Wrecks Plague Hart Highways

A rash of wrecks occurred in the Hart area the past few days but only one resulted in serious injuries.

Jerry Smoot, who lives west of Kress, received serious injuries Friday night in a one-car accident south of Hart on FM168. Smoot, alone in a car owned by John Stiles of Olton, was traveling north when he lost control of the car and overturned.

He was able to drag himself from the overturned vehicle but was not found for at least three hours. Ironically, it was his wife who discovered the wreck and drove to the Lem Roberson home to summon help.

Roberson took the injured man to Olton where he was taken by Parsons ambulance to Central Plains Hospital in Plainview.

Smoot underwent surgery early Saturday on his crushed right leg. He also received multiple bruises and extensive facial cuts.

Doctors said that Smoot's moving himself about probably prevented pneumonia from developing from his exposure before being found.

Larry Rodriguez and Fred Popejoy were uninjured when the 1970 Plymouth driven by

Rodriguez was in collision with a 1969 Ford pickup driven by Popejoy. The two collided on a farm road intersection west of Hart with damages estimated at \$250 for the Rodriguez vehicle and \$100 to the pickup.

Fernando Montemayor was unhurt Sunday when the 1969 Chevrolet pickup he was driving overturned once on FM168 five-tenths of a mile south of Hart. Montemayor lost control of his pickup when blinded by the undimmed lights of an approaching vehicle.

Approximately \$1000 damages were reported to a Dodge pickup driven by Steven Chance, 19, in an accident shortly after 8 p. m. Monday evening. Traveling west, Chance was towing a 37-foot gooseneck stock trailer when a tire blew out, causing him to lose control.

Chance was uninjured when the pickup and trailer ended up jack-knifed in a ditch.

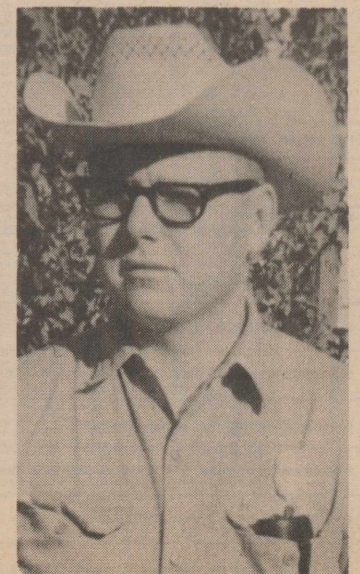
A press conference with Bush will be held from 5:15 until 6 p. m. that afternoon in the City National Bank in Plainview.

Homemakers Haven

As most homemakers have noticed, the grocery stores have been running specials on chickens. This would be a good time to freeze some, unless your freezer is overflowing with fresh vegetables.

PRIZE CHICKEN PIE
1/2 c. green pepper, chopped
2 c. sweet milk
3 T. butter
2 c. chicken broth
1 small onion, minced
1/2 tsp. salt
1 tsp. lemon juice
2 T. flour

oven until biscuits are golden brown.

SUNDAY FRIED CHICKEN
3 lb. frying chicken, cut up
1/2 c. flour
1/2 c. shortening
1 tsp. salt
1/2 tsp. paprika
1/2 tsp. each parsley, thyme
1 lb. can tomatoes
1 c. hot water
1 onion, chopped
1 clove garlic, chopped
1/4 tsp. pepper
3 to 4 c. cooked rice

Mix together and boil about 5 minutes. After this is cooked add 3 to 4 cups chopped cooked chicken. Pour in long baking dish and cover with rich biscuit topping. Bake in 350 degree

Shake chicken in paper bag with seasoned flour (1 tsp. salt, 1/4 tsp. paprika, 1/2 c. flour). Brown chicken on all sides in hot shortening. Add onion and garlic and saute until onion is transparent. Add tomatoes, water and seasoning. Bring to a boil, cover and cook over low heat 45 minutes. Serve with fluffy rice.

KETTLE OF CHICKEN

1 hen or large fryer
1 5 oz. pkg. egg noodles
salt and pepper to taste
1 10 1/2 oz. can cream of mushroom soup

Cut up chicken, wash and place in water, cover and cook over medium heat until tender enough to come off the bone easily. Remove from pan and discard skin and bone. Dice meat and lay aside. Bring broth to a rolling boil and drop in noodles. Boil rapidly 8 minutes, stirring occasionally. Add soup and diced chicken meat. Salt and pepper to taste, and cook about 3 minutes longer.

Future Homemakers Of America

In the year of 1943, the American Home Economics Association appointed a committee to study high school economics education workers of all states inviting them to attend a national meeting in March 1944 in Chicago to consider the development of a home economics club. A committee of student representatives met in June 1944 in Chicago to develop further plans.

The first National Advisor of the National Organization of High School Economics Clubs was employed Oct. 1, 1944. June 11 was celebrated as the date of founding of this new organization.

State clubs were known by many different names. Recommendations for a National name were made in sub-national meetings June 11-16, 1945. The name accepted was the Future Homemakers of America.

The American Home Economics Association and Home Economics Service in the U. S. Office of Education immediately became the sponsors of the Future Homemakers of America. The supporting groups were the National Education Association through the department of home economics sections.

This was the beginning of one

of the most helpful organizations ever created. In just eight short years, this organization had grown from 2,487 chapters to 8,264 chapters with 344,987 members.

At the first official national meeting July 9, 1948, the constitution was reworded and rearranged for correct parliamentary procedure. The reworded constitution was amended and adopted in 1950 at the National Convention.

The Hart chapter of the Future Homemakers of America was founded in September 1948. Its motto is "Toward The Horizons."

This year the executive council of the Hart Chapter is composed of Becky King, senior, president; Roni Cox, senior, first vice president; Carolyn Cole, senior, second vice president; Kathy Crawford, junior, third vice president; Cindy Dyer, junior, fourth vice president; Lisa Lacy, junior, fifth vice president; Dee Ann Clevenger, junior, secretary; Dianne Barham, junior, treasurer; Debbie Hardy, junior, parliamentarian; Denise Lowrey and Carol Miller, seniors, historians and Elizabeth Stephens, junior, refreshment chairman. National objectives were set up for 1969-73.

The first objective is "To strengthen bonds within the

family and between the family and the community".

Projects set up with this objective are Our Future As Homemakers, Stable Home-Stable Life, Make Time Work For You and Decisions That Count.

The second objective is "To help youth comprehend the problems of society and to contribute to their solutions". With this objective projects developed include To Dare Is To Care, Our World-A Growing Heritage and Preparedness-The Key To Opportunity.

This is what FHA, Future Homemakers of America, is striving to do. With the help of each member of the community, these two objectives will be achieved.
