there.

The presumption is that the Soviet Union, which doesn't need Arab oil, would not risk World War III to keep us out of the Arab oil fields. But this may not be the case.

We have seen secret documents which warn that the Soviets may not have enough oil to continue supplying their own needs. Within the next decade, they may become dependent, too, on Arab oil. "Major oilfields in the Urals-Volga region are being depleted faster than anticipated," states one secret report. Thus, it is predicted, the Soviet bloc may be importing 3.5 million to 4.5 million barrels a day by 1985.

This could lead to an eventual Soviet-American confrontation over Arab oil.

STATE CAPITAL HIGHLIGHTS

AUSTIN—Texas Attorney General Mark White blasted the national energy policy last week, painting a gloomy picture of double-digit inflation and a continued energy crisis.

The crisis brings "economic chaos" at a level of "deeper concerns than Vietnam or Watergate," White told a Young Texas Lawyers convention in San Antonio.

The national policy has a particularly negative impact on the economic vitality of Texas, he told them, and Congress "has not dealt with us (Texas) in an even-handed fashion."

White referred to a series of rulings by the Interstate Commerce Commission which granted increases in coal freight hikes ... "additional gouges," White called them.

Coal transport rates have risen from less than \$8 per ton to more than \$18 per ton.

Later this week Governor Bill Clements took advantage of authority given to him by President Jimmy Carter to announce he plans to shift up to five percent of the state's monthly gasoline allocation from low-use rural areas to metropolitan areas.

Clements is considering a plan to require some service stations in big cities to sell gasoline on weekends or not get their share of an additional 40 million gallons of fuel expected to be channeled to the big cities this month.

Kubiak Pushes "Agrihol"

If fuel continues to flow from rural to urban areas, the slack in tractor fuel tanks may be taken up by alcohol fuels, according to one state legislator.

State Rep. Dan Kubiak told a Capitol news conference Tuesday that Texas farmers will one day have "agrihol" plants on their farms and burn pure grain alcohol in their tractors and farm machinery.

Kubiak also announced he is building a pilot "agrihol" plant in Milam County to demonstrate how farmers can grow their own fuels. Irrked by Clements' veto last month of a Texas A&M University alcohol fuel plant, Kubiak went to farmers and engineers in his district for financial backing for the plant.

He was not convincing as a grand figure. His unfortunate sloping nose, dark jowls and marionette gestures just didn't go with the majestic trappings. Once, he tried to dress his White House guards in imperial uniforms, complete with crowned hats. But this provoked such uproarious laughter that he hastily packed up the fancy duds.

Jimmy Carter, in contrast, brought an open-collared, feet-on-the-desk informality to the White House. He has also tried to replace Nixon's extravagance with an emphasis on economy. But Carter has never been able to get the message across to his Health, Education and Welfare Secretary, Joseph Califano.

No one in the administration works harder than Califano. He can often be found in his office at nights and on weekends. He usually puts in 12 to 16 hours a day.

But Califano prefers the Nixon-style trappings. He administers to the poor in rich fashion. Not long after he took office, he hired a top-paid "personal assistant" to cook his lunch. Last year, Califano's chauffeur earned \$37,400 — \$23,000 of it in overtime pay for driving Califano around at odd hours.

Our high-living welfare czar also hauls along as many as six bodyguards when he travels out of town. He keeps one plainclothes man on guard outside his office whenever he is inside.

And in there, Califano found it uncomfortably warm at nights, after the air-conditioning had been turned off. So he spent \$100,000 of the public's money to install a mammoth air-conditioning system in his office suite. That is in addition to the central air-conditioning, which was already cooling the building.

Salt Confusion: The debate over SALT is bound to be confusing; after all, not even the people in charge can decide what the acronym SALT stands for. According to the White House, SALT means Strategic Arms Limitation "talks." But the State Department insists that the "t" in SALT stands for "treaty."

They have apparently resolved the question by agreeing to disagree. In the official State Department-White House brochure explaining the treaty provisions, the meaning of SALT is never spelled out.

Headlines and Footnotes: The Federal Aviation Administration is trying to decide whether blind passengers should be allowed to keep their canes while in flight. The controversy erupted last year when a pilot refused to take off until 15 blind passengers surrendered their walking sticks ... According to the secret minutes of a recent Cabinet meeting, President Carter asked Energy Secretary James Schlesinger whether recent news reports of experimental diesel engines getting 84 miles per gallon were true. Schlesinger replied that all he knew about the engines was what he had read in the papers.

Clements, meanwhile, submitted to Environmental Protection Agency officials a Texas plan for complying with federal clean air standards.

If it is not accepted, the state could lose millions in federal funds in highway and sewage treatment plant construction grants and face a ban on building new industrial facilities.

The plan calls for Texas to meet the Clean Air Act of 1970 guidelines through additional pollution controls on refineries, chemical and manufacturing plants and automobile emissions.

Demos Favor Convention

While Texas Republicans will hold a presidential primary election next spring, Democrats will probably choose their delegates to the 1980 Democratic National Convention through the convention system.

The overwhelming sentiment of testimony at a Democratic Party Rules Committee hearing in Houston was that the party reject the idea of a binding presidential primary.

Only one of 21 witnesses opted for the primary: Franklin Garcia of San Antonio who said, "Let the people choose. Period."

On the eve of the Fourth of July, Republican presidential contender John Connally met in Austin with a group of 200 of the state's most powerful lobbyists.

When the group discovered a news reporter in the adjacent room, Connally's microphone was shut off and the press was effectively left out of the meeting.

Clements has also been entertaining the political movers and shakers lately trying to pay off a \$4.75 million campaign debt. Meanwhile, his 1978 opponent, former Attorney General John Hill, said he will wait until 1981 to decide whether to take on Clements again. Hill predicted Clements will only serve one term in the mansion, but some of Clements friends are saying the same thing: they predict he will be chosen as vice president in 1980.

Colson Bid Rejected

The Texas Department of Corrections rejected a request by Watergate figure Charles Colson to bring an evangelistic crusade to Texas prisons.

Colson, one-time aide to former President Richard M. Nixon, became a born-again Christian during his Watergate ordeal and in the last three years has taken his Prison Fellowship crusade into federal and state prisons.

Department director Jim Estelle admitted he disliked some reported Colson comments that prisons are breeding grounds for criminals, but that Texas prisons already had enough religious activity. It was "no slight to Mr. Colson," he said.

On a Biblical note of another sort, Texas Agriculture Commissioner Reagan V. Brown said grasshoppers have invaded Texas in their greatest numbers since 1958 but he is "declaring war" on them. About 1.4 million acres of Panhandle rangeland were sprayed with insecticide to stop the pests who were counted at from 10 to 18 per square yard.

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Kelly's Heroes

How long has it been? It seems like half a year, although it really has been much less than that. Suffice it to say, it was a great vacation and a great business trip.

It all started June 6 when we lit out for Washington, D.C., and the NFIB national conference. It was a great event, with outstanding speakers, strong panels and interesting discussions. It included a visit to Capitol Hill and a long chat with Kent Hance.

Washington was beset with gas problems, as was neighboring Virginia. We had enough for the first few days, but when we thought about the trip to Saranac Lake and a fillup, the wife had to drive 20 miles to an area town to find a station open.

Cars lined up before dawn, waiting for stations to open, which gives you a pretty good idea of the general shortage in that area. But, once we escaped the Washington area, we had no trouble.

The conference broke up after a tremendous talk by Paul Harvey Wednesday night. We had planned to leave right afterwards, but a call to the Triple A office convinced me we'd better not try it. They advised that only if it was a dire emergency should we start out—and then we ought to be prepared to spend the night alongside the highway.

Thursday morning we had no trouble on I-81, although we were limited to \$10 worth of gas at a station in Pennsylvania just south of the New York line. After that, there was plenty of gas, both for car and boat.

We got into Saranac Lake, N.Y., late Thursday, about 6 p.m., and then there was shopping to do. We didn't start up the lake until about 7:30 p.m. The camp was all ready for us and it didn't take long to get settled, dinner eaten and then to bed.

From that time on the days sort of run together. Joe Jr. went fishing every day and never came home skunked. As a result, we had to buy meat only once. The rest of the time we ate bass, northern pike and brook trout. The weather was gorgeous, too, and that helped a lot.

Jim Whitelaw and I fished Pine Pond the first Sunday and never got so much as a nibble. He's mystified, since the Conservation Dept. swears to him that they stocked the pond. But he hasn't even seen a sign of salmon or lake trout, and neither has his brother.

Cold Brook, where we go after brook trout, was lower than I've seen it in years. You could just about wade across at any point and hardly wet your feet. As a result, the trout generally were smaller, but still fighters and fun to go after.

Jim brought us some salmon from a year ago that we fileted and baked over the coals and one day we had some whitefish that he had caught that morning. Joe was supposed to meet Jim at Kiwassa Lake, but the fog was too thick on the lake and he decided not to try meeting him.

It was unusually cold, even for the Adirondacks, and two nights the local radio station warned residents to spread plastic over their vegetable gardens because frost was due. We didn't have any frost, but it did get into the low 30s and blankets felt good at night, to say nothing of a roaring fire the next morning in the huge fireplace.

We made a couple of side excursions, one of them to Lake Placid, where the winter Olympics will be held in February. They are working feverishly to get the town ready for the Olympics and I'll have more about that later on.

We also went to the Lower Saranac Lake (one of a chain of three lakes), both to show it to Joe and also to see an old friend. He was out, so we missed him, but it's a beautiful lake and it was fun just being on it, even though we didn't fish.

Although it was early in the tourist season, the gas shortage was taking its toll. At the marina, there was little traffic and few cars parked. The same was true in town, with not many people moving about. The cold weather, of course, didn't help, either, although I'm sure things have picked up since then.

One day my wife and I hiked over to Owl Pond and called on Abby Williams and her husband. She's the one who had the coon cats, and there will be more on that later.

It was unusually dry for that area and the lake went down noticeably in the two weeks we were there. We finally got a heavy rain late on the Wednesday before we left and more on Thursday morning. That raised the levels considerably.

All in all, though, the weather couldn't have been better, the fishing was good and we had a chance to relax. Typically, the time went all too fast and we headed home June 28. We made it in three easy days of driving and again, no problem with gas.

I'm ready to go back—but that's a year away. A few interesting details next week, if you all can stand it.

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Exchange Student Homes Needed

Over 2500 foreign students will come to the U.S. for the coming school year, or for 3 or 6-month periods under the sponsorship of International Fellowship, Inc. This non-profit organization is now in its 27th year and is the largest exchange student program in Latin America. I.F.I. also maintains chapters in Europe and in the Orient.

These youngsters, scheduled to arrive between September 1 and January 1, will need host homes. They want to live with U.S. families for 3, 6 or 9 months, and attend the high school to which the children of the neighborhood go. High schools, as a rule, are anxious to participate in exchange programs when there is no cost involved.

The students range from 14 to 18. They are recommended by their own schools, screened by the foreign chapter of I.F.I. and for the most part, speak English. They come, not as guests but as members of the family, sharing in the tasks, and the family hosting them may claim them for income

tax purposes. Students have their own money for personal expenses and are insured against accidents, illness, prescriptions. The receiving family agrees to provide a bed, three meals daily, transportation to school and church, and laundry. Students may share a room.

For each foreign student attending a U.S. High School, that school is eligible to send a student abroad. The scholarship fee includes transportation both ways, room, board, tuition, insurance and the services of the I.F.I. chapter in the foreign country.

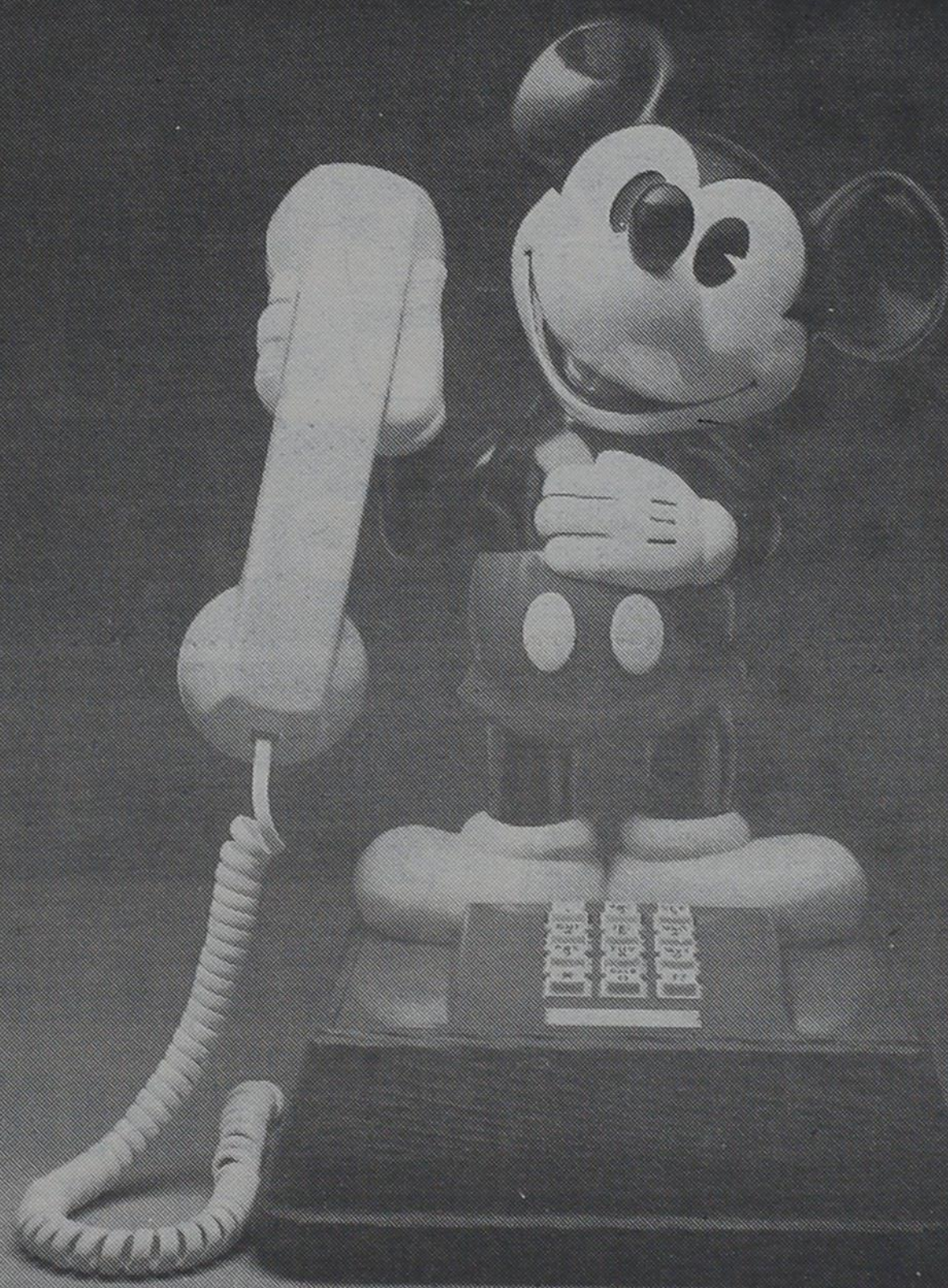

In an era when peaceful international relations depends more and more on one nation's sympathetic understanding of

another's culture and problems, such programs can be valuable. The foreign student who gets a chance to sample family and school life here will return to his own country with a better understanding of our nation. And it is from their ranks that the foreign leaders of tomorrow may come. So in addition to broadening the horizons of the visiting student and the people he or she meets, the Student Exchange Program, in a small way, may further the cause of international peace.

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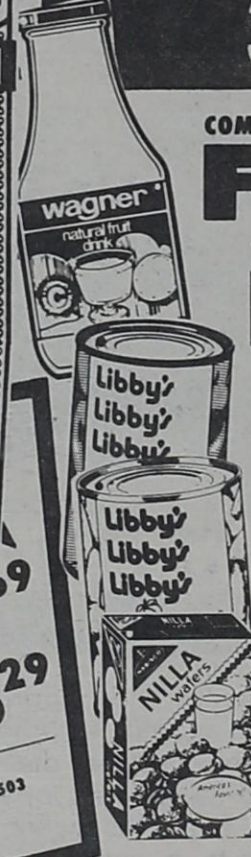

Tips For Energy Savers

by Mrs. Jane W. Cohen

Now is a good time to make sure that the ducts in your air conditioning system are properly insulated, especially those that pass through the attic or other uncooled spaces. This precautionary step could save cooling costs for you later, when hot weather arrives.

Adding insulation to your home may reduce cooling costs in warm weather as well as heating costs during the winter. Find out if your home needs insulation.

When you are sure that the heating season is over, you can save a considerable amount of fuel by having the furnace pilot light turned off. Remember to make a note to be sure to have it re-ignited before you turn the furnace on again next fall.

Keep in mind that more than 7.5 percent of the electricity we use in our homes goes into lighting. Concentrate lighting in your home in reading and working areas. Remember also to light certain areas, such as stair wells, for safety's sake. Reduce lighting elsewhere.

Try using heat treated glass or ceramic dishes in your oven. You will be able to cook at oven temperature settings as much as 25 degrees lower than required for cooking similar items in metal pans.

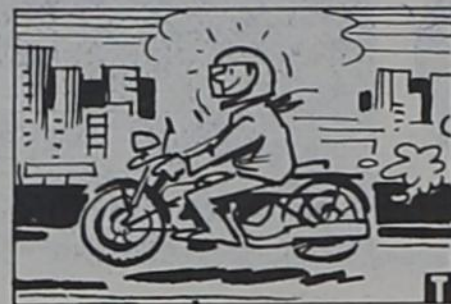

Page From the Black Religious Experience: Fresh out of the seminary—Southern Methodist University in the early 60's, Cecil Williams came to West Texas and later to Hobbs, N. Mexico to establish a United Methodist Church. He was to find it to be a most difficult and discouraging task even though white friends and ministers lent him all the encouragement possible by purchasing land and pledges to help build a church in Hobbs, N.M. With a new wife, the young minister was unable after months of trying to get going and he made preparations to go further West. He did.

Williams is a native of San Angelo and was there recently to attend a Blackshear High School reunion, from which he graduated in 1946. When he arrived at Glide United Methodist Church in 1964, he began a transformation of that church which has been the subject of documentaries around the world and has often caused some concern among the leaders of the Methodist church.

Williams calls himself a "human minister", is a political activist and has often been involved in a number of controversial activities. When this correspondent spoke to him a few years ago, when the United Methodist Church held a General Conference in Dallas, he said: "Bob, I suppose you know that I thrive on controversy." And so he does.

Glide Memorial Methodist is located in downtown San Francisco and every week some three thousand people attend the church. They come from 12 countries and the United States. They are, as he describes them "Pimps, pushers, junkies, prostitutes. I take religion to the people. I get out there with the poor folks—the people who need help—and I get involved. The church today is sitting by getting stale. We need to live dangerously to get involved," states Methodist pastor-evangelist Rev. Cecil Williams.

Williams is publishing a book: "I Am Alive" in which he will relate his experiences with the Hearst family and with religious leaders like the late Jim Jones. "Everywhere I go I see people having the same kind of problems whether they be white or black or gay or poor. We help people love themselves so they can love others," he concluded.

Bishop College of Dallas, one of the nation's top black church related (Baptist) institutions in the nation, had hoped to raise \$3.2 million to pay off current outstanding debts by June 30, 1979. According to our bellringer sources less than \$2 million had been raised by that time. "We are not going to make the \$3 million mark and the situation at the school is tough but better," stated Alex Bickley, executive vice president of the Dallas Citizens Council. He added that he did not know what the eventual outcome of the college's financial problems would be.

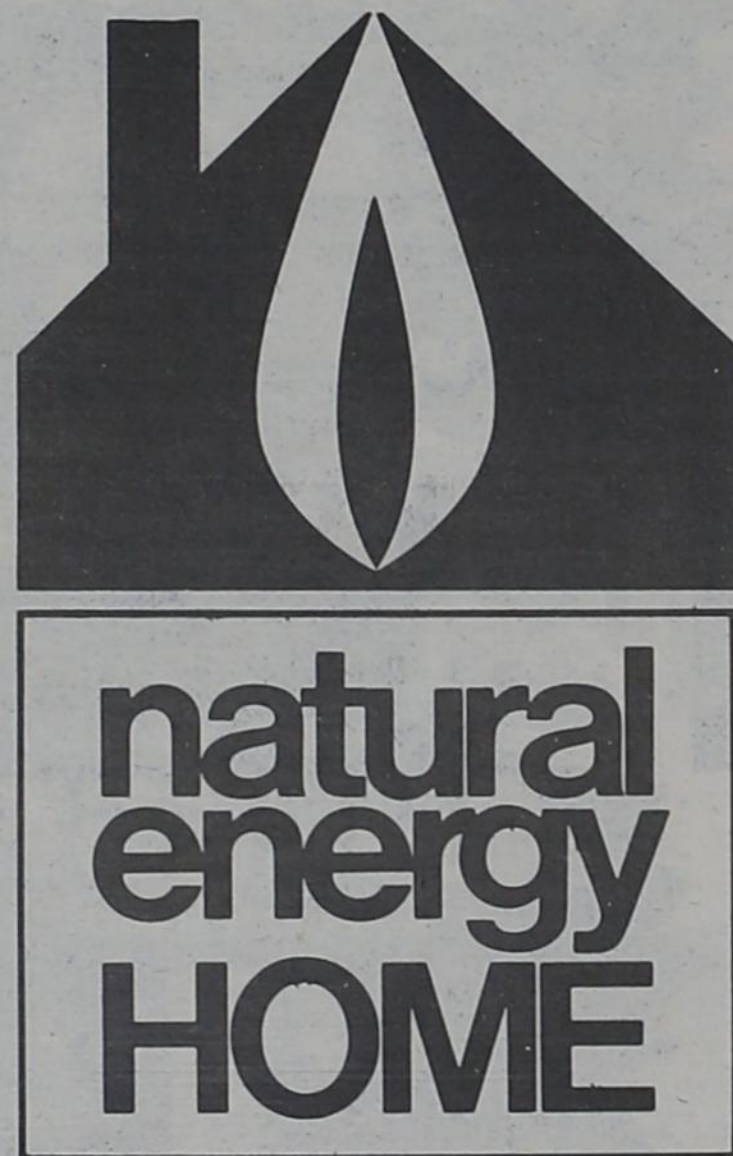
It was reported that since the fund drive began, officials at the college had been able to pay teachers' salaries for March and April and \$69,000 in loan payments to the U.S. Department of Health, Education and Welfare. Several months' utility bills and payments on bank loans are still owed and teachers have not been paid for May and the June payroll is due July 10.

These same sources report that in April of this year, HEW sent Bishop a letter questioning the use of about \$890,000 in federal funds and stating that no more money could be given until the funds were accounted for.

Bishop officials were in Washington, D.C. as we go to press, hoping to have an answer as to the unaccounted funds and perhaps a release of some \$400,000 Bishop officials owe the college. If HEW releases the money, the United Negro College Fund is slated to give Bishop \$600,000 as a matching grant. Before the cutoff, Bishop had been scheduled to receive more than \$3 million from HEW, it was reported.

Chimes: Sen. Birch Bayd, D-Ind., has proposed that Frederick Douglass, the 19th century black leader, be honored with a bust in the U.S. Capitol. At the present time there are 681 statues and portraits of distinguished Americans in the Capitol and "none of these is of a Black American" Bayh said.

Embattled Langston University, a black land grant institution in Oklahoma, has been allocated \$3,532,425 for the educational and general budget for 1979-80. Critics of Langston for a number of years has said the school should be closed or moved to an Urban center (like Dallas?) or under reorganization. A nationwide search is on now for a president. Applications will be received until July 23. Maurice Long is chairman of Search Committee, Langston University, Langston, Oklahoma.

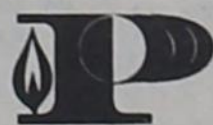

KITCHEN & GARDEN NOTEBOOK

LIVING HEALTHY BY HOME CANNING

One of the many benefits of home food preservation—particularly if you're canning foods from your own garden—is using absolutely fresh produce picked at the prime of its ripeness, the ideal time. And, further, you can "put it up" without using preservatives, coloring or salt. That's right. No salt. In canning vegetables, salt is used only for flavoring, not preserving, so it can be eliminated if you want to.

Also, when canning fruits, you don't have to use a sugar pack. Sugar can be omitted entirely by packing the fruit in its own juice. To do this, crush or chop some of the fruit, heat it to a simmer with just enough water to prevent sticking. Strain the cooked fruit through a jelly bag or cheesecloth to separate the fresh juice from the pulp. Prepare the whole fruit for canning according to your recipe. For a hot pack, heat the fruit in the extracted juice or water before packing. Juicy fruits may be preheated without added liquid and packed in the juice that cooks out. Carefully pack the fruit into jars that have been washed and held in hot rinse water or a dishwasher. If necessary, add more boiling fruit to cover, being sure you leave the correct

amount of head space.

If you like your fruit a little sweeter, try packing the fruit in a syrup made from brown sugar or honey. Fruit is usually canned in



a syrup made from granulated sugar and water. Brown sugar may be substituted directly for the granulated sugar. Follow the proportions of ingredients given for a light syrup: 2 cups of sugar to 1 quart of water which yields 5 cups or enough syrup for 4 to 5 jars of home canned fruit. Honey can also be substituted for part of the sugar. Use 1 cup granulated sugar and 1 cup honey to 1 quart of water. When using honey, however, be sure to use one with a mild flavor so it doesn't overwhelm the natural flavor of the fruit.

Your Child's Sight

No child is too young to have a vision problem, or an eye examination. One in every twenty preschool children has some eye disorder, and certain conditions must be discovered in these early years if treatment is to be most effective.

You can help protect your child's sight with a do-it-yourself Home Eye Test for Preschoolers, available free from your state Prevent Blindness Society or the National Society to Prevent Blindness, 79 Madison Avenue, New York, N.Y. 10016. It's not a substitute for an eye doctor's exam, but a useful first step for many. So far, almost seven million copies have been



distributed. Instructions for performing the test and judging results are included with it.

If the child "fails" the test, make an appointment for a professional eye examination right away. You could be saving your child's sight.

SECTION 4. THIS Ordinance shall be published in its entirety by the City Secretary once a week for two consecutive weeks.

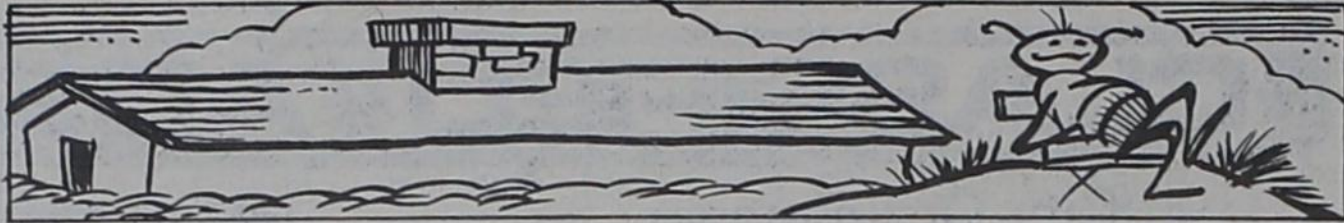

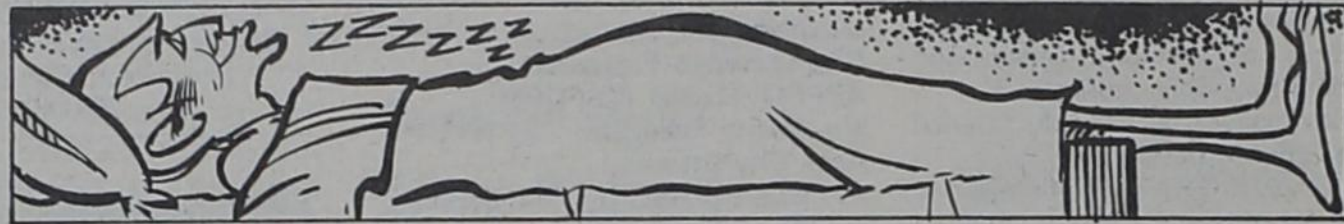

OMELETS FOR LUNCH

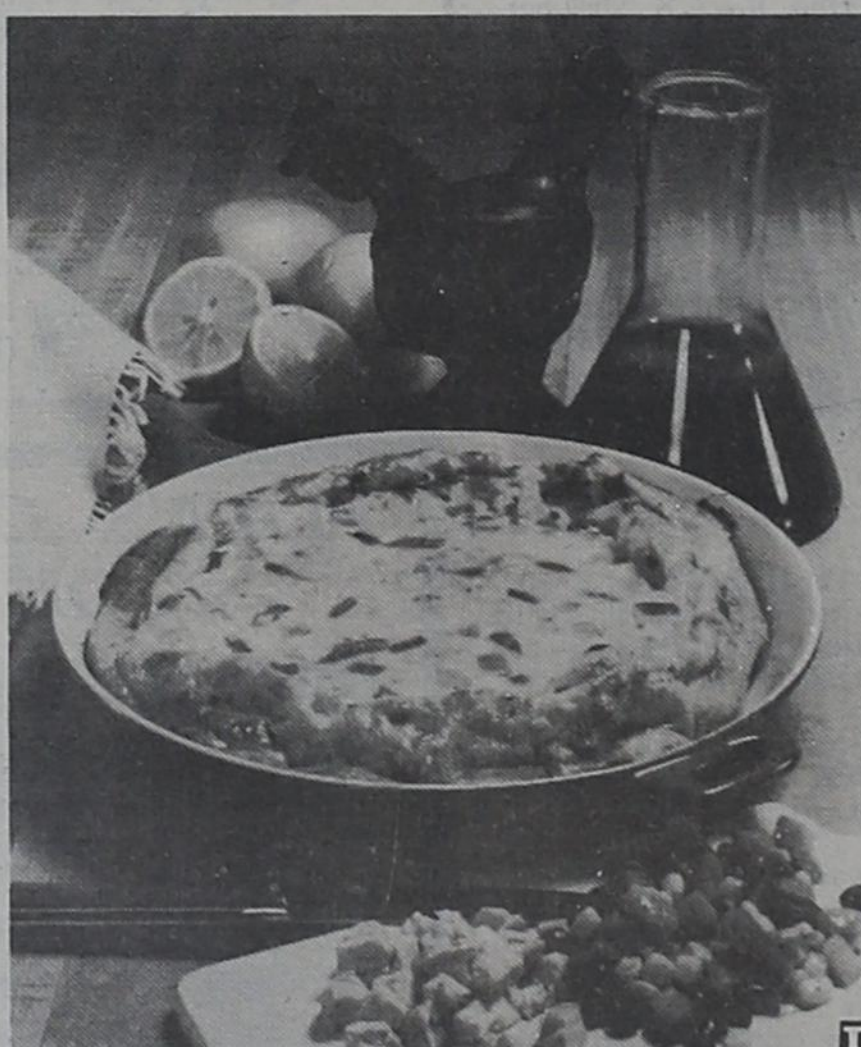
The word *omelet* comes from the Italian or Latin *ova mellita* which literally means "honeyed eggs." This was originally a Roman dessert. One of the most famous Italian omelets is the frittata. This unfolded omelet is often served as a luncheon entree. It can be filled with leftover meats or vegetables to provide a tasty budget meal. A rich tomato sauce adds extra zest.

Italian Chicken-Vegetable Frittata was developed for those people concerned about good health who are watching their dietary intake of saturated fats and cholesterol.
