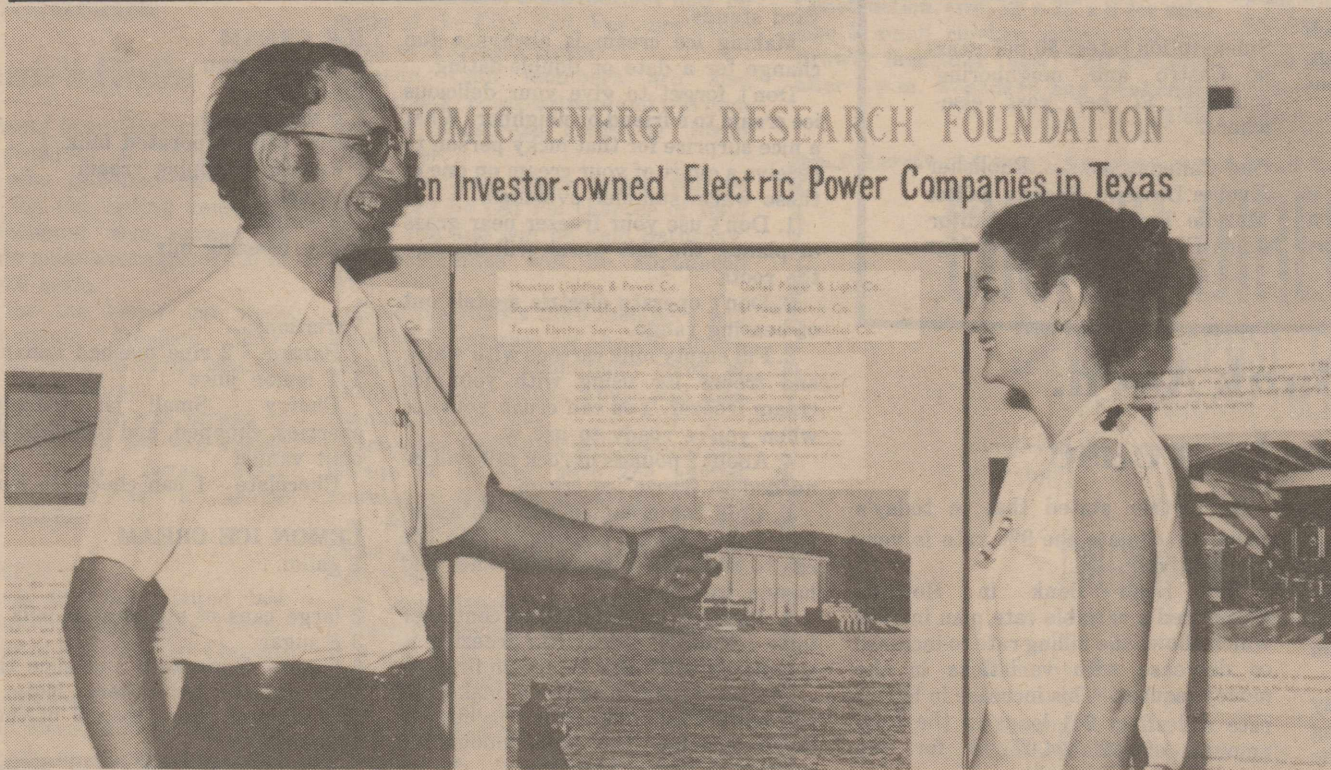

3 Resignations Are Accepted

Board of education of Hart schools met in called session Monday evening. Members voted that a market value schedule be applied to appraisal cards in accordance of current value of property for 1979. Due to the passage of Senate bill 621, wherein the assessment ratio of all taxing jurisdictions shall be 100 percent of the appraised value, it is ordered that the assessment ratio be 100 percent of the appraised value instead of 50 percent of heretofore used. The \$1.25 per one hundred dollars of assessed value will be reduced to approximately 63 cents of the appraised value.

In other action, the board accepted the resignations of Lanny Tucker and Santry and Paula Rush. Tucker has accepted the position of elementary principal at Estelline. Mr. and Mrs. Rush will be employed with Westlake High School of Austin.

Approval was voted for the purchase of four IBM typewriters for the 1979-80 school year.

Federal Land Bank Ass'n. Tells Billing Rate Increase

Marlos A. May, Manager of The Federal Land Bank Association of Dimmitt, announced today that The Federal Land Bank of Houston's billing rate on farm and ranch loans and rural residence loans will be increased from 8½% to 9% effective June 1.

In making this announcement, May stated that the increase in the billing rate became necessary because of the continued high cost of funds to finance the Bank's lending operation and no substantial decline is anticipated in the near future.

He further stated that in today's economic climate the 9% rate is very competitive.

The Land Bank in Houston introduced a variable rate plan in 1969 which allows the billing rate to increase or decrease with variations in the money market. This increase in billing rate will affect 341 loans in the total amount of \$22,404,071.48 for the association in Dimmitt.

The Federal Land Bank Association of Dimmitt makes long-term real estate loans on farm and ranch land and rural residences throughout this area.

If you are like me, summer is the best time of year to get together with family and friends for a freezer of homemade ice cream.

When freezing your ice cream, include all the members of the family. Give everyone a job in preparing it. Someone might like to be appointed the "official taster".

Children might have a good business selling scoops of homemade ice cream rather than lemonade in their front yard stands.

Making ice cream is always a fun change for a date or double-dating.

Don't forget to give your delicious ice cream to a friend or neighbor. What a nice surprise for that lucky person to receive a quart of your cream on one of these warm summer evenings.

1. Don't use your freezer near grass or plants; the salt water will damage the roots.

2. Don't operate electric models out of hearing range.

3. Fill empty milk cartons with water and freeze for using with your ice cream freezer. You can crush your ice when you're ready to use it.

4. About 2 pounds of rock salt will be needed to freeze ice cream.

5. Chill the creamed mixture about four hours before pouring it into the can to make the texture smoother and hasten freezing.

6. Packing ice around the container for a couple of hours after freezing is completed will make ice cream firmer.

Ice cream is not only fun to make and eat, but it's also nutritious. 1½ cup ice cream provides the same amount of calcium as a cup of milk.

The first forms of ice cream are believed to have developed over 2,000 years ago in ancient China. Legend has

it that Emperor Nero of Rome ate fruit puree and wines chilled with snow, "snow cone".

Ice cream was first introduced to the public in 1660 by an Italian who opened a cafe in Paris. He was known for his special desserts.

The first ice cream parlors established in the U.S. were in the 1770's in New York City.

I hope you will enjoy some of my favorite recipes.

ICE CREAM

8 eggs, beaten
2 c sugar
1 c corn syrup
Large can evaporated milk
2 cartons whipping cream
¼ t salt
1 t vanilla
1 pkg freezing mix
Milk

Variations:

Banana - 2 ripe mashed bananas
1 T lemon juice
Cherry - Small jar maraschino cherries, chopped, and including juice; omit vanilla
Chocolate - 1 can chocolate syrup

LEMON ICE CREAM

1 gallon

2 large cans of evaporated milk
3 c sugar
6 lemons (squeeze 3 and slice thinly, then quarter the others. Note: You may squeeze more than 3 of them if you prefer.)
Mix milk and sugar til dissolved; then add lemons and juice. Pour into can and finish filling with milk and freeze.

Summer Rose Care Tips Offered By Extensionist

A little work this spring and summer will insure attractive and abundant roses this fall.

That suggestion comes from Everett Janne, landscape horticulturist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, Texas A&M University System.

Remove spent flowers so that the plant's food and energy will go into flower production instead of seed production, advises Janne. Cut old flowers just above the second five-leaflet leaf above the main branch - the same as cutting flowers for arrangements. Higher cuts result in blind shoots or deformed flowers.

Another recommended practice is to apply a complete fertilizer every four to six weeks for optimum rose growth. However, don't fertilize after mid-August so the plants will mature and be less susceptible to winter injury, warns Janne.

In alkaline soils, iron deficiency can be a problem. If this condition develops, obtain a copy of the leaflet, "Iron Chlorosis," from your county Extension office for information on correcting the problem. You may also want a copy of the publication, "Roses: Summer Care".

During hot, dry weather, the

horticulturist suggests thoroughly watering rose beds to a depth of 8 to 10 inches each week.

Janne stresses the importance of blackspot and mildew control through a preventive spray program. Any reputable rose fungicide produces excellent results if properly applied. Spraying is more effective than dusting.

Most roses require spraying every 7 to 10 days from spring until a killing frost, says the specialist. During high temperatures and dry weather, spray intervals may be extended to two weeks through mid-August. Then return to weekly applications.

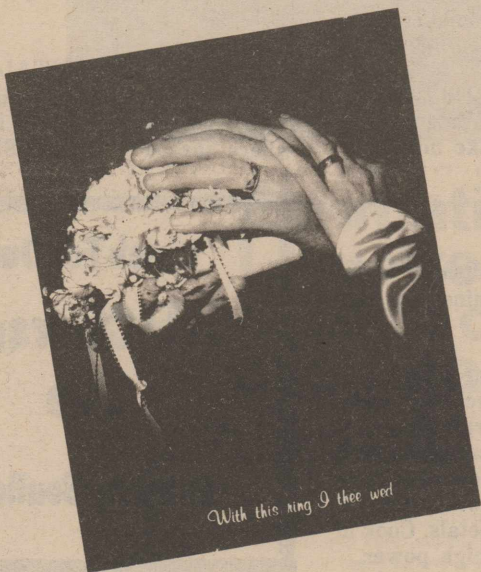


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Homemakers Club Hosts Grandmother's Luncheon

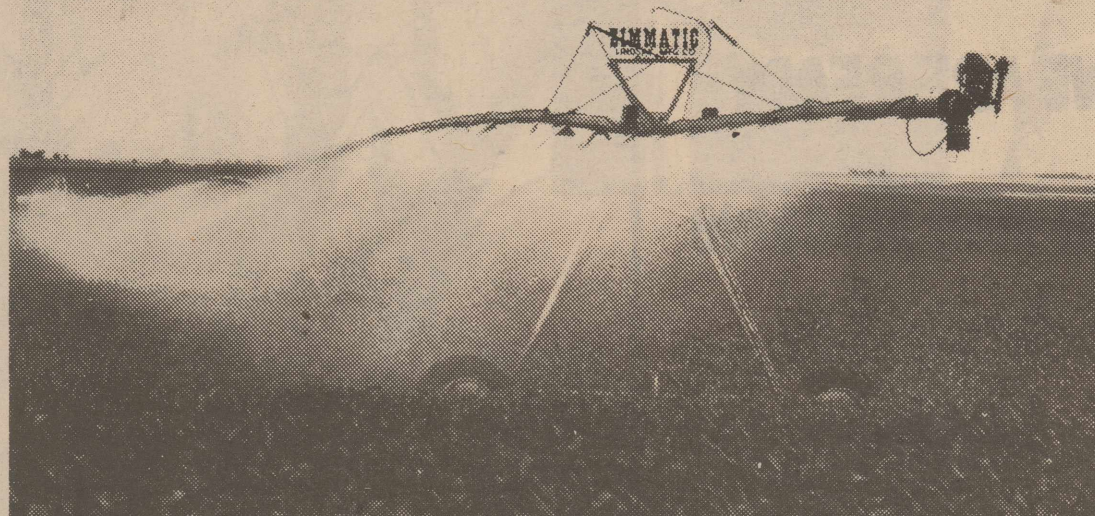

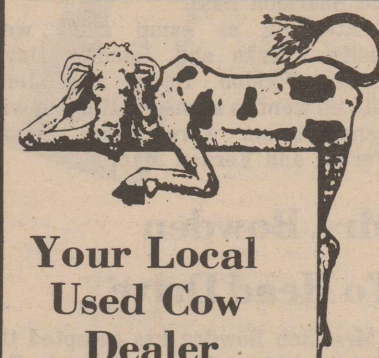
