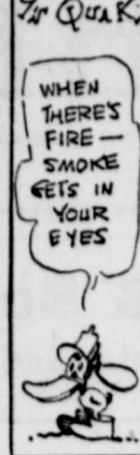

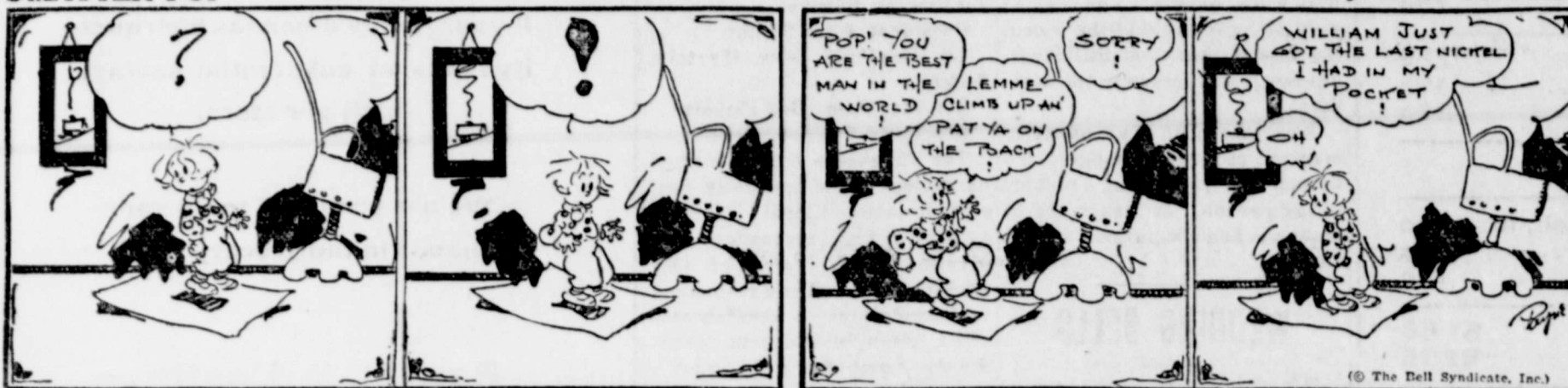

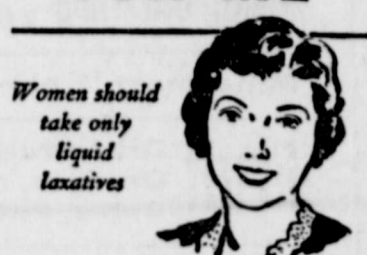

Preventing Sluggish Liver

WHEN an attack of gall stone colic occurs your physician will usually have no difficulty in recognizing it. It comes on suddenly, a most intense, agonizing pain in the right side of the body at the upper part of the abdomen or lower part of the chest (whichever you wish to call the spot). The pain often extends to right shoulder blade. There may be vomiting which relieves the pain to some extent. There may be a chill, increase in temperature, profuse sweating and collapse.

After the stone passes, pain disappears.

However, there are a great many who suffer with liver and gall bladder trouble in whom stones may have formed or be forming who might avoid gall stone colic by a little care in their diet.

Many of these patients think they have "stomach trouble" because many of the symptoms concern the stomach. There may be indigestion and stomach discomfort, inability to eat acid foods—meat, eggs, cereals, fatty foods—butter, cream, fat meat, and coarse vegetables. There is often a "burning" sensation in the stomach and gas comes up from the stomach. In fact, gas is almost a constant condition. Nausea and vomiting sometimes occur.

There is often a stabbing pain in the gall bladder—upper right hand side of abdomen, which may extend to right shoulder and shoulder blade as in gall stone colic.

When these "billoos" attacks occur it is wise to abstain from food for as long as 24 hours, using either calomel and Epsom salts, or Epsom salts alone. Often just a level teaspoonful of Epsom salts daily for a week or ten days, drains the bladder, removes liver congestion and gives the whole liver and gall bladder system a fresh start.

The two methods of preventing sluggish liver, biliousness, or the formation of gall stones is by exercise and diet.

The exercise consists in simply bending the body from side to side, keeping the knees straight—20 to 30 times each side, night and morning.

The diet consists of (a) eating certain foods—soup, fowl, fish, lamb, beef, ham, mutton, spinach, asparagus, celery, green peas, string beans, potatoes, raw fruits, stewed fruits, and (b) avoiding spices, shell fish, cheese, pastry, creams, rich desserts, stews, salmon, mackerel, pork and gravies.

Migraine—One-Sided Headache

I WRITE frequently about epilepsy because, though no cause has been found as yet, these attacks can now be controlled in many cases by cutting down on starch foods and liquids, and increasing the fat foods. When this is not sufficient the use of phenobarbital daily controls the great majority of cases.

Similarly while the cause of cancer is unknown, the removal or irritations of skin or mucous membranes, the use of radium and the X-ray, and also surgery will cure cancer if discovered early enough.

Another ailment that is very common but has defied research workers as to its cause is one-sided headache or migraine.

The cause of migraine in the opinion of many physicians including myself is that the body or mind gets very tired and certain processes of the body including those of the liver do not do their work properly, foods are not digested properly, and the blood carries substances which cause this painful head condition.

You can thus see that it is easily possible for good foods to cause the trouble. The patient may be eating the same foods regularly, but when he is overtired, certain of these foods, which cause no trouble when the patient is not tired, do cause trouble. If you will think of your friends or acquaintances who have migraine, you will notice that they are great "workers"; in some cases working hard all the time and in other cases taking "spurts" when they will work night and day for a certain period of time.

Dr. A. H. Rowe, Oakland, Calif., in the Journal of the American Medical Association says, "For some years past, food allergy—being sensitive to certain foods—has been stressed as a cause of migraine. In 130 private patients whose chief complaint was headache, good results, by leaving out of their diets these foods to which they were sensitive, occurred in 87 per cent of 100 patients who obeyed their instructions faithfully."

Now the foods that cause the trouble in one patient may not cause it in another, but by checking back on the foods eaten previous to the attack, the offending food or foods will usually be discovered.

Foods to Maintain Weight

The proportion of starch, fat, and protein food for the average individual should be four of starch to two of fat to one of protein.

OCEANS AND HILLS SLOW DOWN EARTH: DAYS LENGTHENING

French astro-physicists are completing a series of calculations which prove this world of ours is slowing down, like a wobbly top, as it spins around its polar axis.

The loss of speed is estimated by scientists at the Meudon observatory, near Paris, at one-tenth thousandth of a second a month at the present time, which means that in 1,000,000 years our 24-hour day will be lengthened to a 41-hour day.

This phenomenon is caused partly by the fact that the earth is losing the perfect streamlined curves of its early days and is becoming wrinkled with mountains and volcanoes which impede its whirling.

The main factor, however, is stated to be found in tidal movements. Working under the combined influence of sun and moon, oceans bulge out and act as brakes on the rotation of the earth. Another important cause is found in geological disturbances brought about by the shifting of internal masses. This flinging about of the world's contents, like so much loose baggage in a freight car, tends to detract from the constancy of the earth's spinning.

Calculations to date show this loss of speed increases progressively so that 100 years hence the earth's rotation will have suffered a loss of 18 seconds, and within two centuries, one minute and 12 seconds. In 2,000 years it will be one hour and 50 minutes behind its merry-go-round schedule. This lengthening of the day is explained by the longer time it would take for the earth to complete one single turn on its polar axis.

The majority of these calculations are based on the studies of tidal actions on planets and their satellites carried out by the astro-physicist, M. Antoniad, and his collaborators at the Meudon observatory.

This clocking of the speed of the globe's rotation is entirely apart from computations regarding the changes in time that it takes the earth to revolve around the sun every year.—Detroit News.

New Liquor Control Law

You are allowed in dry counties, to have in your possession up to a quart of State and Federal tax paid liquor, provided it is bought in a wet territory. You must get this liquor and sign up for it yourself. It must not be ordered, or brought to you by someone else.

It is a violation of the law in dry territories to have over a quart of tax paid liquor. It is also a violation to buy it or manufacture it in a dry territory, or to have any amount of bootleg or untaxed liquor in your possession at any time. This is both a State and Federal offense, and the penalty is for a misdemeanor in county court, not less than \$100 nor more than \$1000 fine, and up to one year in the county jail.

This law will be enforced in this county to the fullest extent, whenever it is violated.

The following article was clipped from the Quanah-Tribune Chief. The Joe Estes mentioned in the article is the father of Mrs. J. W. Neel.

Cliff Henry yesterday showed this writer an old metal saddle horn. It looked like it had been through a fire and was found near the grave of Joe Earl. Old timers will remember the story of this man who was killed in 1878 by Kiowas just east of town and his body burned. Cowboys from the R2 ranch buried the body the next day and started Quanah's cemetery.

Recently Walter Moore found an old cap and ball pistol near the place where the murder took place.

The Tribune-Chief man several years ago interviewed Fred Estes who with his brother, Joe, had been pursued by the Indians at the time, and recently discussed their adventure with his son, President Linton Estes, of the Empire Paper Co. of Wichita Falls.

Our paper had been instrumental in letting Earl's relatives in Georgia know what became of him, and S. A. Smith, the late Denver section foreman, one of them, still remembered the day when his uncle left home for California on horseback. He had fallen in with the Estes boys at Henrietta, and was riding a few hundred yards ahead of their wagon when the Indians came out of a ravine.

Earl made peace signs but Sunbow, the chief, enraged over the
