PENNY ON THE DOLLAR

Higher Tax Will Hit Texans During Week

Texans start paying an additional penny on the dollar in sales taxes Wednesday.

That's when the 1 per cent increase in the sales tax voted by the legislature this summer takes effect.

The state sales tax rate will be 3 per cent, but most of the state's citizens will be paying 4 per cent because they live in the 304 cities that also have 1 per cent local sales taxes.

Also taking effect Wednesday will be an increase from the present 2 per cent to 3 per cent in the auto sales tax—just in time for consumers who have been captivated by Detroit's 1969 products. This adds about \$30 to the price of a \$3,000 car.

With the increase in effect, the state sales tax would start at a penny on a purchase of 17 cents. In cities with local sales taxes, the breaking point would be 13 cents.

Vending machine sales of 16 cents or less would be exempt.

In cities without a local sales tax, the rate will be 1 cent on sales of 17-49 cents, 2 cents on sales of 50-83 cents and 3 cents on transactions of from 84 cents to \$1.16.

Where local taxes are in force, the rates will be 1 cent on sales of 13-37 cents, 2 cents on purchases of 38-62 cents, 3 cents on sales of 63-87 cents and 4 cents on purchases of 88 cents—\$1.12.

The legislature did not change the exemptions from the tax, which are the same for both state and local levies.

Cotton Harvest Meet Is Slated At Abernathy

A meeting on harvesting cotton for maximum efficiency and quality preservation is slated in Abernathy Thursday announces Hale County Agricultural Agent Ollie Limer.

The meeting will be held at Graham's Restaurant beginning at 2:30 p.m.

Featured speakers at the meeting will be Dr. Robert Metzger, area agronomist; Beverly Reeves, cotton ginning and mechanization specialist; and Fred Elliott, cotton specialist. All are with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

Proper Use

Proper use of harvest-aid chemicals will be discussed with special emphasis on correct timing of application. Timing is important with respect to maturity of cotton and weather conditions. Other topics to be covered will include proper harvesting techniques for maximum preservation of lint and seed quality.

Quality preservation is a vital step in the overall cotton production picture so proper harvesting of the crop is most important.

The session will last about one and one-half hours, says Limer. All cotton growers, ginners and others interested in the cotton industry are encouraged to attend.

This meeting scheduled for Hale County, is one of a series of eighteen similar meetings which are being held throughout the South Plains to provide the latest, up-to-date information on cotton harvesting with reference to the upcoming season.

WHITE GOLD GIN TURNS OUT FIRST BALE OF COTTON

The first bale of 1968 cotton ginned at White Gold Gin in Abernathy came from the W. V. Halford farm about one mile west of town.

The 2,100 pounds of seed cotton turned out 534 pounds of lint and 800 pounds of seed, Gayle Wallace, gin owner, reported. Wallace ginned the bale free of charge, and paid Halford a premium price of 50¢ per pound for lint and bought the seed on the base price of \$100 per ton. The bale was ginned Sept. 25.

Halford planted the Coker 4104 cotton May 3.

Halford is one of several farmers in this area growing the Coker 4104 cotton on a block basis this year.

Wallace said the block growers have a total of 649 acres of Coker 4104 cotton here this year.

PLACE FIRST IN TWIRLING AT FAIR EVENT

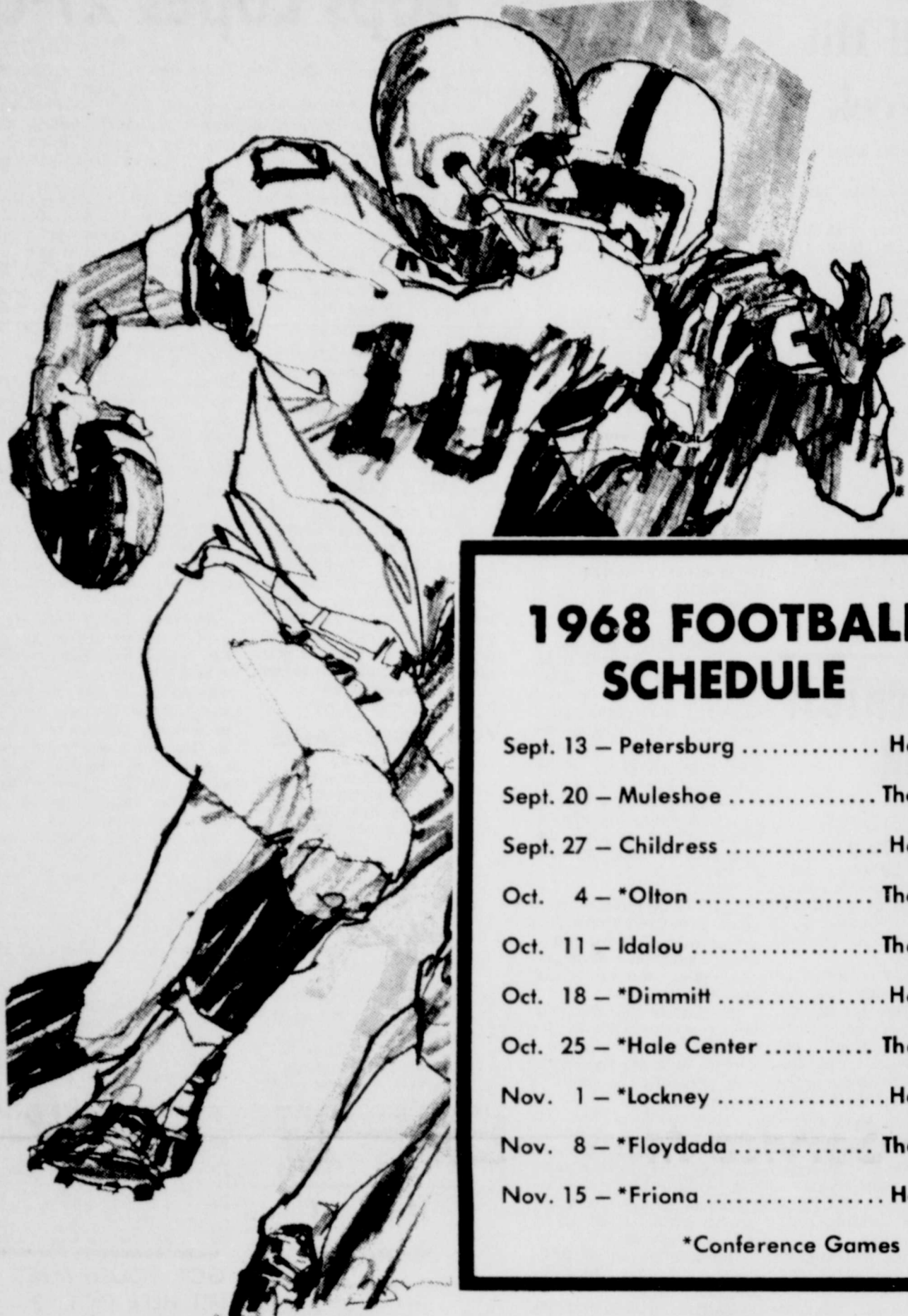

IN SOYBEANS

Harvesting Methods Can Increase Yields

If area farmers have done their jobs well, all that remains of this year's soybean crops are long rows of bushy, knee-high beans abundance at harvest time.

However, it takes care in harvesting to assure collection of complete soybean yields.

But rarely does this special treatment occur. According to one elevator manager, 75 per cent of this year's crop will be harvested incorrectly, leaving several bushels of profits in the fields.

Necessary Precautions

Dr. Douglas Owen, oil seeds agronomist for the High Plains Research Foundation, urges necessary precautions to harvest all of the crop farmers have worked so hard to produce.

The primary objective is to get the soybeans when they are ready, Dr. Owen said. This is when the pods are mature and carry 13 to 14 per cent moisture. "If a farmer is in doubt, he should cut a sample to be checked at the elevator," Dr. Owen stated.

Delay in harvesting after the beans have reached the mature stage will result in serious losses due to shattering of the pods and combine damage such as splitting and cracking of the beans. "And," Dr. Owen cautioned, "moisture content can change rapidly especially in a hot, dry wind. A drop from 14 per cent moisture to eight per cent in less than 12 hours is not uncommon."

Other Precautions

Other tips include slowing the speed of the combine to 2 1/2 to 4 miles per hour with a reel speed approximately 25 per cent faster. Dr. Owen said the greatest cause of field loss is cutting the soybeans too high. This is sometimes due to fast ground speed where the combine sickle pushed the soybean plant forward before completing its cut.

A slow cylinder speed from 300 to 400 revolutions per minute is necessary. "And combines should be operated with the widest concave clearance possible," Dr. Owen stated.

Reel bats should be set about one foot ahead of the cutter bar.

For a check on crop loss, Dr. Owen suggests a count using a rule of thumb of four beans per square foot equals a bushel of beans per acre.

Farmers Cautioned

He cautioned farmers about mixing beans and other crop seeds. "Japanese importers most vocal complaint is the contamination of our soybeans with other crops," he stated.

Specifically, Dr. Owen urged farmers with volunteer plants of corn sorghum or castors in soybean fields to remove the plant from the area before harvest. "You must remove the castor plant from the field after it is cut or the combine will pick it up during bean harvest," he stated.

Capeling all information pertaining to harvesting of soybeans, Dr. Owen said, "Cut low and go slowly."

Ollie F. Liner, Hale County agricultural agent, was named as one of eight recipients of the 1968 Texas Superior Service Award, during the State Extension Conference at Texas A&M University.

Liner was announced as the award winner at the Friday ceremony, in recognition of his leadership in the development of agricultural educational programs for the farm families of Hale County.

The awards, which were presented this year for the first time, went to eight Extension staff members who were credited with doing outstanding work.

Liner has been the county agricultural agent in Hale County since 1950. A graduate of Texas Technological College, he first taught vocational agriculture in the high school at Post, then in 1942 was employed as assistant agricultural agent in Hale County. After three years military service he resumed his agent's work at Plainview. He is a member of the Texas County Agricultural Agents Association, National County Agricultural Agents Association, and the Kiwanis Club.

Q. I am a man. I will be 65 years old next year and have been regularly employed at good wages all my life. I have been told that my benefit will be figured on the basis of my five high years of earnings. Is this correct?

A. No. We will consider your annual earnings for the years from 1951 to 1968. From these 18 years, we must use the 13 high years in computing your average unless we can get a higher benefit rate by averaging your highest 27 years after 1937. You will get the highest amount possible by either method.

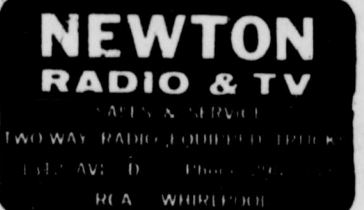
