(Q) From which direction is a motorist supposed to pull into City National Bank's drive-in window?

Commissioners grant JP raises

The Mitchell County Commissioners' Court "went into overtime" when they held their regular meeting beginning at 1 p.m. Monday, February 14. At 4:45 p.m. they adjourned until 9 a.m. Tuesday morning and completed their business then.

there were requests for salary raises from two Justices of the Peace that caused quite a bit of discussion. The Justice of the Peace for Precinct Four, Joan Merket, met with the Commissioners first, explaining that she felt the duties and responsibilities of her office were worth more than the \$457 monthly

she was receiving. After the Commissioners voted unanimously to give travel expenses of 20 cents per mile to both Mrs. Merket and to the Justice of the Peace of Precinct Two, Precinct Four Commissioner Bill Preston made a motion to increase Mrs. Merket's salary by \$150 per month and Precinct One Com-

missioner Paul Logsden seconded the motion. Another discussion followed in which Precinct Three Commissioner Paul Hunter noted that he felt that the raise would "put you out of proportion" with the Precinct One Justice. Logsden said, "If an office is worth having, its worth having a capable person in it."

During the discussion, Precinct Two Commissioner Johnny Shackelford reminded Mrs. Merket that that was the salary she had agreed on when she first took the office. Mrs. Merket replied that the office required much more work now than it had previously. When it came to a vote, Preston and Log-

den voted to raise her salary while Hunter and Shackelford voted against it, forcing County Judge Bill Carter to cast the tie-breaking vote and he voted in favor of the raise. Charles Watlington, Justice of the Peace for Precinct One, also requested a raise during the meeting, stating See C-COURT, Page 2

the amount charged would be averaged out over a year's time with the final month's bill being slightly higher or lower to reflect the actual amount of water used.

During the meeting of the Loraine City Council Tuesday, February 15, the council members discussed the possibility of averaging individual water bills over a 12-month period so that residents would not have unusually high water bills in some months. Mayor Royce Beights sketched the proposition out to the Council, explaining that each water meter would be read twice a year and then

In order to get the benefit of the opinion of Loraine residents concerning this new method, the council members voted to put the proposition on the April 2 ballot. More information on water bill averaging will be forthcoming in plenty of time before the election for Loraine citizens to be considering it, according to Beights. Another new wrinkle being added to the April 2 election is the fact that the school board election will be held at the same time and in the same place—the Lions Club building.

Witnesses sought in burglary

Loraine, Westbrook slated to lose Greyhound service

Loraine and Westbrook are among the 58 Texas cities that Greyhound Lines, Inc. told the Railroad Commission they intend to cancel bus service to. After receiving testimony from Greyhound officials, state legislators and members of the public on this matter in a hearing on February 10, examiners from the Commission's Transportation Division recessed the hearing and indicated additional hearing would be considered in several of the affected cities. Hearing examiner Renee McCright is encouraging affected communities to request a local hearing so that all affected passengers, shippers and receivers will have a chance to give information to the Commission. Under the provisions of the federal Bus Regulatory Reform Act of 1982, interstate bus com-

panies must apply to the Railroad Commission when canceling bus service in the state. However, the act seriously limits Commission authority to block such moves. McCright explained the situation this was in a statement at the opening of the hearing: "Under the new federal legislation, it is presumed that any schedule which fails to cover its expenses is a burden on interstate commerce, creating the possibility that the Interstate Commerce Commission will override any Railroad Commission order seeking to preserve service on schedules where the bus company's revenues do not cover its variable expenses." Transportation Division officials also indicated they are considering other actions to recommend to the commissioners in connec-

tion with the Greyhound application, including cancelling Greyhound's statewide package de-

livery authority and encouraging Texas intrastate bus companies to See BUS, Page 2

Two positions open on Loraine ISD board

The Board of Trustees for the Loraine Independent School District, at the regular scheduled meeting Monday night, called for a school trustee election to be held on Saturday, April 2, 1983 for the purpose of filling two expiring terms on the school board. Board members also agreed to hold the election in conjunction with the city election, allowing voters to cast their votes at one polling place. The Lions Club building will be used as the polling place. Candidates interested in running for terms on the school board must file "Application for place on ballot" in the superintendent's office at the school before March 2, 1983.

Board members also hired an Arlington law firm to collect delinquent taxes.

Discussion arises at P&Z meeting

Mike Smith and Bo Merket met with the Colorado City Planning and Zoning Board on Monday, February 14 with opposing views on the zoning of a block of land located between 8th and 9th Streets and Rusk and Sheppard Streets. Smith was requesting that the zoning for that area be changed from single family dwelling to two family dwelling and Merket was representing a group that opposed the change. Merket presented the Board with a petition signed by seven of the 10 property owners who live with 200 feet of the area for which the zone change was requested. According to Merket, the group that a zone change would devalue their property. As a result of the meeting, the Board will recommend that the City Council not change the zoning, which means that the city could not make the zone change without a 3/4 vote.

Also board members expressed concern over the football program. Lack of participation in the sport this past year has officials worried about the future of football at Loraine High School. A decision to drop the football program will be made at a later date.

that the Precinct One office did 83 percent of the business in the county, adding "The office in the courthouse always carries the biggest load." Although Shackelford noted that Watlington agreed to take the job at

the stated salary, when Hunter made the motion to raise his salary to what the previous Precinct One Justice received, Logsdon seconded the motion and it passed unanimously. Watlington's salary will now be \$13,600 per year plus \$75 per month travel expenses.

A request was also received by the Commissioners for a raise for Geneva Blackard, a clerk at the Mitchell County Library. The motion was passed.

Another decision the Commissioners had to make concerned a county depository for the next two years. Both City National Bank and First State Bank submitted bids to be the depository for county funds.

Both bids were very similar, but City National Bank was awarded the bid because of the difference in the amount of interest paid on money market checking accounts.

The Commissioners also opened the only bid received for two trucks for Precinct Four. The bid of \$26,767.80 for two 1983 Ford F-700 trucks was from Hutchins Ford. It was noted that no bids were sought for the two dump beds needed because delivery time on them was much less than for the trucks and they needed to have the trucks to know exactly what size beds were needed.

Other matters considered by the Commissioners included:

-A report from Sheriff Wendell Bryant stat-

ing that the county was receiving \$3 per day for housing a prisoner of the city, while it actually cost \$27 per day. The Commissioners decided to contact representatives of the City of Colorado City and the City of Loraine to discuss the problem.

-A request from Watlington for a new chair for his office, as the old one is very delapidated. The Commissioners approved the purchase of a chair from Britton's Furniture at a cost of \$177.98.

-James Burson, Highway Patrol officer, requested permission to buy one radar unit because the ones they have now are four years old, with one year of double usage and the electronics are getting weak. He was given permission to buy the unit from Decatur Electronic of Decatur, IL at a net cost of \$2,895.

-Since two county employees are not eligible for a new life insurance plan the county will be adopting as of March 1, approval was given for alternate life insurance. The new plan calls for the beneficiaries of county employees to receive one full year's pay in the case of death. The policy for the two who are ineligible, one because of age and the other because of disability, will receive \$2,000 and \$1,000 policies respectively.

-Approved a maintenance contract with L. H. Office Center in Big Spring for the office machines used in county offices.

-Gave permission for County Clerk Joan Beach to have as many of the record books repaired and bound as she could with the amount budgeted for this purpose, which is \$3,000.

-Tom Lovell of Lovell-Carr Insurance spoke to the Commissioners about increasing the amount of insurance on the contents of the jail. The Commissioners told him to increase the amount of coverage to \$32,000.

-Carter reported that

Tax Assessor-Collector Clarence C. Burt had notified him that the amount of taxes that had been paid as of February 2 was \$1,882,237.07, including the half payments and that this figure is 82 percent of total he expected to receive. When the other half of the half payments are made, the total will be \$2,196,774, which is 95 percent of the taxes levied. These amounts are taxes collected for both the county and the hospital district.

-Carter also told the Commissioners that Valero had tendered the part of their taxes which were not in dispute (\$2,996.40) as required by the tax code and asked the group whether or not they wanted to accept it, explaining that acceptance of the check would not prejudice a suit involving the

taxes. Although Shackelford expressed some hesitation in accepting the check, the Commissioners voted unanimously to accept it.

-Bonds were approved for Jerry Dossey, reserve deputy, and Kenneth Watson, deputy. The bond for Dossey was \$2,000 and the bond for Watson was \$1,000.

put on the city payroll in order to comply with state laws requiring at least two certified water people be employed by the city.

Present water superintendent Kenneth Moelling is certified and the retired Fowler is also certified.

The council voted to hire Fowler on as a consultant.

In a related matter, the council voted to reimburse Moelling for travel expenses and for the fee he paid to attend the latest water certification school.

The council also touched on insurance, deciding to investigate the possibility of the city paying the initial fee that would allow city employees to be able to join a group medical plan under the Texas Municipal League with the employees then being responsible for full payment of the premiums.

Other action taken by

the council included:

-A decision to permit Loraine Chief of Police Edgar Haltom to purchase two new pair of handcuffs; a request for a flashlight that plugs into the cigarette lighter was tabled until more information could be gained on the matter.

-A decision to advertise for bids for new water lines on Colorado Street.

-Approval of the acceptance of \$300 from B. B. Hardee of Texas Electric Service Company for a strip of land 122 feet long and 80 feet wide on Houston Street, north of Interstate 20, to be used to park a portable power unit that is used for certain types of power problems.

-A decision to leave the city's sick leave policy as it is, since there have been no problems with employees' abusing it.

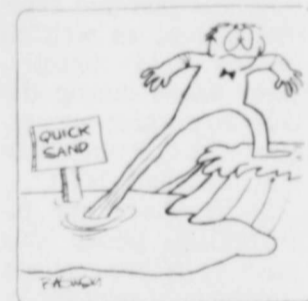
-The appointment of Dr. Joe Terry as city health officer.



In the fourth quarter, Ballinger quickly took the lead on a jumper by Mat Allen and a three point play by Aaron Keese 32-28, and would never trail again.

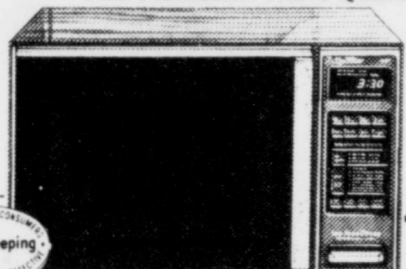
S. Tarter led the Pack in scoring with 14 points. He was followed by Rees with 10. The duo grabbed 13 and 10 rebounds respectively.

Colorado City receives tax payment

Colorado City received \$36,294.25 as its share of the \$114.3 million in local sales tax payments returned to Texas cities by State Comptroller Bob Bullock. Lorraine received a check for \$2,322.86.

These checks bring the total revenue from the one percent sales tax to \$47,241.82 for Colorado City so far this year, a .54 percent improvement over 1982, and Lorraine's \$2,322.86 is up 75.31 percent over last year's \$1,325.02.

Although the \$114.3 million payment is the largest single one returned to cities since the rebates began in 1968,

Bullock warned merchants and city officials not to make too much of it.

"Our sales tax goose is still laying golden eggs but they are not growing as fast as they used to," Bullock said. The Comptroller pointed out February allocations, based on sales made in December, are traditionally the biggest of the year.

"Last February we made an allocation that was 16 percent higher

than the previous year, which was 16 percent higher than the year before that," Bullock said. "This February, our allocation is only 7.49 percent higher than February 1982. And a good deal of this is because of streamlined procedures we're using to get as much city revenue back to the city that collected it just as soon as possible. If we took out the part of the increase due to processing improvements, the

rate of growth over last February would look even smaller."

Houston received the largest check, for \$21.8 million, down 2.5 percent from February 1982. Dallas' check for \$13.1 million was up more than 17 percent from the previous February.

San Antonio received \$6.3 million, up 9.7 percent. Fort Worth got \$4.2 million, up nearly 15 percent over last year. Austin's \$4.3 million was

up 26.4 percent over last year but El Paso, continuing to suffer the effects of Mexico's economic troubles, received \$2.3 million, down 4.2 percent from last February.

She told the group that the Harris County sheriff said, "I think it is coming back because this generation is not familiar with this dangerous acid."





Number of cattle on feed is up

More cattle were on feed on January 1 compared to a year ago—to no one's surprise—but the level is still below recent years.

Although the number of cattle and calves on feed in the 13 major cattle feeding states showed a sharp gain on January 1, the number is still below levels reported at the beginning of 1976, '77, '78, '79 and '80, points out Dr. Ed Uvacek, economist in

livestock marketing with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, Texas A&M University System.

"The main thing we have to remember in comparing figures with 1982 is that we had extremely low levels of cattle on feed and low cattle placements last year," says Uvacek.

While the number of steers on feed was up only 7 percent from last year, heifers were up 28

percent and cows, 26 percent. "This means that the quantity of beef coming from these cattle numbers is going to be considerably below earlier years when the steer-heifer relationship was more nearly equal," notes the economist.

Net placements during the last quarter of 1982 were up 17 percent from the same period in 1981, but were below levels in 1975, '76 and

'77. Uvacek notes that October placements last year were up sharply due to the large number of drought-type, light calves that went into lots. These will require a much longer feeding period.

Uvacek estimates feedlot marketings for the first quarter of 1983 to be about six million head, up 11 percent from a year ago. Although that would be the largest level in three

years, it would still be below the number of fed animals marketed during the first quarters of 1978 and '79.

"While we're starting the year with more cattle on feed than a year

ago, we should by no means expect a beef market glut in the months ahead," says Uvacek. "We still have a long way to go to reach the cattle feeding levels of the late '70s."

Disaster Loans available for non-farm businesses

Applications for loans from the Small Business Administration under the Economic Injury Disaster Loan Program will be received.

October 20, 1983 is the deadline for making applications for loans from the Small Business Administration under the Economic Injury Disaster Loan Program, according to Robert A. Lansford, State Coordinator of the Division of Emergency Management of the Texas Department of Public Safety.

Only non-farm small business concerns who are determined unable to obtain credit elsewhere are eligible for this assistance, Lansford said, adding that the loans would be for da-

mages caused by heavy rain, hail, high winds, tornadoes and flooding during May and June of 1982, and drought during the other month of heat.

The SBA identifying number for this particular incident period is 602801 and the interest rate on approved loans will be eight percent.
