# Tom Eddins Resigns As Deputy

Red River County Deputy Tom Eddins of Bogata resigned his post Wednesday morning, apparently in the face of an investigation of his background by the Bogata, Deport and Talco newspapers.

Red River Sheriff M. E. McGuire confirmed the resignation by telephone. Another Red River Deputy, Bobby Yarbrough, has also been under investigation, and a search of courthouse records in Fannin County revealed that Yarbrough has been convicted of "bootlegging."

Mrs. McGuire, who works as a dispatcher in the sheriff's office, said Tuesday morning that she didn't know of anyone who might be fired by the sheriff, but that "Tommy is talking about quitting because he doesn't like the work."

"When Eddins lost control of himself in the middle of that mob in downtown Bogata on the night of August 30 we knew he did not have the temperament to be a law enforcement officer," Wright said. "Then a week later he fired his gun several times in a residential area at a traffic violator, and since then we have assisted in the preparation of a number of affidavits which have been turned over to the Federal Bureau of Investigation concerning incidents in which Eddins' conduct and the conduct of elected officials was questionable."

Yarbrough pled guilty and paid a fine of \$139.50 plus court costs in the Fannin County Court of Judge Choice Moore on September 18, 1967, for possession of liquor for sale in a dry area.

A search was initiated by the newspapers following persistent reports that such records existed. The Bogata News is located in Red River County.

Yarbrough was sworn in as a Red River Deputy in January, 1971 and Eddins was sworn in on September 4, 1975. Eddins salary as a deputy is supplemented by the city of Bogata by way of a vote of the

Bogata City Council on September 9, 1975. The vote to supplement Eddins' salary by \$240 a month came during a heated city council meeting in which a number of citizens appeared in support of and against the hiring of Eddins. City Councilman Tommy Corbell said at that meeting about Eddins, "I've checked the man out and I'm satisfied." When Charles Guest, a visitor at the meeting told Corbell he would be held responsible for Eddins' actions, Corbell replied, "My conscience is not going to be bothered one bit."

Eddins and Yarbrough are two of 45 different deputies sworn in by McGuire since December, 1968, with a total of 52 swearings-in caused by several of the same deputies coming and going.

An investigation by the Texas Attorney General's office into the activities of the Red River County Sheriff's Department was confirmed late Tuesday. The press officer for the Attorney General's office, Mary Jane Bodie, said that John Hill had instructed Jack Boone, an attorney in the enforcement division to handle the request from the Red River County Grand Jury to probe into the activities of the Sheriff's Department.

Ms. Bodie said that the

"strike force" division of the attorney general's office normally handles cases like this, but "because of problems in Orange County and Duval

County Jack Boone was assigned from the enforcement division. Boone is a former district attorney in the Panhandle area of Texas and

knows how to handle a case like this," Ms. Bodie said. She did not know when he would be in the area to work. Frank Kemp, a Texas

Ranger based in Paris, said Monday morning that he had received a copy of the request of the Red River Grand Jury and that he was to assist in the investigation. "I don't know what we will be investigating," Kemp said. "The instructions were very vague and didn't specify one or two areas, just a general probe. We will get our instructions from the foreman of the Grand Jury." The Grand Jury foreman is Mrs. Ben (Bonnie) Black of Clarksville. "It appeared that no one was going to do any leg work on this case but us and Avery Constable Gregg Woods," publisher Bob Wright said, "and See DEPUTIES Page 3

## Wolff Manufacturing Coming To Bogata

Jerry Conroy with Wolff Manufacturing Company announced Friday that his company will establish a dressmaking plant in Bogata, and that it will be located in the Assembly of God Church building on Fifth Street.

Conroy said that they hope to be in operation by the first of December, just depending on how long it takes to convert the building for the plant operation. "We will have 15 people working by the end of the first week and 27 people working within three weeks," Conroy said.

"We are very excited about coming to Bogata and really appreciate the welcome we have received," he said. "We are happy with the location and with the people."

Those who will be employed by the plant will be notified

soon, Conroy said, and added that the plant will be making two lines of dresses, with 12 employed in each line, and three employed as finishers.

Mrs. Irma Green, who was in Bogata for the interviews, will

be in charge of the plant during its first few weeks of operation, Conroy said.

The plant will furnish a payroll to Bogata of between \$2500 and \$3,000 a week.

## Winnsboro Slowed By Rebels

The Winnsboro Red Raiders, easily the second team in the district 15A ratings, were held to a 22-6 victory over the Rivercrest Rebels Friday night in Rebel Stadium. The Rebs were relatively successful in their play against the Raiders, who had drummed Prairiland 50-0 the week before.

Good strategy and strong will marked the Rivercrest team, which sent Winnsboro to the field house at half time with a 6-

6 tie to think about. There was no scoring by either team in the first quarter, which was dominated by a 15-play drive by the Red Raiders. The drive started on the Winnsboro 22 yard line and ended on the Rivercrest five when Randy Belcher and Kenny Stanley closed the gap on Raider hopes for a TD. Quarterback Clyde Brown directed the Rebs out to their 23 yard line, where kicker David Horn put another 33 yards between the Raiders and their goal. The Raiders found they could not move the ball against the Rebels, and punted to Gary Neill near the Rivercrest 20 yard line. Neill bobbled the catch and Winnsboro took possession on the Rivercrest 19 yard line.

The stubborn Rebels shut off the Raider drive this time on the one yard line, and following the turnover were able to get out to their own 15 before being forced to punt. Horn got the ball out to the Rebel 37, and a 15 yard penalty against the Rebels, plus a 10 yard pass accomplished the Raider touchdown. The extra point attempt was no good.

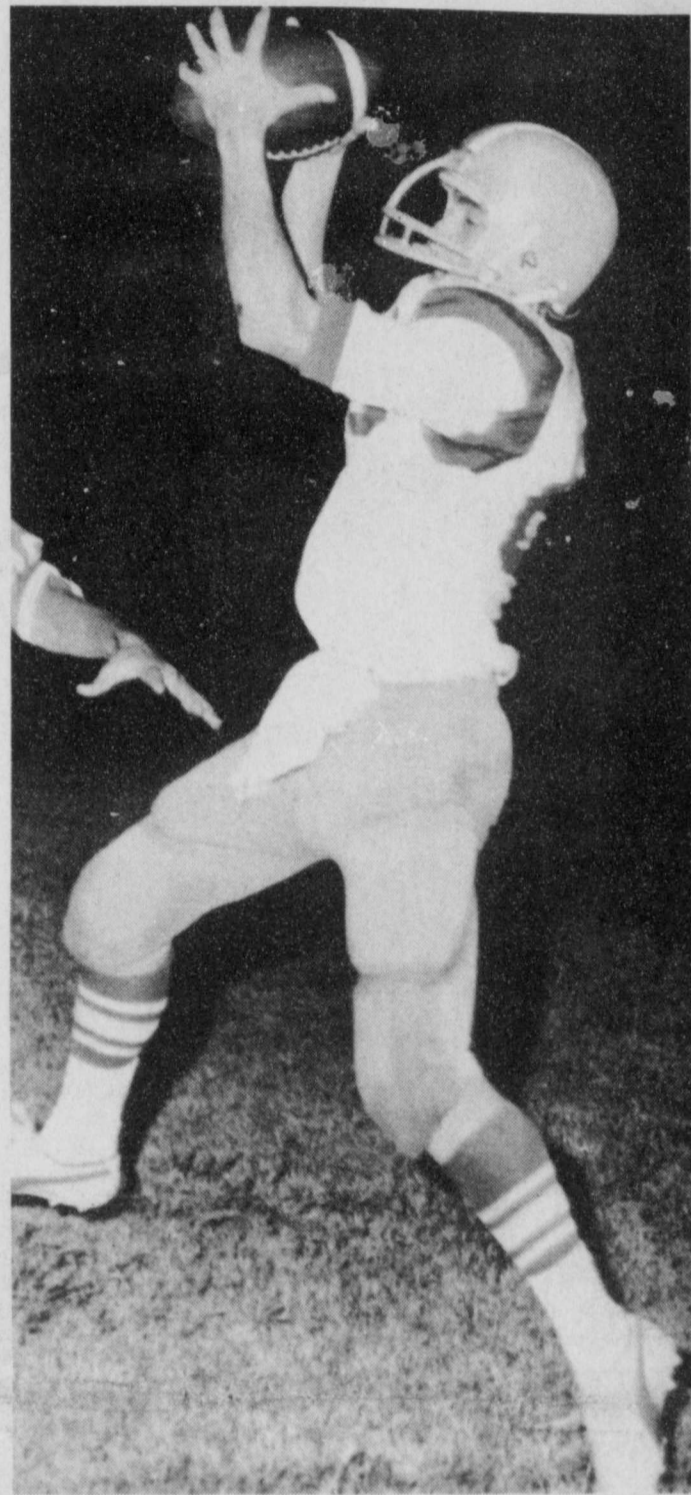
The Rebel score came with 22 seconds to go in the first half following a drive that began on the Winnsboro 43. Kenny Stanley intercepted a Raider pass to give the Rebels possession, and a 15 yard completion by Milton Scales put the ball on the Winnsboro 36 yard line with first and 10. Brown's first pass to Eugene Norman was incomplete, but on the next play he found Gary Neill in the end zone with a 16 yard completion. The try for extra points was no good.

Even though the Raiders were able to make six first downs in the third quarter against the Rebels, they were

unable to score. A Raider drive that began in the third quarter ended in a score early in the fourth quarter, and the next Raider possession also ended in a score.

The Rebels play North Lamar their Friday night at 7:45 p.m.

## Responsibilities Of Officials Shared By Citizens

The responsibilities of elected officials in our system of government are immense indeed, but they are really no greater than the duty of every citizen to hold elected officials responsible for their actions in office.

In Bogata there has developed a situation in which an elected official, the sheriff of Red River County, has perpetuated an injustice upon the people of the county by employing persons with questionable backgrounds.

Sheriff M. E. McGuire's injustice was made greater by members of the Bogata City Council, who, in the face of strong objections by this newspaper, voted to supplement Eddins' salary. Comments by Councilman Tommy Corbell in the meeting indicated that his personal dislike of the publisher of this newspaper was so great that he would hire anyone if the publisher objected, simply because he objected. Corbell said, "His opinion and his newspaper does not have any influence at all on me." Personal feeling should not be allowed to enter into a decision of the magnitude of the one made by the Bogata City Council.

The people of Bogata and the Bogata City Council have been played for fools by the Red River County Sheriff, who is the party responsible for hiring capable personnel. This is not to say that there are not qualified persons on the sheriff's staff who are dedicated lawmen, because there are, and it is unfortunate that good men will be hurt by the actions of their employer, over which they have no control.

An investigation by Texas Rangers and the state Attorney General's office? Yes, it's time, and it's overdue, but the investigation, as best as we can determine, will not center around Eddins or Yarbrough or the assault complaint filed by Robert W. Wright or a shotgun shooting on a dark night. All this is trivial when compared to the other things going on in Red River County.

Unless we miss an educated guess, part of the investigation will center around the Red River County Sheriff's department, but a separate investigation will also be conducted into the deaths of Lena Smith, Harvey Lee Goodwin, Eddie Dean Runnels, John Paul "Bully" Brown, Pete Hastings, Ada Cleveland Smith, Will Smith, and Alejandro deLeon.

Without a doubt, all of these eight people would prefer life to death, and even though attempts to wreck and-or control these newspapers, which are actually the property of all the people, have been launched (unsuccessfully) by individuals in high and influential places, we expect that the eight who are already dead would support our stand.

We are morally obligated to all the people throughout the county, in all stations of life, to object publicly to wrongdoing and incompetence of public officials at local and county levels. That is the purpose of a newspaper in a free society. If our objections can save just one life, then our purpose has been served.

## Keep Halloween Enjoyable This Year

AUSTIN, October 24—Halloween is just around the corner, and the Texas Safety Association reminds you that it won't be long 'till the little ghosts and goblins celebrate their big night October 31. But too many children—and adults—have found the fun to be short lived because of carelessness or lack of awareness. TSA offers this bit of advice for a happier Halloween.

The Great Pumpkin can prove a greater disaster if you're not careful. If you use nature's product, the pumpkin,

always instruct children to carve away from—not toward—themselves as they create Jack-O-Lanterns. As far as lighting the will-o-the-wisp is concerned, never use a candle in a plastic or cardboard pumpkin. In fact, a flashlight or other battery-operated light is even best for the natural pumpkin—it glows just as well, and is much less a fire hazard.

Don't costume your little trick or treaters in flammable outfits. The use of crepe paper is an invitation to trouble, and probably won't survive a walk around the block even if it doesn't catch fire from a candle-powered Jack-O-Lantern. Choose costumes that do not restrict movement, and eliminate masks that obstruct the child's vision.

Accompany the small-fry when they go a-haunting. Even if you must stay near the street or hide behind a tree, they'll be safer from traffic and the possible sadist who would trick instead of treat the youngsters.

Beware of any suspicious treats. Instruct your youngsters to refrain from eating anything until they have arrived home where careful inspection under the light can

expose razor blades, glass, or other booby traps not so easily detected in the dark. Watch for unwrapped or tainted candy, fruit, etc. The sick minded can be most proficient at sabotaging a child's happiness.

Be a responsible parent. Some children, especially older ones, may think fun consists of pranks alone. Know where they are going and what they plan to do. Be strict in your instructions to respect other's property rather than relating inflated tales of how much fun tricking was when you were young.

Protect your own property. Leaving your car unlocked, in the street or driveway, is a temptation to the soap-wielder. Lock your car in the garage, and anything that could be carried away—garbage cans, lawn furniture and ornaments—should be put away, too. Prevention of vandalism is far better than trying to cure it after it happens.

If you're in your auto, slow down and watch for the wee Halloweeners. They may be having too much fun to watch for you—so don't spoil it for them or yourself!

We have already provided the information we turned up to every official who might be able to do something, including state certifications and field officer James T. Morris, Jr., who was in Bogata and Clarksville on Thursday, October 23.

"We have been all over north and east Texas, have done aerial surveillance, and have been digging in courthouse records on a number of matters for several months," Wright said. "Greg Woods has been into three states on his investigation of the Harvey Lee Goodwin murder, and received a great deal of cooperation everywhere but in Red River County, where a number of people told him, 'The sheriff told me I don't have to talk to you.'"

The state certifications officer, Morris, said that a man can be certified to serve as a deputy sheriff in this state even if he has been convicted of a major misdemeanor, which is the class into which Yarbrough's conviction falls. "I don't know why the hell you would hire a man with a record like that, though," Morris said.

### Colonel Grogan Retires From Army

Col. Earl Wayne Grogan, son of Mrs. Vera Grogan of Bogata and the late Earl Grogan, retired from the U.S. Army on August 31, 1975, after almost 29 years of service. In a retirement ceremony in Washington, D. C., he was awarded the Legion of Merit for exceptionally meritorious service as Director, Division of Veterinary Medicine, Walter Reed Army Institute of Research, during the period March 10, 1970 to August 31, 1975. He was recognized for dynamic and innovative leadership while directing a staff of 140 persons assigned to four professional departments performing research and providing the highest quality laboratory animal resources support to that biomedical research institute. Combining a unique background in biology production, infectious diseases, laboratory and executive experience, he provided unparalleled service to the Army Surgeon General as consultant for laboratory activities.

Born in Rugby, Grogan attended elementary school in Rugby, and high school in Bogata, graduating from the latter in 1941. He attended Texas A&M College and graduated with honors with the degree of Doctor of Veterinary Medicine in 1946. He entered the U.S. Army Veterinary Corps in October 1946 and served continuously until his retirement from active duty. His assignments included various stateside posts, a tour each in Germany and Japan, as well as extended temporary duty assignments in East Pakistan and South Vietnam, mostly in medical laboratories. He was promoted to the rank of Colonel in 1966. In 1950-51, Grogan attended Johns Hopkins University in Baltimore, Maryland, under Army sponsorship and was awarded the degree of Master of Public Health. He was married to the former Alice Allen of Lynn, Massachusetts in March 1950. They have two sons, Earl

Wayne, Jr., 24, a 1971 graduate of Johns Hopkins University, and now a senior medical student at the University of Maryland Medical School, Baltimore; and Allen Ray, 21, a 1975 graduate of Oberlin College in Ohio, and now a graduate student at the University of Southern California, Los Angeles.

On September 2, 1975, Grogan assumed civilian employment in the position of Executive Secretary, Institute of Laboratory Animal Resources, National Academy of Sciences, Washington, D. C. He is President-Elect of the District of Columbia Veterinary Medical Association, as well as being a member of the American Veterinary Medical Association and several other professional organizations. He and his family continue to reside in Rockville, Maryland, a suburb of Washington, D. C.
