

Russians Open Decisive Battle

Russian shock troops were reported smashing in a direct frontal assault today against 100,000 Germans massed at Moshalsk, 57 miles west of Moscow, in what appeared to be one of the greatest and perhaps most decisive battles of the war.

Moshalsk is the keystone of the dwindling German defense corridor on the Napoleonic road from Moscow to Smolensk.

The British radio said a savage battle was raging at the gates of Moshalsk and that "one key position is said to have changed hands several times."

Other Red army forces, slowly closing a giant trap around Moshalsk, were officially reported to have recaptured the town of Medyn, 35 miles to the southwest. This meant that the Germans now had only a 70-mile-wide escape route from Moshalsk, with Soviet troops pressing down from Volokolamsk in the north and Medyn in the south.

Volokolamsk is 35 miles north of Moshalsk. A bulletin from Adolf Hitler's high command, tersely noting "defensive battles" on the Mos-

Seven Taken After Prison Break By 21

Bars Sawed In
Dormitory At
Eastman Farm

CROCKETT, Jan. 15 (AP)—Seven of 21 long-term criminals who escaped from Eastman prison farm last night were captured today, the state police department announced.

Search for the fugitives is being conducted by 35 state patrolmen and rangers with headquarters here. A radio station on wheels is directing the action.

Two prisoners were captured immediately after the break. They were C. R. Stout, 27, of Wichita Falls, serving a life term as an habitual criminal, and Ed Morris, 30, of Fort Worth, serving 12 years for burglary from Tarrant county.

Taken into custody today were: Joe Marvin Burleson, 33, of Lamesa, serving life for robbery from Lee county.

John Eugene Jurgenson, 34, of Dallas, serving 99 years from Dallas and Harris counties for robbery, robbery by assault and assault to rob.

Ford Marvin Laxon, 39, of Ballinger, serving life as an habitual criminal.

Jess Hill, 43, of Fort Worth, serving 12 years from Tarrant county for burglary and theft.

Charles Hillburn, 39, native of Ireland but claiming United States citizenship, given 25 years for robbery in Dallas county.

LeRoy Robbins, 31, of Baytown, given 25 years for murder from Gonzales county.

Elbert Mangum, 29, of Dallas, given 14 years from Dallas county for robbery and attempted robbery.

The men sawed through the bars of their dormitory in which 220 convicts were housed. How they obtained the saws and severed the bars without detection has not been determined.

Another Ship Attacked Off Long Island

NEW YORK, Jan. 15 (AP)—The coast guard station at Quogue, Long Island, said today that survivors of a ship attacked off the Long Island coast were being brought to shore.

Details of the attack were not immediately revealed. It was the second such attack in these waters in two days.

Welles, Argentine Minister Confer

RIO DE JANEIRO, Brazil, Jan. 15 (AP)—Undersecretary of State

Sumner Welles of the United States and Foreign Minister Enrique Ruiz Guinazu of Argentina conferred for 25 minutes today and success or failure of the Pan-American conference at hand may have been bound up in that meeting.

The two met in the Argentine's hotel room and, leaving the place separately, they withheld precise comment on their talk. Argentina has shown signs of holding out against any general Pan American breach of relations with the axis.

Welles left Ruiz Guinazu's hotel room smiling. He said he had had "a cordial and pleasant conversation with my old friend, the foreign minister of Argentina."

Welles and Ruiz Guinazu are the heads of their nation's delegations to the third consultative conference of foreign ministers of the Pan American republics. Their talk was in the nature of a preliminary consultation.

The formal opening was set for 5:30 p. m. (2:30 p. m. CST) with an address by President Getulio Vargas, of Brazil, in the Palacio Tiradentes, formerly Brazil's chamber of deputies.

The delegates were eagerly awaiting an address by Welles at the opening session. It was reported that Ruiz Guinazu also might speak.

The third meeting of Pan American foreign ministers since 1939 found ten of the 21 republics at war.

Looming large as obstacles to unanimous and effective action were Ecuador's surprise insistence on obtaining settlement of her 100-year-old boundary dispute with Peru before doing anything else and Argentina's announced refusal to enter into any military alliances or "acts of pro-belligerency."

The cautious-tongued Argentine foreign minister came to Rio de Janeiro with his nation not committed to any concrete proposals and a press conference last night he evaded a query whether his delegation was studying severance of relations with the axis nations.

However, there was a report current in pre-conference discussions that Argentina was showing some disposition toward severing relations with the axis—perhaps ending commercial relations, which already are almost paralyzed, without an actual termination of diplomatic relations.

After the formal opening ceremonies, the conference is scheduled to receive some three score resolutions, of which the most important deal with these three issues:

Army Of 3,600,000 Men Planned, Reports Stimson

WASHINGTON, Jan. 15 (AP)—

Secretary Stimson announced today the army had starting expanding to approximately 3,600,000 officers and men, more than doubling its present strength in ground and air forces.

Stimson said the increase, authorized by President Roosevelt, would be made this year, with the first three new divisions to be organized by March 25.

Looking to further increases of undesignated size next year, camp facilities are to be expanded in the meanwhile.

The expansion, announced at a press conference, calls for:

More than double the number of air combat units.

Creation of 23 motorized or triangular divisions, in addition to the 27 conventional ground troop divisions now in service, and doubling the number of armored units.

A proportionate increase in anti-aircraft, engineer, and similar special units.

Formation of 50 or more military police battalions to replace troops now guarding critical facilities in continental United States.

A large increase in the number

of men in training centers to provide replacement for all organized units and the personnel for "the additional units to be created in the spring of 1943."

As a part of the vast expansion, Stimson announced at the same time, 75,000 officers will be commissioned in special officer candidate schools this year and requirements for air force pilots, bombardiers and navigators had been lowered from 20 to 18 years. Married men now also may train as fliers, and intelligence tests have been substituted for educational requirements.

Stimson said the army increase called for a vast expansion also of housing and training facilities which he added, has already started.

The army now is building nine new camps to accommodate 30,000 men each, he said. All training centers are being expanded to accommodate an additional 200,000. In addition, five temporary tent camps are being set up.

"In this way we hope to be able to house all the men inducted and left in the continental United States by the time the last men are inducted," Stimson said.

Officer training for enlisted men in the army has been expanded since last July to give instruction to 90,000 candidates instead of the initial annual rate of 10,000.

For men possessing the necessary qualifications, the war department said induction as a private would be the first step toward an officer's commission as a second lieutenant. The army expects to commission approximately 75,000 men from its officer training school this year, as Stimson said.

Enlisted men are eligible for the three-months officer schools after four months in a replacement training center, or six months with a unit in the field, and leadership qualities are stressed above formal education.

Japanese Liner Sunk

Japanese Assert British Mining Causeways Leading To Singapore

Fighting On Luzon Island Is Continuing

Nipponese Armies
Drive Within 100
Miles Of Singapore

An official Tokyo broadcast asserted late today that British authorities at Singapore had begun to mine the causeway bridge connecting Singapore island to the mainland as Japan's invasion armies drove into the rain-whipped jungles of Johore state, 100 miles north of Singapore.

Domei, the Japanese news agency, said Emperor Hirohito's forces are now conducting a terrific offensive against 30,000 British troops which are guarding the last defenses of Malaya.

The news agency had previously declared that 30,000 British had been trapped in the green-hill wilderness north of Singapore.

Domei quoted "foreign reports" as saying that British forces defending the "Pownall line" stretching 125 miles across the extreme lower peninsula were rushing up reinforcements from Singapore "for a last desperate defense before falling back on Britain's Asiatic Gibraltar."

The U. S. war department reported that "aggressive enemy ground activity continues, with attempts at general infiltration all along the line" against Gen. Douglas MacArthur's heroic defenders on Luzon Island.

"Although greatly outnumbered, American and Philippine troops are holding well-prepared positions with courage and determination," the war department said.

Japan's invasion armies were pictured by Tokyo headquarters today as driving into the rain-lashed jungles of Johore state, less than 100 miles north of Singapore, while British and Dutch planes fought Japanese raiders in a fierce battle over Singapore itself.

Johore state is the last defense bulwark before Singapore.

A bulletin from Imperial Japanese army headquarters said Japanese troops advancing down the west coast of the Malay peninsula crossed the border into Johore state last night, capturing the strategic rail junction of Gemas.

All nine of the federated and unfederated Malay states have now been penetrated or overrun by Japanese troops, Domei said.

Japanese front-line dispatches asserted that British resistance had also been virtually crushed to the northeast border of Johore, 90 miles above Singapore.

Dispatches from Singapore said relays of Dutch and British fighters planes clashed with Japanese raiders in an extended battle over Britain's 400,000,000 island stronghold this morning.

The use of the word "relays" indicated two things:

1. That Japanese planes were now apparently smashing at Singapore in heavy force, preparing the way for a direct assault by land troops.

2. That allied short-range planes are still available to defend Singapore, despite the incessant hammering of its airports, and that aerial reinforcements may have arrived.

City's Cash Balance Down

A small decrease in the cash balance is noted in the city's financial statement as of the end of December, which marks the three-quarters period for the fiscal year.

With revenues of \$17,735 for the month against disbursements of \$18,314, including \$2,564 transferred to the interest and sinking fund, the net decline was \$777 for December, or \$36,053 in all.

The revenue figure included \$3,440 in current taxes and \$531 in delinquents. This pushed current collections to \$76,178 on the roll, or 70 per cent of it. Since the beginning of the fiscal year last April, delinquent payments have aggregated \$22,006.

Operating expenses and capital outlay for December amounted to \$15,264, less than the appropriations for the period by \$4,502 and boosting the under-run for the year to \$26,247. Expenditures for the nine-months period stand at \$156,253.

Interest and sinking fund payments amounted to \$5,226, a total of \$98,773 for the fiscal year, including \$54,500 in bonds and \$2,000 in warrants, the balance for interest and exchange. The \$200 transfer to the swimming pool and park fund for December was occasioned by operating expenses of \$276 against \$44 in revenues. The cemetery fund increased from \$1,508.02 to \$2,458, a net gain of \$950 due to receipt of deferred payments for cemetery lots and grave opening charges.

Water billed to consumers in December amounted to \$7,747, down by \$486 from the November figure and \$257 less than December of last year.

State Wins Chain Tax Judgment

AUSTIN, Jan. 15 (AP)—The state today won an \$8,167 chain store tax judgment against the Texas-New Mexico Oilfield company in district court here.

The amount represented an additional tax originally paid under protest upon demand by the comptroller and attorney general.

Car Tax Regulations Received

Regulations for payment of the car-use federal tax were received Thursday at the local postoffice, where stamps covering the \$2.09 charge will be issued.

Postmaster Nat Shick said he anticipated a stamp supply would be forthcoming in a few days and that as soon as it arrived, payment of the special tax would be in order.

The method of collecting the tax will be simple, he said. Car owners will be required to appear at the window, state the number of cars on which they are paying the tax.

They must lay down the cash (checks will not be accepted) at the rate of \$2.09 per machine. In turn, clerks will issue a stamp, which should be affixed to the instrument panel, windshield or other conspicuous place on the automobile to readily show that the machine is being operated legally.

In addition, they will receive a card directed to the collector of internal revenue (Dallas, Texas), in the case of local people) which is to be filled in after leaving the stamp window. This card calls for the date, the amount of tax paid (\$2.09) for the make of vehicle, body type, model year and engine number, and the signature and a complete address of the purchaser. A card and stamp will be issued for each automobile, according to

17,000-Ton Ship Hit By US Submarine

Craft Was Of Type
Convertible Into
Aircraft Carrier

WASHINGTON, Jan. 15 (AP)—The navy announced today that a 17,000-ton Japanese merchant liner had been sunk by an American submarine.

The vessel was of the fast Yawata class, owned and operated by the N.Y.K. line, and probably convertible into an aircraft carrier.

No other details of the sinking were supplied.

The navy also said in a communique:

"The menace of enemy submarines off the east coast of the United States remains substantial."

A navy spokesman said at least one vessel of the Yawata class of three ships, frequent visitors to west coast ports, had been converted into an aircraft carrier, but it was not known whether this was the one sent to the bottom.

The communique, untimed, read:

"Far East:

"A 17,000-ton Japanese merchant ship of the Yawata class has been sunk by an American submarine."

"There is nothing to report from other Pacific areas."

"Atlantic area:

"The menace of enemy submarines off the east coast of the United States remains substantial."

"There is nothing to report from other Atlantic areas."

Japs Promise Good Treatment For Prisoners

WASHINGTON, Jan. 15 (AP)—Japan has told the United States that all captured Americans would be accorded the good treatment specified in the international convention on prisoners of war.

Although Japan's delegates signed the convention adopted by 47 nations at Geneva in 1929 the pact was never ratified by the Japanese government. The pledge made through the Swiss government — was the first official information received concerning the treatment to be accorded American prisoners of war in the Far East.

Soon after Japan's attack on Pearl Harbor, Washington sent word through the Swiss government that the American government would live up to the prisoners pact and provide good treatment, food and prison camp quarters for all Japanese captured.

Marc Peter, former Swiss minister to Washington and now a delegate of the International Red Cross committee, said after conferring with Secretary Hull that Japan had established a prisoners-of-war information bureau in Tokyo.

A similar American bureau to handle all questions concerning prisoners-of-war has been established here under General Allen Gullion, provost marshal.

As soon as transportation facilities permit, the American Red Cross or the international office here will forward mail or food packages to Americans held prisoner in belligerent countries.

Daylight Saving Bill Is Passed

WASHINGTON, Jan. 15 (AP)—Congressional action was completed by the house today on legislation for universal daylight saving time which would advance all clocks one hour.

The measure will become effective 30 days after President Roosevelt signs it.

The legislation was passed by the house with little debate. The senate acted yesterday.

Tennis Assn. Looking For More Players

NEW YORK, Jan. 15 (AP)—Faced with the problem of carrying on through the war with what players the armed forces don't need, and the professionals don't want, the U. S. Lawn Tennis Association is about to take the game away from the stars and hand it over to the boys who still find the net too high.

The first step in adjusting the U. S. L. T. A. program to wartime requirements will be taken at the organization's annual meeting here Saturday, with President Holcombe Ward advocating a plan to "get people out of the grandstand and onto the courts."

Specifically, Ward will request the executive committee to cancel the national indoor tournament for men this year and let the outdoor champions, both singles and doubles, be decided in one tournament at Forest Hills instead of separately as in the past.

If Ward's plan is approved, the one national outdoor tournament for both men and women in singles and doubles will be held here Aug. 27 to Sept. 7. The plan does not involve the women's indoor meet.

"Most of the ranking players among the men probably will be in service by then," Ward said, "but there will be many young men under military age to fill their places, thanks to the association's junior development program."

In the future, Ward said, the U. S. L. T. A. will pay less attention to the first ten ranking players and more attention to the rank and file.

Gehring Left Off Active List, Could Have Coaching Job

DETROIT, Jan. 15 (AP)—The Detroit Tigers have retired Charley Gehring, slick fielding second baseman, by omitting him from their 1942 playing roster, but the door to his return to baseball is more than slightly ajar.

The Detroit management is endeavoring to interest the 35-year-old mechanical man infielder in a coaching job under Manager Del Baker who he conceivably could undergo the usual conditioning process and thus might be available for active duty in an emergency. But thus far the untalkative Gehring, pursuing his business as a manufacturer's agent, has been somewhat more than characteristically silent.

For the first time in 19 years the name of Gehring was missing from the Detroit squad list when it was announced yesterday. To fill the vacant base job, the Tigers nominated Jimmy Bloodworth, acquired by trade from Washington, and Lambert (Dutch) Meyer, former Texas Christian footballer purchased two years ago.

"Charley has the final word on whether he chooses to remain in baseball," declared General Manager Jack Zeller, "and the coaching job is open for him."

On the squad list the Tigers named seven infielders, nine outfielders, 15 pitchers and three catchers. For the shortstop post held mainly in 1941 by Frank Croucher, now with Washington, the club sighted a three-cornered battle involving Murray Franklin and Eric McVair, returning from the farm system, and Billy Hitchcock, purchased from the New York Yankees affiliate at Kansas City.

Rudy York at first base and Pinky Higgins at third are without apparent opposition for jobs, but Zeller said farm talent might be brought up if needed.

Only newcomer among the pitchers is little Roy Henshaw, acquired in the draft, while new outfielders are Roger (Doc) Cramer from Washington and Draffie Don Rosa, who came up previously to the Tigers as a third baseman.

Over Two Billion In Tax Note Sales
WASHINGTON, Jan. 15 (AP)—The treasury reports that prospective income and excess profits taxpayers have bought, since Aug. 1, \$2,511,385,975 worth of tax notes.

The notes are a special security which can be used to pay income or excess profits taxes. The treasury pays a small amount of interest on the notes, enabling the taxpayer to save an equivalent amount on his taxes by buying the notes ahead of tax payment time.

Range Cattle Go On Sale At Denver
DENVER, Jan. 15 (AP)—As 15,000 young range cattle went into the auction ring at the National Western Livestock show today, Denver stockyard officials predicted that buyers would shell out a million dollars for them before nightfall.

The cattle are feeders, sold by carloads of about 50 head, for shipment to the corn belt for fattening. Thousands of buyers are in town for the show from the Middle West and the entire nation, and sellers have sent almost twice as many animals to the sale this year than last to take advantage of good prices.

A million-dollar day would be the greatest in the National Western's history.

Fat cattle, sheep and hogs went for a total of \$50,000 yesterday—10 to 15 per cent more than last year—and predictions of a total 1942 sales volume of \$3,500,000 continued to abound.

For the first three days, 49,216 animals passed through the stockyards, and nearly 30,000 more are now in the pens.

Bungling, Selfishness Scored As Bars To War Output

Dollar-A-Year Men Assailed By Committee

WASHINGTON, Jan. 15 (AP)—The senate investigating committee charged today that American war production had been hampered seriously by months of official bungling, labor selfishness and management greed.

In a report covering its studies during last year the committee accused government agencies of slowing war output by a mesh of "bureaucratic red tape" and declared:

1. That after two years of frantic effort America has too few planes to allow adequate flying time for its pilots and that many of them are "mediocre."

2. That dollar-a-year men on loan from industry were actually lobbyists for their former employers and should be eliminated.

3. That the automobile industry had been allowed to continue civilian production virtually unchecked throughout 1941, with no real conversion to military production even attempted.

4. That a concerted effort should be made to use all the facilities of small manufacturers in defense production.

Expressing full confidence that the war could be won if proper remedial steps were taken, the committee asked a reorganization of the office of production management to do away with the "dollar-a-year" officials. This recommendation was already in type Tuesday when President Roosevelt announced reorganization of the war production system with Donald M. Nelson, former mail order executive at the helm.

"On the drawing boards we have many high-performing pursuit ships," the report said. "But in January 1942 very few will be produced which can be considered better than mediocre, and there will be no long-range pursuits, a type so vitally needed for our present operations."

The committee complained that 19 "favored manufacturers" of airplanes had received the bulk of orders and loans, with 60 other aircraft companies unable to get any substantial contracts.

In asking reorganization of the OPM, the committee said that "the practice of diffusing responsibility commonly referred to as the old army game" must not be tolerated. It said that as of Jan. 5 there were 255 dollar-a-year men working for the OPM, and 631 others employed without compensation.

Because they dealt "with matters involving the class of clients by whom they were formerly employed and by whom they naturally expect to be employed in the future," the report said, they could be termed lobbyists "in a very real sense."

"The committee believes that the government should not continue to accept the loan of dollar-a-year and w. o. c. (without compensation) men by companies with so large a stake in the defense program as to make them likely to use their position to the detriment of the government's interest."

In a separate section reporting evidence of lobbying for government contracts, the committee said that often contractors seek "to take unfair advantage of their government" by attempting to purchase influence which they fail to get, and added:

"The practice is difficult to expose and eliminate, because the businessmen who are duped by it have to admit that their avowed intent is to attempt what they thought was bribery of government procurement officers."

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Navy Needs Specialists In Many Trades

Men with almost any type of special skill may find opportunities of enlistment in new navy headquarters companies designed as construction units.

Possibly these would be used as demolition and special repair squads to follow in the wake of any attack on harbors, etc. Among the type of experienced hands needed by the navy for the headquarters unit are sail makers, boatmen, chainmen, chaffeur, cooks, draftsmen, gunners mate, hospital attendants, pharmacists, photographers, rodmen. Construction companies would need evacuator, firemen, crane helpers, laborers, launchmen, metal smiths, mechanics, millers, shovel operators, painters, pipemen, powermen, riggers, road machinery operators, crane and engine runners, telephone men, auto mechanics, copper smith, drivers, electricians, pile drivers, water tenders, welders, warf builders, etc. Full information can be had at the U. S. navy recruiting office in the postoffice building. Men would be enlisted as reserves, given training and then made subject to call. The navy also has received instructions to lower the age limit for enlistment for training as naval aviation cadet to 19 years. Two years of college are still required, however, a candidate now in his sophomore year may be enlisted and remain in school until the end of the current school year. Junior and seniors may enlist under this provision.

Tanker Torpedoed -- Battle Of Atlantic Brought To The Nation's Front Yard

NEW YORK, Jan. 15 (AP)—Disclosure that an enemy submarine had deliberately circled a Panamanian tanker just off Long Island, exploding two torpedoes in her port side and one in her starboard, was made today by navy officials in detailing the closest approach of actual warfare to the nation's east coast.

Rear Admiral Edward C. Kalbfus, commander of the Newport naval base, disclosed that the attack by an unidentified submarine on the tanker Norcross had resulted in the death of two men—reviving an earlier navy estimate. He said 38 officers and men had been rescued and were in "good shape."

The Norcross was still partially afloat today—her bow sticking almost vertically out of the water—and Admiral Kalbfus notified the navy department that the vessel constituted a menace to navigation.

The torpedoing occurred at 12:20 a. m. (CST) on Wednesday just 60 miles southeast of Montauk Point, Long Island, little more than 100 miles from New York Harbor.

NEW YORK, Jan. 15 (AP)—The torpedoing of a Panamanian tanker by an enemy submarine almost within sight of Long Island brought the battle of the Atlantic into the east coast's front yard today.

Striking early Wednesday morning just 60 miles southeast of Montauk Point, the submarine fired three torpedoes at close range, the Navy announced, and left the tanker Norcross lying helplessly awash.

Insurance by the third district naval headquarters of the list of survivors revealed that of the crew of 40 officers and men—all aliens—two men were unaccounted for and one was injured.

Navy officials in Washington said the survivors had been taken safely to New England ports and added that more than 24 hours after the torpedoing the ship was still partly afloat.

It was 12:20 a. m. (CST) yesterday when the submarine attacked the tanker, formerly under Norwegian registry, but her plight was not reported until late in the afternoon after a Navy patrol plane spotted her wallowing in the sea, her crew tossing about in lifeboats.

U. S. Naval vessels sped to the rescue and picked up six officers and 24 men, landing them at Newport, R. I., last night, while the fishing boat Malvina took Captain Harold Hansen, a Norwegian, and eight others in to New Bedford, Mass.

Rear Admiral E. C. Kalbfus, commandant of the Newport naval operating base, informed naval headquarters in Washington that only one crew member was seriously injured. Identity of the missing seaman was not disclosed.

Naval officials at Newport would not permit the survivors to talk of their experience, and placed them under medical care in naval custody pending action by immigration authorities.

The 9,577-ton tanker was built in Hamburg in 1939 and flew the Norwegian flag in plying between Liverpool, Key West and Trinidad before transferring to Panamanian registry. She was bound from Panama City for an undisclosed port when attacked.

The brasserie of enemy craft in venturing so close to the mainland was a striking reminder of similar tactics in the last World War, when U-boats sank more than a score of merchantmen in off-shore waters.

Maritime experts assumed that yesterday's raider was a U-boat, since there has been no publicly known instance of any Italian underwater activity north of the Spanish coast region.

They expressed belief the submarine was either of the 740-ton class or perhaps one of the few 1,000-tonners which Germany was listed as having in the latest official compilations.

They're Trying To Make Gary Cooper Look Like Big Leaguer

HOLLYWOOD, Jan. 15 (AP)—"Gary Cooper never could become a big leaguer, but we'll make him look like one for the camera—or break his arm."

It's Lefty O'Doul talking. Because Lefty knows a bit about baseball, Samuel Goldwyn is paying him a few thousand dollars to make a Lou Gehrig, II, out of his high priced acting star.

Cooper is supposed to emulate the late great Columbia Lou in a baseball thriller. He is a candidate for the best acting job of 1941. But he'd have trouble beating the bat boy out of his job on a bush league club. He never played the game. He's right-handed; Gehrig was a southpaw.

O'Doul found one ray of hope, however. Cooper swings an ax from the port side. The studio didn't explain why Cooper ever swung an ax.

Coop started tossing pebbles underhanded; then overhanded. As his arm loosened up, he progressed to some fair-sized rocks. That was before O'Doul was signed as

technical director and Cooper's personal coach.

"A ball player throws baseballs, not rocks," he decreed.

Lefty, now manager of San Francisco in the Pacific Coast circuit twice led the National league in batting and still can use his left arm better than most. But he called in Babe Herman, former Brooklyn Dodger who led the Coast loop in batting last season to show Gary how to throw. Babe threw slowly—as slowly as he could. That wasn't much help.

"I can't even see how he does it, let alone do it," moaned Cooper. What he couldn't see was the wrist action. So the studio made a reel of Herman batting and fielding—in slow motion. Cooper studies it nights.

More Cash For Uncle Sam—

Texans Start Digging Up Income Tax

By BRACE CURRY

Mr. and Mrs. Texas begin digging into cash-laden pockets this week for their annual income tax accounting with Uncle Sam.

As the old year gives to most potential war costs of 150 billions of dollars, 200,000 Texans for the first time prepare to file income tax returns.

Increased income from 1941 and lowered exemptions will double the number in Texas filing returns this year, Internal revenue officials estimate.

From this new tax bracket, millions of dollars pocketed by Texans in 1941 will pour into Uncle Sam's war pockets to help produce the unprecedented war armadas called for by President Roosevelt.

In 1942 the heaviest taxes in

American history—double those for the first World War era—will draw increasingly big handfuls of cash from the public's pocketbook. Uncle Sam will take the equivalent of 20¢ or more in taxes from every man, woman and child in the country.

Income tax forms went into the mails Jan. 5—the first official notice to thousands of Texans that they will be required to make returns on income for 1941. In the nation, 2,350,000 will make their first reports before the deadline March 15.

Those who filed last year and who had gross incomes of \$3,000 or less will be sent two forms, 1040 and 1040-A. The 1040 form is the one on which all deductions and other data are carefully detailed, just as usual.

The 1040-A is the optional form, under which a citizen may list his income and his dependent exemptions and pay a stated amount, without going into detail. These amounts are figured on a basis of deductions amounting to six per cent of total income.

In passing the \$3,500,000,000 defense tax bill last year, Congress provided for the simplified form. A graduated table shows the amount of tax owed.

Lowering the exemptions granted both single and married persons and an increase in income of individuals in the lower brackets are responsible for the anticipated large gain in the number of taxpayers, says S. L. Mayo, assistant collector of internal revenue at Dallas.

Truck Crops In
Texas On Par
With Last Year

AUSTIN, Jan. 14. (AP)—Harvesting of fall truck crops in Texas this season is practically over, the U. S. agricultural marketing service reported today, and production about equals that of the previous season.

The service said increasing volume of produce would come from the winter and early spring producing areas where prospective production is above that of last season.

Important production increases over last year seem likely for snap beans, cabbage, celery, lettuce, shallots and spinach.

Best production in Texas is indicated to be 994,000 bushels, compared with the 1941 crop of 1,014,000 bushels and the 10-year (1931-40) average production of 943,000 bushels. Growing conditions the last half of December were favorable in all areas. Shipments should show a material increase in January.

All areas of Texas have good quality cabbage in prospect. Shipments are beginning to show an increase and should continue active for the next three months. The Florida crop is in very good condition. Harvest has started and will show a gradual increase. In Arizona carlot shipments from Phoenix are expected to decline during the next two weeks but they should increase at Yuma.

Carrot production in the early

states, Arizona and Texas, is indicated to be 2,319,000 bushels, which is about the same as the 1941 crop of 2,326,000 bushels and compares with the 1931-40 average production of 1,962,000 bushels. A number of fields in Arizona were harvested prematurely due to favorable prices, but the stock moving at the present time is more uniform in size and is of good quality. Early plantings in Texas got a poor start and considerable acreage has to be replanted. Crops are now making good progress but the weather the latter part of December was unfavorable for harvesting.

Fresh Vegetables Contain Many
Needed Vitamins And Should Be
Cooked Carefully To Be Good

Fresh vegetables are again listed as "blue" stamp foods on the Surplus Marketing Administration's January food list. Cauliflower, cabbage, carrots, okra, peas, tomatoes, squash and other fresh vegetables all high in vitamin content, and can be purchased with blue stamps by clients of the Food Stamp program.

However, everyone is being urged to eat more fresh vegetables because of their high vitamin content and their supply of calcium and iron. It is all part of the national educational campaign to improve America's health defense. Ralph Linck, chairman of the Howard county food industry committee, speaking of the local campaign said, "Our local homemakers are doing their share in this important campaign. All of us are asking what can we do? Well, for one thing, housewives can prepare and serve health-building, nourishing meals to their families

every day—thereby helping their families to be strong healthy Americans. I think the following food facts about vegetables taken from a publication issued by the bureau of home economics, U. S. D. A., will reveal some interesting facts regarding vegetables."

"Carrots, according to nutritionists, are an excellent source of vitamin A. The coloring matter in carrots is a yellow pigment known as carotene. The body changes this carotene into vitamin A. Carrots are also a good source of vitamin G and of calcium.

"It's easy to cook carrots, because the orange color stays bright without any special care on your part. And the vitamin A value remains intact at all ordinary cooking temperatures. But to save the calcium—use as little water as possible, and serve this liquid with the cooked carrots.

"Cooking carrots takes only 10 to 15 minutes. That is—sliced carrots cooked in water. If you have tiny young carrots, you may want to boil them whole. That takes about five minutes longer.

Peas are a good source of food value and include protein, calories, vitamins, A, B1 and C. Peas are also a good source of phosphorus and iron. Peas should be cooked in just enough water to keep them from scorching. Cook them long enough to make them tender but don't drain off the cooking water in order to retain valuable minerals and vitamins. Leave the cover off the pan and they'll stay green. Here, again, as with all green vegetables, soda destroys the food value. Have the water boiling when you put the peas in—but after that, keep it at the simmering point.

Americans eat more vegetable than any other vegetable except potatoes and it contains A, B1 and G vitamins. Green cabbage is also a good source of calcium and iron. Short cooking of cabbage saves the delicate flavor and crisp texture. Shredded cabbage cooked in milk is a good way to get a lot of food values into a single dish. To the cabbage and milk, add some melted fat and salt for flavor and a little flour for thickening. You'll have to stir the cabbage constantly but it is only cooked for five minutes.

'Target For Tonight' A Message For Today

Called the best documentary film to come out of the war, "Target For Tonight" is one of the features on a twin-bill playing today through Saturday at the Ritz theatre. High praise for the picture has come from John Rosenfield, drama editor of the Dallas News, who wrote as follows:

As things are now going, you can add the United States 180,000,000 to the "so many" who still owe so much to so few, meaning the RAF. What the RAF has been doing since Dunkirk, and still is doing, is shown in Target For Tonight, a Crown Film project released in this country by Warner Brothers. By long odds Target For Tonight is the best documentary film to come out of the war.

Target For Tonight was produced with co-operation of the RAF and it takes any spectator, including you and me, on an actual raid of a German objective. All that happens before and after the raid, the hearts and minds of, not actors, but fliers who make up the raid are shown by camera craftsmen who know their theater as well as their photography. You can accept Target For Tonight as the real thing and the nearest you will come to dropping a bomb for freedom unless you can manage to be one of the boys who drop a bomb for freedom.

A reconnaissance plane equipped with aerial camera returns to its British base with a tell-tale lead of film. The apparently innocent town of Freilhausen is revealed as an important oil dump. Sectors of the panorama are blown up. The photographs are compared with maps and with other data in the British files, which aren't incomplete by a darn sight.

Now for the Attack
The raid is ordered. The air squadron is assembled in its subterranean, bombproof class room. The object of the attack is explained. Maps are displayed and charts are drawn on the blackboard. There is the merest sort of pep talk. The boys go to the locker room to make ready with their uniforms, warm overcoats, earphones and other impediments of scientific service.

Ground crews make the planes ready. Night comes and it is time for the take-off. The locker room empties. Its desolate walls echo the light-spirited rigging of the youngsters who have now gone to their desperate game.

The departure itself is thrilling. The wing commander enters a trailer midfield. From the center of its top rises a glass dome to encase the head of the officer. He gives orders through radio microphone and wears earphones to hear the replies.

The Wellingtons all have names for the flight, F for Freddie, C for Charlie and similarly. Repetition of the names and initials is a science. All orders are issued twice, all names sounded twice, for the ear is less reliable to the eye—a fact that keeps newspapers

the return of F for Freddie and goes to bed.

An Amateur Cast

This is a picture without heroes but with such heroism as few movie script writers could invent. The cast is authentic even to Sir Richard Peirse, commander in chief of the RAF. Blond, curly-haired wing commander is one Speedy Powell who led the first flight over the Alps to bomb Venice. The amusing Scottish navigator is Sergeant MacPherson, as he is called in the picture. Mac is the RAF's most famous noncom.

Many communities saw Target For Tonight before the United States became a belligerent. To them the picture was just a selling of the RAF.

Now that we are in the war, Target For Tonight has a message. This war is a struggle of deep organization. Every raid and sortie has the structure of a big business enterprise controlled by managers with charts. A slight skirmish must have the co-ordinated management of a national sales campaign.

Managers are human and they do blanch when salesmen are dispatched on missions of death in which they may be the casualties. But they play their trade in routine calm and gulp down their emotions.

If you want to know what war in 1942 is like, see Target For Tonight.

Enemy Aliens Instructed In Wartime Rules

Instructions regarding treatment of enemy aliens have been received by local peace officers, and the Big Spring police department is ready to place under safeguard cameras, firearms, and radio transmitters or receivers held by enemy aliens.

The department of justice has asked local police to collect from enemy aliens all radio transmitters, short wave radio receiving sets, firearms and cameras. Exception is made in the case of cameras which are fixed parts of studios and cannot be readily moved.

The police are instructed to place these items under safeguard and issue the alien a receipt for them. Assumption is that they would be returned at the close of hostilities.

Aliens are expected to go voluntarily to the police station to surrender these items.

Short wave radio receivers are interpreted to mean those which can receive broadcasts of under 160 kilocycles or over 1750 kilocycles.

Travel other than from his home to work and within the community in which he lives is forbidden for enemy aliens unless they have filed a written statement with the United States attorney.

Enemy aliens include Japanese, Germans and Italians.

Lindbergh To Help US As A Technical Man

WASHINGTON, Jan. 15. (AP) — Charles A. Lindbergh will not return to active duty with the army air corps, Secretary of War Henry L. Stimson said today, but for the present will engage in technical research on a commercial project in which the war department is directly interested.

The secretary told his press conference that Lindbergh, formerly an air corps reserve colonel, called on him last Monday to ask whether he could be of any use to the government or the war department.

"I told him," Stimson said, "that we were always glad to receive information, help or advice from anyone who thought he could be of service, and I asked him what he thought he could do most usefully."

"He replied that he thought for the present he could be most useful in the line of technical experimentation."

The next day, Stimson said, Lindbergh conferred with Lieut. General H. H. Arnold, chief of the army air force, and Robert A. Lovett, assistant secretary of war for air.

"All that I can say now," Stimson concluded, "is that he decided, with our approval, to devote his time for the present to a technical commercial project in which this department is directly interested. I think that covers all that can be said at this time."

Popcorn Balls Are Nourishing And Fun To Make

Big, crunchy pop corn balls are a delicious, nourishing confection for your children. They are fun to make, too—and so easy and inexpensive.

The recipe given here is the pick of the many tried and tested by America's largest pop corn producers. It makes about two dozen medium sized balls.

POP CORN BALLS

5 quarts popped corn (salted)
1 2-8 tablespoonfuls butter
6 cupfuls sugar
1 cupful corn syrup
1 cupful water

Put sugar, syrup and water in to a saucepan and cook, stirring until the sugar is dissolved. Continue cooking, without stirring, until syrup reaches 243 degrees F., or a soft ball when tried in cold water. Add the butter and stir only enough to mix it through the syrup. Have the corn in a large bowl so there will be room enough for mixing. Pour the cooked syrup slowly over the salted popped corn and mix well. Shape into balls with the hands, using only enough pressure to make the balls stick together. Make about two dozen medium-sized balls.

The War Today --

Spring Due To Bring U-Boat Campaign

By DEWITT MACKENZIE

The sinking of a Panamanian tanker in our own home waters off the Long Island coast, presumably by an Axis submarine, looks mighty like the harbinger of the all-out U-boat campaign which Herr Hitler is likely to inaugurate when the good weather arrives—and that's not so far away.

It's hardly likely the fushier would undertake a major offensive at this time of year, although the sinking follows the torpedoing of a big steamer off Nova Scotia Tuesday with heavy loss of life. The Atlantic kicks up too much fuss in winter to permit of concerted submarine activity.

However, come the spring and the Allies must be prepared to see the Nazis cut loose with a heavy drive against shipping, not only with submarines but with bombers and torpedo planes.

We mustn't forget how vital

important the outcome of the battle of the Atlantic is both to the Allies and the Axis. The stream of supplies which is pouring from this country is what Hitler has to fear most, next to his present inability to replenish his own resources.

And this threat is no mean one. We can't just look down our noses and rely on the fact that the Kaiser's submarine campaign in the World War failed. It failed after the United States got into the conflict and provided warships with which to counter the menace, but the Germans missed winning the war with their U-boats by a nose.

Then we must note that things have changed since the World War. The air has provided a new

and frightful menace not only to merchant shipping but to warships. It is my personal thought that Hitler is likely to cut loose against the British navy and our naval ships in European waters in an effort to shatter the allied protection of the Atlantic and the Mediterranean. The Axis offensive which seems to be boiling up in the Mediterranean now may easily be part and parcel of this strategy.

There is no way of estimating accurately what power Hitler can unleash in submarine warfare. Supposedly he has a "big fleet," and guesses have placed the total at 600 and more. Whatever the number may be, we do know that he has weakened his Atlantic force by sending submarines to the Mediterranean and the Black Sea, those being

small U-boats which could be shipped overland and thus avoid passing through the Strait of Gibraltar and running the British naval gauntlet. However, it would be unsafe to assume that his pack of sea-wolves isn't formidable on the Atlantic side.

The brunt of the attack presumably will be borne by shipping either approaching or leaving the British Isles, but there can be no doubt that U-boats will be haunting the steamship lanes far to the west and our own coastline. It's no trick for the big, long-distance submarines to cross the Atlantic these days and make the return voyage.

Even the smaller submarines take on roving commissions, depending on cargo ships or isolated bases for refueling. These cargo boats may be German, or owned by friendly nations, or the property of those rats who always are ready to engage in any sort of traffic for money.

It is because of this threat of a great Nazi offensive against shipping that the allies are hoping to persuade Elise at long last to grant the use of naval bases on the west coast of Ireland. The need of these may be dire in the spring.

Texans Favor Health Insurance, Poll Of Public Opinion Shows

Texas Surveys of Public Opinion

AUSTIN, Jan. 12.—First the defense program and now the war effort have forced attention on the problem of improving the health of the nation. More frequent use of medical services and hospitalization have been pointed out as important prerequisites of a higher physical standard.

Advocates of health insurance believe their plans, if widely used, would bring about better conditions, especially among the people of lower incomes who

have the hardest time paying physicians' bills. Texas public opinion, by a good majority, already approves of voluntary health insurance, whereby an individual insures for himself and his family medical or hospital care by making regular payments to a health fund.

Only slightly more than a third of the adult population definitely opposes such a plan, Texas Surveys of Public Opinion discovers in a statistical study of the entire state in which a representative sample was interviewed in homes, offices, farms, and workshops.

Even more people than would subscribe to a health program are convinced that their financial inability to make wider use of medical facilities is impairing the well-being of their families.

These were the questions used in the survey, and the answers received, converted into percentages: "Which would you rather do, pay a monthly or yearly fee that would take care of all medical and hospital bills, or pay bills each time sickness arises?"

Pay regular fee 87%
Pay bills each time 37%
Undecided 6%
"Do you believe the health of your family would be better if you had more money to go see a doctor every time it was necessary?"

Would be better 65%
Would not be better 31%
Undecided 4%

Advice To Gunmen: Don't Kill Pigeons

AUSTIN, Jan. 15 (UP)—Tip to sportsmen: Don't shoot pigeons.

In Texas it's illegal to kill, maim or molest a carrier pigeon. And lots of carrier pigeons are serving in the army signal corps.

That brings up the question of how to differentiate between carrier and ordinary pigeons.

The state game department will tell you but it adds:

Leave all pigeons alone.

The carrier bird closely resembles the domestic pigeon you see every day. The coloration varies, just as in the domestic bird. No help there.

But the carrier is somewhat smaller than the domestic variety and more streamlined—built, say, like a mourning dove. However, the carriers are larger than mourning doves.

Prison Provisions for Escape

COLLEGE STATION, Jan. 15 (UP)—The total cotton acreage allotment for Texas in 1942 will be 9,864,569 acres as compared with 9,880,197 acres in 1941, George Slaughter, chairman of the Texas AAA committee, announced.

These figures include various additions to the basic allotment of 9,730,973 acres, the AAA official said, as provided for in the AAA program.

Increased yields, a smaller national allotment, and a decrease in the number of farms growing cotton were responsible for the 15,228 acre cut in acreage, Slaughter, himself a cotton farmer, explained.

Already plans are shaping up for the Third R-Day, George White, chairman of the Howard county Selective Service Board disclosed Tuesday.

He appealed for volunteer workers to contact the selective service office (telephone No. 875) and leave their name, address and telephone number if they could help on Feb. 16, the appointed day.

Like in two former registration days, the service necessarily will have to be gratis, and those volunteering will be required to sign the federal waiver of pay.

How many places of registration will be set up is yet undecided, said White, but he anticipated that there would be an effort to centralize it so far as possible. There may be places at the Third R-Day, George White, Vincent and Coahoma, possibly one at the Kate Morrison school in the Latin-American quarter, and the others in the courthouse.

As a service to transients, said the chairman, booths may be set up at the bus station around time for buses to arrive and depart.

It was anticipated that the total would be about 60 per cent of the total in the previous registrations, or about 1,200 to 1,300 men.

Those who have attained their 20th birthday on or before Dec. 31, 1941 or those who have not attained their 45th birthday on Feb. 16, 1942, and who have not been registered before, are to be registered.

Here Are Some Quick And Easy To Prepare Dishes For The Busier Than Ever Housewife

Everybody's stepping along a bit faster these exciting days and that includes housewives. There are so many new duties and civic as well as home problems added to their routine, that short cuts and energy savers are the order of the housewife's day.

The emergency shelf, formerly maintained to answer the question of unexpected guests, is the solution to how to save from meal preparations the time required for other duties. Foods moderate in cost but high in health-giving properties and family appeal should be purchased carefully to fill this shelf.

CANNED SOUP takes the lead in BRUNSWICK BEAN STEW: Simmer 10 minutes, 1 cup cooked lima beans, 3 tablespoons each chopped celery, onions and green pepper, 2 cups cream of pea soup, 1-3 teaspoon salt and 1-4 teaspoon pepper.

CORN BEEF HASH goes high hat when made like this: Unmold a can of hash, shape into cakes an inch thick and 2 inches across. Brown quickly on both sides in fat. Make little hollows with back of spoon on each cake. Fill with eggs carefully broken into a saucer. Lid and cook slowly until firm forms over eggs. Remove to heated platter and surround with

Cheese Potato Puffs
4 potatoes (baked or boiled)
3 tablespoons hot milk
1-3 teaspoon salt
1-3 teaspoon paprika
6 to 8 inch cheese cubes
1 cup rolled ready-to-serve cereal flakes
3 tablespoons butter, melted
Mash potatoes, add milk and seasonings. Shape portions for 6 or 8 around cheese and roll in flakes. Flatten and brush with butter. Bake 20 minutes on greased baking sheet in moderate oven (300).

creamed peas, green beans or cream of mushrooms soup, heated.

PORK CHOPS are savory when blended with canned spaghetti. Heat frying pan, add 4 or 5 pork chops and brown quickly on both sides. Cover with 2 cups canned spaghetti and tomato sauce, 1-3 teaspoon salt, 1-4 teaspoon paprika, 1-4 cup water. Simmer 15 minutes.

Have you ever served VEGE-TABLE PANCAKES as the main part of the meal? Mix 3 cups flour, 3 teaspoons baking powder, 1-2 teaspoon salt, 1-4 teaspoon pepper, 1 cup drained canned corn. Add 2 beaten eggs, 1-2 cups milk (or liquid drained from canned corn). Bake on hot griddle and sprinkle with sliced cheese and chili sauce.

If you prefer a pancake mix, clam cakes are unusual and filling. Mix 2 cups prepared pancake flour, a teaspoon baking powder, 1-3 teaspoon salt, 2-3 cup chopped celery, onions and green pepper, 1 teaspoon minced parsley, 1-4 teaspoon celery salt, 1 beaten egg and 1-2 cups milk. Beat until smooth and cook large-sized pancakes on hot griddle. Lightly spread with catsup and stack in three. Serve in wedge shaped pieces.

DEVILED OYSTERS are a winter treat made in a jiffy: Simmer 4 minutes 2 tablespoons each chopped green pepper, celery and onion in 4 tablespoons chopped bacon. Add 1 cup chopped oysters and cook 2 minutes; blend in 3 tablespoons flour, 1-4 teaspoon salt, 1-8 teaspoon white pepper, 1 cup tomatoes, 1-2 cup water. Simmer until creamy. Stir constantly. Four over hot buttered toast, crackers, noodles or rice. Or pour oyster mixture into buttered baking dish, cover buttered crumbs and bake 20 minutes in moderate oven.

To change the flavor of HOME-SPUN BAKED BEANS try this: Simmer 2 minutes 2 tablespoons each celery and onions in 4 tablespoons bacon fat or chopped salt pork. Add 1-2 cup chopped cooked ham and 3 cups canned baked beans. Pour in 1-4 cup chili sauce and simmer 10 minutes.

I hope you have time to whisk up these BRAN GEMS to go along with the bean dish: To make 12 1-2 cups flour, 1 teaspoon each of soda and baking powder, 1-3 teaspoon salt, 2 tablespoons molasses, 1-4 cup sugar, 1 beaten egg, 1 cup bran, 1-4 cups buttermilk and 3 tablespoons fat, melted. Mix just enough to hold ingredients together. Half-fill greased muffin pans and bake 20 minutes in a moderate oven. Serve hot or cold. Raisins and figs may be added to the batter.

When you keep your larder equipped with jars of cheeses, packages of pasta and whole wheat wafers and what fresh fruit your markets offer (apples, grapes and pears are fine), your dessert problems are over. Many folk are getting the cheese-cracker-fruit habit to sign off their meals.

Modern Housewives Are Watching That Grocery Bill Now

The average housewife may not know by percentages how the cost of living has gone up and she may not know, statistically speaking, how much less her dollar buys now. But she can tell you with positive proof that the price of food, clothing, and supplies is higher now than this time last year.

Where her dollar used to fill a basket, she can carry a dollar's purchase home in her hands these days. She doesn't have to be a mathematician to figure this out.

To solve her problem, the modern housewife is buying more shrewdly than she ever has before. Where she used to phone for a dozen eggs, so many pounds of meat and certain vegetables and never notice the bill until the end of the month, she's hoofing it to the grocery nowadays, to save the dime delivery charge, and shopping carefully for her food.

In place of buying a pound of this and that, the lady of the house is buying in larger quantities because it is cheaper. Where she used to call the grocery for a jar of jam, a can of peaches, or a jar of relish, Mrs. Housewife is going to the pantry where row on row of shiny jars testifies to her preparedness. All these vegetables and fruits that she canned this summer—because so many of her friends were canning—are coming in mighty handy to fill out the family bill of fare.

The leftover roast that sometimes was left to spoil, appears on the table in a variety of ways now, or maybe ends up in Junior's Sunday lunch. The multiple egg cake that was the family favorite has temporarily gone by the board for bread pudding, rice pudding, and fruit desserts.

So far the family hasn't noticed much change in the menu but the cook in the house is pouring over economy menus to make that dollar stretch even farther.
